This year we will donate to the Willow women's shelter in Rochester among other organizations.

Periodically we collect clothes for Open Door Mission, Asbury Storehouse, and Victor UMC's Community Clothes Closet, along with food for Easter, Thanksgiving, and Christmas Dinner Baskets, and items for Christmas shoeboxes for the Red Bird Mission in Kentucky.

They rehab homes for the refugees to live in, help them with their basic needs to get resettled, and then offer many training programs and other services to the refugees. Some of our members volunteer for this worthwhile organization. RRRS is looking for donations of operational computers (both laptops and PCs) with at least 5GB memory to help in their adult computer training program and to go to refugees and asylum seekers in need. North Bloomfield Cemetery is located at 1941 NY Route 65, Honeoye Falls, N.Y. 14472.

The North Bloomfield Cemetery, No. 35-021 was established in 1804 and then incorporated in May 1870. This picturesque property was originally donated by Captain Josiah Gates' family.

There are approximately 140 veterans buried there beginning with the French and Indian War through current conflicts.

Every Memorial Day at 8:30 AM a small parade takes place and the reading of each veteran's name, along with a gun salute, commemorates their sacrifice. Please join us this Memorial Day 2022. Take a walk through history in our cemetery!

Most people do not realize that these country cemeteries are run and maintained by the volunteering of community people that live in and around the cemeteries. It has been challenging to keep the cemeteries viable as their only sources of income are donations, sales of plots, and volunteers. More and more these cemeteries are being abandoned to the town and villages they lie within. Please consider helping a few hours a year at one of the local cemeteries.

REMINDER: This spring when placing flowers and plants on the graves, they must be potted. Any items permanently planted in the ground will be removed as allowed by NYS Cemetery Law. Also, by local policy, memorial lights are NOT allowed at any time in the cemetery.

Play it safe while fueling

In recent years, local fire departments have responded to several fires in our area caused by fueling accidents of small engines and power equipment. In at least one case an entire home was destroyed by a lawnmower fire that started in an adjoining shed during service work. Portable gasoline equipment is all around us, and many of us use these tools to maintain our properties, or for recreation. I'd like to offer some steps you can take to avoid fires when fueling gas-powered equipment. Be safe and protect your home and property! When using gas-powered equipment...

- Do not fuel the engine when it is hot. Take a break from your work and let it cool down for several minutes.
- Never smoke when fueling. This should go without saying, but you would be surprised how often this simple step is ignored.
- Do not over-fill the fuel tank. It's best to leave a "safety margin" of a half-inch or so below the filler neck to avoid problems. When done fueling, close the filler can, and move it well away from the equipment before starting the engine.
- Clean up spilled fuels and ventilate the area before starting the equipment, or using any source of flame or sparks nearby.
- Beware of sparks coming from the muffler of your equipment when it is running. This is not a normal condition, and may indicate a faulty muffler or spark arrestor.
- To minimize backfiring on a small engine, try this simple step: Idle the engine for 30 seconds before shutting it off.
- Make sure all equipment guards are in place.
- Be on the lookout for any signs of fuel leaks at the engine, such as gasoline puddling on the top of a mower deck. This may indicate a rotted fuel line or other problem, and should be fixed before using the equipment.
- Keep a fire extinguisher in your garage (in addition to at least one in your house and car) and be sure it is approved for Class B (flammable liquid) fires.
- In dry grass conditions keep a garden hose handy in case of a grass fire. Even striking stones or debris with a lawnmower blade could create enough sparks to ignite tinder-dry grass.

If a fire does occur with your equipment, would you know what to do? First, think of your family's safety, and get everyone out of harm's way. If it's a small fire, you may be able to control it with the proper type of extinguisher. Know which type you have, keep it mounted in plain view, and most importantly: know how to use it! Always call 9-1-1 for *any* fire emergency, even if you believe you have the fire out. If you have questions about fire safety, feel free to contact your local fire department.
