TIME TO CELEBRATE SPRING

Thank you to everyone who attended our last meeting at Matt's in Bethlehem, CT. Always nice to travel out to the western part of the state, and as always, our visit to Matt's was outstanding. The shop was filled with an ongoing line-up of restorations in difference stages of build. Matt's model train building was very impressive, it is truly museum quality – I cannot wait until it is complete. Thank you to Matt for his hospitality and overview of the operation of his facility. I would be remiss not to thank Don and the ladies present for setting up the meeting area and food service, your dedication made the meeting very successful!!!!!!!!!!!

The Club is moving forward towards our 34th Annual Show that is on June 25th. A lot of behind work has been going on by various members of the organization to once again pull off this event. Tee shirts and posters are in, contacts are being made for the toy barn, National has been contacted for the ad in the WOT and the insurance certificate is due any day. Lance has been busy with dues activity and truck registration forms. John is in communication with food vendors and the fairgrounds regarding the logistics needed to smoothly run the show; sorry if I missed anyone. It takes a team to make this all happen. THANK YOU to everyone involved!!!

For the past several years, the Show Chairman as well as the Officers have been watching the number of volunteers available to work the show day dwindle in the areas of the spectator and truck entrance gates. First and foremost, as President, no one is to blame for this decline and the officers appreciate all of the hard work and dedication to all of the members who have and still continue to support the Club on show day and throughout the year. We have been running this show for 33 years and have a great following, along the way we have aged as well. Many of our members who have supported the Club on show day have been sidelined with illness and are not able to continue to help out as much as they would like to. As a Club, we understand that and wish them a speedy recovery.

At the March meeting, I voiced a concern about the manpower shortage. At last year's show, one person worked the Main Gate for two hours by himself due to lack of help. THIS WAS UNSAFE AND NOT ACCEPTABLE. It is time to fix this situation if manpower continues to be a problem. The two gates generate about an average of \$8,100.00 each year. We use these funds to make donations to various organizations. We make enough money from other aspects of show day to pay our expenses. We are looking for your support in signing up to help the Club fill the times the gates are open: 8 am to 1230 pm. Please call John or me if you can pitch in. At our meeting in May, a list will be passed around to sign up. If the lists are not filled to cover the times listed, I will be asking the membership to vote on allowing the Board of Directors to pay other nonprofit organizations to collect admission fees very similar to our current agreement with the Girl Scouts who assist us with parking. Their payment would come out of monies collected at the gates. Due to the timing of our May meeting and show day, the Board of Directors will be putting some non-committal feelers to several civic organization in the area to see if they might be interested in assisting the Club at one or two gates. Some members of the Club are present on show day and elect not to assist us. We have no problem with that as the day should be spent having a good time and enjoying the show with family and friends. We are not under any obligations to make donations to outside organizations. Over the years we have always worked as a team making improvements to the operation of the Chapter. I am very confident that we will figure this out and move forward. Feel free to reach out to me if you have any questions or ideas as how to address this current situation. Thank you.

OLD BUSINESS: 2023 NUTMEG CHAPTER TRUCK SHOW: June 25, 2023

- 1. John Raymond could not attend this meeting. He did leave our Flyers with Harold Foskett for Don to include with the next newsletter and there were flyers available for members to take and post in local businesses closer to the show date.
- 2. John reported that the Tee Shirts have been ordered. The cost of each shirt has increased to \$18.05. No Youth size shirts were ordered since we have 13 remaining from last year. Not cost effective to order again.
- 3. The Dash Plaques have also been ordered; the cost of these also increased this year.

- 4. The Posters have been received and are available to members for distribution.
- 5. Brooklyn Fairgrounds has approved our contract, however it is being held up until they have the Certificate of Insurance from National ATHS in hand. Tom has been in touch with Barbara Sloan numerous times regarding this and they are working on getting it to us as soon as possible.
- 6. The Brooklyn show will be listed in the next two issues of Wheels of Time.
- 7. Rob Coutu reported to Tom that the DJ Gary Promo is already booked for this year. John Raymond checked with the Fairgrounds and they do not have a sound system for our use.
- 8. Maggie McCormick reported that she has been in touch with previous Toy Barn vendors and so far 4 have responded that they will participate again this year.
- 9. Harold reported that new half page Membership applications have been printed and will be distributed at all truck shows.

Tom reported to the members that the Cornet Band has been informed, that based on last year's vote, we will move on without them this year. With regard to finding volunteers for our show, Tom noted that he checked with local high schools to see it they require community service hours of their students. Apparently, this concept is not recognized by those schools.

Tom went on to say that annually for the past 6 or 7 years, we have asked for support from our members to help at the Brooklyn Show with collecting Gate Fees or assisting with general help on the show weekend. Again, he is asking for members support. Last year, we had one member sign up for the Main Gate, he worked by himself for several hours until someone finally showed up to replace him. THIS IS UNACCEPTABLE. We need more members (or perhaps family members) to take an active role in the show. The Main Gate generates an average of \$5,100, the Show Truck Gate generates \$3,200 for a total of \$8,200. IF more members are not inked in at the May meeting, Tom will seek authorization from the Board to hire outside Gate Collectors to man these two locations. There is no reason why the officers of the Club have to stress all day of the show about staffing.

NEW BUSINESS:

Tom Bachand introduced Nutmeg member Tom Voccola. Tom Voccola is working with National ATHS to become the Regional Vice President for Connecticut. Tom spoke briefly about his meeting with National and what his duties entail. He will be meeting with ATHS National at the ATCA Macungie Show in June to finalize his appointment beginning next year. Tom was questioned by members about assistance from National with travel expenses for the required Kansas City meetings and he said there is none. Someone will research if a Chapter can help with these expenses, which can be costly.

ROAD STORIES

A while back I had the pleasure of running down to Glassboro, New Jersey, driving my old '85 R Model MACK, to pick up a couple of wrecked trucks that I bought at an auction down there.

It is more than a same day, down and back trip from Eastern CT. So, I left late that day. I banged, and bounced, and rattled my way down there. I stayed at a hotel that I frequent, as I have made this journey quite a few times in the past. My plan was to stay overnight, get a good night's rest and be ready in the morning for the battle of dragging these broken trucks onto my trailer. And then it would be just the leisurely ride home. Maybe a stop at my favorite diner off I-84 in Fishkill, New York. I do this all the time. What could go wrong? Right?

The next morning, I got an early start and arrived at the salvage pool shortly after 8:00 am. I was told they could not process my paperwork until 9:00. OK, I said. And headed back to my truck, where I dug out some reading material and waited. 9:00 came and I was able to pay for my trucks and get the paperwork. Now I was just waiting for the loader operator to guide me out to where my trucks were.

So, I waited and waited. Finally, the loader came out and the guy says, "We got a problem."

Ok, what's going on I said. He says there are three road tractors blocking your trucks, they are all torn up and I can't move them. You're going to have to wait for a heavy-duty wrecker to come and move them. Ok, I wondered. How long is this going to take? This is going to drain a whole bunch of time off my logbook, but I still have some buffer. A few hours passed and the big wrecker showed up and moved the stuff that was in the way. Finally, now it was my turn to load my trucks. It was no big deal. Just your standard snatch block those one-way then back the other a few times. And eventually the job was done. Now it is about 2:00 in the afternoon I'm all tied down and secured. I called the shop and told them I was going to be late. I had planned to be home before 5:00 pm. I asked them to leave the keys in my pickup. My plan was to glide into our parking lot, pull up next to my truck, shut down, and jump in my truck and go home. I knew I wasn't going to be in the mood to fool with locks and gates. I was just going to pull up out front and leave her outside of our compound.

Now I was finally rolling back in the direction of home. In a few miles, I was on I-95N, and I got off the first rest stop. I got a big coffee for the run home. They have made these rest stops pretty good now, easy in, easy out. In a short time, I was on I-287N. I hadn't been on very long when I started to smell fuel. I thought maybe someone up ahead of me was running really bad or something. But, nope! It was me! Soon the cab filled with fuel vapor, and I was skipping, running on five cylinders, so I got off the next exit in Clinton, New Jersey. I started looking around for a place to pull off and investigate. I had to roll along a good way before I could find a place to pull over. Right across the street there was a storefront with a NAPA sign in the window. Perfect, I thought!

I jumped out and flipped the hood open and everything was dripping with fuel. I quickly spotted the trouble. The first two injector lines had been rubbing together. And they had rubbed a hole though one of them. It was just a pinhole, but that is all it takes to ruin your day. So I marched across the street to see if I could get some fuel line and some clamps to put a makeshift Band-Aid over the hole. Just enough to get her home where I could fix it right. I walked in, there was a pimple-faced young guy behind the counter, and a couple of his buddies were talking about how fast some kids' Toyota was. I thought to myself whoop-dee-doo!!! Finally, he acknowledged me and quickly told me they were just a repair shop and they use NAPA parts. Thus, the sign in the window. But they weren't really a parts store. Turning for the door, I thought, Thanks for all the help. And back across the street to my ailing truck I went.

This was not the first time I had been in trouble, so I decided to rummage through the trucks I was hauling to see if there was something of use in my current situation. I found a razor knife, I pocketed that. And a couple of pens, I kept those too, although I don't know why as I really did not have time for a letter. Anyway, I pried open the hood of one of the trucks and was just about to cut a piece of heater hose off with my new-found knife and I stopped and looked over at that darn NAPA sign again...It was really bugging me. So again, I crossed the street. This time the guy's buddies were gone, and it was just him and me. I explained my problem to him, and asked if he would let me see what they did have for NAPA stock, maybe I could find something to MacGyver this thing back to health. And he did. I grabbed a handful of small

clamps and some hose remnants that were laying around, and back out I went again. The pinhole was in a bend in the line. A tough spot to seal up, but I gave it my best effort. To no avail. I only managed to redirect the spraying fuel. It was now nearly 5:00 pm and the sun was going down. So was the temperature. It had broken the 30-degree mark at the height of the day. Once again, I went back across the street. I was running out of options, so I asked him if there were any truck repair places close by. He said no. I did get him to look up some local mobile truck repair guys for me and he gave me several numbers. Armed with a few phone numbers, I climbed into the cab and started dialing. I got a hold of a guy who was local. We had a real hard time understanding each other as he was speaking mostly Spanish, and I was only speaking English. After some very patient back and forth, I think he understood what my trouble was. He asked me to send him a picture of the lines in question. And I did. A good while later he called back, asking for my VIN number. So I took a picture of the tag and sent it off. I sat there pondering what a longshot it was that he was going to find an afterhours MACK truck parts place that stocked 35 year-old injector lines. And that he was going to bring two new ones out to me and solve my problem. I thought, Well maybe....after all I was in the trucking capitol of the country---NEW JERSEY. I will let him give it a try. What do I have to lose?

Again, after a long wait, he called back; he said "no good on the lines." I wasn't really surprised. He then said, "Maybe I can fix it." I said OK, come out and give it a look.

After another long while, he shows up to survey the situation for himself. He says, "I cut the line and put in piece of line". I agree. It sounds like a good plan. He says, "I go get some line and fitting...I be back. I be back." Ok now it has been several hours and my truck has cooled off. And the temperature has dropped into the low teens. It is dark, It is cold, It is desolate. I am surrounded by lots of huge creepy old abandon factory buildings. Only the occasional truck whizzes by. Finally, he returns. After about a hundred trips from the back of his van to my truck, and what seems to be an eternity, he says, "Start it up." So I did. Immediately he starts jumping up and down, waving his arms, yelling SHUT IT OFF! SHUT IT OFF!"

I did just that, and climbed down to take a look. The fittings did not hold. I have to give him credit though. He said "I Fix; I Fix!" So now, I'm starting to have visions of heavy tow trucks and a huge tow bill from having to be towed home. I crawled back up into the cab and burrowed back into my seat. My feet were starting to get really cold, and I resorted to a little tap dance to keep the blood flowing. After a good while longer, he says, "Start it up!"

This time I was watching him closely for his reaction. No jumping up and down. OK this is good! I was happy just to sit there and listen to her banging on all six for a while. But soon I climbed down, went over to the throttle linkage, and gave it a good yank and she revved way up and I held her there for a bit. NO leaks, Great! So the mechanic was picking up his tools. I was wicked cold, so I crawled back up in the cab with renewed confidence that I was going to be able to drive her home after all. I stared at the temperature gauge watching for any signs of movement. So now, it was just a matter of the bill. \$548.00 I was fine with that and so I paid him. Now it is 11:30PM. I know I really should not make a run for home now. I am way out of time in my logbook and I cannot really say I spent any time in my sleeper berth as my truck does not have one! And it would be kind of a stretch to say that I got any kind of meaningful sleep in that little R model cab, with a big toolbox, a good-size cooler, my overnight bag, a large fire extinguisher, two big shift levers, a PTO control tower...all in the way! But that was going to be my story.

Finally I was rolling again. I snaked my way through the city letting my GPS lead me back to I-287. The heat was starting to come up. And I was feeling pretty good. I pulled a few hills and was starting to get back into my rhythm. And all of a sudden, she started skipping again....Oh Man! What am I going to do now? What am I going to do now?? I am soaked with diesel fuel, I'm filthy dirty from wrestling those trucks on, there is no place to sleep in this truck, and you can't get into a decent hotel with a big truck. And I am in no mood to pull over and start shopping for a truck-friendly place to stay. There was only one thing to do...."JUST GO FOR IT." And so I did, all the while knowing that I was a few good sparks away from having this whole mess, truck, trailer and the two I had tied down on the back go off like a Roman candle! But she was doing pretty good. Under a light throttle, she really wasn't missing too bad. But of course, when I had to hold her to the mat for a hill there was no mistaking the fact that I was down a cylinder. So I put my four ways on and turned off my radio. I knew there would be plenty of chatter about the guy with all that raw fuel wafting out from under his truck. I didn't need to hear it!

Fortunately, traffic was light, and it was cold, and dark. I was having trouble with fuel vapor coming up between the hood and the cowl and getting on the windshield. I used my washer and wipers very sparingly as I still had miles to go. Wisps of fuel vapor were still sneaking in through the firewall. I had the heater going full blast. And my window open. I was still breathing in all that crap. I rolled right by a cop sitting under a bridge, he was either oblivious to the vapor trail I was leaving Or he was comfortable in his cruiser and did not want to be out in the cold. I watched my mirror and he never moved.

I was starting to worry about my fuel level, as I was blowing a lot of it out into the night air. I wasn't sure if I could make it without stopping. I did not want to chance trying to get off somewhere that I wasn't familiar with, plus, I was trying to avoid bright lights and unwanted attention. 




