# HALLOWEEN COSTUME CREATIONS

Residents explain how they get to become anything they want to be on this imaginative holiday.

Halloween is a special time of year when most anyone can put on a costume or mask and temporarily take on a different persona. It can be liberating to become someone or something completely apart from our usual roles, even if only for a short time.

Some opt for a frightening look. Some prefer costumes that are funny. Some like to dress as a favorite celebrity. Some costumes are difficult to categorize.

Nowadays, almost any costume that can be imagined can be purchased with just a visit to a store or the click of a computer mouse. But, for some, the creation of a costume can be just as rewarding as the final product.

Regardless of the individual's preference — whether it is store-bought or homemade, and whether it is simple or elaborate — costumes can be a lot of fun. Here are a few examples of local people who enjoy getting into the seasonal spirit.

#### **EMILY DONOVAN**

Emily Donovan enjoys the fun and creativity of Halloween costumes, and she said she always has.

"My mom always did fun costumes when I was growing up. She was a stayat-home mom with four kids. She always made elaborate costumes, and, one year, all four of us were Smurfs," Donovan said. "She always had really creative costumes."

Donovan brought that fun to her kids when she and her husband, Billy, became parents.

"When our kids were little, it was fun to dress them up. We had groups of our friends who also had kids, and we would have parties together that we could bring our kids to. One of our friends hosted a pirate-themed party, and everybody, the adults and kids, dressed up like pirates."

The Donovans have two children. The kids have passed the age of trick-ortreating, so Emily found a new way to channel her Halloween spirit.

"The way I got into a regular Halloween costume thing is my husband owns

Donovan Construction, and he had bought a shop downtown. So, we started participating in the Beggar's Night, and I dressed up as a character from 'Day of the Dead.' I liked the elaborate makeup, too."

Following the experience, Donovan realized she enjoyed a night of villainy.

"Then it kind of turned into an alter ego," she said. "Coming up with all these evil characters has been fun. I've done the evil stepmother from 'Snow White.' I've been a couple different versions of a witch. I did the Queen of Hearts from 'Alice in Wonderland.' I did Cruella De Vil, and the one from 'Beetlejuice.'"

Donovan enjoys the opportunity to trick people while she is in costume.

"People will see me and think I'm not real, and then I start moving, and they realize it's a real person inside," she said. "Or, after I dress up and people don't know it's me, I'll go out to eat, and people have no idea who it is, so that's kind of fun."

For Donovan, the creation process is just as fun as Halloween itself. Her creations are usually a combination of homemade and store-bought.

"It's a little bit of both. I have a couple of wigs, and I try to reuse. But it's fun to try to transform," she said. "If I can reuse parts of old costumes, I do that."

Although the Donovans live at Lake Panorama, the construction shop provides an easy way to get involved in the Halloween activities in Panora.

"I like being able to do it uptown, because at the lake, we don't get trick-ortreaters. It's fun to see all the kids, and they remember what I was the year before," Donovan said. "Our shop moved, so now we're up on Market Street, so now we do it with the residential, because we're on kind of the main loop where kids go trick-or-treating."

When asked her favorite part of the creation process, Donovan had a clear answer.

"I love doing the makeup. I usually have an image to look at, and that's the fun part. The hard part is just coming up with the idea," she said.

Although some costume creators carefully keep their next costume a secret, Donovan has not had to worry about secrecy much.

"I don't know if it's more of a secret, or if I really just don't know until the week before," Donovan said. "It's been eight years that I've been doing this, and now I feel like it's expected. And, it's like, am I going to run out of villains? I don't know. I can't be a princess, because that would be out of character."

Shoppers in Panora are likely familiar with Chelsea Schwartz and Sarah Carstens of Tribe Boutique (130 W. Main, Panora). The two enjoy working together and have found a way to build some fun into their business every October.

"We did our first Halloween costume livestream in 2019. We were Napoleon Dynamite and Ace Ventura. We got into

"Then it was cool, because the city of Panora started the Main Street trick-ortreating. The kids wanted to come see what our costumes were," Carstens said. "We had both worked at the school, so a lot of the kids knew us."

Fun is the only recurring theme in the

The fun has become contagious.

"It's kind of become a family affair, too, because our kids pass out candy," Carstens said. "One year, Chelsea's husband dressed up in an elf costume, which was hilarious."

"We always try to make it suspenseful, for people to guess before we have it on the live video," Carstens said.

"I think that adds a layer of fun to it," Schwartz said.

become. They plan to continue surprising the community with each year's costumes.

"Oh, gosh. It's always busy. We get maybe 200 or 250 kids," Schwartz said. "And it's a great safe spot for kids to be. It's just a fun way to bring the community together and make people laugh, and we really get into it."

#### **STEVE SIDMAN**

If anyone challenges Steve Sidman to create a difficult Halloween costume, it should come as no surprise when he succeeds. He enjoys the challenge of finding creative ways to overcome obstacles.

Over the years, Sidman has frequently entered his costume creations in costume contests, both locally and in the Des Moines metro area, with impressive results. His creations include Oscar the Grouch, Inspector Gadget, R2D2 from "Star Wars," and others.

"It's never been about Halloween for me. It's more about just building the costume. I always want to be a character something from my childhood or something that I've seen," Sidman said.

"And, I bet I've won maybe \$3,000 in prize money.

"The first costume I built was Scuba Steve, from the Adam Sandler movie 'Big Daddy.' That was around 2008 or 2009. I think I spent maybe \$25 from Menards buying PVC to make it look real, and I ended up winning a prize. Then it just kind of snowballed from there," Sidman said. "Eventually, I started getting into more technical stuff, and that's when I built Inspector Gadget, where all of his gadgets actually worked. His helicopter spun, he had shooting water out of his fingertips, and all sorts of things. I just have fun building it and then going out to show it off."

Sidman said his wife, Krista, also enjoys being in costume. However, he said she does not get into the creation process the way he does.

"You could ask my wife, when Halloween comes around, I'll have an idea of what I want to make, and then I'll just wander around Menards for an hour looking for things that I can turn into something," Sidman said. "Then I come home with a truck bed full of junk."

Sidman's proudest costume creation is R2D2.

"I think R2D2 has been the most challenging costume I've made. Not so much building the framework but figuring out how to get him to move," he said. "I looked to see what I could deconstruct, to reconstruct, and I was on one of those websites where they do those battle bots that smash into each other. And, people

were saying that some of the most robust things to make things move is old wheelchair motors. So, I went on eBay and found a couple of old motors from wheelchairs."

R2D2 is designed for Sidman to sit inside, so space was at a premium.

"I had to buy a wheelchair battery and figure out the wiring. The battery is underneath the little seat that's inside of him," Sidman said. "My claim to fame is

I usually build a costume for under \$100. R2D2 was the exception. And I probably have 25 or 30 hours into that costume. It's got a small dashboard inside, so he plays all the noises. That took a while to do."

Sidman said his Inspector Gadget costume was full of challenges.

"Inspector Gadget was also a fun costume because all of his stuff worked. I even had a CamelBak hydration backpack that people wear. I had one of those



I was wearing, and it was plumbed to my gloved fingers, so I could walk up to a table and say, 'Go-go gadget, water gun,' and then squeeze it and fill up water glasses right at the table," he said. "And I had those heely shoes that kids wear with the wheels on the back of them. So, I'd say, 'Go-go gadget, skate,' and then I'd skate across the floor."

All of those gadget details were crowdpleasers.

"I think that's the costume that people interacted with the most. That one was a lot of fun," Sidman said.

Although some of Sidman's costume details are high-tech, others are more down-to-earth.

"For me, it's about the problem solving," he said. "For example, Oscar's head is actually a hanging plant basket that is flipped upside down and then covered in a green bath rug."

Sidman strives to keep his upcoming costume creations a secret.

"I try to keep it on the downlow," Sidman said. "I do have a couple of ideas in mind for upcoming years."

Sidman said he'll be out of the local area this Halloween but may try to make a costume, if the spirit moves him.

"We'll be down in South Carolina this year for Halloween, so I'm excited to check out the Halloween scene down

there," he said.

Sidman has discovered that each costume creates unique challenges, but he enjoys finding solutions.

"I've done Optimus Prime from 'Transformers,' " he said. "That one was very popular but a bit cumbersome because he was so big. I had to walk through doorways sideways, and I couldn't get my arms up, so we strung together about five straws so I could drink a beer."



"The Conjuring: Last Rites"

# GUTHRIE COUNTY SUPERVISORS RETURN TO EMS ISSUE, LEARN ABOUT FLU VACCINE PUSH AND ACTIVE SHOOTER TRAINING

#### **SEPT. 23 - LAND PURCHASE REQUEST, P28 ROAD PROJECT**

During the Sept. 23 meeting of the Guthrie County Board of Supervisors, Ron Woods addressed the supervisors to ask if he could purchase 9.1 acres of land near the former county home building, which Woods owns. The land Woods asked about is Parcel 0000917402.

Woods explained his interest in the land.

"The silting going into the pond from that 9.1 acres is considerable. What I'd like to do is buy that land and turn it into either a pasture or hay field, to eliminate some of that silting," Woods said. "And my oldest son is considering building a house there, on the 9.1 acres overlooking the pond. So, it seems like a perfect fit; it squares off the

property."

Supervisor Maggie Armstrong said the land is currently under lease until 2029. Woods said he would consider a lease transfer, if that were feasible.

Armstrong said the first step would be for the county to speak with the current leaseholder. Then, if appropriate, the county would like to see an offer from Woods. No formal action was taken at this time.

County Engineer Josh Sebern provided a departmental update and shared information on the upcoming P28 Road project between Panora and Stuart. He described the various options regarding road width and the related costs. The road is currently 22 feet wide and could be widened to 26 feet overall, or in certain areas, to help address safety concerns.

Sebern described a "hybrid" option of keeping the road surface at 22 feet on straight areas but widening it to 26 feet on curves, which would allow for rumble strips outside of the 22-foot striped road for additional safety.

Supervisor Steve Smith asked Sebern's preference.

"I definitely like the widening, at least on the curves," Sebern said. "They're nice things to have for maintenance. They're nice for agriculture. They're nice for safety."

As part of the consent agenda, the supervisors approved a payroll change notice for Dana Tews, for a change to the position of jail control room operator at a wage of \$20 hourly.

#### **SEPT. 30 - MORE ON P28 ROAD PROJECT, SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT UPDATE**

County Engineer Josh Sebern shared his recommendations for the P28 Road project between Panora and Stuart.

Sebern suggested widening the road from Monteith to Stuart to the 26-foot paved width, which would add 2 feet of paved shoulder on each side of the road. He explained the lanes would remain at their current width, but the paved shoulder would allow for rumble strips at the outside stripe, resulting in increased safety. He noted that P28 is the secondbusiest road in Guthrie County.

"My thought is widening Stuart to Monteith, and that being the primary focus," Sebern said. "From Monteith north, we handle that through maintenance and through other funds."

Sebern explained that if the supervisors agree with this plan, the project will likely go out for bids in January or February of 2026 with an expected start date in or around August 2026.

Sheriff Matt Harmann provided a departmental update.

"Since January, we've kept overtime to a bare minimum. There's been not much at all," Harmann said. "Calls for service looks like it will be up slightly from last year."

Regarding calls for service, Harmann said the department totaled approximately 3,500 in 2024 but is ahead of that pace so far in 2025.

"Right now, we're around 2,700, so it's looking like it'll be slightly higher," Harmann said. He reported no significant new trends noted in the calls for service.

Harmann reported on the jail's usage through the first six months of this year. He said 264 prisoners were admitted with 147 being Guthrie County residents and 117 out of county.

Supervisor Brian Johnson asked about the Sheriff's department's dogs. Harmann said the department has two canines, and he hopes that each can continue to serve for another four years or so.

#### OCT. 7 - LETTER OF RESISTANCE, COUNTY EMPLOYEE HEALTH INSURANCE

County Attorney Dana Minteer addressed the supervisors regarding agen-

da item 4a: "Resistance to the Summit Carbon Solution Transport LLC Motion for Consolidation."

Minteer explained the reason for discussing the issue at this time is because of recent legal action by Summit Carbon Solutions.

"They filed a petition to amend their original petition within the Phase 1 docket," she said.

Minteer summarized that Summit is asking to consolidate the legal processes with the various counties involved.

"They're requesting that everyone now be lumped together," Minteer said.

Minteer and Supervisors Chair Maggie Armstrong concurred that each county has a unique perspective, so consolidation is not appropriate, in their view.

After discussion, the supervisors voted 4-1 to ask Minteer to send a letter of resistance. Brian Johnson voted nay.

County Human Resources department head Jamie Lindsay discussed with the supervisors regarding the effective date of health insurance for county employees. She explained that currently, coverage begins on the first day of the month following a hire date. She explained the challenges this creates for employees hired later in a given month, since their paychecks may essentially have double deductions for health insurance premi-

ums due to the timing of premiums.

However, Lindsay also explained that if coverage were to be effective one month later, this could create situations in which employees would have no coverage for a month. She also shared that if department heads are instructed to only hire employees within a certain "window" each month, that creates a challenge as departments aim to fill vacancies.

"If we're going to make a change to the policy, we have to communicate that 60 days prior to the change," Lindsay said.

No formal action was taken at this time.

The supervisors voted to call a special election for Diamondhead Lake and Lake Panorama Rural Improvement Zone for Tuesday, Dec. 9.

#### OCT. 14 - RETURN TO EMS ISSUE, LEARN ABOUT FLU VACCINE PUSH AND ACTIVE SHOOTER TRAINING

Chair Maggie Armstrong brought up Resolution 26-10 (A Resolution Declaring Emergency Medical Services an Essential Service in Guthrie County). The supervisors voted 4-1 to approve the resolution, with Mike Dickson voting no.

Health Service Director Jotham Arber provided a departmental update. He

shared the county's plan for offering seasonal vaccinations.

"We haven't done a big push on our flu vaccines yet. We will; we're working with the pharmacies," Arber said. "We've kind of waited strategically into October to start doing our push, just because of the trend I'm seeing of the disease."

"We'll go and do the schools; we'll offer it to businesses," Arber said. He said the plan is to make a big push for flu vaccinations through November and December.

Arber also shared plans for active shooter trainings.

"The hospital and the schools are doing an active shooter drill that we'll be participating in," Arber said. "The role of the health department will be the aftereffects of that."

Agenda item No. 7 (Heart of Iowa Community Services) stated that the supervisors may enter into a special closed session with County Attorney Dana Minteer to discuss a matter that is presently in litigation or where litigation is imminent.

The public meeting ended immediately prior to the opening of the closed session.

The supervisors meet regularly on Tuesdays at 9 a.m. The public is welcome to attend in person or via remote technology. To join remotely, call 323-792-6123, then use meeting code 547029216# ■

### CITY OF YALE TO TAKE BIDS FOR WATER TREATMENT PROJECT

The Yale City Council met on Oct. 7 regarding Resolution 25-06 (Notice of hearing on proposed plans, specification, form of contract and estimate of cost for the Water Treatment Filter Unit Replacement Project and the taking of bids therefor). Mayor Bev Louk provided background.

"This is for the bidding for the treatment plant," Louk said. "On Nov. 4, here at city hall, we will open a public hearing on the plans and specs. Then, on Nov. 6 at 2 p.m., we will open bids."

The council approved Resolution 25-06. As in previous years, the council voted to provide funds (\$300) for the Saddle Club's Halloween party.

Mayor Louk explained agenda item No. 10 (CDBG Grant 22-WS-023 Contract Extension).

"It's just basically to get all the paperwork and everything in," Louk said. "Chris Whitaker with Region 12 already has the OK."

The council approved the extension.

The council set trick-or-treating in Yale for 5-7 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 31.


Mayor Louk brought up the topic of the city purchasing one or more cameras as suggested by Sheriff Harmann. Louk said the camera(s) would be remotely accessible by the Sheriff's department. Louk said the total cost would be around \$13,000 total for four cameras, which is much more than the city anticipated. Councilmember Mindy Fear voiced her concern.

"I feel like we need some clarification," Fear said.

The council took no formal action but will ask Sheriff Harmann for more information.

# PANORA CITY COUNCIL REVIEWS SIDEWALK SALE ORDINANCE, 'EMERGENCY ONLY' CREDIT CARD

#### SEPT. 22 - TRICK-OR-TREAT NIGHT SET, LIBRARY BOARD MEMBERS APPOINTED

During the regular meeting of the Panora City Council on Sept. 22, the councilmembers voted unanimously to approve Resolution 25-32, setting Oct. 31 as the standard date for the city's trick-or-treat events, regardless of the day of the week.

The council reappointed members of the library board to another six-year term. Chris Hastings, Kari Sebern and Tina Thornberry each have a new term through Dec. 31, 2031.

City Administrator Lisa Grossman described the work she has been doing to update the city's code of ordinances. She said the majority of the changes are minor wording or numbering changes to make sure references match.

"Just making it read a little bit better," Grossman said.

Councilmember Mark Sheeder mentioned a tree that may need attention near Jackson Street.

"There's a large diameter stump about 15 feet high," Sheeder said. "It's now starting to lean into the right of way."

Grossman said the city crew is aware of the situation.

#### OCT. 13 - SIDEWALK SALE ORDINANCE, "EMERGENCY ONLY" CREDIT CARD

Council members discussed sidewalk sales by downtown storefronts in the business commercial district. City Administrator Lisa Grossman read from the current ordinance, which outlines the number of days that a business can have a sidewalk sale consecutively.

Council members suggested amending the ordinance to stipulate that sidewalk

sales can occur only during regular business hours, meaning that items would need to be brought inside or removed at the end of the business day.

Grossman suggested the matter should first be reviewed by the Planning and Zoning Commission and then could come back to the council after that. No formal action was taken by the council.

The council discussed a request from Mason Caruthers for permission to hunt Canada geese on agricultural ground within city limits. The land in question is owned by Ethan Boyers. Caruthers' request stated he would hunt at least 600 feet from any building or dwelling, and he added that Police Chief Matt Reising has no objection to the request. The council unanimously approved Caruthers' request.

Grossman brought up a request to obtain an "emergency-only" credit card for Panora EMS use.

"There's a fuel card in each vehicle, and each employee has a PIN. We've had a

few situations come up where a PIN is incorrectly entered, and sometimes the employee has to then use their own card for fuel and get reimbursed," Grossman said.


Grossman also said the credit card could help with various unexpected emergencies, such as in case of a vehicle breakdown or accident. She explained that if approved, the emergency-only credit card would be for only those situations when EMS staff are unable to use the fuel card. Council members were hesitant about the city having another credit card.

"I'm just looking at it as one more credit card out there. Personally, I'm not for it," Councilmember Brian Dorsett said.

The council did not take formal action on the request.

During the Sept. 25 meeting of the Guthrie County Hospital Board of Trustees, Matt Leaders and Cory Bettis, representatives from Graham Construction, presented the tentative timeline for the hospital's planned improvement project.

"We're looking to start construction in early March," Leaders said, adding that the construction period is tentatively expected to be from March 2026 to August 2028. He also said the tentative start date of March 2 is somewhat weather-dependent.

Chief Financial Officer Brandon Johnson provided a monthly report on finances.

It was noted that seasonal flu shots for staff have begun to be scheduled and administered.

Foundation Director Dennis Flanery

said the 5K walk/run and health fair are set for Oct. 4. He added that the hospital auxiliary plans to hold a potato bar fundraiser on Nov. 20.

The trustees voted to approve opening a bank account for the improvement project and to set a date for a hearing on a proposal to issue bonds or notes and borrow funds related to the project. CEO Chris Stipe noted that the hospital still could decide to shelve the project if unforeseen challenges arise.

"This is not a point of no return yet," he said.

The trustees set the hearing for Oct. 23 (the date of the next regular board meeting).

The board went into a special closed session to discuss a personnel matter.

The next regular meeting of the trustees is set for Oct. 23 at 4 p.m. The public is welcome.

Upcoming dates noted included parentteacher conferences 3-7:30 p.m. on Oct. 21 and Oct. 23. On each of those dates, school will dismiss at 1:45 p.m.



# AUTO SERVICES AND EQUIPMENT RENTAL IN LINDEN


"My mom's from Adel. My dad's from Stuart. I was born in southern California. So, I've moved home to a place I'd never been before," Maynes said.

The first auto shop Maynes operated was in Adel, from 2009 to 2014, before getting the opportunity to open in Linden, at 401 W. North St. Maynes has spent his lifetime around cars.

"I've been working on cars since I was about 19, and I just turned 69," he said.

"I had talked to the city of Linden, and they had vacated this street, so I offered to build my shop here, and that was approved," Maynes said. "I had retired last year, for about three months. That was about nine or 10 months ago," Maynes said.

When asked what sets his shop apart from others, Maynes short answer was

"service."

"When I do an oil change, I don't just change the oil and filter. I have a whole list that comes out on the computer. I vacuum the floorboards, check all the fluid levels, fill the washer fluid, check all the tires, check the belts, battery and wiper blades, air filter," Maynes said.

"I sell a lot of tires. I have pretty good prices on tires, from what everybody has told me," Maynes said.

Maynes said for tires, the busiest season

is right now. He said from October through December, as drivers prepare for snowy roads, demand for tire replacement is at its peak. Otherwise, Maynes said his business runs fairly steady year-round. Maynes said he usually has a lineup of vehicle to

be worked on, but he strives to juggle things around when a customer needs a car fixed fast.

Maynes recently chose to expand his business by adding Linden Rental at the same locale as his auto shop. The demand for rental equipment has already been a pleasant surprise.

"I'd talked about adding that for years, and then I decided now was the time. I've got the location, and I'm here anyway, so I started it about three weeks ago, and I'm already having trouble keeping my equipment here," he said.

ry on Mother's Day and Valentine's Day," Carter said. "Those holidays are a lot of fun, because it's super busy, and I thrive on busy."

Carter had no trouble stating what she feels is most difficult in her floral creations.

"Corsages, because they're so small and delicate, and you want to make sure they stay together. So, they're the most challenging, but I do them," she said.

Artistic expression is important to Carter, and it goes beyond flowers.

"I do pen and ink, and I paint," Carter said. "I've done art since high school. I call it my passion. I also entered some contests and won some prizes over the years."

When asked about memorable moments in making floral art, Carter recalled two incidents.

"I worked at a flower shop and grocery store in Oklahoma, and there happened to be two funerals on the same day, and I was the only one working that day," Carter said. "Well, their last names were very similar, and they each ordered at least 20 pieces."

After delivering the arrangements to each of the two churches, Carter noticed a problem.

"I realized I'd switched them," Carter said. "I was at the second church, and people were already starting to come in. I was crying, and I asked the funeral director what I should do, and he said, 'I don't know. It's your problem.'"

With that warm support, Carter quickly set about getting all of the flowers to the correct destinations.

"We did it, but it was one of my horrible moments as a florist," Carter said.



- **CHARGING** lithium-ion batteries, always use the manufacturer-approved charger, charge the device on a hard, flat surface away from flammables, and never leave it unattended, especially overnight. Avoid excessive temperatures and physical damage, disconnect the charger when the battery is full to prevent overcharging, and ensure a working smoke alarm is present in the charging area.

## PARMESAN GARLIC FOCACCIA BREAD IS A SLICE OF COMFORT

This month, I share another recipe from my daughter, Samantha. She loves to make all kinds of bread. Few things make a kitchen feel more welcoming than the aroma of freshly baked bread, and parmesan garlic focaccia delivers that comfort in every bite. Golden and crisp on the outside yet soft and airy inside, this Italian favorite is elevated with the irresistible pairing of roasted garlic and nutty parmesan cheese. It is the kind of bread that fe

parmesan cheese. It is the kind of bread that feels special but is surprisingly simple to make at home. Serve as a side with soups and pastas, cut into squares for an appetizer board, or enjoy warm right out of the pan. Focaccia is versatile and crowd pleasing. The drizzle of olive oil, a sprinkling of herbs and the cheesy finish give it that bakery-style touch you will love sharing — or keeping all to yourself. Enjoy!

#### PARMESAN GARLIC FOCACCIA BREAD

#### **Ingredients:**

- 1½ cups warm water (about 110°F)
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 2½ teaspoons instant yeast (1 packet)
- 4 cups flour
- 1½ teaspoons salt
- 1/3 cup extra virgin olive oil, plus more for greasing
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 2/3 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 teaspoon dried Italian herbs or chopped rosemary
- Flaky sea salt

#### **Directions**

Combine warm water, sugar and



yeast. Let sit for 5 minutes until foamy. Add flour and salt. Mix until dough forms. (It will be sticky.) With a mixer, kneed for 5-7 minutes or by hand for 8-10 minutes until smooth. Brush dough with olive oil and cover. Let rise 1-1.5 hours in a warm spot until dough has doubled. Heat 2 tablespoons olive oil with minced garlic until fragrant

(about 1 minute) in a pan. Keep for later. Place dough in greased 9-inch by 13-inch pan. Gently press to corners. Let rest 10 minutes, then stretch. Cover and rise 30-45 minutes. Preheat oven to 425 F. With your fingers, dimple the dough all over. Brush with garlic oil. Then sprinkle parmesan cheese, herbs and sea salt on top of dough. Bake 20-25 minutes until golden brown. Cool 10 minutes in pan, then transfer to wire rack. Slice and serve warm. Store bread for two days at room temperature or freeze up to three months.

For the best results, follow these additional steps: Make sure your water is warm (110 F), not hot. For the best texture, let the dough rise completely. Use plenty of oil in your pan, as this will give your bread a crisp crust.




