



"You're simply the best. Better than all the rest."



THE BEST OF GUTHRIE COUNTY 2025

The votes have been tallied. Check out the full results.

"Good, better, best. Never let it rest, until your good is better and your better is best."

That quote is generally attributed to Saint Jerome, an early Christian priest and theologian, born in Croatia, who lived approximately 347-419 AD. Although Saint Jerome never had the chance to experience Guthrie County, his perspective matches well with our annual poll to determine the Guthrie County people, places, events and businesses that are voted as best by our readers.

In 2024, we launched our first "Best of Guthrie County" poll, and we were pleased to see a total of 471 votes in the 82 categories listed. The 2025 poll surpassed the initial poll, with 642 votes cast. That represents an increase of more than 36% in votes received, which indicates our readers are becoming more engaged in the poll.

In 2024, and again in 2025, some categories saw a difference of only a very few votes separating the winners from the runners up, so every vote matters. We thank all of you who voted.

There are again 82 categories, but from one year to the next, there may be a few categories added and/or dropped as we refine the poll to match what resonates with our readers. We welcome any feedback on categories to add, exclude or change.

Some categories garnered many votes, while others had relatively few. Categories such as "Camping Spot," "Barge Service," "Dance Studio," and "Dog Boarding Facility" may only apply to a subset of the population, so votes may be lighter in those categories. But, once again, every vote matters.

A concept to keep in mind is that our poll is "a snapshot in time." In other words, circumstances may change after votes are cast. An individual may move away, or a business may close. But our results show the opinion of the

voters during the time the poll was open.

Also, the poll does not hold strictly to the borders of Guthrie County. Communities such as Linden, Stuart and Adair are included, even though all or most of the municipality may actually reside outside Guthrie County.

The results listed show the winners and the runners up. The runners up are listed alphabetically and do NOT represent placement of second or third.

Our results show some repeats from one year to the next, which is to be expected. Some of these repeat honorees in the top three include Tribe Boutique LLC, Crafty's Coffee & Gifts, Panorama Gardens, and B&B Marketplace.

In some categories, however, new names have shown up in our vote tallies of the top three. Some of the first-timers include The Captain's Pick, The Color Nook, and Guthrie

County Sheriff Matt Harmann.

In conducting such a poll, it is natural to ask, "What makes something the best?" That is a complicated matter. For example, if asked to name the best burger you ever ate, your response would likely be based on a wide range of factors. How was the burger cooked? What ingredients were added? Where did you eat it? Who were you with? The votes in our "Best of Guthrie County 2025" poll are similarly subjective, so the results are to be seen as opinions, not facts. But, clearly, those listed below have been doing something right, and we applaud them for it.







GUTHRIE COUNTY SUPERVISORS HEAR ABOUT MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

AUG. 26 - COUNTY PLAN FOR FIRST RESPONDERS, RECENT HEALTH FAIRS

During the Aug. 26 meeting of the Guthrie County Board of Supervisors, Health Service Director Jotham Arber provided an update on the status of the county plan for first responders (also known as EMR or emergency medical responders), as a way to improve response and response timing for medical emergencies. He said since Panora and Stuart have ambulance services, the EMR plan is focusing especially on areas where ambulance response time may take longer. Arber said training for EMRs is set to begin.

"On Sept. 3, we're going to hold our first EMR class through DMACC here

in the county. I currently have six folks signed up," Arber said. "I have one from Bagley, and I have three from Bayard. I have one from Guthrie Center, and I have one from the Panora area."

Arber explained that EMRs are to provide basic life support services to stabilize a person in a medical emergency until a higher-level provider can take over. He said new EMRs would go through an orientation period.

"We'll do a 90-day orientation with all responders that are coming on board with us before we let them out into the world," Arber said.

Arber said EMRs need to clearly know what they can do — and, just as importantly, what they cannot do — while interacting on the scene of a medical emergency.

"They're not going to transport

anyone," Arber said. "They're going to arrive on the scene to do what they need to do with the backpacks."

Arber also reported on the success of recent health fairs at local schools.

"We've done health fairs in Stuart, Panora and Audubon, and we're going to do one in Guthrie Center Sept. 4," Arber said. "In total, we have had 252 folks come through the doors between Panora and Stuart. We've done 19 haircuts. We've given out 79 backpacks. We've done 45 dental screenings, and we provided 310 meals."

County Recorder Tristen Richard shared an update on operations in the recorder's office. She discussed the various revenue sources for the department and where the funds go.

The supervisors approved the health service agreement between the county and the sheriff's department (jail) as described by Arber. Supervisor Maggie Armstrong said she is eager to see the expected cost savings under the agreement.

SEPT. 2 - OPIOID SETTLEMENT FUNDS

Board Chair Maggie Armstrong shared information she recently learned regarding possible uses for funds from the opioid settlement.

"Last week, I had a Behavioral Health Advisory Committee meeting," Armstrong said. "It was really interesting because somebody from Iowa HHS was talking about the Iowa Opioid Settlement dollars. When those dollars are handed down from the federal government, a portion goes to the State of Iowa and a portion goes to the counties. So, the state was actually asking the advisory council to give guidance on ways the state can help fund services around



the state. It was a really good discussion."

The supervisors discussed ideas of possible fund uses, such as outof-home treatment for addiction. No board action was taken at this time.

Armstrong also praised the efforts of the Guthrie County Fair Board. She said the fair had strong attendance and ran smoothly.

"Hats off to the fair board. They do a really good job," Armstrong said.

SEPT. 9 - MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES, COVID VACCINES

The supervisors heard from Brett Michael, Mental Health Advocate, who serves an area including Guthrie County and six other counties. Board Chair Maggie Armstrong shared why she felt it would be helpful for the supervisors to hear from Michael.

Michael explained how he is assigned to work with individuals who are deemed by the court to be in need of involuntary mental health services.

"I get appointed to basically work with people through the process," Michael said. "Overall, part of it is making sure people know what their rights are through the process. It can be a really confusing time for people. Some people are perfectly able to advocate for themselves."

Supervisor Mike Dickson asked about the need for the advocate position, saying that county staff are already able to provide such services.

"We're setting things up within the county ourselves," Dickson said.

Armstrong said the county's advocate cost is reimbursed by the State of Iowa, and she added that Michael's position has been operating at the same hourly rate of \$19.30 per hour for more than a decade. She asked the supervisors to consider a cost-of-living increase in that rate. No formal action was taken at this time. Michael said his time spent dealing with Guthrie County has ranged from seven to 32 hours per month.

Health Services Director Jotham Arber addressed the supervisors, reporting on status of Public Health and Environmental Health services.

"COVID vaccines are a big thing right now," Arber said.

Arber shared a plan that is in the initial stages.

"I am working with the schools to try to get a 28E agreement drafted that would allow them to all share mental health services," Arber said. "I talked to all the superintendents and all the school counselors, and I think there's a great appetite to work together to get more mental health services into our schools."

SEPT. 16 - HALTERMAN GIVES UPDATE ON CONSERVATION DEPARTMENT

Conservation Director Brad Halterman told of the farmers market events that were held at the Guthrie County Historical Village (GCHV) in Panora every other Saturday.

"It was a big success," he said. "We had the last one last Saturday."

Halterman said overall, the GCHV saw good attendance this summer and remains open until mid-October

"It was a pretty busy summer down there," Halterman said. "Our annual Haunted Village is Sunday, Oct. 12 from 5 to 7 p.m. It's a pretty huge event. A lot of volunteers make that happen."

Halterman reported on usage of Guthrie County's camping areas and trails.

"We've had a pretty steady camping season," he said. "The holiday weekends were really busy. We've seen a lot of activity on the Raccoon

River Valley Trail throughout the summer."

Halterman noted that water will likely be shut off in the county parks around Oct. 15, but he said that date is "weather dependent," meaning that the shut-off may happen sooner if a freeze is expected.

Board Chair Maggie Armstrong talked about her participation in the National Association of Counties ("NACo").

"I had an introductory call to the Rural Action Caucus," Armstrong said. "They meet quarterly. We had a great conversation about what we see here and how we're not the only ones dealing with the same issues. It's more of an idea exchange."

As part of the consent agenda items, the supervisors approved two payroll change notices for new staff. Amanda Claussen was hired as a part-time dispatcher at a rate of \$21 per hour. Noah Sargent was hired as a fulltime roadside technician at \$28.37 per hour.

The supervisors meet regularly on Tuesdays at 9 a.m. The public is welcome to attend in person or via remote technology. To join remotely, call 323-792-6123, then use meeting code 547029216#. ■

GCH TO SEEK BIDS FOR CONFERENCE CENTER PROJECT

During the Aug. 28 meeting of the Guthrie County Hospital Board of Trustees, CEO Chris Stipe explained that groundbreaking for the hospital's proposed major construction/expansion plan will likely be delayed until the spring of 2026. He explained the delay is due to waiting for official approval from the Office of General Counsel (OGC).

"Because we're pushing the larger project start date to March, we could go ahead and build the conference center. The reason we would do that is to avoid having trailers (during the larger project). We were going to have the primary care clinic in a trailer," Stipe said.

Stipe said the conference center could be built over the fall/winter, and that space could then be used instead of trailers during the larger project.

"Instead of moving the clinic into a trailer, we would move the clinic into the conference center, and it would be a temporary clinic while we were doing phase one of the construction," Stipe said.

The trustees voted in favor of a resolution to seek bids, not to exceed \$2 million, for the conference center. The board retains the option of rejecting any or all bids.

Stipe also said the hospital plans to schedule "town hall" meetings to share information with the public regarding the hospital's construction project.

"If there's a lot of interest, maybe we'll do more," he said.

Chief Financial Officer Brandon Johnson provided a monthly report on finances. He reported on the expected impact of the newly enacted "Big Beautiful Bill" on the Guthrie County Hospital. Johnson said there are two scenarios based on how the measures in the bill are implemented. Johnson said the expected impact is that the hospital would lose out on either \$3 million or half a million dollars over a five-year span.

Stipe explained the timing of the bill's impact on the hospital.

"Both of these scenarios are five-year scenarios that start in 2028 and end in 2033, so you've got a five-year impact," he said.

Foundation Director Dennis Flanery said the hospital with be hosting a 5K run/walk event on Oct. 4 along with a health fair.

Because of holidays (Thanksgiving and Christmas), the dates on the board's November and December meetings were changed. The November meeting was set for Monday, Dec. 1, and the December meeting was set for Monday, Dec. 29.

The board went into special closed session to discuss two matters.

The next regular meeting of the trustees is set for Sept. 25 at 4 p.m. The public is welcome. ■

PANORA CITY COUNCIL **PROHIBITS CAMPING IN CITY PARKS**

AUG. 25 - PARK HOURS AND CAMPING; COMMUNITY CENTER RENTAL FEE; NEW BASKETBALL COURT

At the Aug. 25 regular meeting of the Panora City Council, Councilmember Brian Dorsett led the meeting due to Mayor Curtis Thornberry's absence. The council considered proposed changes to the city's Ordinance 359, relating to park hours and camping. The proposed new wording states, "Camping is not allowed at city parks." The council approved the first reading and waived the second and third readings and voted unanimously in favor of the amendment as proposed. The amended ordinance will be in effect once it has been published in the city's official print publication.

On behalf of the Lions Club, Pat Subbert requested a reduced rental rate for the club's occasional use of the Community Center for fundraiser events. She said the current rate of \$175 is excessive. She told of the many ways the Lions Club has worked to better the community.

Councilmember Mark Sheeder agreed with the good performed by the Lions but objected to setting a precedent.

"There are a lot of good causes, so where do we draw the line?" Sheeder

The council discussed possibly creating a rate just for nonprofit organizations.

Councilmember Blake Michelsen pointed out that the council would then need to define "nonprofit," since some groups consider themselves nonprofit but do not have any official verification of that status.

The council chose to address the issue individually for now and voted to approve a \$90 rental fee for the Lions Club.

City Administrator Lisa Grossman said the concrete for the new basketball court has been poured, and lines will be painted when feasible.

SEPT. 8 - WATER/SEWER WORK

During the regular meeting on Sept. 8, the councilmembers had a discussion regarding the Title VI Physical Environment (Utilities Sanitary System, and the Water System) pertaining to the updates 2025 City Code of Ordinances. City Administrator Lisa Grossman and Public Works Director Ismael Galvan highlighted the most significant changes. One area of discussion was private citizens having water/sewer work done that involves the city's right of way.

"The big one that I want to talk about, we don't really have a specific permit. We have an application for work in the right of way," Grossman said. "The fees are \$150 to hook up to the water and the sewer each."

Galvan said he feels those fees are in line with other municipalities in the area.


Grossman also said that the city could require an excavation permit and could require a bond from whoever is doing the actual work. That way, if problems arise that impact the city, they could have some options to cover the costs.

After discussion, Grossman said the ordinance could be worded to say the city "may require a bond." She explained this would allow the city some discretion based on the work to be done and the individual or company that would do the work. The council consensus was for Grossman to pursue that wording and bring it to an upcoming council meeting for consideration.

Galvan reported that the city completed the repair on the 12-inch sewer pipe along Highway 44, and the blockage has been cleared. He said the city will now be able to "camera" the area to inspect for any is-

Grossman reported on progress at Michael Mills Park. She said the basketball court is installed, and the painting of lines is vet to be done.



Q: HOW MANY STOPLIGHTS ARE LOCATED IN GUTHRIE COUNTY?

A: The Iowa DOT says they do not own or operate any traffic signals in Guthrie County, However, Guthrie County does have a blinking red light at the train tracks in Stuart and a few on top of stop signs around the county. If you are curious, Butler County, located in northeast Iowa, is said to be the only Iowa county with no stoplights of any sort — or four-lane roads, a hospital, a movie theater or a fast food chain.

Q: I AM GOING TO BE DIGGING UP SOME PLANTS IN MY YARD. DO I NEED TO CALL THE UTILITIES AND HAVE MARKER FLAGS INSTALLED? AND HOW MUCH NOTICE DO I NEED TO GIVE THEM?

A: Yes, you should always call for utility locates (DIAL 811) prior to doing any digging. And, you should call at least 48 hours (two working days) prior to starting the work.

Q: I HEARD THE FARMERS MARKETS MAY CONTINUE INDOORS IN PANORA. IS THAT TRUE?

A: Yes. Panorama Gardens, 3055 Highway 44, will be holding a Morning Market on Saturdays from 9 a.m. to noon. Co-owner Landon Loftsgard said they hope to have baked goods, arts and crafts vendors, produce, meats, food trucks, salsa and basically anything that would be at a traditional farmers market. If all goes well, they hope to eventually add live music, too. The Market will start Sept. 27 and plans to run through May 2.

Q: WHAT ARE THESE "CALTROPS" THAT I HEARD THE GUTHRIE COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT WARNING PEOPLE ABOUT?

A: A caltrop is a spiked device typically made of metal that is designed to impede the movement of vehicles by puncturing tires. Historically used in warfare, caltrops have four spikes arranged so that one always points upward. The Guthrie County Sheriff's Department issued a warning due to an increase in motor vehicle flat tires caused by caltrops apparently being placed on roadways. Anyone who experiences this or has knowledge of the situation is asked to contact the Guthrie County Sheriff's Department at 641-747-2214. ■

Like other "bin style" stores, Justin Rockwell's store uses a pricing system that lowers prices daily each week.

Bin There is the name of a new store in Panora that combines the fun of "treasure hunting" with the environmentally friendly slogan of "reduce, reuse, recycle." Owner Justin Rockwell explained how his business came to be.

"My wife, Brandi, started buying and selling online, with Old Soul Millennial, and her business online grew and grew so much that we needed more space. So, she opened in a location in town, and there was still an overflow of product and nowhere to keep it. People donate stuff to us, and we don't like to tell anybody no," Rockwell said. "Then, I had the idea of having a bin-style store, so here I am."

Rockwell noted that the generosity of the community has been impressive, proving that there is a large supply of items that do not yet need to be discard-

"I'd say 90 to 95% of the items are donated," Rockwell said. "It gives the locals somewhere to donate stuff, and then it gives the locals somewhere to find affordable things. And, it keeps things out of the landfill."

Rockwell's store is located at 111 E. Main in Panora, next to The Color Nook.

When weather conditions allow, some items are placed outside along the sidewalk.

"We're open Wednesday through Sat-

urday. Wednesday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., and Thursday through Saturday, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., as of now," Rockwell said.

Like other "bin style" stores, Rockwell's

store uses a pricing system that lowers prices daily each week. On Wednesday, all items are \$4, then \$3 on Thursdays, \$2 on Fridays, and \$1 on Saturdays. Be-

cause of this, customers sometimes play a "waiting game" hoping that a certain item will still be available later in the week. Rockwell said that is part of the fun built into the pricing schedule.

"You're rummaging through a bin, just kind of digging for treasure. That's all part of the game. Sometimes it's 'you snooze, you lose,' "Rockwell said.

Rockwell occasionally offers additional sales, such as a recent "everything is \$1" sale to celebrate reaching 500 followers on the Bin There Facebook page. Rockwell said the store's Facebook page is the best place to keep up on any sales or special events.

Housewares and clothing comprise

the majority of the store's inventory. Rockwell is glad to be able to provide quality items at affordable prices. He pointed out that many children's items (clothing, toys, furniture) are in nearly new condition but are available simply because a child outgrew them, and he knows some families operate on a tight budget.

Rockwell strives for quick turnover of his inventory, so items that have not been promptly sold are donated and/or recycled, as able.

"Some people say this is like a year-round indoor garage sale, and I say 'absolutely.' I have no problem with people thinking of it that way," Rockwell said.

REPAIRS ON LAKE PANORAMA DAM TO **BEGIN IN OCTOBER**

The Lake Panorama Association (LPA) will lower Lake Panorama by approximately 5 feet in October to perform scheduled maintenance on the dam. This follows a routine inspection conducted in December 2024 that revealed wear on hydraulic cylinders that have been in service for 20 years.

LPA management says repairs will include cylinder replacement and other minor improvements to hydraulic lines and the spillway. The Weitz Company, which handled the previous replacement of the dam cylinders, was awarded the contract with engineering support from Shive-Hattery.

LPA Members who own boats, docks and boat lifts were encouraged by LPA to contact their service providers before Labor Day to schedule removal and winterization. While lake use is not prohibited during the drawdown, LPA strongly discourages boating due to exposed underwater hazards. Members who have not yet contacted their service providers are advised to do so immediately.

The lake drawdown will also impact downstream users of the Middle Raccoon River. Beginning Oct. 1, river flow into the Middle Raccoon River will exceed seasonally normal levels. This will continue until the lake has been lowered by 5 feet, which should take 10 to 14 days. Recreational users, especially kayakers and fisherman, are advised to exercise caution during this

time. For questions about safe flow levels and river access points, LPA recommends contacting Guthrie County Conservation for guidance. Guthrie County Conservation manages public entry and exit locations along the river and is a resource on responsible use of the Middle Raccoon

Once the cylinder replacement project begins, flow in the Middle Raccoon River will be variable depending on the phase of the project and rainfall that occurs. LPA management says they will continue to discharge water to ensure the minimum required flow will be met, or exceeded, at all times and that they are committed to meeting all Iowa Department of Natural Resources guidelines for minimum outflow to ensure uninterrupted operations for the City of Panora's potable water treatment facility and the protection of aquatic life that exists downstream.

LPA management says the timeline for refilling the lake will depend on rainfall received within Lake Panorama's watershed, noting that they cannot forecast if the lake will freeze at normal pool level or at a lowered level. They stated confidence in projecting that the lake will return to full pool level prior to the 2026 boating season. If the lake freezes below normal pool level, LPA says that level will be maintained throughout the winter and until the ice has melted from the lake.

DREAM ACRES HOUSING IN PANORA RECEIVES \$199,999 WORKFORCE HOUSING TAX CREDIT

The Iowa Economic Development Authority (IEDA) recently announced \$35.9 million in workforce housing tax credits to support development in 36 counties across the state.

The awards will fund 63 projects expected to create nearly 2,000 new residential units — 1,217 in large communities and 752 in smaller towns.

"When families can find quality, affordable homes, they put down roots— and that gives businesses the steady workforce they need," Debi Durham, director of IEDA and the Iowa Finance Authority, said. "It's that kind of stability that keeps our communities strong and our economy moving forward."

IEDA received 137 applications requesting about \$83 million in tax credits. Of the \$35 million available for fiscal 2026, \$17.5 million was specifically reserved for projects in Iowa's 88 least-populated counties. Applications were evaluated on readiness, financing, community impact, developer experience and innovation.

Origin Homes, a rural, custom homebuilder that builds in all 99 Iowa counties, has one of the projects with its Dream Acres Housing in Panora, creating five housing units with a total tax credit of \$199,999. Origin is on its fourth year of the Rural Housing Initiative.

"Origin Homes is fortunate to continue to collaborate with so many talented communities across the state and the list of those wanting to partner is growing quickly. Panora's leaders had their housing studies complete, with single-family home types in mind, and the home lots ready to build," Matt Daniels, director of operations for Origin Homes, said.

Origin plans to build five ranch homes in Panora's Dream Acres public-private neighborhood, developed by Panora Fiber. The homes will range from two-three bedrooms, all around 1,400-1,500 square feet with finished and unfinished basements. The homes are three blocks from main street and one block from Panora's schools and Little Panthers Daycare.

"Right now, we have employers struggling to fill key positions, young families who want to stay but can't find a home and newcomers ready to join our community — if we can find them homes. Origin has a proven track record across rural Iowa and their initiative is built on collaboration, local insight and long-term vision," Panora Mayor Curt Thornberry said.

The Workforce Housing Tax Credit program supports projects that redevelop abandoned, vacant or deteriorated properties. For more information about the program, visit iowaeda.com/workforce-housing-tax-credit.

TERRY TAUSZ KEEPS THE MUSIC ALIVE

Panora resident's collection includes dozens of miniature jukeboxes and two full-size classics.

The purpose of any museum is to keep something "alive" and available for people to experience in the coming years/decades/centuries. Terry Tausz of Panora is passionate about keeping the classic rock and roll music of the 1950s and 1960s alive, and he has accumulated a massive collection of music records, juke boxes, concert posters and other memorabilia.

Tausz explained that his first collection was sports cards and sports autographs, which he accumulated during his junior high and high school years. Tausz spent much of his life in the Rock Rapids area.

During his working years, Tausz was a teacher and volleyball coach. He is now retired and living in Panora to be closer to his daughter, Michelle Recker, and her family. Terry's wife, Patty, passed away earlier this summer.

As a lifelong fan of early rock and roll music, Tausz gradually began amassing memorabilia from 1950s and 1960s rock and roll performers. His collection now includes records (45s and LPs), band T-shirts, guitars and jukeboxes.

Despite the wide array of music memorabilia Tausz has accumulated, he downplays his collection as just a fun hobby.

"Another guy and I have about 35 signed guitars. Four or five of them are country performers, but the rest are rock and roll,"

Tausz said. "I don't consider myself to be much of a collector. What I've got is pretty much small peanuts compared to some collectors. I tend to be a little choosy about what I buy, and I don't have enough room

to display all of the things I have." Tausz also collects posters.

"My all-time favorite poster is this Wes Reynolds poster," Tausz said while holding up the unique poster of the musician. In the mid-1960s, as rock and roll music was catching on in America, musicians strived to find their niche. Reynolds performed with a band known as The Bloodthirsty Executioners. This may have been

a precursor to performers such as Black Sabbath and Alice Cooper, who later used morbid or demonic imagery and costumes to catch the audience's attention.

Tausz recalled Reynolds' music and stage presence.

"He's like Jerry Lee Lewis. He had a couple of different groups. He had the Bloodthirsty Executioners, and he had the House Rockers," Tausz said. "I guess when he'd play with the Bloodthirsty Executioners, they'd come out in black, with hoods on, looking like they were ready to chop someone's head off."

The most unusual part of Tausz's collection is his jukeboxes. He has dozens of miniature jukeboxes and two full-size

classic jukeboxes. One is a 1968 Wurlitzer Americana, while the other is a 1973 Rock-Ola 450. Both jukeboxes still work, and Tausz aims to keep it that way.

"The advice I've always gotten from two friends who work on these things is, 'Play them, play them, play them,' " he said. "You need to play them all the time, because the longer they sit, the harder it is on them. I try to play mine every day."

The Wurlitzer holds 100 45-rpm records (singles) and plays them vertically, while the Rock-Ola holds 80 and plays them horizontally.

Tausz recalled when his first jukebox needed repair, and he was given the contact information for a gentleman who had

experience doing so. The two became friends and ended up buying a number of vintage jukeboxes, which they would clean, repair and bring back into working order. They would then offer them for sale to others who wanted to have a nostalgic way to hear early rock and roll.

"We sold a lot of jukeboxes," Tausz said. Tausz has amassed many autographed items, including T-shirts, posters and photos. Many collectors have a "Holy Grail" item that they strive to find. For Tausz, he fulfilled that quest years ago.

"That is the Wes Reynolds poster. It's from about 1965 or 1966," Tausz said. "To me, that was my Holy Grail."

Tausz said he is not actively seeking to

add to his collection, but he occasionally finds something he wants, or friends will give items to him.

Because of his love of classic rock and roll, Tausz was invited by a friend to become a board member for the South Dakota Rock & Roll Hall of Fame. Tausz has never been a musician, so he wasn't sure at first if he wanted to accept the offer.

"He had been asking me for about six months when I finally agreed to do it. I finally looked at it as one way that I could help keep the music alive. That was important to me," Tausz said. "I was an active board member from October 2008 to August of 2014. That is a time that I wouldn't trade for anything."



CREAMY TOMATO SOUP IS RICH WITH SUN-RIPENED FLAVOR

There is something special about cooking with ingredients grown from your own backyard. Recently, I was watching our grandson at my daughter and son-in-law's house. He and I ventured outside to check on their garden and discovered a bumper crop of tomatoes. Since the weather was cool, I decided that a batch of tomato soup for dinner would serve the harvest well. Our grandson, just 8 months old, is already a curious observer in the kitchen. He keeps me company from his high chair, happily armed with a dozen measuring cups to toss and a few snacks to keep

him content. This creamy tomato soup, made with an abundance of fresh-picked tomatoes and a blend of herbs, is rich with sunripened flavor. Paired with a golden, melty grilled cheese on homemade

sourdough, it was the perfect fall dinner — simple, cozy and made even sweeter by sharing it together with my grandson. Jolene Goodman is the

CREAMY TOMATO SOUP

Total time: 45 minutes Servings: 4

Ingredients:

- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 3-4 garlic cloves, minced
- 2 tablespoons olive or avocado oil
- 2 pounds fresh tomatoes (about 6 large), blanched, skins off and chopped
- 2 cups chicken broth (low sodium preferred)
- 1/3 cup Parmesan cheese, grated
- 1/2 -3/4 cup heavy (whipping) cream
- 2 tablespoons honey
- Salt and pepper, basil, oreg-



ano — more of everything than you think

- Pinch of rosemary
- Fresh basil or parsley (optional, for garnish)

Directions

Heat oil over medium heat. Add onion and sauté for about

5 minutes until soft. Add garlic and cook all for 2 more minutes. Add tomatoes and cook for 10 minutes. Add chicken broth and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for 20 minutes, uncovered. Stir occasionally. Blend until smooth by using an immersion blender and scooping the mixture into a traditional blender. Return soup to the pan. Add whipping cream and honey and stir. Season with salt, pepper, basil, oregano and other herbs of choice. Simmer for 5 more minutes. Serve immediately. Garnish with fresh basil or parsley. This pairs well with a grilled cheese sandwich on sourdough bread. Enjoy! ■




