Call to Order: Nutmeg Chapter President Charles Dainton called the meeting to order at 2:00 PM

It might be slower and not have the creature features as his newer trucks have, but it will always be special to him. It reminds him of a simpler time when there were fewer regulations and working for \$9 an hour was a good rate. Dale's newer trucks are meticulously maintained just like this 1966 Chevy is. People who do not know trucks, think all Dale's trucks are new.

LAST RIDE - UBALD SASKAL

Some Nutmeg members may recall Ubald Saskal. He had to be our tallest member and you would remember him for that. Talking with Ubald, you would soon learn that he was very knowledgeable about heavy-duty trucks. He also had a passion for trains, formula one racing and diesel cars. He ordered his trucks after much research and was always on the cutting edge of new technology. He used a lift pusher axle and disc brakes on his tractor long before anyone else. He probably was the last one to utilize airstarters. All of his trucks were unique.

His life story was also unique. Ubald grew up in Austria and relocated to Canada as a teenager. His first job was as a dishwasher at a local restaurant, but when a customer saw how tall he was, he offered Ubald a job painting the inside of houses for twice as much money. As a youngster he learned how to drive on a Lanz tractor in Austria. If you could drive a Lanz tractor in Austria, why not a truck in Canada? All you have to do is get the truck out of the company yard and you can 'self-learn' on the road. That was how Ubald became a truck driver.

After a few company driving jobs, he bought a used Kenworth and leased it to Chemical Leaman in Canada. The used KW was manufactured in Canada and he could not legally haul loads into the US. He traded the KW for a used Diamond T so he could drive in the US. During his driving career, he had multiple trucks with multiple drivers leased to Chemical Leaman, Trans Plastics, and Quality Carriers. He relocated to Buffalo, NY and finally to Branford, CT. He became a single truck owner/operator and worked out of the North Haven railroad yard hauling plastic pellets until he retired at age 78.

Ubald has been ill for the past 16 months following a heart attack and has resided at a convalescent home in Guilford. Ubald passed away on April 2 at the age of 88. He is survived by 3 children, one grandson. His sister and nephew live in Austria.

Ubaldi was a unique man and trucker. We extend our sympathy to his family. May he rest in peace.











Expo draws trucking fans with old and new vehicles

The roar of 400-horse power. The gleam of chrome. Million-mile truckers. An auctioneer's rapid fire. It was all there at Truck Expo '83.

The theme? "No matter where you live or work, if you've got it, a truck brought it."

Like a herd of elephants at rest, the mammoth trucks and trailers were lined shoulder to shoulder down the field, their factory finish sparkling in the

searing sun. A row of spit-andpolish antique trucks, dating to the 20s and teens, proudly held

their own amidst the modern giants. At field's edge, dozens of second-hand trucks and trailers, tarnished a bit by time and travel, waited to haul cargo again for new owners.

Well over 100 vehicles, from 8,000-gallon gasoline tankers to refrigerator units, were gathered on the former airport grounds here this past weekend for the third annual show of the Motor Transport Association of Connecticut. The two-day event for truckers, dealers and the public featured action as well as exhibits that ranged from massive engines to tiny bolts and intruck computers.

A truck "pull" pitted one behemoth's hauling power against another's, while the antique vehicles, on hand for the annual meet of the American Truck Historical Society state chapter, paraded to applause.

Guyed by two husky Halprin Co. tow trucks, a 130foot-long tandem trailer was gradually eased over on its side to simulate an accident. Later, to demonstrate new methods, air bags were inflated beneath its hulk to lift the three-part vehicle clear of the ground on one side for easier rescue.

Nearby, a waste oil furnace demonstrated how to use a problem product to heat a workshop area.

"Are you all done at 27½? Last call," intoned the auctioneer to the crowd around the second-hand rigs and forklifts. "I got a \$3,000 bid." He clinched the sale as a buyer flicked his arm. "Sold at 32½."

Looking down the lineup of new tractors (the cab and chassis units to which trailers are hitched), a jumbo rig in navy with gold stripes caught the eye of Bethany Fire Marshal Frederick "Red" Cunningham, a trucking buff. "That's a Christmas tree," he said. "It's decorated to the hubcaps." Their mirror-like shine reflected viewers perfectly. Such units can cost up to \$125,000, he noted.

A traveling salesman for Bowman Company's 14,-000 auto and truck items, Cunningham has been on the road all his life, "driving everything from fire trucks to Volkswagons and motor homes."

While motorists may "get a little on the nervous side" with trucks all around on a highway, he commented, truckers are excellent drivers. "And they're great for helping people (on the road). I've seen it a hundred times."

He greeted Bethany drivers Kevin Smith and Marcel Languerand of Auto Transport Ltd. as they studied fleet models. Their company hauls cars to and from Florida, seven to nine at a time. "People call them portable parking lots," joked Cunningham. Bethany is a collection point for the service.

The town has other trucking ties as home base for three long-distance transportation companies, American, Petruzzello and Sorensen, plus some "gypsies" or independents who work under contract. Expo official Bob Sorensen reported his company's 50 tractors average 100,000 miles a year.

In exhibit tents, the latest small (by comparison) items were displayed: from a spotless \$20,000, 400horse engine used on coast-to-coast rigs ("You match the engine to the truck," explained Marcel Cicerone of H.O. Penn, a Caterpillar dealer) to giant tires (at \$200 each or \$7,000 for a 34-wheeler) and high performance gadgetry. There were sophisticated tachographs to record engine and vehicle speed simultaneously, stops and starts and whether a driver coasted out-of-gear. ("You don't s'pose to do that, as they say," drawled J. Vernon Pert, Milford dealer).

A state-of-the-art truck computer "checks every move a truck makes 24 hours a day," noted P.J. Audley, Kenworth truck representative. It ups profits by enabling a company to monitor and improve a driver's performance. "Is that what they call a tell tale?" quipped Cunningham.

"It's become a complex field," he added. "People don't realize what you have to get involved with (in trucking). It's more than hauling people and freight."





1932 GMC after restoration




