I am grateful for this opportunity to more publicly express my appreciation for the important work of the Hospice Society of Camrose and District. I had firsthand experience with the impact of this important service through my experiences in providing palliative care to my father in 2017 and then my mother in 2018.

My father, Richard Yamabe, was a resident of the dementia-care unit at Seasons Retirement Community in Camrose. My mother, Marianna Yamabe, also lived in that residence, but in Designated Supportive Living. It was reassuring to know that there were those around me, like Joy, Bill and Penny from the Hospice Society, who understood the grieving process and who could provide me with the emotional counsel that I needed, as well as be physically present with my parents when I couldn't be there.

The community is so fortunate to have Camrose Hospice with such dedicated, caring and knowledgeable volunteers and coordinators. I can truly say these people, this organization, changed my life.

With encouragement in 2010 from a nurse who spoke about the many needs in the Camrose area, the dream soon became a whole-hearted journey.

Community support for hospice care was swift and strong; in 2011 a Hospice Society was formed. Charitable status soon followed, and plans were developed for a volunteer program that began in the Fall of 2012.

Eight years later, *your* partnership fuels the Hospice Society of Camrose & District in its work providing support to those with a life-limiting illness, support for their families, and for those who grieve a loss. 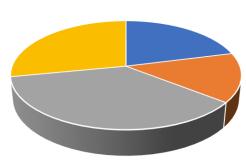


Our Community Supporters

Celebrating Hospice Programs

Palliative/End-of-life Care (Contact the Volunteer Coordinator at 587.322.9269 for more info) Trained volunteers are matched with individuals with a diagnosis of a life-limiting illness. Care Volunteers may help with daily tasks, listen to life stories, or simply sit in quiet companionship.

Nav-CARE (Contact the Volunteer Coordinator at 587.322.9269 for more info)

Nav-CARE stands for "Navigating, Connecting, Accessing, Resourcing, and Engaging"

Navigation services provide support, education and connection to resources in the community to help individuals improve their quality of life and remain in their communities.

Grief-Support Walking Group (Contact the Program Coordinator at 780.608.0636 for more info) This drop-in group meets year-round, 52 weeks, on Wednesday mornings at 9:30 am. Spring, summer, and fall at the Hospice office for a leisurely walk around Mirror Lake, followed by coffee and conversation (*coffee compliments of the Camrose Primary Care Network*). Winter walking at the Camrose Recreation Center indoor walking track.

One-on-One Grief Support (Contact the Program Coordinator at 780.608.0636 for more info) Book time with Grief & Bereavement Coordinator for conversation about your grief journey. Phone 780-608-0636.

Grief-Companioning Program (Contact the Program Coordinator at 780.608.0636 for more info) Grief companions are volunteers offering one-on-one grief support. Based on Dr. Alan Wolfelt's model of companioning the bereaved, companions are a compassionate, listening presence when you need a safe place to tell stories and shed tears.

Men's Cooking Circle (Contact the Program Coordinator at 780.608.0636 for more info) Men's Cooking Circle is an opportunity to learn basic cooking skills, meet other men, cook and eat together, and to engage in conversation with men who are experiencing grief. This is a partnership program with Hospice, Alberta Health Services, the Open Door, and community facilitators. The program runs one evening per week for seven weeks, and includes a grocery store tour, nutritional information, cooking instruction, dining on the meals we prepare, and rich conversation on all things grief and mourning for men.

Death Café (Contact the Volunteer Coordinator at 587.322.9269 for more info) Join the conversation at this drop-in, no-fee gathering where all things death and dying are open for discussion. All Death Cafés occur on the lower level of the Camrose Public Library. Please note, this is not a grief therapy or support group; it is a conversation forum.

Hospice Presentations (Contact the Program Coordinator at 780.608.0636 for more info) Book a staff member or volunteer to bring a hospice presentation to your organization. Ranging in length from 15-90 minutes, themes include: • History and Work of Hospice • Sorrow & the Journey of Navigating Personal & Professional Grief • Palliative Care — What is it and Who is it For? Call the office to book a speaker

Additional Hospice Programs

Caregiver Support Group – U.S. (Contact the volunteer facilitator, Joan at 780.672.9579 for more info) U.S. - Understanding Support is a gathering of support for those in caregiver roles. Meeting twice monthly, this group provides debriefing, resources, and connections for personal caregivers. U.S. will create space for the sharing of your unique story, exploring issues that may be a cause of caregiver fatigue, and offering suggestions for coping with day-to-day caregiving challenges that you may encounter in caring for a loved-one. Meets the 1st and 3rd Tuesday of each month, 1:30-3:30pm at the Hospice office at Mirror Lake Centre.

Daytime Grief Support Group (Contact the Program Coordinator at 780.608.0636 for more info) This support group is for adults who have experienced a loss. Interested participants will be contacted by a facilitator who will discuss the program content, answer your questions and discuss readiness for group grief work. Group work includes discussion and activities, facilitator presentations, videos, writing exercises, journaling, and knowledge sharing. Call for information on upcoming groups.

Suicide Grief Support Group (Contact the Program Coordinator at 780.608.0636 for more info) This intake-based group is for anyone, 18 years and older, who has been affected by suicide. The group is co-facilitated by CMHA Jenn Pilot and HSCD Bill Harder. Call for information on upcoming groups. Call for upcoming groups.

Threshold Singers (Contact the volunteer facilitators, Ron and Leah at 780.885.9947 more info) The Threshold singers of Camrose honour the ancient tradition of singing at the bedside for those in transition & on the threshold of life. Our goal is to bring ease and comfort to those at the thresholds of living and dying. A calm and focused presence at the bedside, with gentle voices, simple songs, and sincere kindness, can be soothing and reassuring to clients, family, and caregivers alike. We practice twice a month, 1st and 3rd Wednesday evenings from 6-8pm in a private home in Camrose.

Bereavement & Grief Workshops (Contact the Program Coordinator at 780.608.0636 for more info) You Are Not Alone. This free workshop is for people who are coping with grief and loss, as well as for support people (i.e. friends, co-workers, family, and/or healthcare providers). Topics covered include: How to be a companion/grief helper to someone who has experienced a loss, types of loss, importance of integrating loss into our own lives first, unique grief journeys, complicated grief, accessing appropriate community resources.

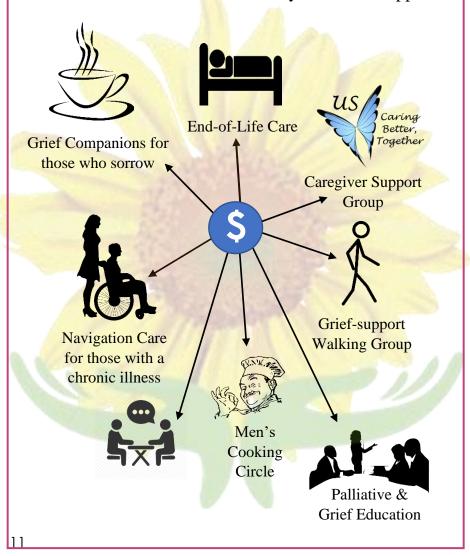
Lights to Remember

Meet Hospice Volunteers Leslie and Butch Koehli



Leslie has had a long interest in palliative/end-of-life care. Her openness to dying and death goes back to some losses as a young adult, her work as a nurse and eventually, pastoral care training when she took her RN refresher in 1994. She worked for many years in long-term care, growing her skill in being with those who neared the end of life. Since then, she has given her time to support families and individuals by being at the bedside of those completing their life journey. Her passion finds expression as she interacts with

families sitting vigil with an actively dying loved-one. Says Leslie, "I just want to support them, to be with them."



On Leslie's suggestion Butch also took Hospice volunteer training. As a younger man he spent time with people much older than himself. In so doing he developed a warmth and openness to the stories of elders. For Butch, making a connection and relating through stories is rewarding. As well, he experiences sitting beside with those who near death to be very gratifying. He considers this to be one of his gifts. His firm voice and compassion are well received.

Both Leslie and Butch have had the privilege of being with someone at the moment of their last breath. They consider this to be a sacred privilege. Butch states, "It's important to be there, to support the families, and if they have questions, you have the experience to provide some answers." Sometimes the men Butch visits are astounded that he would come to see them. The simple act of spending time with someone, listening to them, sharing with them – this can be huge for a lonely person.

In addition to beside care, Leslie enjoys participating in serving the tea cart at Saint Mary's Hospital. She says it gives her an opportunity to go into rooms to speak with people, to introduce them to hospice, and to share knowledge. Mentoring people in understanding that death is a part of life is key for her.

This only scratches the surface of the ways Leslie and Butch share

their soul gifts with the community. Hospice is grateful for the Koehlis – for their kindness, generosity of time and talents, and for their great big hearts.



Hospice Volunteers at the Threshold of Life and Death

Hospice Volunteers are often asked "why?" Why have you chosen to work with people who are dying? This was a question posed to Mother Teresa, who worked with the dying in India. Our volunteers' response is similar: "because we really care about the dying and believe no one should die alone."

Each of our volunteers carries this compassion and love in their hearts. They radiate all that is good about being human, each of them filled with such a loving spirit. Their compassion, accompanied by their years of lived wisdom, brings such a gift to all whom they encounter. They go out of *their* comfort zone to bring comfort to others, knowing how to patiently wait as someone struggles to tell them how they feel. A volunteer's sensitivity to a dying person and their families, as they listen to their stories, over and over again, shows how deeply they care.







Volunteers provide emotional support by their gentle listening and understanding. They are comfortable to sit silently by the bedside while the families take a coffee break, have a nap, go grocery shopping, go to work, or do whatever the family needs. Although volunteers can't provide physical care, they can read, listen, massage hands and feet, make memory books and photo albums, and provide helpful information related to death, dying and bereavement. Always, the family and dying person determine what it is they want, and we try to meet their needs. When we are no longer needed, we quietly exit, grateful for the opportunity to have been of service.
