The bathroom had a dark brown toilet. Seriously. Dad and I installed a new one and moved that one to the basement. It worked, and it was good for a few laughs.

The ceiling had what I thought were wooden beams. Upon closer inspection, I learned they were made of Styrofoam. I called Jolene into the room and asked her to watch while I knocked them down with one hand. She was impressed, for a few seconds.

We sanded the dark interior woodwork and doors and painted them lighter colors, and we gave the exterior a makeover from the dark brown and white barn look to more neutral and earthtone colors. New landscaping and stonework gave the home a much-improved street appearance as well.

We did our best — on a very limited budget and a lot of sweat equity — to update this house and erase those disco-era features. Looking back, it was fun, and we learned a lot.

Over time, we were able to hire professionals to do other improvements as well. All this remodel work helped to make this little house into a home — our home. It looked much different from the time we bought it to the time we sold it.

Five homes later, and we still smile as we look back with fond memories of our first home and the work we did to it. I am sure many of you can relate.

Binzebo, rocks transform backyard

When Kent and Jody Eubank built their home in West Des Moines on 2-plus acres of land, it offered room for gardens and a shed surrounded by a large lawn. However, when Kent retired, the pair began rethinking their lawn.

Both Kent and Jody like rocks and decided on transforming their yard with boulders in the front yard and river rock in the back.

"The boulder project was my first retirement gift," Kent explains.

A semi-truck delivered 15 tons of rock. A 6-ton boulder was place by a crane. The boulder was originally planned for the backyard, but, due to its size, it only made it to the front yard.

"That's as far as he could get it," Kent recalls.

Other 3-ton rocks and a huge granite boulder, sliced from a 10-ton rock, were placed in the front yard.

The landscaping didn't stop at the rocks. They installed an outdoor pizza oven on the back patio but didn't enclose it in a wood deck due to fire hazards. Then, the couple attended a pond tour, sponsored by Just Add Water, where

they were inspired by unique water features and rocks they saw. They inquired about back patio ideas and discussed replacing an existing water feature.

The staff of Just Add Water, a landscape contractor specializing in water garden designs, listened to the Eubanks' vision of transforming their backyard and putting in a large waterfall.

Within three weeks, the backyard water feature was established.

"I can sit on the porch swing and hear the waterfall," Jody says.

As many homeowners find, once one thing in their home is changed, more changes are inevitable. As the Eubanks were viewing their waterfall, they discussed how they wanted to

enjoy the waterfall year-round.

"Some days were rainy, too sunny or too cold," Jody says. "I wanted to view it in all seasons."

So, they researched options and considered adding a gazebo, which would provide shelter from many weather elements. However, a traditional gazebo with open sides might not block the wind. Instead, they found a binzebo — a modified grain bin. Panels block the wind from the north, and they cut out portions of the binzebo to provide a view of the waterfall.

Jody decorated the silver bin inside with casual seating, while the outside of the bin includes flower boxes and vintage metal decorations. Now the couple can enjoy the waterfall in all seasons and entertain friends while enjoying it and seeing deer, coyote, birds and other wildlife.

The final phase of work was to address a portion of the backyard where grass was not growing. Their solution? Add more rocks.

"Why not rockscape it," Kent says. "The hill never grew grass."

This year, they added 28 tons of river rock and more boulders. During vacations, they

collect unique rocks and add them to their backyard landscape.

"I like rocks," Jody says. "I like to walk among our river rocks and look for interesting rocks. The tranquility of the water feature is wonderful."

The waterfall also includes color-changing lights. A 400-gallon storage tank underneath the water feature pumps 800 gallons an hour.

In the winter, snow forms over the waterfall, creating a beautiful scene.

Rounding out their home is a windmill, metal artifacts and vintage farm equipment, as both grew up on farms. They like how the water features, rocks and metal pieces tie into their home.

"It's a sanctuary out here. I love to enjoy the space, whether alone or with friends," Jody says.

Basement remodel

A finished bar with a rec room was completed. The bar is made of butcher block sections.

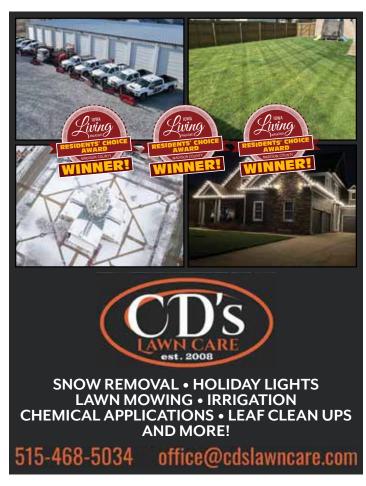

"I really enjoy the sauna," he says. "There's lots of health benefits. It's a great way to

He added a storage closet and enclosed the utility room. Since moving in, he's added a walk-out patio, completed landscaping and done other projects.

He says, by hiring Hansen Home Remodeling, the renovation was a smooth process.

- · Mix butter, heat-and-sweet seasoning and garlic powder. Using meat injector, inject mixture into chicken. Rub remaining buttered seasoning over chicken and season with salt and pepper, to taste.

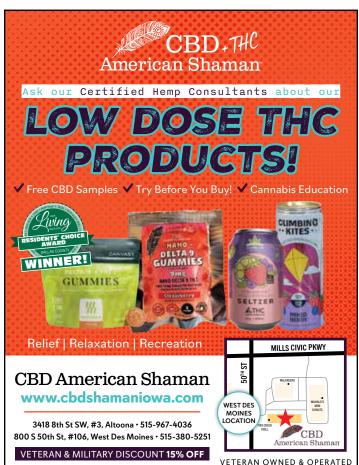

MEET Katie Hoover

Honored with Education of Character Award

Katie Hoover, a West Des Moines teacher, was recently honored with an Education of Character Award for 2024. The Robert D and Billie Ray Center established Character Counts as a way to practice good character skills and promote a positive culture.

Hoover, who is a "fierce advocate for special needs students," was one of 12 Character Award winners and was nominated by families and educators.

Hoover has been a "lifer" in the West Des Moines Community School District since she first attended kindergarten. Her mother and grandmother both taught school.

While attending Valley High School, she was a peer helper paired with special needs kids. The teacher asked her if she had considered being a special needs teacher.

"She said to me, I see something in you," Hoover recalls.

One summer, she was a nanny for a child on the autism spectrum. Then she attended UNI, where she earned an elementary education degree, with a special education specialty.

Throughout her 20-year teaching career, she has taught in several roles, all in West Des Moines. She worked as a behavioral interventionist, assisting teachers and students in the classroom at Hillside for seven years.

When Hoover began teaching, she realized there weren't many programs or summer camps for special needs kids.

"Let's create one," she recalls.

The district then created a summer program called Camp Champs, which meets over four weeks in the summer. Hoover brings in selected peer helpers from high school.

"They come in and love our kids and interact. Adults help out, too, but the kids love it when school-age students come and help."

Hoover began working with the Blank Park Zoo eight years ago. Organizers wanted to learn how to expand their special needs camps and hired her as an inclusion specialist. She filters out students who might need extra support during camps due to all types of issues, including medical or special needs.

She also noticed a need for kids in middle school. She started Club 515 — The Hope Foundation, which offers four events a year for kids with

At Jordan Creek Elementary school, she began a Circle of Friends program, similar to best buddies, where students support kids. Friends ask others if they want to be a part of a circle, which assists with inclusivity.

In January, an unexpected opening arose at Hillside for a teacher in a special education classroom. Hoover stepped up and is back in the classroom.

"I'm so content with my choice. I'm back with my little family," she

She says working with special needs kids is both her and her family's

"I love seeing the progress. They smile and hug and feel loved," Hoover says. "Building a close relationship with the families is important to keep everyone involved." ■

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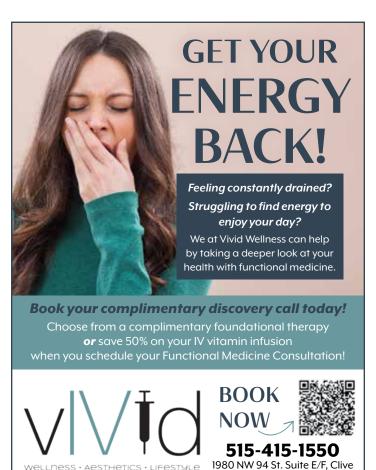

Whether it is in small or big ways, change in grief shows us that we are integrating the loss into our lives and adjusting to life after the death of our person. The gauge in grief isn't necessarily about "feeling better" or forgetting our person or "moving on," but rather adjusting to life without your person's physical presence and carrying the love you have for them forward with you.

So much so that Monson was inspired to learn Spanish. She had noticed many people coming into the food pantry had limited English speaking skills and used a translation app on their phone to communicate with her. She decided it was a good time to learn a new language herself.

For three-and-a-half years now, Monson has slowly learned Spanish through an online program, taking at least one lesson a day.

"I think, when you meet someone from a different country who's here, and you can learn even a little of their language, they're so grateful,"

Monson likes the community feel of the food pantry and believes it's well run by both staff and volunteers.

"Everyone is so committed," she says. "It's a joyful, joyful experience. Each time I have a shift and leave, it's the highlight of my day, oftentimes

Monson has even inspired her husband to get involved. Every Friday, he picks up donations from local grocery stores and takes them back to the food pantry.

For Monson, volunteering is all about doing what she can to make others' lives easier.

"It gives to me far more than I give," she says. "My week isn't complete unless I've somehow helped people during that time. I don't see a greater need for anything I do than to help people who are less fortunate. It's so meaningful to me." ■

'The Night Guest'

With the stress of her sister's recent tragic death causing family strife, and conflict with a coworker, Iounn resorts to trying anything to relieve her stress and get some rest. After getting a fitness watch, she learns a creepy new symptom — she's been sleepwalking thousands of steps each night. Terrified and confused, Iounn's journey to understand what's happening to her is both horrifying and compulsively readable.

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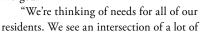
MEET Audrey Kennis

THE ROLE of a trust in estate planning

Creating an estate plan is the way to ensure that your assets pass to your loved ones following your death. There are several different estate planning options, but a common one is to create a trust.

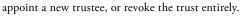
A trust is comprised of three separate parties: a grantor, a trustee and the beneficiaries. The grantor (or settlor) creates the trust. The trustee manages the assets held within the trust. The beneficiaries are the individuals or groups who receive the benefits provided by the trust.

There are two main types of trusts that a person can create as part of an estate plan: a living trust and a testamentary trust.

A living trust — also called a revocable trust — is created during the grantor's lifetime, and the grantor funds the trust while still alive. The trust contains provisions as to how you choose for your assets to be distributed after you die. You can name a trustee to manage the assets in the trust, or you can act as the initial trustee.

The grantor has the authority to decide when and to whom trust distributions are made. The grantor can also change the trust,

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Living trusts are good options for planning for potential incapacity. They are a good way to manage assets during your lifetime as well as have an orderly plan for disposition after you die. Further, living trusts allow those settling the estate to avoid probate and get the assets distributed to the beneficiaries more quickly and efficiently.

The second type of trust is a testamentary trust. Testamentary trusts are trusts which are created within a person's will. Because they are not created until the death of the grantor, testamentary trusts do not hold any assets or have any power until the grantor has died. After the grantor's death, assets are transferred into a trust for the benefit of the beneficiaries. Testamentary trusts are most commonly created in a will for the benefit of minor children, a spouse, or a disabled adult child.

When created properly, trusts are an efficient and effective way to ensure that loved ones receive your assets. Be sure to consult with an experienced attorney when choosing a trust for your estate planning.

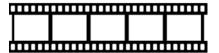
