BARNS OF GUTHRIE COUNTY

Stories of notable local barns and the families that cherish them

Barns have been called "cathedrals of the prairie." That seems a fitting phrase, since, like cathedrals, barns are often the most easily spotted and recognizable features on the horizon for travelers through rural Iowa. And for the families that live and work on Iowa farms, the family barn means much more than just a structure to which the cows come home.

Barns have long been an iconic image of Iowa. In recent decades, the number of family farms statewide has decreased, and barns have also become less prevalent. But in Guthrie County, many barns have stood the test of time. Some have been repurposed, while others have been refurbished to continue housing livestock, hay bales, and other farm necessities.

Here are the stories of some notable local barns and the families that cherish them.

MARVIN AND JUDI SMITH


Marvin and Judi Smith's property and barn in rural Panora have some interesting history. Judi explained.

"Actually, this property was Milo Yale's. He gave all the land that became the town of Yale. There used to be a big, square, three-story house here," Judi said. "When Marvin bought this place in 1972, he could see that it was going to be a money pit, so he tore it down and built this house."

The story of the barn is a story of changes. Marvin said he recalls when the barn was built.

"I believe the barn was built in 1950, because I remember when they built it; I graduated in 1954, and they were building it a few years before that," Marvin said. "We've lived here since 1972. We've always had horses and ridden horses. We used it as a corn crib for a while. It used to sit a little further north, but I converted it to shelled corn for several years. I filled both sides with shelled corn. We had about 14,000 bushels of corn in there."

When the government program changed, using the building in that way

no longer made financial sense, so Marvin came up with a new idea.

"We didn't want to have to tear it down, and we weren't going to use it for a corn crib anymore. It's worked out really nice for a barn," Marvin said. "Now we have a head gate in there, and we can run cattle in there and work them."

Marvin recalled the process of moving the one-time corn crib and turning it into a barn.

"We moved it up here for a barn. I'd say that was in the late 1980s," Marvin said.

"Well, first I ran the foundation. Then I had the guy from Perry come, and he just loaded it up and pulled it up there and set it on the foundation, and it's been there ever since. Hopefully, it doesn't blow

away."

Eventually, the couple decided they wanted their small barn to look more like a traditional barn. Judi took on the challenge of creating a barn quilt on the building. She started looking for a pattern she liked.

"I saw ours on a calendar. It was called the "Star of the East," and since it was going to be on the east side of our house, and I liked the colors, that's how I came up with that," Judi said.

About 15 years ago, Judi painted the original barn quilt pattern herself.

"We had a guy come out with a cherry picker and put it up there, along with a cupola, and I had bought a horse weathervane, so we put that up there," she said. "That made it look like a barn instead of a corn crib."

The barn quilt is 8 feet by 8 feet, and it was repainted by a crew last summer.

The Smiths are happy with how their small barn functions and with its appearance, too.

"Now we just use it for horse stables, mostly, and I've got a tack room in there. So, when we saddle up the horses, we bring them in through there into the tack room and throw the saddle on," Marvin said.

He added how others seem to agree that the barn is pleasing to the eye.

"When people stop out on the road to take pictures, I don't know if it's because of the quilt block or because of the barn," Marvin said.

DAVE AND SHEILA DEARDORFF

The barn of Dave and Sheila Deardorff. rural Yale, is one of the most historic in the county. Not only did the barn have a notable beginning, but it is still in use today to house the many cattle on the farm.

In 1889, Mahlon and Sarah Deardorff moved from Illinois to a farm in rural Yale in Cass Township. The farm previously had been the Reuben Reaver farm and consisted of 267 acres. In 1892, the Deardorffs had a new barn built. As was common at the time, a large crew of men helped build the new barn. The workers must have been skilled carpenters, since the barn is still in use today. Reportedly, after the barn was completed, the 70 men were treated to a well-deserved dinner, followed by cigars and lemonade.

The farm has been in the Deardorff family ever since. Mahlon and Sarah's son, Russell, and his wife, Mary, owned

the farm, followed by their son, Orville, and his wife, Marjorie. Dave and Sheila Deardorff now own the farm.

MEGAN SMITH

At 1075 Highway 4 in rural Bagley, Megan Smith and her family live on a farm with a traditional Iowa barn.

"It was built in 1904, but I don't know much else about its history," Smith said.

The barn is still used for housing livestock.

"I've lived here all my life," Smith said.
"We had used it for draft horses, but then we converted it, and now we use it for horses and my daughter's show calves."

NORMAN AND GLADYS WILLEY

For Gladys Willey of rural Yale, the family farm, and especially the barn, is a tangible reminder of her family's history. Although the two large barns on her property no longer house any farm animals, the buildings are home to a lifetime of family memories.

"My grandparents, Arthur and Femmie Wood, came to live here in 1934. They had

lost their farm in Orient, Iowa. They went 28 miles the first day and stayed at Stuart. Then they came the last 20 miles the next day, with horses tied onto their wagons," Gladys said. "They raised horses and angus cattle. The barn was already here when they came. They kept their draft horses and cattle in there."

Since then, the farmstead has stayed in the family.

"My parents, Lloyd and Delores Chaloupka, bought it in 1965. I was in fourth

grade, maybe," Gladys said. "They lived here until 1981, and at that time, my husband, Norman, and I moved here. After my mother passed away, we sold the farmland but kept the acreage."

Norman and Gladys are now retired, and the barns on the property are no longer used regularly.

"About three years ago, we had a family reunion here, and everybody came out and looked at the barns," Gladys said. "They've been unused for about 20 years."

Looking back, she recalled a childhood memory at the farm.

"I remember one story after we had moved here. One of my sisters had graduated. One was a senior, and my brother was a junior. Dad sold the milk cows because he didn't have enough kids around to do the milking anymore," Gladys said. "The other kids told me I was spoiled because I was the baby and I didn't have to milk cows."

She also recalled how the barn offered kids plenty of chances for fun.

"We used to play in the haymow. That east barn had a pretty nice haymow," Gladys said. "There were always kittens to find up there, too, because the cats would have them up there to hide them."

Looking to the future, Gladys knows the barns are continuing to age, but she has no plans to fix them in the foreseeable future.

"I'd like to have the money to restore them, but I don't think that's in the cards," she said. ■

"The Accountant 2"

The month of May in the movie theaters means we see the first "big guns" of summer. We also see a couple of anticipated sequels and a few art films before we get to Tom Cruise, Lilo and Stitch and the rest of the avalanche of May films. You've got a little bit of both this month.

"THE ACCOUNTANT 2"

Ben Affleck delivers a much-anticipated sequel to his action/comedy movie of the same name (minus the 2) from 2016. Jon Bernthal reprises his role as Affleck's brother. Action fans who were confused by the film's title might

have missed out, but this is your chance to catch up on both films. Great action, maybe better comedy. **Grade: A**-



"ON SWIFT HORSES"

The film swings wildly (no pun intended) from sex to gambling to

a \$63 million opening weekend is the latest from Tom Cruise and, allegedly, the last film in this lengthy series. Without the gory details, the entire planet is in jeopardy and there is only one person on our planet who can save it. Any guess who? Like most (if not all) "Mission Impossible" movies, it is long on action and short of a credible storyline. Admittedly, this has been

a record-breaking and occasionally entertaining series, but I won't miss it.

Grade: A for action, C-for story

GUTHRIE COUNTY SUPERVISORS APPROVE ANIMAL CONTROL ORDINANCE

MAY 20 - WEATHER CLOSINGS, TRAVEL POLICY, WORKER'S COMPENSATION

During the May 20 meeting, Board of Supervisors chair Maggie Armstrong led a discussion of the county's procedure for closing during severe weather.

"From my understanding, this is how it's been done in the past. It's been up to the Board of Supervisors to determine if the courthouse, specifically, would close," Armstrong said. "I would like to expend that and not just talk about the courthouse but treat all campuses the same."

The supervisors discussed that some staff would be expected to continue working during severe weather. Armstrong asked that a list of "essential workers" or "essential jobs" be identified.

The supervisors discussed the county's travel policy and some potential changes.

Armstrong asked for opinions regarding instate versus out-of-state travel. There was related discussion regarding lodging and meal allowances during work travel.

Becky Benton of State Street Insurance reported to the supervisors regarding the county's Workers Compensation renewal. She reported on a savings for the county.

"This year, for about the third or fourth year, the rates have gone down, so that's positive. The payroll figure that was submitted is lower than in 2024. So you put those two together... and the base premium is about \$6,000 lower," Benton said.

At 10 a.m., as part of the meeting, the supervisors walked outside to view storm shelter options and view a demonstration.

MAY 27 - ANIMAL CONTROL ORDINANCE, BUDGET AMENDMENT, FENCE DISPUTE

The supervisors discussed moving forward with creating an Animal Protection and Control ordinance for the county.

Supervisor JD Kuster asked about the wording saying that dogs should be leashed or confined. He said there are many farms and rural properties where dogs run loose but stay on the home property. Supervisor Chair Maggie Armstrong said if a dog isn't being aggressive, there would be no problem.

"It's threatening behavior that is the issue," she said.

The supervisors voted to approve the title and summary of the proposed ordinance, to be published June 5. The supervisors opted to hold a first reading of the proposed ordinance at the regular meeting on June 17.

The supervisors held a public hearing on the county's proposed budget amendment for fiscal year 2024. No members of the public addressed the supervisors on the issue. After the public hearing closed, the supervisors unanimously approved the amendment.

The supervisors discussed agenda item

No. 7, Shelley Property (Penn Township) Right-of-way fence dispute. Armstrong reported that cattle on this property have frequently been found on county land (roadway) due to inadequate fencing on the property. The supervisors voted to approve the county attorney to send a letter to the property owner to address the issue.

JUNE 3 - OPIOID FUNDS, SHERIFF DEPARTMENT VEHICLE PURCHASES, EMPLOYEE EVALUATIONS

During the June 3 meeting, Jotham Arber addressed the supervisors regarding the use of opioid funds from state and national settlements with companies over lawsuits stemming from the opioid crisis. He told of the need for EMS services to have naloxone for use with patients experiencing opioid addition. Arber also explained Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT), in which a patient is given another medication to replace the dangerous drug the patient is addicted

Arber explained that he is a strong believer in making sure that resources are available in this county, because many patients will not follow through on appointments further away due to transportation or time constraints.

Arber explained his thinking in targeting youth education.

"Another huge area is developing youth prevention programs and service navigation," Arber said. "We've talked with all three of the schools, and we're going to be having some pretty in-depth conversations over the next three months about the needs that they have in the social work space. I think we can avoid some things going forward. It's that ounce of prevention being worth a pound of cure methodology."

Sheriff Matt Harmann spoke to the supervisors about planned vehicle purchases. Supervisors Chair Maggie Armstrong said she appreciates the information even though the purchases planned are already in the budget, so no board action was needed.

The supervisors discussed the county's employee evaluation process and possible improvements. The discussion included the inherent challenges of evaluations being done by the five supervisors, meaning that employees essentially have five "bosses" who each will see things differently. There was also a suggestion to have a six-month

"check-in" to review if annual goals are progressing. After discussion, Supervisor Steve Smith said he will work on creating a first draft of an amended format for the supervisors to review at an upcoming meeting.

JUNE 10 - STEPHEN BASCOM HEALTH CENTER, COMP TIME PAYOUT, HEALTH FAIR

The supervisors approved Resolution 25-30: A Resolution Honoring Dr. Steven Bascom and Dedicating the Guthrie County Health Services Building as "Stephen Bascom Health Center."

The grand opening of the remodeled Health Services building and the dedication ceremony will occur at an event June 10 from 1-3 p.m. at 2002 State St. in Guthrie Center. The public is invited.

Supervisor Mike Dickson asked that one item (Comp Time Pay Out Notice for Todd Thorn) be removed from the Consent Agenda and discussed separately. Supervisor Steve Smith said he agrees with Dickson's concern about setting a precedent, but since the hours have been worked, Smith supported paying out Thorn for the comp time hours to get his balance down to 160 hours. The supervisors voted 4-1 to approve the payout, with Dickson opposed.

Health Services Director Jotham Arber provided a departmental update.

"We are planning to do a health fair.

We're trying to decide whether to do it right before school starts or right after school starts. We'd like to do it at each of the schools and offer physicals and some other services, just to try to bolster some health services for our schools," Arber said. "We're working on the details there."

Arber explained his department's ongoing efforts to decrease the cancer risk for citizens from radon exposure. He described the information and resources available for radon testing and radon mitigation. The county has home radon tests available for

JUNE 17 - ANIMAL CONTROL ORDINANCE APPROVED, BRIDGE FUNDING

During the June 17 meeting of the Guthrie County Board of Supervisors, a first reading was held regarding the draft version of the Animal Control and Protection Ordinance. A few minor wording changes were suggested, and approved, to clarify intent. There were no public comments.

The supervisors unanimously voted to waive the second and third readings. The county will publish the entire ordinance, and it will then go into effect.

County Engineer Josh Sebern shared the final plans for Bridge Replacement Project BROS -C039 (100) 81-39 on Victory Trail over Beaver Creek. Sebern described the

"pass-through" manner in which funding for the project will flow.

"The original one was built in 1959, and the deck has since gone bad, so we're doing a full replacement," Sebern said. "This one's a bit of a unique beast. The cost is estimated at \$1.385 (million). This will be 100% federal aid funded; however, it will pass through the local budget."

Supervisor Brian Johnson asked how quickly the federal funds will be received once requested for reimbursement.

"It's fairly fast. They want us doing it monthly; they don't want to wait until the end," Sebern said.

As part of the consent agenda, a payroll change notice was approved for part-time jailer Ben Marsh for a new pay rate of \$23 per hour.

Evan Subbert addressed the supervisors, speaking of his resignation from his position as Assistant to the Engineer. He voiced appreciation for the County Engineer's department and all those he worked with in

"I want to thank you guys. I feel like the board has always had my back these 15 years," Subbert said.

PANORA CITY COUNCIL BUYS SKID LOADER, DISCUSSES SIDEWALK INSPECTIONS, BRUSH FACILITY HOURS, DEAD GRASS

MAY 27 - ROAD CLOSURES, SKID LOADER PRICING, BRUSH FACILITY HOURS

During the May 27 meeting of the Panora City Council, the councilmembers approved Resolution 25-24, authorizing the closure of Iowa Highway 44 and other city streets at certain times during Panorama Days, Aug. 1-3.

City Administrator Lisa Grossman updated the council on the city's plans to purchase a new skid loader.

"Our budget, we were looking around \$60,000, and they are going to give us \$15,200 for our trade-in," Grossman said. "With everything, it came to about \$64,500 with our

trade-in."

As part of the Consent Items, the council approved a retail liquor license renewal for Local Liquor.

Grossman reported that no citizens had preregistered to address the council on any matters during the Public Forum portion of the meeting.

Grossman explained that the city's brush facility is now open, 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. daily, seven days a week. She reported that some violations of allowed usage have already been caught on camera.

JUNE 9 - SKID LOADER PURCHASE, SIDEWALK INSPECTIONS, CLEANUP DAY, DEAD GRASS

During the meeting of the Panora

City Council on June 9, the council approved the purchase of a Ziegler CAT 2025 Caterpillar skid loader for \$64,583. The city's old skid loader will be traded in for approximately \$15,000.

City Administrator Lisa Grossman and the council discussed the city's sidewalk inspections and possible action regarding incomplete blocks that currently have partial sidewalks. Grossman explained that the city requires sidewalk to be installed with new construction, but some properties have no sidewalk on blocks that have sidewalk.

Grossman explained that, in some areas, sidewalk is not present because some areas are considered "drainage ditch." Mayor Curt Thornberry said that in years past, the city has also identified other properties where side-

walk is missing, but previous councils have not chosen to require those properties to have sidewalk installed. Thornberry said that this is up to the council to decide. No formal action was taken at this time. The city will send out letters to inform the property owners who are missing sidewalk (or with badly damaged sidewalk), but the letter does not require that sidewalk be installed.

Grossman reported on the city's upcoming cleanup day.

"We had 43 people sign up for cleanup day, which is this Friday. The deadline was last Friday," Grossman said.

During the Public Forum portion of the meeting, Allie Halsey addressed the council about a concern. She showed pictures of a portion of her lawn.

and I'm here to talk about the spraying the city has done along the curb at my address. I think you'll see in the first picture, there's over a foot of dead grass along the curb," Halsey said.

Halsey said she also has a company that treats her lawn for weeds. She suggested the city could inform property owners before spraying, so that kids and pets could be kept away. Since the issue was not on the agenda, no council action was taken at this time.

The council approved several licenses and permits, including an 8-month

special Class C Retail Alcohol License for Off Course Golf Carts, a 12-month Special Class C Retail Alcohol License for Pedal-In, and Tobacco licenses for Casey's and Dollar General.

GUTHRIE COUNTY HOSPITAL PREPS FOR GOV. REYNOLDS VISIT

During the May 22 meeting of the Guthrie County Hospital Board of Trustees, CEO Chris Stipe talked about the upcoming May 28 visit from Gov. Kim Reynolds.

"We do have quite an event planned here Wednesday. Invitation only," Stipe said. "The governor will be signing a couple of bills that impact healthcare positively, and she wanted to do that at one of the hospitals, and we were lucky to be asked to participate."

Chief Financial Officer Brandon Johnson provided a monthly report. He said that nearing the end of the fiscal year, the hospital's financial statements look good.

"If historical trends and current indicators are correct, we should be finishing the year strong," he said. "May is also going well."

CEO Chris Stipe pointed out that the

current fiscal year status is much better than a year ago.

"From an income statement perspective, you look at where we were last year. We had a \$1.5 million loss," Stipe said. "So, it's pretty good."

Chief Nursing Officer Sandy Atkinson told of training that the nursing staff will begin to take called MOAB, which stands for Management of Aggressive Behavior. She said it will help staff safely deal with patients who may become a threat.

Foundation Chair Dennis Flanery discussed the upcoming fundraiser golf tournament.

"We're taking registrations for that right now. This will be our 25th anniversary, so we're doing some extra special stuff this year," he said. "It will fill up; the golf course is only allowing 40 teams."

The next regular meeting of the trustees is set for June 26 at 4 p.m. The public is welcome. ■



Q: HOW DOES SOMEONE GO ABOUT BECOMING THE GUTHRIE COUNTY FAIR QUEEN?

A: The following information is available on the fair's website www.guthriecounty-fair.com.

Applicants are encouraged to be involved in a community organization, such as 4-H, FFA, girl scouts, church group, etc. Applicants are not limited to 4-H and FFA membership. The young lady chosen will not only represent Guthrie County at the Iowa State Fair Queen competition but will also be awarded a \$300 scholarship from the Guthrie County Fair Board at the conclusion of her reign. The competition is open to young ladies between the ages of 16 and not older than 21 years of age on Aug. 13, the first day of the 2026 Iowa State Fair. The candidate must reside within Guthrie County (or an adjoining county if the majority of her activities are within Guthrie County). Contestants must never have been married or have had children. Complete rules and the application request form can be completed at www. guthriecountyfair.com. The deadline to request an application is July 5. Applications will be mailed to candidates after receiving their request and must be returned by July 15. Q: WHAT IS GOING ON AT THE AIRPORT WITH ALL THE CONSTRUCTION EQUIPMENT?

A: We asked this question to Matt Pearey, the airport board chair, and he provided details.

"The current construction project is the re-paving of the airport apron," Pearey said. "The timeline, weather permitting, is to have the project completed by the end of July."

An airport's apron (also known as the ramp or tarmac) is the area where aircraft can be parked, loaded and unloaded, and serviced.

The total cost of the project, including design and construction, is expected to be around \$1.6 million. Pearey explained why the project was needed.

"It began as just fixing the existing ramp, as that concrete was getting to a point where it could be hazardous for smaller aircraft," he said. "We are actually extending the ramp area further to the south to move the fuel pump station."

The project is 90% grant-funded, with the airport receiving three federal grants through the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA).

Q: WHERE CAN I PROPERLY RETIRE A TATTERED AMERICAN FLAG LOCALLY?

A: A flag disposal box is located inside the Panora Library. Bring your worn-out American flag to the library or place in the book return slot after hours. Boy Scout Troop 153 will collect the flags and conduct a flag retirement service throughout the year.

Q: WHEN ARE THE PANORA AND GUTHRIE CENTER FARMERS MARKETS?

A: The Panora and Guthrie Center farmers markets alternate weeks, meaning that each Saturday from June 7 through Sept. 20, shoppers can easily find local produce. The season kicked off on Saturday, June 7 at the Panora farmers market (held every other week at the Guthrie County Historical Village, 206 W. South St.). Hours will be 9 to noon. On the opposite Saturdays, the Guthrie Center farmers market will run from 9-11 a.m. in downtown Guthrie Center

Q: THERE WERE SOME NEIGHBORS ASKING WHY THERE HAVE BEEN PILES OF REMOVED TREES ALONG THE ROUTE FROM STUART FOR TWO YEARS. ANY CHANCE YOU CAN DO SOME RESEARCH ON THIS MATTER?

A: We asked this question to Maggie Armstrong with the Guthrie County Board of Supervisors. She spoke with County Engineer Josh Sebern about the project and reported back the following: "The P28/ Wagon Road right-of-way tree/brush clearing started in the winter of 2023/2024. The top reasons for this project are to manage the vegetation and wildlife and provide additional visibility for motorists. With regular maintenance, this very large-scale project should be a permanent solution. The county will burn the piles a year or so after they've been cut and when there is snow on the ground to prevent the fire from spreading."







COLLISION CONCEPTS FIXES 'FENDER BENDERS' AND MORE

Deer accidents are keeping the Storesunds busy in Bagley.

Quintin and Tonya Storesund are the owners and sole employees of an auto body repair shop named Collision Concepts, in Bagley. As the business name would suggest, much of the work completed at Collision Concepts is to repair damage caused by any type of impact between a vehicle and anything else. In Guthrie County, many of those impacts involve deer.

"With all of the deer running around, that's the majority of what we're doing here," Tonya said. "Sometimes, we're booked out two or three months, but with it being a one-man show, he does the whole job from start to finish."

The shop is open 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on weekdays and closed on weekends. While Quintin does the repairs, Tonya handles everything else. The business phone number is 641-427-5831.

"We opened up in 2003. It's just him and I — a husband-and-wife team," Tonya said. "I handle the writing of the estimates, dealing with insurance companies, billing, and keeping the customers up to date."

The Storesunds have lived at Lake Pan-

orama since 2000 and have operated their business in Bagley since 2003. They have three children, with one still at home, and two grandsons.

Quintin earned a degree in the auto body program from Northwest Iowa

Community College, but he says his education is "never-ending." As vehicles have become more computerized, sensors and cameras are installed in many locations as safety enhancements. Because of this, auto body work has become much more

complex. To deal with the ever-changing challenges, Quintin maintains an I-CAR (Inter-Industry Conference on Auto Collision Repair) Gold Class certification.

Another significant part of Quintin's work is calibration, which means the



aligning and adjusting of sensors and cameras to ensure proper functioning of features (such as Advanced Driver Assistance Systems, lane-departure warning and automatic emergency braking), especially after repairs or replacements. This is often true even if the sensor or camera wasn't replaced.

"A lot of times, if we've removed a front bumper and put it back on, we may have to recalibrate it," Tonya said.

To handle this work, the Storesunds added a separate building directly across the street from their shop specifically for calibration. Tonya explained why a separate area was needed.

"You've got to have a lot of room around the vehicle in order for the calibration to work," she said.

According to Tonya, many customers do not realize that Collision Repairs offers windshield repair.

"We do windshield repairs, both the

entire windshield replacement and also rock-chip repairs," she said.

Collision Concepts also offers specialty products to protect vehicles from specific damages.

"We also do 3M ceramic kits and 3M paint protection film. It's a clear film that goes along the rocker panels of your vehicle," Tonya said. "It's great for vehicles that drive on gravel roads."

Tonya added that some of what Quintin works on isn't auto body work.


"He does do some mechanic stuff," she said. "He'll do radiators and condensers, but as far as engines and oil changes, no."

In years past, the Storesunds have sometimes employed others to help handle the workload, and that is a possibility they may consider again when the time is right.

"We always have the room and equipment to expand if that right person comes along," Quintin said. ■

HARBAUGH SHARES HER COLLECTION OF BARN REPLICAS

Companies that create and sell items that are part of a set or collection have often used the phrase "Collect them all" to encourage customers to do just that. For many collectors, the search is the thrill. Another frequently used term is "Limited Edition" to encourage buyers to act quickly before supplies run out. Those marketing approaches are often successful, as shown in this example from Janice Harbaugh.

Harbaugh has collected all of the pieces in a collection called the "American Country Barn Series." She recalled how she first became interested in the collec-

"My husband and I had an acreage at Mitchellville. After we retired and moved, we would go to farm sales, and he would look at tractors. While he was doing that, I would go to antique shops or flea markets," Harbaugh said. "I noticed these little barns every so often, and I saw they were part of a collection, and I decided to try to collect them. I thought this could be something fun to pursue."

At first, Harbaugh added to her collec-

tion mostly by chance, when she would happen upon a piece that she had not yet obtained. Later, she was actively search-

"At first, I started finding them every so

often. And, eventually, I had to go on eBay to find the ones I was missing, and the last one I found was the ultimate one, the Frank Lloyd Wright barn," Harbaugh said. "I started collecting them in 2010 and fin-

ished about five years later."

The barns featured in the collection include examples from around the country with roughly half being from Midwestern states. However, the collection includes

examples from other areas including Montana, Massachusetts, Virginia and Oregon.

Harbaugh noted that the miniatures are replicas of actual barns, and she believes each of the full-size barns is still standing. She added that the one Iowa barn in the collection (Elkader, Iowa) was deteriorating but received renovations some years back.

"There are 17 in the collection, and they're made by Ertl," Harbaugh said. "That's a farm toy company that started in 1945, and in the 1990s they made this collection of barns. The barns are historical and architecturally significant, too."

Included in the collection are George

Washington's 16-sided barn (Mount Vernon, Virginia) and Frank Lloyd Wright's Midway Barn (Spring Green, Wisconsin).

Since completing her collection, Harbaugh has occasionally displayed the items so others can enjoy them, too. The complete collection is currently displayed at the Jamaica Library in the window display so patrons can enjoy viewing the items even when the library is closed.

Although Harbaugh didn't collect the items for a monetary investment, she is aware that the value has increased over time.

"The Frank Lloyd Wright barn has been listed for \$150, but I didn't pay anywhere near that much," Harbaugh said. ■

In 1898, the women donated their own books and solicited additional books to establish a library for Panora. Voting rights were achieved Oct. 21, 1919, so the club reorganized and became The Panora Women's Club.

In September 1925, The Panora Garden Club was formed as a department of The Panora Women's Club. The group reported each month as part of the regular minutes. The Garden Club continued as a department of The Panora Women's Club but eventually gained equal status. The Women's Club disbanded in 1998, and the Garden Club took root and bloomed.

CURRENT PROJECTS

Current projects of the Panora Garden Club include planting and maintaining the bright blue pots highlighting the business areas; the new Pink Petunia Trees flanking the gazebo steps; the planters at Michael Mills Memorial Park; and the Raccoon Valley Bike Trail. The revitalization of Heritage Park on the North Edge of town along the bike trail is also underway.

Watering these areas became easier using a new cart with water tank that was



comedy movies, attending concerts and being a huge jokester, playing pranks on many friends and family members, who often found ways to get him back.



Marvin Cline (Ilene) of Huntington Beach, California; as well as many other family and friends.


Ed will be greatly missed, but his memory will live on with his family and friends.




Ingredients:
