
THE PROOF IS IN THE NUMBERS



DOUBLE VISION Multiple birth siblings form special bonds

Over the years, many TV shows and movies have used twins as a theme for comedy, drama or both. Twins were featured in TV commercials as part of Doublemint Gum's "Twins" campaign, which ran from the 1950s into the 1990s. The jingle included the lyrics, "Double your pleasure, double your fun."

But do families that include twins view the situation as "double the fun" or as "double the trouble"? The short answer is, yes.

The rate of multiple births (twins, triplets, etc.) in the U.S. has increased significantly in recent decades. In the early 1980s, the rate was around 20 multiple births per 1,000 live births. By the year 2000, that had climbed to more than 30, and since then it has hovered in the 30 to 35 range.

Experts say the change is partly because of the increased use of assisted reproductive technologies such as in vitro fertilization, when multiple eggs are fertilized and implanted. Also, the average maternal age has increased, and, on average, older women are more likely to use assisted reproductive technologies than younger women.

Locally, examples of multiple births abound, sometimes with surprising frequency. For example, the Panorama graduating class of 2021 included four sets of twins (Audrey and Paige Cmelik; Gwen and Olivia Steffen; Drew and Evan Taylor; and Domonic and Preston Walker).

Below, a few local families share their experiences with twins (or more).

AUDREY AND PAIGE CMELIK

Audrey and Paige Cmelik and their classmates in the Panorama class of 2021 are statistically unusual for the frequency of twins.

"I believe there were 82 graduates in our class, and we had four sets of twins. We're all identical twins," Audrey said.

How those four families ended up "rolling doubles" is anyone's guess. In most cases, twins are a surprise, and that is true of the Cmeliks, who have no known instances of twins in the family tree. But, Audrey would not have it any other way.

"After we graduated, I started to fully realize the effect of having a twin sister, because we always enjoyed the same sports and activities, so we always had that connection," Audrey said. "And even something as simple as going to grab groceries, we'd usually go together. So, she was my best friend that I always had growing up."

Paige agreed that having a twin is something she only fully appreciated after graduation.

"We always had someone to do something with, and we never really knew what it was like to be alone until we became adults," Paige said.

Although some twins develop a unique lingo, Audrey does not recall that happening between Paige and herself.

"I wouldn't say a language, but we would mimic each other's actions, and that seemed to continue throughout our childhood," Audrey said.

Whether identical or not, most twins attempt to switch identities briefly on occasion. In the case of the Cmeliks, the girls' skills of mimicry and deception apparently improved over time.

Paige recalled the first time the two tried tricking their teachers.

"When we were younger, our mom would dress us up in specific colors to make it easier for people to tell us apart. But Audrey and I had gotten the hang of it when we were in elementary school, so sometimes we tried changing it around," Paige said. "We had two teachers that were husband and wife, and we tried to

fool them sometimes, but they would figure it out and have us go back to the right room."

But as the saying goes, practice makes perfect. Years later, the girls were able to pull off the trick.

"We had to do it once while we were in high school. I believe we were sophomores," Audrey said. "We went into the restroom and swapped clothes before first period, and then we just went about our day as if we were each other."

Audrey recalled that some of their best friends realized the switcheroo but kept the secret under wraps. She added that none of the teachers noticed the change.

"The teachers called us the wrong names the entire school day," Paige said. "And it was amusing to see our friends'

looks when they caught on."

For Audrey, the best part of having a twin is that she always had a best friend nearby, but it wasn't always a joy. Audrey recalled that, in her childhood, there were times she tired of "always having to share everything," including a room, a birthday, and even a cell phone for a while.

But, overall, the girls agree they are thankful for being twins.

"We always had a little sense of competition," Audrey said. "I think that helped give us the drive that we have now."

KNOX AND LENOX MATTHIES

John and Erica Matthies were hoping for a baby but ended up with two. The girls are named Knox and Lenox and are now 6 years old. Erica described how the situation unfolded.

"We found out really early, because we were about to start with MidIowa Fertility. We had been trying. The doctor told us not to wait the whole year but to try for six months, and if nothing happened, to come in. So we were starting that process, and I happened to be pregnant," Matthies said. "I was scheduled to go in with MidIowa on May 9, and on Cinco de Mayo (May 5) I went and took a test, and I was pregnant."

Matthies said she decided to keep an ultrasound appointment that was already scheduled with MidIowa, and that allowed her and husband, John, to see the first sign of twins much earlier than most parents can.

"They were only like four to six weeks, and they could see that there were two,"





she said.

Mattheis recalled that, after many months of trying for a pregnancy, the sudden news of two babies on board was a whirlwind of emotion.

"It was a mixture of laughing and crying, because a lot was happening all at once," Matthies said. "That changes things real fast."

Matthies said neither she nor her husband have any known family history of twins. She also explained that Knox and

Lenox are considered "mono-mono" twins, which is a type of identical twins.

"One percent of twins are born this way," Matthies said. "It's when one egg gets fertilized and splits."

Matthies explained that, with monomono twins, significant medical concern can occur if the babies are born prior to 24 weeks.

"With mono-mono, they say your first goal is to make it to 24 weeks. A regular pregnancy is 40 weeks," Matthies said. "I went in for inpatient as late as I could — at 27 weeks — because, mentally, being stuck in a hospital bed, it's a lot."

The twins were born at 29 weeks and two days. When the moment finally arrived, things sped up.

"It went fast. Knox was 1 pound, 13 ounces, and Lenox was 2 pounds, 1 ounce," Matthies said.

Because of the early arrival and small size of the twins, they were in an incubator until they were ready to go home.

Matthies noted that, although she knows each girl will reach various developmental milestones individually, she finds it tough not to compare them if/when one lags behind the other.

Also, despite Knox and Lenox being identical twins, Matthies has definitely noticed individual differences in personality and behavior.

"I have one that's a little more tenderhearted," Matthies said. "I have one that, in social settings, is going to hang back next to mom, while the other one goes up and makes friends with anybody."

Matthies shared that she enjoys seeing the girls learn things quickly as they explore their world.

"When they catch on to things, it's fun to watch that growth," she said.

Twins learn early on that they can pretend to be each other, and Matthies recalled that happening on the first day of 3-year-old preschool. But she found a solution to avoid mistaken identity.

"For their birthday, we went and got their ears pierced, and one has pink earrings, and one has purple," Matthies said.

But, overall, the girls remain similar. "They just love being outdoors, swim-

ming, being at the park. That's just kind of their jam," Matthies said.

Matthies admits that twins can be a challenge, but she takes it in stride.

"I always say, 'My hands are full, but my heart's even fuller,' " she said.

KENNY MCCAUGHEY

Having a twin is a joy, and, at times, a challenge. But, what if, instead of one twin, you had six? That is the situation Kenny McCaughey of rural Bagley grew up in. He is one of the "McCaughey seven" from Carlisle who became famous as the world's first surviving septuplets.

The McCaughey septuplets were born at Blank Children's Hospital in Des Moines, on Nov. 19, 1997, to Bobbi and Kenny McCaughey. The babies were


named Kenny, Alexis, Natalie, Kelsey, Nathan, Brandon and Joel. The family already had a 1-year-old daughter, Mikayla.

Kenny was the first-born of the septuplets, emerging at 12:48 p.m. The seven siblings were born at a speedy rate of one per minute from 12:48 to 12:54 p.m. So, if you ever feel rushed or overworked, just imagine Bobbi McCaughey delivering seven babies in a seven-minute span.

The septuplets each weighed between 2 pounds, 5 ounces and 3 pounds, 4 ounces. Kenny was not only the "oldest" of the seven but also the largest at birth. Despite this, he claims he never held his "big brother" status over the other six because they all had their big sister Mi-

kayla to look up to.

"We have an older sister, so she was more like the boss when our parents were gone," Kenny said.

As the septuplets grew from babies to toddlers to school kids, the family continued to be the focus of much media attention.

"I think, as kids, we liked the attention," Kenny said. "A lot of times, the journalists would bring us gifts and stuff."

Kenny and his siblings grew up accepting the fact that they were the center of media attention. They adjusted to the feeling of living inside a fish bowl. Kenny reported that, when his parents had an "open house" for their newlybuilt house in 1998, an estimated 3,000 people came to walk through the home.

"It was Iowa's biggest open house at that time," Kenny said. "We lived in Carlisle until we were 19 or 20, when our parents sold the house."

Throughout the "fishbowl" years, Kenny struggled with one frequently asked question.

"The one question everybody asks that's hard to answer is, 'What is it like to have seven brothers and sisters?' because we grew up with it," Kenny said. "It was all we knew."

The media attention was nearly constant when the seven were born. As the kids grew, the media coverage, although intermittent, continued. When the kids turned 18 and graduated from high school, the hoopla calmed down.

"It slowed way down after that," Kenny said.

Nowadays, the seven are scattered around the country, but they stay in touch in the same way most families do.

"We all see each other, usually a couple of times a year," Kenny said. "But we have a group text that all of the family members are in. That's how we mostly communicate. Only two of my brothers and one sister live here in Iowa still," Kenny said. "Two sisters live in Missouri, and a brother in South Carolina, and my older sister lives in Virginia."

Kenny and wife, Thia, now live in rural Bagley, with their children, Kenny

and Missie. Kenny McCaughey is a name shared by five generations of men in the family, so they found a solution.

"Sometimes we call him Kenny the fifth," Kenny said of his son.

Jobwise, Kenny and Thia have found a balance that works for their family.

"I do cabinetry at Waukee Cabinet Works. I'm the shop manager there now," Kenny said.

Thia operates Thia's Photography, which allows her to work from home and watch the kids. The family is happy to be in a small-town area, where people know each other.

Looking back at his family's early fame, Kenny doesn't mind that much of his childhood was under the spotlight. But, he admits, sometimes his unique childhood had a downside with so many siblings around.

"All through elementary and all the way through high school, you were going to be in a classroom with at least one of your siblings," Kenny said. "So, like in high school, if I was in a class with one of my sisters, and I was goofing around in class, I could just expect that my sister would go and tattle on me to Mom."

SNOW WHITE. STATHAM. MICKEY. **NOVOCAINE. AND A BLACK BAG.**



"Night of the Zoopocalypse"

"NIGHT OF THE **ZOOPOCALYPSE**"

This is what it looks like when a studio makes an animated film that they really have no care for, nothing to really gain and, frankly, just threw it into the theaters to see if it might stick. It didn't, and for good reason. No story, nothing memorable in the cast

of characters, and just a sloppy effort to cash in on kids when they were home for spring break.





I was not a big fan of this writer/director's last film, "Parasite," but it won Best Picture, Best Director and a bevy of other important awards a couple years ago. "Mickey 17" tells us the story of a future

society that has created a way to bring people back to life after death. Instead of letting them reestablish their lives, they use them as guinea pigs to go into dangerous situations — over and over again. So, Robert Pattinson, who still owes me money for those weird "Twilight" vampire movies, is Mickey 17, an "undesirable" who has died and been brought back 17 times. When an undesirable decides to stay alive and not die, the plot thickens. By the time that two Mickeys come back to life and have a threesome with a woman, I mentally checked out. I guess I won't have to

wait for the writer/director's next release. I left the theater thinking of just one question: "What's the point?" Grade: C-

Stephen Soderberg has directed and written some great movies including his

last film, "Presence," a modern ghost story from the ghost's point of view. "Black Bag" gives us the story of government spies in England with a potential mole in the group. Many dinners and conversations later, we find out who it is, but there was really no way for us to even have an educated

guess. The movie is still good, but the pace is decidedly different than you may be used to.

Grade: B+



"NOVOCAINE"

I have no idea who Jack Quaid is. I guessed he was Dennis Quaid's son, and I was correct, but I never would have guessed that his mother is Meg Ryan. Talk about hitting the genetic jackpot. In "Novocaine," he plays a young man with a condition that prevents him from feeling any pain. You can burn him, knife him, run him over with a car or whatever.

Quaid plays it well, though it slips dangerously close to slapstick

at times. I did laugh out loud several times, but the finale went on way too long. Grade: B



"THE ALTO **KNIGHTS**"

This movie is a bit of a conundrum for me. You take a well-respected and awardwinning director like Barry Levinson ("Rainman," "Wag the Dog" and "Disclosure"), hire a top-notch writer like Nicholas Pileggi ("Goodfellas," "Casino" and "City Hall") and then hire Robert DeNiro ("Cape Fear," "The Deer Hunter," "Raging Bull" and "The Godfather Part 2") and

ask him to play two different roles? Maybe they were short on money and saved a little cash? I wish I could report that it was worth all that talent, but

I can't. It was a good — sometimes very good — movie, but the gimmick wore me out. **Grade: B**

"SNOW WHITE AND THE SEVEN DWARFS"

The remake of one of Disney's top five classic films, "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," will always raise eyebrows. As expected when you touch a classic film, criticism will follow before anyone has even seen it. In my opinion, this time the criticism was particularly vicious. It started with the casting of a non-white

actress in the lead role. Heaven forbid! Then, they chose (rightly, in my opinion) to use CGI to recreate the seven dwarfs (again,

The first half of this movie is great fun. Then the whole darned thing goes so far off the rails it is amazing it got released. There has to be 100-plus people killed in some of the most gruesome and gory ways, and the violence just never quits. What a disappointment.

Grade: B+ for the first half of the movie and D- for the second. ■

GUTHRIE COUNTY SUPERVISORS DENY CHANGE TO BEREAVEMENT POLICY

MARCH 25 - PETITION TO INTERVENE

During the March 25 regular meeting of the Guthrie County Board of Supervisors, the supervisors unanimously voted to adopt Resolution 25-20 (Resolution Directing the Guthrie County Attorney to File a Petition to Intervene on Behalf of Guthrie County in Iowa Utilities Commission Docket Number HLP-2024-0004).

Brian Hoffman provided a departmental update regarding information technology. He shared the status of various equipment and said efforts are ongoing to weed out equipment that is no longer used.

"It's good to eliminate what you don't need, so you can see what you do need," Hoffman said.

County Engineer Josh Sebern provided a

departmental update regarding secondary roads. Sebern also described proposed Resolution 25-21: Contract for Project FM-C039(102).

"This is pertaining to a project...for patching of the Yale-Springbrook road," Sebern said. "We had eight bidders...and the lowest bid was \$345,000, thereabouts, by Midwest (Midwest Contractors Inc.)... This resolution does two things. It awards the contract to Midwest, and it authorizes me to sign the contract," Sebern said. The supervisors approved the resolution.

A public hearing was held at 10:30 a.m. on the Fiscal Year 2026 proposed property tax notice.

MARCH 27 - BULK OF WORK ON BUDGET IS DONE

Auditor Dani Fink explained that the bulk of the work on the county's proposed budget for the upcoming fiscal year is done. Fink is awaiting some final information on health insurance rates.

"It's just going to be accounting for potential new hires for next year, making sure of their budgeted amounts in case they want insurance. We'll do that at the family rate, just to be safe," Fink said.

The supervisors set a public hearing regarding the Fiscal Year 2026 budget on April 15 at 9:30 a.m.

APRIL 1 - BEREAVEMENT PAY, ANIMAL PROTECTION AND CONTROL

Denise Ballard (Iowa Governmental Health Care) discussed the county's Fiscal Year 2026 Health Insurance Renewal. She shared options for the supervisors to consider. No action was taken at this time.

Human Resources Coordinator Jamie Lindsay updated the supervisors on possible changes to the county's employee handbook in the areas of call out/overtime pay, bereavement pay, sick leave, and personal leave.

Lindsay explained that currently, only fulltime employees qualify for bereavement pay, and she suggested adding some bereavement leave for parttime staff.

"I'd like to table this until we have a full board. I'd like to have everybody there to discuss this; I think this is a big change," Supervisor Brian Johnson said.

The supervisors voted to table the bereavement pay issue.

Board Chair Maggie Armstrong described the draft ordinance "Providing for Animal Protection and Control." She suggested removing the wording about "bite" and replacing it with wording of "incident" so that non-bite incidents would also be covered by the ordinance.

Health Director Jotham Arber stressed that the county's aim is not to take animals away but to have a system to address dangerous behavior of animals as needed.

The supervisors voted unanimously to accept the resignation of Bill McDermott from the Guthrie County Board of Health. Andrew Knorr was unanimously approved to fill the vacancy.

APRIL 8 - BEREAVEMENT PAY FOR PART-TIME EMPLOYEES VOTED DOWN

The supervisors returned to consider changing the bereavement policy to allow bereavement leave for part-time employees. Supervisor Mike Dickson voiced his opposition.

"I don't agree with that. This conversation has come up in the past, and part-time employees can work around that with their schedules," Dickson said.

Brian Johnson voiced agreement with Dickson, and the supervisors voted 3-1 to deny the proposed change with Maggie Armstrong as the sole vote to oppose the denial. Supervisor JD Kuster was absent.

The supervisors discussed the draft of a proposed Ordinance 25-38 (Survey Permit Ordinance). Armstrong read the draft aloud as part of the first reading process. The supervisors approved the first reading as presented with Johnson opposed. The supervisors also voted to waive the second

reading and have the proposed ordinance published. Johnson voted against.

Johnson voiced his concerns about enacting Ordinance 25-38.

"I think there's a pretty good chance we're going to see a lawsuit on it," Johnson said. "I don't know why we'd move forward with lawsuits and that kind of aggressive action when things are kind of in a pause right now."

Three department heads gave updates/ reports to the supervisors. Beth Watson provided a quarterly report on Veterans Affairs. Jotham Arber shared information regarding the Health Services department. Brad Halterman told of happenings in the Conservation department.

"We're going to be opening our campgrounds April 15, and turning on the water, weather permitting. The weather looks good to do that," Halterman said.

Arber shared updated plans regarding vaccinations.

"As far as COVID shots and those kinds of things, they're coming out with some new recommendations. We'll make those available to the public as we know more," he said.

APRIL 15 - BUDGET HEARING HELD

The supervisors first went into closed session to discuss strategy with counsel in

matters that are presently in litigation or where litigation is imminent.

A Fiscal Year 2026 budget hearing was held at 9:30 a.m. County Auditor Dani Fink shared information on property valuation and data from prior years.

"Fifty percent of the county's taxable value is made up of residential property; 34% from ag land, and then we kind of drilled it down...for ag buildings, commercial, industrial, railroads and utilities," Fink said. "For this fiscal year budget, for 2026, the levies are set to remain the same."

The supervisors adopted Resolution

25-22 (Adoption and Certification of Taxes) and Resolution 25-23 (Approving Fiscal Year 2025-2026 Annual Salary for Elected Officials). Both were approved by a 3-1 vote, with Supervisor Mike Dickson opposed. Supervisor JD Kuster was absent.

During the Public Comments section of the meeting, there was discussion about concerns of landowners regarding the planned Summit CO2 pipeline.

The supervisors meet regularly on Tuesdays at 9 a.m. The public is welcome to attend in person or via remote technology. To join remotely, call 323-792-6123, then use meeting code 547029216#. ■

PANORA CITYWIDE CLEANUP SET FOR JUNE 13

At the March 24 meeting of the Panora City Council, councilmembers discussed the proposed Resolution 25-11, approving a revised Electric Utility Inspection and Maintenance Plan.

"Nothing has really changed from last year; it just requires you to review it," Electric Superintendent Doug Long said.

The council voted to approve the revised plan.

City Administrator Lisa Grossman reported that the city will receive a \$5,000 grant from the Guthrie County Community Foundation to help with improvements at the community center.

The council discussed a request from Eric and Jenna Morris for the city to vacate some areas of alley adjacent to their property. Mayor Curt Thornberry explained the area in question is the alleyway from when Panora was first laid out, and he said the request is reasonable. The council voted to have the Planning and Zoning Commission first consider the request.

APRIL 14

The council discussed setting a date and fees for the annual citywide cleanup. The council voted to set the fee at \$29, with additional fees for certain items. The date will be Friday, June 13. More information on sign-up and fees will be forthcoming.

A public hearing was held regarding the city's proposed Fiscal Year 2025-2026 budget. No citizens attended, and the council reported hearing no specific input from citizens, so the hearing was promptly closed, and the council voted to approve the budget as proposed.

City Administrator Lisa Grossman addressed the council regarding the proposed Resolution 25-13, approving a local match for the Hazard Mitigation Assistance Program for the Panora Utility Resiliency Project.

"This is in regards to the grant that would put electric utilities underground," Grossman said. "The federal government has all but canceled the 'Bricks' program, so what the State has decided is to run this under their Hazard Mitigation program, so we're going to submit all the paperwork under that program."

Grossman also pointed out that the city's matching funds would actually be lower under the Hazard Mitigation program. The council approved the plan.

Grossman read aloud a brief written request from Mary Dorsett for the city to consider designating Halloween as the official date for trick-or-treating each year. No action was taken at this time.

The 10 Squared Women of Guthrie County held the first meeting of 2025 on Tuesday, Feb. 25 at St. Mary's Catholic Church Parish Hall in Guthrie Center. Thirty-nine women attended in person or via Zoom.

Julie Dent-Zajicek presented for Tori's Angels Foundation, Paulette Chambers presented for Children's Clothes Closet (3C's), and Devan Seeck presented for St. Thomas More Center. After hearing all three presentations, the group voted to approve a lump sum of \$14,200 from member donations and several employer matches to Children's Clothes Closet.

For 23 years, Children's Clothes Closet (3Cs) has been a vital resource, providing free gently used clothing to those in need. Serving babies, young children, high school youth and now adults, 3Cs has expanded beyond clothing to offer bedding,

toys, towels and baby essentials like cribs and strollers. The organization also accepts select kitchen items to further support families in need.

"We have grown in many ways since that first day in 2002 when we had just one client. Today, we serve families across Guthrie, Greene, Audubon, Adair and Dallas counties, averaging more than 40 families per month," Mary Kay Hamilton, 3Cs organizer, said. In 2024, 3Cs provided assistance to more than 1,000 children with 285 total family visits.

Families are encouraged to make appointments monthly to shop and are limited in the number of items they can receive per visit. 3Cs operates in the building directly behind Panora United Methodist Church at 119 E. Main St., Panora.

"We are incredibly grateful for our faithful volunteers who make this mission possible, as well as for the generous support from the community," Hamilton said.

"We're going to invite the bikers in here and have fun and games for them," he said.

Rietz feels strongly about the brands he sells. Off Course in Panora sells Evolution brand golf carts and Lectric brand e-bikes. Evolution is a trusted brand that's been around, especially in the southern states, but is fairly new to Iowa.

"Our golf carts are loaded with features," Rietz said. "If you compare our vehicles to what else is available on the market, they have far more features, they have far more cool stuff, and at a lower price point than almost anybody. The value is so much greater in these because of the things you get."

Rietz commented on the company that makes his e-bikes.

throttle."

He added that price and battery life are excellent, as well.

"You can go anywhere from 45 to nearly 100 miles on a charge, depending on the rider and terrain," Rietz said. "And they're at a price point that is below most national brands."

Besides sales, Off Course will soon also offer e-bike rental.

"They should start around May 1," Ri-

etz said. "I would say, 80 to 90% of the population has never been on an e-bike, so this will be an opportunity to take a trail ride, learn about e-bikes, and do something they've never experienced."

Looking to the future, Rietz is open to adding or expanding, eventually.

"We've got a whole bunch of ideas, but we want to excel at what we're doing now before we move on to the next thing," he said.

Q: WHAT'S THE STORY ON **FANSLER?**

A: According to discoverguthriecounty.org, Fansler, located approximately 3 miles north of Panora, was established as a stage coach stop and post office in 1871 but became an important mining town in Guthrie County with its first mine in 1874. By the 1910s, 10 mines were operating. The mines of Fansler eventually closed due to stricter government regulations in the 1920s. The final blow was the 1959 Mother's Day tornado that decimated the town with destruction of the dancehall, roller skating rink and general store.

Q: CAN I STILL USE MY FIRE PIT WHEN A BURN BAN IS IN **EFFECT?**

A: A burn ban means conditions are drier than normal and fire risk is much higher. A countywide burn ban may be issued by the State Fire Marshal when a majority of fire chiefs in the county concur. Individual cities or fire districts may also issue a burn ban for specific areas.

During a countywide burn ban, campfires, fire pits and backyard fireplaces are generally still allowed, assuming safe practices are used. Check for city, campground or park regulations to be sure. Penalties for violating a burn ban may include up to 30 days in jail and/or fines of \$105 to \$800. During a burn ban, local fire chiefs are able to approve permits for controlled burns. More information about burn bans is available from the Adair/Guthrie County Emergency

Q: WHEN WAS THE FIRST COURTHOUSE BUILT IN GUTHRIE COUNTY, AND HOW MUCH DID IT COST TO CONSTRUCT?

A: Although the first county seat was Panora, the construction of the first brick courthouse started in 1877 in Guthrie Center at a cost of \$30,000.

Q: I READ THAT PHEASANTS ARE NOT NATIVE TO THIS AREA. IF THAT IS TRUE, THEN HOW DID THEY GET HERE?

A: According to the Iowa Department of Natural Resources, pheasants are not native to this area or the United States at all, but they seem to have found a home in the Plains and upper Midwest. Iowa's birds can be traced back to a wind storm in 1901 that damaged William Benton's private game farm in Cedar Falls, liberating around 2,000 pheasants. Rumor had it, Benton obtained his stock from a Tacoma, Washington, importer. That unintentional release was followed by intentional stockings in 1908-09 by private landowners in Kossuth and O'Brien counties that helped the exotic birds get a foothold in northern Iowa. By 1910, the state Conservation Commission got involved, purchasing 6,200 eggs and distributed them to farmers in 82 counties. Farmers would often have hen houses where the pheasant eggs would be placed alongside chicken eggs. ■



ASIAN GROUND TURKEY BOWL IS HEALTHY AND FLAVORFUL

When our girls were younger, and we were running from one activity to the next seemingly every night, we treated ourselves, often to Chinese take-out. Shane and the girls loved the sweet sauce on orange chicken. My choice was cashew chicken, and we all devoured the fried rice.

We like Asian food, but, it has not been something I cook at home. This recipe caught my eye the other day, so I thought I would test it out. My family loved it!


ASIAN GROUND TURKEY BOWL

Ingredients

- 2 pounds lean ground turkey
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 red pepper, diced
- 1 green pepper, diced
- 4 green onions, chopped
- 1.5 cups carrots, shredded
- .5 cup water chestnuts, chopped
- 4 teaspoons minced ginger
- 4 teaspoons minced garlic
- 4 tablespoons low sodium soy sauce
- .75 cup hoisin sauce
- 2 tablespoons rice vinegar
- 2 tablespoons sesame oil
- 4 cups rice (any variety I use Jasmine)
- 1-2 cups lettuce, finely chopped
- 1-2 cups cucumbers, diced


Directions

Make sauce by combing hoisin sauce, soy sauce, rice vinegar and sesame oil. Save for later.



Add turkey once hot and brown for 3-5 minutes. Push the turkey to the sides of the pan. Add red and green bell peppers, green onions, water chestnuts, garlic and ginger. Stir together and cook for 4-7 minutes. Cook until turkey is cooked. The vegetables should be tender-crisp.

Add sauce and cook 2-3 minutes. Sauce will thicken and coat the turkey and vegetables nicely. Serve turkey and vegetables on top of a bed of rice. Top with lettuce and cucumbers. You can add additional carrots and green onions if desired. Serves eight.


