

ERASING the disco era

Jolene and I bought our first home in the mid-1990s, and we stretched ourselves financially to do so. It was a split foyer home that was built in the 1970s — and it looked like it.

The appliances and countertops were green, typical of the era. We hired a company to paint the appliances white, and they looked like 1970s appliances that were painted white. This was a great example of the expression about putting lipstick on a pig. My dad and I installed the new countertops, and we did a good job for a couple of amateurs.



The kitchen had a fake, red, brick veneer over the drywall, which was, again, typical of the era. We primed and painted it, and it looked much better.

The bathroom had a dark brown toilet. Seriously. Dad and I installed a new one and moved that one to the basement. It worked, and it was good for a few laughs.

The ceiling had what I thought were wooden beams. Upon closer inspection, I learned they were made of Styrofoam. I called Jolene into the room and asked her to watch while I knocked them down with one hand. She was impressed, for a few seconds.

We sanded the dark interior woodwork and doors and painted them lighter colors, and we gave the exterior a makeover from the dark brown and white barn look to more neutral and earthtone colors. New landscaping and stonework gave the home a much-improved street appearance as well.

We did our best — on a very limited budget and a lot of sweat equity — to update this house and erase those disco-era features. Looking back, it was fun, and we learned a lot.

Over time, we were able to hire professionals to do other improvements as well. All this remodel work helped to make this little house into a home — our home. It looked much different from the time we bought it to the time we sold it.

Five homes later, and we still smile as we look back with fond memories of our first home and the work we did to it. I am sure many of you can relate.



New bathroom tile makes a big impact

(Family Features) Updating the flooring can help infuse new life into tired, outdated bathrooms. For an upscale, polished look that doesn't have to break the bank, consider installing tile flooring.

Whether you are doing the work yourself or hiring a professional to do the work, you'll want to make some decisions about the look and feel of your flooring before you start.

Ceramic or stone? Weigh factors such as porosity, how slippery the surface may be when wet and how well it retains heat or cold. Ultimately, your decision hinges on the needs and uses of

Big or small? Generally, the larger the tile, the fewer grout lines, and too many grout lines in a smaller space can create the illusion of clutter. However, smaller tiles can eliminate the need to make multiple awkward cuts, and small tiles are perfect for creating accent patterns or introducing a splash of color.

Getting the overall look and materials finalized is only the beginning. Next, you or your contractor will need to make sure

the subfloor is prepared.

- Use a level to check for uneven spots; you need an even surface to prevent cracks in the tile or grout. Even out rough spots that could pose tripping hazards. Use patching and leveling material to create a consistent surface. Apply a thin layer of mortar then attach your cement backer board with screws. Cover joints with cement board tape, apply another thin layer of mortar, smooth and allow to dry.
- To ensure square placement, draw reference lines on the subfloor using a level and carpenter square. Tile should start in the middle of the room and move out toward the walls, so make your initial reference lines as close to the center as possible. Mark additional reference lines as space allows, such as 2-foot-by-2-foot squares.
- Do a test run with your chosen tile by laying it out on the floor. There are color variations in most tile patterns, so you'll want to verify each tile blends well with the next.
- Mix tile mortar and use the thin side of a trowel to apply mortar at a 45-degree

angle. Use the combed side to spread evenly and return excess mortar to the bucket. Remember to apply mortar in small areas, working as you go, so it doesn't dry before you're ready to lay the tile.

- When laying tile, use your reference lines as guides. Press and wiggle tile slightly for the best adherence.
- Use spacers to create even lines between one tile and the next, removing excess mortar with a damp sponge or rag.
- As you complete a section of tile, use a level and mallet to verify the tiles are sitting evenly.
- Let mortar dry 24 hours before grouting.
- Remove spacers then apply grout to joints, removing excess as you go.
- Allow grout to dry per the manufacturer's instructions then go back over the tile with a damp sponge to set grout lines and clean grout residue.
- Once grout has cured usually at least a couple weeks apply sealer to protect it.

Improve your home's look with wallpaper

(Family Features) To understand the mood of a room, look no further than its walls. Wallpaper can add instant texture and flair, and today's DIY-friendly options make it easy to create inspired spaces with little fuss.

The key to successful wallpapering is in the preparation. Clean, dry walls are a must, and any holes or cracks should be filled and sanded. To avoid paste that absorbs into porous surfaces, take time to apply a light, even coat of primer before beginning.

Choose a corner or space behind a door as your starting point. Mark your starting point using a level to draw a vertical line from floor to ceiling. Next, cut a length of wallpaper several inches longer than the height of your wall from the baseboard to ceiling.

Apply paste or activate the adhesive according to the manufacturer's directions. Be sure to fully cover or dampen the paper surface; dry spots may result in unsightly bubbles.





Begin smoothing the paper onto the wall using the vertical line as a guide. Begin at the ceiling and smooth using a brush or plastic smoothing tool. If you encounter wrinkles or bubbles, gently lift the paper and smooth, relaying the paper as you go.

With each strip, you should end with several inches above the ceiling joint and below the baseboard line. Ensure the paper has firmly adhered top to bottom then trim using a sharp

blade. Smooth each seam as you go.

Continue this process around the room, aligning your paper pattern as needed. If it isn't possible to completely match the pattern, focus on the middle third of the wall, which is most likely to be at eye level.

To maneuver corners, cut a slit in the paper overhanging the ceiling and floor. This allows the paper to lay flat for a smoother finish.

When you round back to your starting

point, overlap your original strip of paper with the final strip. Make a single cut for a clean, crisp seam. Gently wipe away excess adhesive from the trim and seams.

To prevent rips and ripples, allow paper to dry completely — at least overnight —before replacing furniture and hanging artwork to complete your space.



Blackened spatchcock chicken


- 1 whole chicken
- 1 cup melted butter or ghee
- · 2 tablespoons heat-and-sweet seasoning
- 1/2 tablespoon garlic powder
- · salt, to taste
- · pepper, to taste

DIRECTIONS

- Heat grill to 375-400 F.
- · Use kitchen shears or knife to remove backbone from chicken to lav flat. Remove rib cage, if desired, or push flat with
- · Mix butter, heat-and-sweet seasoning and garlic powder. Using meat injector, inject mixture into chicken. Rub remaining buttered seasoning over chicken and season with salt and pepper, to taste.



- Place spatchcock chicken breast-side up over indirect heat and cook 35-40 minutes.
- · When internal temperature reaches 145 F, flip chicken breast-side down over direct heat 5 minutes, or until internal temperature reaches 165 F.
- · Let rest 10 minutes before serving.

COUPLE has a history in Bondurant

Wunns have been in town for decades.

Linda Wunn and her husband, Lonny, have been in the Bondurant community ever since they married 54 years ago. First, they lived in a trailer court just outside town. Twelve years later, they bought a house in the city proper.

They've been there ever since.

For 42 years, the Wunns have been proud residents of Lincon Street. There, they raised their children, all of whom graduated from Bondurant-Farrar High School, and experienced the growth and changes of the town.

"When we first moved here, we were the young couple with the kids, and everyone around us was older and established," Wunn says.

She remembers learning a lot about Bondurant from some of their earliest neighbors, who had a great history with the community. Now, Wunn hopes to pass down that information and her own love for Bondurant to others.

As the Wunns' kids grew up, Wunn was known as the nurse on the block. If a neighbor had an ache or pain, they'd call her up.

Over the years, as the older people on Lincoln Street passed away or moved into senior living facilities, Wunn and her husband became

the elders of the street. While they still cherish their longtime relationships with neighbors, like one who is 95 years old, they've also enjoyed welcoming new people to the neighborhood.

"What I love about it now is we're surrounded by young couples with young families," Wunn says. "It's like a rebirth of this

She also appreciates how friendly and kind everyone is. Recently, some of the neighbor kids brought her and Lonny cookies out of the blue. A few days later, the same kids learned how to make balloon animals and brought the couple some of their creations. Wunn shares that, between the small number of houses on Lincoln Street, there are 18 kids under the age of 16.

"It's just remarkable, and I think it helps keep Lonny and I young," she says.

Because they live in one of Bondurant's original neighborhoods, Wunn still feels like they're in a small-town atmosphere, even amid the community's growth. The location is close to restaurants and City Park. Wunn enjoys being able to walk a block to get a pie from Home Slice Handmade Pies or a bite to eat somewhere.

"It feels so homey and small-town, but it's nice to see the town growing and young couples moving in and how many vibrant businesses are coming to town," Wunn says. "I think it's fantastic."

The Wunns don't plan on leaving Bondurant — or Lincoln Street — any time soon.

"I hope to stay here until we end up in the nursing home," she jokes. ■



HOW TO CHOOSE AN INTERIOR DESIGNER

You've decided to update your home or business and have lots of ideas but are overwhelmed with where to begin. A good interior designer will help bring those ideas to life by clarifying your vision and providing you with a detailed design plan that transforms your space and functions well for you.

Investing in an interior designer adds valuable experience and expertise to your project. As industry experts, they can connect you with the resources needed for your project and provide you with plans to communicate the details. They are specialists in design trends and knowledgeable of the products, building process and codes. They will help streamline the process and alleviate the pressure of making design decisions. Here are a few things to consider when searching for an interior designer to refresh your space.

DEFINE YOUR PROJECT GOALS AND STYLE

Think about your specific project goals and do some research gathering imagery in advance of meeting with an interior designer.

COST

for a project, some work on a cost-plus basis by purchasing items for the project then adding a percentage, and some designers do a combination.

CERTIFICATION

Certain states, including Iowa, require those utilizing the title "Registered Interior Designer" to meet the formal interior design education requirements, experience and passage of the NCIDQ (National Council for Interior Design Qualification) exam. Continuing education requirements also apply, ensuring interior designers are aware of industry updates — from finishes, fixtures and furniture to the health, safety and welfare of the public. A list of registered interior designers in Iowa can be found on Iowa's Professional Licensing Bureau website. Professional interior design organizations include, among others: IIDA (International Interior Design Association) and ASID (American Society of Interior Designers). ■

HOW TO CHOOSE YOUR FLORIST

HOW TO CHOOSE GARAGE DOORS

PREPARING for the cold and flu season

Summer 2024 Facilities Enhancements





UNDO summer sun damage

Summer is officially over, and you might be finding yourself with duller skin, rougher texture, and more freckling and sunspots. Adding an exfoliation step into your home skincare regimen, as well as to your professional services, can help undo the UV damage that accumulated over the summer months. There are two main types of exfoliations, both with benefits to maintain youthful skin and a healthy skin



Physical exfoliation utilizes various tools or scrubs to provide physical abrasion of dead skin cells. Examples at home include the use of wash cloths or brushes, while professional physical exfoliation includes services such as dermaplaning and DiamondGlow. Chemical exfoliation uses different agents, such as alpha hydroxy acids (like glycolic and lactic acids) and beta hydroxy acids (like salicylic acid) to loosen up dead skin cells, allowing them to slough away. Laser skin rejuvenation is another option for treatment of sun damage, providing dramatic results, sometimes in a single treatment session. Laser skin rejuvenation has also been shown to decrease the risk and incidence of non-melanoma skin cancers, including basal cell and squamous cell carcinomas.

An effective approach to treating sun damage includes both an at-home and professional service regimen based on your skin type, concerns, social schedule and budget. ■

BAD breath? Brush your tongue

Have you experienced bad breath? Have you thought, "Oh man, I need to brush my teeth to get rid of this bad breath." Or, "Does anyone have a mint or gum?" Have you ever thought about what causes bad breath? Bad breath, also known as halitosis, can come from food and drinks, poor dental hygiene, tobacco use, medical conditions or the tongue. The tongue has a rough surface with peaks and grooves, the perfect place for bacteria to settle and live. The bacteria on your tongue, when not brushed daily, can be a cause of bad breath. Next time you notice the coffee breath or the bad morning breath, try brushing your tongue.

BE AWARE of trending financial scams

It seems like scammers never sleep. Criminals are constantly coming up with creative ways to steal money from unsuspecting people, especially older Americans. Each year, millions of elderly adults fall victim to financial frauds, suffering \$3 billion or more in losses, according to the FBI.



As people live longer, elder fraud will continue to be a problem, though likely an underreported one. Older Americans may not want to report

fraud for several reasons: they might not know how, or they may be too embarrassed at being duped out of their money. They could also be concerned that, if their families find out about the scam, they may pressure them to hand over the reins of their financial affairs.

Trending financial scams

Grandparent scam

Criminals pretend to be a relative, usually a child or grandchild, and often claim to need money for a health emergency. In this scam, the "relative" says they are going to send a friend by your home to collect the money. They may also ask money be wire-transferred to someone you don't know.

What to do: Resist the urge to immediately help. Never give or send money, jewelry, gift cards, checks or wire transfers to people you don't know. Call another relative to confirm the situation.

Tech support scam

Through email or by phone, criminals pose as technology support staff and offer to fix computer issues that don't really exist. Sometimes they want to install anti-virus software as a way to gain remote access to your electronic devices and personal information.

What to do: Hang up on scammers if they call. Always be careful of what you download. Never open an email attachment from someone you don't know or weren't expecting. Be wary of email attachments forwarded to you. Make sure your security software protections are up to date.

Government impersonation scam

Criminals pose as government employees, sometimes from the IRS or Social Security administration, and threaten to arrest or prosecute you unless you agree to provide a payment.

What to do: Government agencies won't call you and ask for personal information over the phone. Do not give this information out.

How to report financial fraud

If you or someone you know thinks they have been a victim of financial fraud, contact your local financial institution or law enforcement office. You can also file a complaint with the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center.
