National Vietnam War Veterans Day

Women’s History Month was officially recognized in 1987 when Congress expanded National Women’s History Week (established in 1982) into a month-long observance. Women across all fields continue to shape our future in meaningful and lasting ways.

Congratulations to Rich Barb and Anthony Hinnant on their election at our March membership meeting to fill the vacant 2026 membership year positions of 3rd Vice Commander and Judge Advocate. We also finalized our Post Convention Delegate list for the Department of Maryland Annual Convention in Ocean City, Maryland, scheduled for July 14–17, 2026.

We are making steady progress toward our Department of Maryland membership goal, currently at 92.5% as of the March 20, 2026 report. That leaves us just 7.5%—or 94 members—short of reaching 100% and going “Green.” Maintaining strong membership is essential. If you have not yet renewed, please consider doing so. Our Membership Team will soon begin a team outreach effort, as we do each year, to strengthen retention. Please continue making Buddy Check calls—sometimes a simple hello can make a meaningful difference.




Message from Oratorical Chair Valerie Barnes

The American Legion Riders was started by Garden City, Michigan American Legion Post 396 in 1993.

It began with two Legionnaires/riders who wanted an environment where Legion family members could come together to share a common love for motorcycles. It has grown to over 125,000 Legion Riders worldwide.

Who are the American Legion Riders? We are a national program under The American Legion. The purpose of the American Legion Riders is to use our common interest and association to promote the aims and purposes of The American Legion as well as the promotion of motorcycle safety and awareness. Each legion riders' group/chapter must be supported by a Post. The American Legion Clinton Post 259 is our sponsoring/supporting Post. American Legion Riders Chapter 259 started in 2011.

Who can join the American Legion Riders Chapter 259? Anyone that is a current member and in good standing with The American Legion, American Legion Auxiliary or Sons of The American Legion. There is one major requirement, you must have a motorcycle, and you must be a legally registered motorcycle owner or be the legally registered owner's spouse within the state of registration. You must be properly licensed and insured per state laws. And you must obey the motor-vehicle laws in the state in which you are operating a motorcycle or riding as a passenger.

What is Be the One?

At its core, Be the One is The American Legion's top priority: a mission to reduce the number of veterans and servicemembers who die by suicide. It involves everyone throughout the entire American Legion Family. Post members are able to support Be the One by conducting Buddy Checks, raising awareness of resources for veterans in their communities, taking the Columbia University training so they know what to do in a general time of crisis and more. These units and chapters can work together to host or support events aimed at bringing the darkness of suicide into the light.

By talking about it, raising awareness and fostering camaraderie, you are demonstrating how to "Be the One." At the department level, staff can elevate awareness about how posts and members are contributing to the cause, and also create opportunities for training sessions, fundraisers, awareness events and other means to promote Be the One.

At the national level, staff is promoting the initiative through various marketing, internal media and external media means. National Headquarters staff is also focusing energies on creating more training opportunities, resource materials and other ways that posts and members can further the mission.

How can my post best support Be the One?

There are many ways to best support the other sanctioned American Legion activities, it is best to take the concept for Be the One and incorporate it into the needs of your community.

The majority of posts already conduct events that can be adapted for Be the One event. These include a fundraising ride, corporate sponsorship, car show and other activities that posts regularly conduct. Still, there are other ways to support Be the One. For example, a large post in a populous area might want to consider a symposium or similar event where VA staff members, mental health experts and community agencies that support mental health and similar topics could present their information to veterans, their families and others.

A smaller post in a rural area might want to conduct Buddy Checks as a way to educate local veterans about Be the One and the assistance the post and other community groups can provide.


