HIGHWAY SUPERINTENDENT Jeff Ball

This winter has been calm with about 30 inches of snow to date – 51 inches short of our normal seasonal snowfall by the end of February. Most local storms have been reduced by rain, sleet, and snow mix. Keep in mind that March is a weather wildcard. It was this week in 1991 that we were hit by a massive ice storm that paralyzed our community and left over 300,000 people without power for up to 14 days. This is a good reminder to consider the Boy Scout Motto "Be prepared" with flashlights, batteries, food, and water for two weeks.

Despite low snowfall this winter our Highway Department has been busy with maintenance, repairs, and building projects. The new highway office addition is mostly complete, and I was able to occupy the space on February 27. This work has been done by the highway employees at a great savings to the community. Feel free to stop in and see the addition any time during our working hours.

We took possession of a new 10-wheel plow truck on January 4. Anyone trying to buy a new truck these days knows the challenges we face – the biggest problems being inventory shortages, rising prices, and uncertainty of delivery dates. Preferably our new trucks arrive by August and give us time to work out any problems. Having a truck delivered in January is not optimum, but it's the world we live in now. We've been very limited in our ability to order pickup trucks, but hopefully that will change soon.

We no longer offer brush pile grindings, but there is a small pile of "rough" grindings at the Highway Garage if anyone's interested. If you have a trailer, we can load it for you. Contact me to coordinate.

The Transfer Station is open the 2nd & 4th Saturday each month – March through November, and the 2nd Saturday each month – December through February. A free permit for town residents is available from the Town Clerk. Check the Town website, <u>www.townofwestbloomfield.org</u>, for Transfer Station rules and special collection events that Ontario County offers throughout the year.

With Spring right around the corner, the highway crew will soon start road repairs, including oil and stone, cold mix paving, culvert replacement, and ditch cleaning. I will list those projects on the Town website in the next few weeks.

Overview of Services & Duties

<u>Clerk to the Town Board</u> West Bloomfield Town Board meetings are held the second Wednesday of each month at 7:00 PM, at the West Bloomfield Town Hall. Meeting minutes are taken by the Town Clerk, re-tained permanently as historical records of the Town of West Bloomfield, and published for the public within the parameters required by law.

<u>**Tax Collector**</u> Town and County taxes are collected in the Town Clerk's office January through March of each year. School taxes are collected by the School Districts in the fall. Unpaid taxes after March 31st of each year are handled by Ontario County at 585-396-4432.

<u>Registrar of Vital Statistics</u> Records on file are for marriages, births, and deaths that have occurred in the Town of West Bloomfield. Application for such records must be strictly done by the legal procedures. Please contact the Town Clerk for each particular situation. These records are protected by privacy laws.

<u>Marriage Licenses</u> Must be obtained at least 24 hours prior to ceremony and are valid for 60 days. Raised seal birth certificate and picture ID for bride and groom are required along with official picture ID. A certified proof of how/when previous marriage(s) ended, must be presented at time of application.

<u>Conservation Licenses</u> The Town Clerk's office serves as an agent for the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation. All persons must appear in person for licenses and doe permits. The NYS DEC website can be of assistance for any particular questions. (www.dec.ny.gov)

<u>Handicap Parking Permits</u> are issued by the Town Clerk (both permanent and temporary). Certification must be provided on a NYS Department of Motor Vehicle form MV-664.1. All applicants must be residents of the Town of West Bloomfield to be eligible for a permit from the Town Clerk.

<u>NYS Dog Licenses</u> All dogs in the Town of West Bloomfield must be licensed by the age of six months old. Fees are \$20.50 for an un-spayed/un-neutered dog and \$12.50 for a spayed/neutered dog. Proof of rabies vaccination and spay/neuter certificate must be presented. The Town of West Bloomfield has no dog control officer, but contracts with Ontario County. The Ontario County Humane Society number is 585-396-4590.

<u>Records Management Officer</u> The Town Clerk is the custodian of all Town records, responsible for active files, storage and disposition of inactive records, and the careful maintenance of archival material.

<u>Administrator of Freedom of Information Law</u> This law guarantees your right to know the workings of the government.

Qualifications The Real Property Tax Law requires that members of the board of assessment review have knowledge of property values in the assessing unit. Members of the board of assessment review constitute local public officers, and are required to be at least 18 years old, citizens of the United States and residents of the assessing unit which the board serves (Public Officers Law, section 3). Each member of the board is required to take and file an Oath of Office oath of office. Oaths of local public officers are filed with the clerk of the city or town in which the board serves. In counties having county assessment, oaths are filed with the county clerk. Failure to take or file in a timely manner the oath of office will result in the office being considered vacant (Public Officers Law, section 30).

In the last issue, I mentioned the potential for more chimney fires due to higher fuel prices and use of alternative heating equipment. I'm happy to report we had no chimney fires since the last edition was printed. Kudos to all who may have used alternative heating equipment the last few months.

Our call volume the last few months has been normal but included a devastating house fire in January for a family on Conn Road. Your volunteers from West Bloomfield and Ionia, along with help from neighboring departments, did a valiant job in preventing the flames from consuming the entire house. This is one of those situations where the call came in during the middle of the day and there was limited manpower available from all departments. It is an example of why folks should consider volunteering with their local fire department. Not everyone has to be a smoke-eater and enter a burning building. There is a need for people to work outside as well. Fortunately, many of the calls we respond to do not involve such a major fire.

On a positive note, at Ionia's January meeting, we celebrated four of our members who have or will celebrate birthdays in their 80s this year. All are still active, and the numbers on the cake represent the years of service each has to the fire company. To-gether, they have a combined total of 213 years of service – another example of the commitment this generation had and still has to their community.

As Spring unfolds, everyone has the urge to get outside and start cleaning property of leaves, branches, and other debris that may have accumulated over the Winter. Please remember, there is a burn ban in New York State that begins March 16th and runs until May 14th. This annual burn ban includes burn barrels. If you choose to have a campfire during this time, be sure it is in a contained area suitable for such purposes. When in doubt, the best practice is to refrain from such activities until late May.

As always, we are looking for new members in our community of West Bloomfield. Both Ionia and West Bloomfield can always use more help. Memorial Day: A brief ceremony is scheduled currently for Monday, May 29th at 8:30 AM.

This spring when placing flowers and plants on the graves, they must be potted. Any items permanently planted in the ground will be removed as allowed by NYS Cemetery Law. Also, by local policy, memorial lights are NOT allowed at any time in the cemetery.

We are required by state law to maintain two funds:

The first is a General Fund which is used to pay for the maintenance of the cemetery. This would include such expenses as lawn mowing, new flags, shed and vault repairs, etc. A portion of each lot sale and each interment is put in this fund.

The second is a Permanent Maintenance Fund. Once the General Fund is depleted, this fund is turned over to the Town Board and they are responsible for maintaining the cemetery to a minimal level. By state law 10% of each lot sale and \$35 for each interment is added to this fund. The interest from this fund can be transferred to the General Fund but the principle must remain in this fund.

In the interest of keeping our local cemetery well maintained it is important that the Millers Corners Cemetery Board does not deplete the General Fund. Until last year, the expenses have exceeded the income every year for quite a few years. Thankfully, last year we received some donations which allowed our income to exceed our expenses. We are also grateful to Extreme Land-scape, 585Tree, and the Town Highway Dept. for the tree clean-up, and to the Evans family for the new sign.

Making Home Sweet Home More Efficient

My husband Bill and I began exploring this topic about 20 years ago and thought you might enjoy some of the things we have learned. After much research, little by little over the years, we have added the following energy saving items to our home: weather stripping, Indow inserts (inside storm windows), insulation update, heat pumps, hot water heat pump, solar and geothermal. Let me share how we began exploring this topic. First, we looked at suggestions/ programs from NYSERDA (New York State Energy, Research and Development Authority's) excellent website. They suggested an "energy audit" performed by a NYSERDA certified company. The audit can be free based on family income. The audit began with a <u>"blower door test"</u> that inserted a large fan into our front door with all the windows closed. It was easy to see and feel any leakage around doors and windows. Weather stripping updates were needed (cheap and do it yourself). The NYSERDA auditor gave us a list of recommendations on what to do first, and likely costs. We have 3 small West facing windows that really got hit hard by the wind. The solution there was an "Indow" (trade name), a window insert made from flexible material that is surrounded by flexible rubber stripping and fits firmly on the interior of the window (a bit expensive, but no drafts now). We then had our insulation updated, especially in the ceilings (again not inexpensive). It lowered our heating bills and added comfort. Now the fun stuff! Solar panels supply almost all the electricity we need. Patience is required as investment payback is about 6-8 years. A heat pump became our main source of heat (it pulls heat from the air even on the coldest days) and a heat pump hot water heater (this one looks like the Darlik from DR WHO). We added 5 geothermal wells (100 ft. into ground) and ran the heat pump from them. (Absolutely amazing air conditioning and heating)! Note: We kept our wonderful oil furnace, which still helps out in a below zero day. New high-tech thermostats really gave us control of when and where we were heating. Everything had significant financial support from NYSERDA and Federal programs. We had good luck with the NYSERDAcertified contractors helping us locate the funding support. The heat pump uses a lot of electricity. Our solar array usually covers our electrical need except February. As you can see, there is a lot to learn and consider in doing an almost complete energy retrofit to an existing home. The necessity of doing a little at a time makes the conversion possible. Please let me know if I can be helpful and please check the NYSERDA website for updates.
