## PANORAMA DAYS

## "Navigating our past, sailing into our future," Aug. 1-3.

This year's theme for Panorama Days is "Navigating our past, sailing into our future." After more than 50 years, Panorama Days has developed a rich history and become a premier event in the area. The event is now held on the first full weekend (Friday through Sunday) in August, which, this year, is Aug. 1-3.

Naturally, the celebration has evolved over the decades. The first event was originally scheduled to be held on Aug. 2, 1969, but was postponed until June 1970. That initial celebration included a breakfast, a parade, water fights between the Panora and Guthrie Center Fire Departments, a watermelon feed, Little League baseball and a teen dance.

A double-dose of Panorama Days happened in 1970 with another event held Sept. 12. That event included a skydiving demonstration, a greased pig contest, pony rides, and bingo. Since then, Panorama Days has been celebrated every year except 2020 (due to the COVID-19 pandemic).

Panora Chamber of Commerce Coordinator Erica Matthies provided details on this year's schedule. Most of the weekend's events will happen at or near Panora's main square. One of the highlights is the downtown parade with many of the floats designed to match the year's theme.

#### THE PARADE AND OTHER TRADITIONAL EVENTS

"The parade is Saturday morning at 10 a.m. Registration for the parade will be at the elementary school at 9 a.m.," Matthies said. "One new thing this year is we are doing some payouts for the float winners. Be on the lookout for more information, but each division will have a payout. We're envisioning a lot of boat-type floats, probably."

Matthies highlighted some of the many other parts of the Panorama Days weekend

"A lot of the traditional events will be included again this year. Chalk the Block will be Friday at 4 p.m. for kids of all ages, and the kids' cake walk will be Friday at 7 p.m.," Matthies said. "At 7 p.m. on Friday, Twin Vines Winery is having Wine and Yoga, so before you come to the street dance, you can go there and get all 'zenned-up.' Main Street Dance Studio will be performing, and the Bill Riley Talent Show will follow that. We are having live music on Friday from 6-8 p.m., so when people are uptown, there will be live music played by Kile Jackson. Then the main act will be Oreo Meatwagon, and they start at 8:30 p.m. Around 8:15 p.m., we'll have our Little Miss and Little Mister announcement, and we're actually having our Homecoming King and Queen on hand to crown the Little Miss and Little Mister."

On Friday, Aug. 1, 2-4 p.m., a cribbage tournament will be held at the Panora Community Center. There is a \$5 entry fee, and \$100 in prize money to be won.

#### **A NEW SOUND SYSTEM**

Matthies explained that one major

upgrade is the city's new sound system, which will be used throughout Panorama Days.

"Also, on Friday evening around 8:15 p.m., we'll do a little speaker recognition project to recognize those who have been a large part of the fundraising effort for the new speaker system, which will be up and running for Panorama Days."

#### **MORE SATURDAY ACTIVITIES**

"On Saturday, we, of course, have the bass fishing tournament, pancake breakfast, and the 5K run/walk. Online registration for the 5K is appreciated, or you can register in person that morning, 7-7:45 a.m., with the run starting at 8 a.m.," Matthies said. "At 11-ish, immediately following the parade, we'll have

the Citizen of the Year announcement and parade winners' announcement. Parade winners will need to be present to get their prizes."

At noon on Saturday, a bags tournament will be held on Main Street. The tournament will have an 80% payout.

Saturday offerings continue throughout the afternoon and evening.

"We have our family fun zone again, and we are adding live music on Saturday as well. From 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. is Dale Menning and the Stardusters," Matthies said. "The classic car show is 11:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.. Another new feature is the bags tournament, with 90% of the fees paid out to the top three teams. Bags will begin at noon, with two-person teams. If all 32 team spots are filled, the winning team will get around \$500, maybe even a little more than that. We're having live music with Four Shades of Grey from 1:30-3:30 p.m."

#### **WATER SKI SHOW**

One of the longtime highlights of Panorama Days has been the water skiing show. The Lake Panorama Ski Team has been a part of Panorama Days for more than 40 years. This year's show will begin at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, Aug. 2 with parking and viewing on Lake Panorama's south shore.

The theme for the 2025 show is "Making Waves Since 1985." The history of water skiing, which began in 1922 in Lake City, Minnesota, will be show-cased with costumes, music and onshore skits that allow the water to calm down between acts.

Prior to the show, members of the ski team will be in the Panorama Days parade towing the Ski Team boat with kids "skiing" behind the boat and adults throwing candy.

The ski team has 42 members this year with 32 of those skiing. Others help with ropes, boat driving, music, photog-



There are 12 kids skiing this year, ranging in age from 5 to 16. Of the 20 adult skiers, the youngest is 18 years old, and the oldest is in his 70s.

For many, ski team is a family activity. The Reese and Lefkow families both have three generations involved.

The Reese family includes Grandpa Mark, his son Eric, daughter Sara Mills, and Sara's kids, Tate, Reese and Chloe. The Lefkow family includes Grandpa Bruce, Grandma Liz, daughter Laura Eslinger, and Laura's daughters, Evelyn and Ella.

New members of all ages are welcome

to join the ski team. The only requirement is membership in the Lake Panorama Association.

Ski team practice starts at the end of May. Practices are held each Thursday night, weather permitting, from 6-8:30 p.m. In June, team members spend most practices trying different things. As the kids get older and bigger, they try different acts each year.

In July, the team firms up the act. Practices are held both Tuesday and Thursday the last two weeks of July. Practices the last week of July are dress rehearsals with the skits and music.





Matthies shared information for visitors from out of town.

"There's designated handicapped parking spots near the Community Center," Matthies said. "One of the other things to keep in mind, for anyone coming to the Community Center for the pancake breakfast, just be mindful that the 5K will be going on at the same time, so cars might need to go on the south side of Main Street and wrap around up past City Hall to get to the Community Center. The 5K route is kind of on the

north side of town."

Matthies shared how another local event, though technically not a part of Panorama Days, will serve as an "appetizer" for the weekend.

"Thursday night (July 31), Twin Vines Winery is doing something to kick off the weekend. Josh Sinclair will be playing live music 6-9 p.m., and they're having Rockets Raccoon Valley Catering," Matthies said.

More details on Panorama Days will be posted as the event approaches, on the Panora Chamber of Commerce website (panorachamber.org) and Facebook page. Matthies noted that there are also links to registration forms for the parade, 5K and bags tournament.

Matthies thanked all who help make Panorama Days a success and encourages everyone to participate.

"A lot of people help, and it's worth it. It makes for a fun and busy weekend," she said. ■

### **WILSON, WICK, A DRAGON, AND A ZOMBIE MOVIE THAT WILL BRING TEARS.**

The summer movie season is in full swing as we go from big box office movie to big box office movie every week. As I write this, we are preparing to see an early screening of the new Brad Pitt movie "F1." Expectations are high, and my inside source who has already seen it praised it highly. Here's a quick catch-up for those who have not made it to the theaters recently.

#### "FROM THE WORLD OF JOHN **WICK: BALLERINA"**

With this pompous title, we are expected to enjoy a film so dark in its tone and so violent in its action that is not only not good but is literally boring. Keanu Reeves stumbles through scenes just occasionally to remind us of how good the first two John Wick movies were. Grade: C-

#### "STICK"

(on Apple TV)

Owen Wilson plays a former golf pro who had a meltdown and lost his career (and, presumably, his fortune). The first episode was brilliant comedy, but the subsequent episodes have been hit and miss, at best. Grade: B-

#### "DEPT. Q"

(on Netflix)

This show may remind you of the old TV series on FOX titled "House." Instead of a brilliant surgeon, though, this main character is a brilliant de-

tective who never fails to speak his mind or irritate his supervisors. This one is rough, as we find out who did what, why and how. The ending is a wild ride,



for sure. Grade: B+ (with strong violence caution)

#### **"HOW TO TRAIN YOUR DRAGON**"

This is a fun, live version of the charming, animated movie about a boy and his friendship with a real dragon. The story doesn't change much. The relationship with the boy and his dragon is still special, but the action is wild

and maybe a little too much for younger kids. It's still a fun story, and the movie is raucous and very, very well made. Grade: A-

#### "THE LIFE OF CHUCK"

This does not happen often, but I sometimes walk into a movie that I have no idea what it's about, who made it or who stars in it. This movie is a perfect example. I actually believe that is the way this movie should be seen. The less you know, the more you will like it. The main character's name is Chuck, and he is played by Tom Hiddleston, who plays Loki in the Aveng-

ers movies. The story is by Stephen King, but it is not a horror movie. Just remember the word magical. Grade: B+



#### "MATERIALISTS"

This movie takes a look at today's dating, and it doesn't have much good to say about it.

Dakota Johnson, Chris Evans and Pedro Pascal star in this look at modern relationships. According to the film, women are looking for tall men (even if that means surgical enhancement) with a steady and sizable income and deadly handsome good looks. (I al-

## GUTHRIE COUNTY SUPERVISORS HEAR ABOUT STORM SHELTER PLAN

During the June 24 meeting of the Guthrie County Board of Supervisors, Conservation Director Brad Halterman told of the county's plan for making storm shelters available for use in times of threatening weather.

"It's not in anybody's best interest to have those things unlocked 24-7, so they're not going to be. Both at Lenon Mill and at Nations Bridge Park, the storm shelters will be locked up. They will be unlocked at both parks when a severe thunderstorm warning is issued for Guthrie County and/or a tornado watch is issued for Guthrie County," Halterman said. "When those warnings are done, both of the shelters will be locked back up."

Halterman said he and three other staff will have the keys to unlock and

lock the storm shelters as needed.

Health Services Director Jotham Arber talked about plans to have a system of First Responders available throughout the county.

"The crux of what we're trying to do is build on the system that we already have in place. We have Panora and Stuart and Bayard that are transporting services. We're trying to come at it from a different angle. Instead of placing ambulances everywhere, which we know is very expensive, we're trying to put first responders...on so that the response time for that initial crisis is being met," Arber said. "Then, if it takes our ambulance 10 or 15 minutes, we've got someone out there who's at least doing the basics."

Supervisor Brian Johnson asked what role law enforcement will play in this plan.

"Great question," Arber said. "Jesse

Swensen is an EMT, so we're going to bring him on the services with us, so he can have one of the first responder bags and equipment in his vehicle."

Arber said law enforcement staff could be a great asset in this way.

"If we can incorporate them in our training, and get them in our system, that gives us one more vehicle that's out there," Arber said.

#### JULY 1 - FENCE DISPUTE, AUDITOR'S TASKS, FIREWORKS PERMIT

Guthrie County Assistant Attorney Charles Abel discussed the issue of the Shelley property (Penn Township) right-of-way fence dispute.

"The board approved sending a letter in regard to that 30-day notice to the Shelley property to put up those fences. We got a response from Miss Shelley in which she said she's working on getting those fences put in," Abel said. "It's basically asking the removal of some of the trees that are impacting this fence line."

Abel went on to explain a possible contract to outline an agreement between the county and the property owner on this matter.

"Basically, the goal is to address those aspects that apply to the trees in the right-of-way and also address that these fences and all these areas of issue need to be put up within 45 days from the date of signing the contract," Abel said.

Supervisors discussed some of the wording in the contract. The supervisors approved the cover letter and Roadside Fence Agreement, which will be delivered to the property owner.

The supervisors unanimously approved four resolutions related to Au-

As part of the consent agenda, the supervisors approved a fireworks permit for Weston Grow and a Comp Time payout for Matt Parker.

The supervisors went into closed session pursuant to Iowa Code 21.5 1 (c) regarding mediation with Lang Construction.

#### JULY 8 - MONITORING WELL, TREASURER UPDATE, EMPLOYEE EVALUATIONS

During the July 8 meeting, Health Services Director Jotham Arber expressed a need to have another monitoring well drilled at the transfer station.

Arber said he had hoped to receive local bids, but despite contacting many firms in and out of the local area, only one was received. He said this is likely because it is such a rela-

tively small project for any well-drilling company. The one bid received was from EcoSource.

Arber explained the reason for drilling another monitoring well.

"The DNR decided another background monitoring well is needed to verify the water sampling that we're doing," Arber said.

Arber said the cost is expected to be \$3,965. The supervisors approved accepting the bid for the monitoring well.

County Treasurer Brenda Campbell provided an update on her department. She told of ongoing trainings for those in the department, as well as trends in usage of the various services provided by the department.

"We issued a total of 3,397 driver licenses this past fiscal year, and 814 of those were out of county," Campbell said. "We also issued 276 CDLs (Commercial Driver Licenses)."

Supervisor Steve Smith updated the supervisors on his progress drafting a proposed new format for employee evaluations. He noted that the target date for implementing any new format is Jan. 1, 2026. Supervisor Chair Maggie Armstrong said she will work on turning Smith's draft into a PDF form so users can type in it. The supervisors

approved the new format.

#### JULY 15 - BRIDGE PROJECTS, STORM SEWER INLETS, SEVERE WEATHER POLICY

County Engineer Josh Sebern provided an update on the Secondary Roads department to the Guthrie County Board of Supervisors on Tuesday. He described two options for meeting the county's need for engineering work related to the many bridge projects on the horizon. Sebern said the county receives approximately \$1 million annually in federal funds for road/bridge projects.

"One would be hiring a professional consultant, which I've gotten a quote for. Or advertise, hire and promote from within two positions," Sebern said.

Sebern also suggested purchasing a drone for bridge review/inspection.

The consensus of the supervisors was to pursue Sebern's plan to hire from within and to purchase a drone.

Facility Manager Brandon Thompson presented an update on his department. According to Thompson, summer weather and storms have kept his crew busy.

"We've been cleaning out the storm sewer inlets; there's been a lot of debris," Thompson said. "We're going to be working on parking lot stripe painting once we get some dry days."

Supervisor Brian Johnson asked if Thompson still finds 100,000 miles to be a good rule of thumb for when to replace vehicles. Thompson said yes because trade-in values fall more steeply after that milestone is reached.

The supervisors discussed the severe weather policy. The supervisors agreed that the board will make decisions about closing facilities during severe weather events and will consult with applicable departmental staff as feasible.

As part of the consent agenda, the supervisors approved two fireworks permits, for Mark Blomquist and for Rich Boals. Also approved in the consent agenda were the hiring of Mckenzie Laughery as full-time Administrative Assistant in the Sherif's Department (\$55,000 annually), and Synthia McCaughey as full-time Administrative Support Specialist in the Public Health Department (\$25 hourly).

The supervisors meet regularly on Tuesdays at 9 a.m. The public is welcome to attend in person or via remote technology. To join remotely, call 323-792-6123, then use meeting code 547029216#. ■

### PANORA CITY COUNCIL LEARNS ABOUT SEWER REPAIR NEEDS

During the meeting of the Panora city council on June 23, City Administrator Lisa Grossman said Panora's recent "downtown forum" was well attended and went smoothly.

.....

"I thought it was really good, and we got some perspectives from other towns around," Councilmember Roger Dorr added.

Dorr said he heard many positive comments about Panora, and the only constructive criticism he heard was that Panora's crosswalks could be repainted for better visibility. Grossman said the city plans to repaint the crosswalks with large white rectangles to help with the visibility.

The council approved Resolution 25-26 to allow alcoholic canned beverages in designated areas for Panorama Days.

"Pretty much the same as last year," Dorr said.

During the Public Forum portion of the meeting, Joann Smith addressed the council, asking if she could put two trees into the parkway at her property. She listed the requirements according to the city's ordinance and explained that what she is requesting would follow all of the city's specifications.

"I believe I meet all of those qualifications. I know you guys like trees," Smith said.

Smith also said there are few trees remaining on the street where she lives. Mayor Curt Thornberry explained that the council only takes formal action on agenda items, so her request would not be formally considered at this time, but he thanked her for explaining her request.

The council considered Resolution 25-25 to approve a pay change for Masin Shearer due to completion of his six-month probationary period. The resolution would increase his hourly pay from \$24 to \$26. Doug Long reported there have been no concerns with Shearer's work performance, and the resolution was passed.

#### **JULY 14**

During the July 14 meeting, Public Works Director Ismael Galvan provided an update on an area of sewer line that need to be replaced. The line had previously been worked on by Accu-Jet, but that company has since filed bankruptcy, and, according to City Administrator Lisa Grossman, the city's attor-

ney does not feel it would be cost-effective to pursue legal action against Accu-Jet since the legal costs would likely exceed any amount

Galvan explained that he has been trying to figure out how much of the line has liner that needs to be removed.

"We ended up spending about \$30,000 trying to do that," Galvan said. "We made it about 160 feet south of Highway 44, and they ran into what looks like grease pockets, where it's about 80% clogged. It was impassable for the camera to go any further."

Galvan said replacement of the sewer line seems to be the best solution.

"We're going to have to replace about 280 feet of that line," he said.

Galvan explained that he received two bids from companies that could do the work, but the bids are approximately \$46,000 and \$65,000. He said his crew can do the work, with materials expected to cost around \$10,000

The council addressed a request from JoAnn Smith to plant trees in the right-of-way near her home. Councilmember Blake Michelsen said he is concerned with any trees in the right-of-way for visibility reasons. Councilmember Tom Flanery said he has declined similar requests from citizens in the past and was inclined to do so in this case also. The council voted 4-1 to deny the request with Mark Sheeder dissenting.

Sheeder brought up a concern about camping at the northern portion of Lenin Mill Park because that area can become flooded with heavy rain. He also said there have been reports of someone essentially living there as a primary residence. Other council members said they have heard the reports as well.

As part of the consent agenda, the council approved a 5-day Special Class C Retail Alcohol License for Lucky Wife Wine Slushies for July 30 through Aug. 3 for Panorama Days.

The council approved Resolution 25-28, for the purchase of a 2025 Silverado 2500 from Shottenkirk Chevrolet for the Water Department at a cost of \$49,972. Grossman pointed out that \$50,000 had already been budgeted for this.

## EXPANSION FUNDING PLAN EXPLAINED AT GCH TRUSTEES MEETING

During the June 26 meeting of the Guthrie County Hospital Board of Trustees, CEO Chris Stipe explained the expected flow of funding for the hospital's planned expansion project. He shared how the flow may be puzzling at first glance.

"You should be saying, 'Why do we have so much cash in the first year of construction?' So, they will sell bonds that will generate all the cash we need to pay for this construction, and that will happen, we think, in the first part of the next fiscal year," Stipe said. "They'll reinvest those proceeds, and we will get interest on that while that money sits until we use it to pay for the construction."

Danielle Lauzon reported on quality measures and gave data.

"For May, we had three complaints and one grievance," Lauzon said. "They all had appropriate follow-up done, and no trends identified. Patient satisfaction for May was really good."

Chief Financial Officer Brandon Johnson reported on the hospital's finances for the

month of May. He reported that the hospital saw an operating loss of \$448,000 in May, and he reported on some of the factors that led to the loss.

"It was not a huge census month, and we had three nurses go on vacation, and several patients with high needs," Johnson said.

Stipe shared his overview.

"Not our best month. Expenses were high, revenues were a little low, but still, for the year, we're kind of where we budgeted and pretty similar to last year, year-to-date," Stipe said.

Foundation Chair Dennis Flanery reported that registrations for the fundraiser golf tournament are full.

Stipe shared that Chief Nursing Officer Sandy Atkinson will be retiring and thanked her for her years of service.

The next regular meeting of the trustees is set for July 24 at 4 p.m. The public is welcome. ■









# WALKER WELLNESS FITS ITS MEMBERS' SCHEDULES

## Allyson and Tim Walker opened the Yale gym in July of 2019.

One of the major trends in gyms today is that users no longer have to find workout times that match the gym's hours. Many gyms have "flexed" to meet everyone's schedule. That is true at Walker Wellness in Yale. Allyson Walker explained how the gym came to exist.

"My husband, Tim, and I started this gym in July of 2019, so this is our sixth year. It's a 24-hour gym. We offer cardio, strength training, and we have a virtual room with preloaded workouts," Walker said. "We also offer tanning seven days a week, which is a big hit."

Walker said she and Tim had heard from doubters when they first talked of opening a gym in Yale, but they were not discouraged.

"My husband said, 'The worst that can happen is it will flop, but we'll never know if we don't try,' " Walker said. "Our membership ebbs and flows throughout the year. You'd think in the summer it might go down, but there are a lot of college kids that come back for the summer. At any given time, our membership list is around 75, give or take."

Every member receives a key fob to access the gym whenever is most convenient. Because the gym is available 24-7, cameras are installed for security of the facility and for the safety of members.

"You have to be 16 or older to work out here, and we have members from 16 to 94," Walker said. "Everything is very userfriendly. We built it so that anyone of any dynamics can use it."

According to Walker, the popularity of the tanning bed has been a pleasant surprise.

"Tanning is a big thing all year around, and especially around homecoming, prom, and spring break time. We were amazed at how much tanning there is," she said.

Rather than the obvious physical benefits of going to a gym, Walker Wellness offers a chance for members to take a mental break as well.

'It really started when I was a stay-athome mom," Walker said. "I just needed a break. My girlfriends and I would go running, and I realized there was a need for a place like this to go to. The gym's a great place to go."

When asked about a success story of a member who achieved a fitness goal, Walker had a ready answer.

"There's one gal that comes in every day, who has trained for a half-marathon, and then she trained for a full marathon. She did both very successfully," Walker said. "Yale is kind of dark because there aren't a lot of streetlights, so she felt more comfort-

able running in here. So, kudos to her for putting in a lot of miles on the treadmill. We went and watched her run the IMT Marathon and cheered her on."

Walker said one particular thing often surprises people upon first entering into Walker Wellness.

"People are always surprised at how nice

it is in here," Walker said. "We have spent time and money. We pride ourselves on it being clean and safe. There are lots of fans and outlets. There is Wi-fi. There is a TV anywhere that you could want to watch one."

Walker explained that most memberships are monthly.

"It's a monthly fee of \$35. That is our flat rate across all ages," Walker said. "We do offer a couple's rate that saves you a little bit of money, and then there are family plans."

Walker said she does very little traditional advertising for the business but has found a unique way to achieve recognition in the community. At Yale's annual Fourth of July celebration, Walker gives bottles of water during the parade.

"We hand out 800 to 900 bottles of water a year," Walker said. "That's what gets us known."

Walker has no plans for major changes at Walker Wellness in the coming years.

"We're happy with what we're doing here," she said.

Walker said new members often mention that they prefer not to be watched while





#### Q: WHAT IS THE POPULATION **DENSITY OF GUTHRIE COUNTY AS COMPARED TO POLK COUNTY?**

A: The number of people residing in Guthrie County (population 10,623), on average, per square mile, is 18. The number of people residing in Polk County (population 492,401), on average, per square mile, is 858. For comparative purposes, the population density of Iowa from the 2020 Census is 57.12 people per square mile, based on data from the U.S. Census Bureau.

#### Q: HOW MUCH IS THE PANORAMA SCHOOL DISTRICT **GOING TO ASK FOR IN THE BOND ELECTION, AND WHAT** WILL IT PAY FOR?

A: Community members in the Panorama School District are now circulating petitions that will ask the board of education to place a \$19.6 million general obligation bond referendum on the Nov. 4 ballot. State law requires that signatures be collected from 168 eligible voters in the Panorama Community School District, which amounts to 25% of the voter total in the most recent board election.

The petition asks the board of directors to call a special election to "contract indebtedness and issue General Obligation Bonds in an amount not to exceed \$19,600,000 to build, furnish, and equip an addition to the secondary building for a competition gymnasium, including site improvements; to remodel, repair, furnish, and equip the secondary building, including improvements to classrooms, common areas, secure entrance, roofing, and site improvements; and to remodel, repair, furnish, and equip the elementary building, including a secure entrance, roofing, and site improvements, including an accessible playground."

According to Panorama Schools Superintendent Kasey Huebner, once the signature requirement is fulfilled, the petition will be presented to the school board for verification, and a decision can be made on the referendum request.

Huebner said an advisory committee that included community members provided a recommendation that includes the installation and securing the entrance at the elementary school, a new roof, and an enhanced playground that will improve accessibility for all children.

At the secondary school, the proposal calls for updates to the shop area; heating, ventilation and air conditioning system updates; and renovations to the school's entrance, commons area, kitchen, restrooms and other spaces.

Additionally, Huebner said the construction of a new competition gymnasium would be made at the secondary school to provide additional space and resources for physical education classes, athletic teams, school events, youth programs and community activities.

The total projected debt service tax rate implication for this potential project would be \$1.96 per \$1,000 of taxable property value. Panorama's average total property tax rate over the last 18 years is \$13.10. With an approved bond, the projected levy rate would be approximately \$12.40.

Petitions are available at Panorama Secondary District Office, Panora Fiber and NAPA Auto Parts in Panora; Jamaica Public Library, Farmers State Bank in Yale; and Linden Public Library.

#### Q: WHY IS THE WOOD ON THIS



A: The reddish-colored inner wood of this cottonwood tree located just past the Lenon Mill Park bridge that was damaged in last week's storms is likely due to "tannins," which are defense chemicals that plants and trees use for various purposes. Tannins bind to proteins making enzymes less effective, so they exist in plants and trees to make them less palatable to herbivores and also to make them more resistant to diseases. The tannin can appear red if it interacts with iron present in small amounts in the water a tree may absorb. High-tannin wood can still decay, but it does so slower because the fungi have to produce a lot more wood-digesting enzymes to overwhelm it, and that costs the fungi energy.

# AFTER 50 YEARS, SAUNDRA DEVICK STILL PAINTS

"I think that's typical for any artist," Devick said. "Particularly in my oil, I'll reach a point where I wonder, 'Oh shoot, can I finish this or not?' But oil is easy to correct."

Devick's artwork has earned numerous awards. One of her oil portraits was selected as a finalist in the portrait category of The Artist Magazine's annual art competition. Her art was also featured in a book titled "Splash 8" for her use of a new technique in watercolor.

For approximately 10 years, Devick has displayed some of her art for sale at Art on State in Guthrie Center.

For now, Devick plans to continue enjoying her artistic outlet in whatever direction it takes her.



## MOM'S CHICKEN SALAD


