#### An early beginning

It was the first lap of her life.

A tiny and nervous 5-year-old Courtney Mullin sat in her 80cc quad kart as she waited for the green flag to drop. This was going to be fun, she thought.

And, off she went. For less than a lap.

"I got into an accident on that first lap," she remembers with a laugh. "It was't a huge one, but it was enough. The other kid ended up breaking his arm, but I was OK."

Apparently. She went on to win the race. Her first one.

From then on, racing was in her veins. Winning. Racing. The tracks. The smells. Speed, as it was, was her thing. She had gotten it from dad.

"My dad had raced since he was 16," she said of the genesis of her love of racing. "He had me racing on weekends in the winter, because, in California, you can do that."

Mullin drove a dirt sport mod and also raced on asphalt in a quarter midget car. Eventually, she made it all the way up to racing modified on asphalt. With success, too.

She won a track championship racing

quarter midgets. There were thoughts of making racing a career. Things, as they say, were getting serious. So much so that Mullin visited Iowa in the summer of 2019 to experience racing here in the tall corn state, because "they do things differently" here. She eventually made her way back to California, but, in 2022, she made a big decision. She was returning to Iowa; it would be her new racing home.

"I sold all my stuff and moved here permanently," she said. "I sold my trailer, truck – everything. My plan was to start over when I got to Iowa."

That would have to wait, however. Mullin and her husband, Brandon, had their first child, putting her racing plans on hold. A move and a little time later, child No. 2 arrived.

The racing career is still on hold. But Mullin still has the need to scratch that racing itch and get behind a wheel. At least once here in Iowa, anyway.

"It's not an impossibility," she says. "It's just a matter of time and money; it's just so expensive. But within the next two or three years, I'd like to get back into racing and

experience it here, because it's just so different than it is in California.

"The payout is zero to nothing there, and the driving style is so different there," she says. "You take your new car out onto the track, race one race, and it's not new anymore because of how rough they race. Here, it's a really smooth race. The ethics of racing are so different in Iowa. The drivers here are so much more polite, to say the least. They aren't out there to wreck everyone to win. They're out there to race."

Being a female didn't help her California





racing cause either. Most of the time, Mullin was the only female on the track, racing against adult males to boot.

She persevered, though. A track championship proved she belonged. Her advice to young girls wanting to get into racing is simple: Don't

"When you're out on the track, you're all the same. You aren't a girl, you aren't a boy. You're just a racecar driver doing the same thing as everyone else," she says.

#### Off to the races

Although he is just 9 years of age, Bondurant's Braxton Hammond has a competitive drive that isn't seen in most kids his age — especially behind the wheel.

Braxton is a racer. During the season, he can be found behind the wheel of a winged caged kart on tracks in Knoxville, Osceola, Kamrar and Newton with his parents, Heather and Jacob Hammond.

The family purchased Braxton's first kart in April of 2020 when he was just 4. He couldn't race until he was 5, but, when he did, it was off to the races. Literally.

"We thought it would be a good time to see if it was something Braxton would be interested in, so we gave it a try," Heather says. "Being so young, there were naturally some things, as parents, that we were concerned about, but he got in and seemed to enjoy it. We've been doing it ever since."

Even at a young age, Braxton has been somewhat of a "motorhead." He was drawn to cars already.

"He always liked being in cars and could tell you the difference between a Camaro and a Mustang at the age of 2," his mother says. "He always had lots of Hot Wheels, we watched NASCAR, and we went to Knoxville a lot. His interest had already been piqued."

Heather was nervous watching that first lap being made all those years ago but says she had faith in the safety precautions they had taken in advance.

"The joke is that I only have one kid, and we don't have a backup if he gets broken, so there's always a lot of emphasis on safety equipment and making sure that he has the right devices on," she says.

Braxton, himself, was nothing short of elated to finally get his shot on a real track.

"It was like I was in another universe, being able to run real fast and be able to drive," he says. "It was like I was 16 and getting to drive a car for the first time."

The first couple of years of competitive racing were slow, Heather admits. The podium finishes were few and far between. The learning curve was steep, and they knew it would take some time to teach the youngster hand/eye

coordination, techniques and how to pass smartly without wrecking.

"There were a lot of teaching moments that went into those first couple of years, and there were moments where we weren't sure if it was something he wanted to do," she says. "But he always wanted to get back in the kart, so every chance we had to get back to the track and run laps and practice, we did."

Finally, it paid off, ironically on the heels of a broken arm Braxton suffered in a non-racing accident in May. On the surface, the injury couldn't have come at a worse time. Typically, Heather says, the biggest improvement comes when kids reach the age of 9. With a broken arm, however, Braxton wasn't able to get back into the kart until July. Racing was out of the question until the end of the month.

The first two races back were rough, Heather admits. But then something happened on the way to the track.

"In August, we raced three races in a row at Poplar Grove, and he won them all, including one that was the championship race against kids that had been racing there all season," Heather says.

A handful of additional wins and top-three finishes later, Braxton was officially back. And he doesn't plan on leaving anytime soon. He has big dreams.

"My goal is to at least make it to sprint cars or NASCAR," he says.

#### In it for the long haul

Unlike some of the other parents of racers, Tony Wiederholt of Bondurant has exactly zero laps of racing under his belt.

None.

But what he does have is a love for the sport. "I have never raced myself, but, growing up, I had a lot of buddies who did, so I was at the track every Friday and Saturday night," Tony says.

What Tony lacks in on-track wheeling, his son, Randy Wiederholt, makes up for, driving winged go karts on dirt tracks across Iowa.

Dad has always wanted to give his son the shot that he never had and has worked to make it happen, beginning when Randy turned 6.

It was a cold winter day in December a few years ago when Tony brought home a racing kart for his son. Both were elated, but there was



much work to be done before race No. 1.

Not much driving can be done in a Midwest winter, but as soon as spring came, the dead-end street in front of their home became a makeshift practice area a couple of times. It wasn't dirt, like the tracks were, but it would have to do. Unfortunately, those precious two sessions would be the only wheel time young Randy would get. Whenever Tony would take his son to an actual track, out came the rain. Again and again. So they did the only thing they could do: a trial by fire.

"We just went right into a points race the Saturday after he turned 6," Tony remembers.

There was no trepidation on Randy's part, practice or not. His first thought wasn't of how little practice he had gotten heading into this, his first go-round.

"I thought, 'I really want to win this,' " he says.

The track, he says, was "way bigger" than the road in front of his house. The difficulty level had been ratcheted up a few notches as well.

"It was harder because (the track) was on dirt and not pavement, so it was harder to steer," he says.

The first year, because Randy was so young and inexperienced, Tony had his fair share of trepidation. Big-time.

"Being that young and him not ever having been in that position, that first year I was scared beyond belief," he says. "Is he going to wreck anyone? Will he understand what the flags are? If he spins out, will he know what to do?"

As it turned out, those concerns were valid. At the end of the first hot laps (practice) session, when it was time to park the kart, Randy drove to the pit area — but at full speed.

"He went right up to the scales, and I was pumping my arms and signaling for him to stop, and, luckily he did," Tony says.

Now, with 150 races under his belt, Randy has more than a solid grasp on things. His skill level has increased dramatically in the past year, his dad says, almost to the point he is a different driver altogether, Tony says.

"He's giving me feedback now," Dad says. "His evolution as a driver has been unreal from last year to this year."

The game plan, according to Tony, is to purchase his young racer an IMCA-sanctioned modified car when Randy turns 12. He won't be racing competitively at that stage, but the goal

will be to get him to as many on-track practices as possible.

Eventually, Randy says, he wants some experience driving a little bit of everything.

"I want to get a late model and a sprint car — and keep the modified — and pretty much drive every car there is," he says. ■



## EGG ravioli with sage and almonds

Recipe courtesy of the American Heart Association Servings: 4

- 8 cups water
- 1/2 cup fat-free ricotta cheese
- 1 tablespoon grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 1/2 teaspoons fresh, chopped thyme
- 1/2 teaspoon grated orange zest
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 8 gyoza wrappers, shumai wrappers or wonton wrappers
- 4 large egg yolks, unbroken
- 1 large egg white, lightly beaten
- 2 teaspoons olive oil
- 1/4 cup sliced almonds, chopped
- 1 tablespoon chopped, fresh sage
- 1 tablespoon finely chopped red bell pepper (optional)

#### **DIRECTIONS**

- Fill large pot with water. Bring water to gentle boil over medium-high heat.
- In medium bowl, stir ricotta cheese, Parmesan cheese, thyme, orange zest and pepper.

- · Place four wrappers flour sides down on cutting board. Spoon 1 1/2 tablespoons cheese mixture onto center of each wrapper. Using back of spoon, press down on cheese mixture to create well about 1 1/2 inches across (width of large egg yolk), leaving at least 1/2 inch space around edges of wrapper. Without breaking it, carefully place one egg yolk in center of each well.
- Using pastry brush, brush edges of wrappers with egg white. Place one top wrapper with flour side up on each bottom wrapper. Using thumbs and forefingers, firmly press edges together to tightly seal each ravioli. Set aside.
- Using slotted spoon or spatula, carefully drop each ravioli into boiling water. Cook 2 1/2-3 minutes, or until wrappers are al dente (cooked not too soft but not overdone). Using slotted spoon, gently remove raviolis from pot, draining well. Transfer to plates. Drizzle with oil. Sprinkle with almonds, sage and bell pepper, if desired.
- Tips: Gyoza wrappers (or shumai wrappers) are preferred because they're thinner than wonton wraps. Look for gyoza wrappers in the dairy aisle, deli department or freezer



section.

Use these guidelines to determine how you want eggs cooked: At 2 1/2 minutes, eggs are yellow and slightly thickened but not set around edges, similar to sunny-side up. At 3 minutes, eggs are deeper orange and slightly set around edges, similar to over-easy. ■

### **SMOKE ALARMS: MAKE THEM WORK FOR YOU**

Most of the U.S. home fire deaths continue to occur in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms. It is vial to install, test, and properly maintain smoke alarms within your home and business. Having a smoke alarm reduces the risk of dying in a house fire by more than half. Ensure that:

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, a hallway, and on each level (including the basement) of the home.
- Make sure smoke alarms meet the needs of all family members, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old or don't respond when tested.

The Bondurant Fire Department provides free smoke & carbon monoxide detectors to those in need. We also



provide free home inspections, fire extinguisher classes, and smoke detector battery changes for residents of Bondurant, Douglas Township, and Franklin Township. We would rather come see you by changing your batteries out rather then end up taking you to the hospital.



# **PLANNING** for long-term care needs

American citizens are aging rapidly, and we are ill-prepared. The number of Americans over the age of 60 who will need long-term care will more than triple over the next three decades. Around 30 million people are estimated to live in long-term care by 2050. This is in large part due to the aging baby boomer population, but also due to the increasing prevalence of chronic



diseases that eventually require long-term care services, such as cardiovascular disorders and diabetes. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services estimates that nearly 70% of 65-year-olds will need some form of long-term care in their lifetime. Of that 70%, the average person will need long-term care services for three years and 20% will need long-term care services for five years or more. Despite these astounding statistics, Americans are not saving for long-term care costs. Long-term care services can cost more than \$100,000 per year, and prices continue to rise. Most people are not only unsure of how they will pay for long-term care, they are not well versed in how much it will cost. In a recent poll, only around 7% of people shared that they are familiar with what 24-hour care costs.

More than half of aging adults have not discussed or planned

potential long-term care needs with their spouses or loved ones. Thinking about aging and the associated cost can be scary and intimidating, but the lack of open dialog about it is scarier. People often think that their spouse or children will care for them, but depending on the level of care needed, that may not always be possible. Often, long-term care is not discussed or looked into until there is a medically emergent situation, which results in immense pressure on loved ones to not only find longterm care placement but also navigate how to pay for it.

An increasing number of aging adults depend on, or are planning to depend on, Medicaid to cover their 24-hour care costs or hold the false belief that Medicare covers long-term care costs. However, many nursing homes have to limit the number of Medicaid patients they accept because Medicaid reimburses far below the daily cost of care.

Ultimately, the discussions around our country's longterm care crisis are not adequately communicated, which can result in devastating results for middle-income families. If you haven't started these discussions with your loved ones or support advocates, it's not too early to start.

I saw a quirky experiment when I was a kid and now realize how surprisingly insightful it was. The man took a stalk of celery and placed the bottom in a glass of water dyed with food coloring. He left it in there for a day or so. What happened next is fascinating. The leaves at the top of the celery stalk took on the color of the water. Why did this happen? It's because the celery draws its life from the water, and, as it does so, the color permeates the entire plant, visibly changing its appearance.



In a similar way, our spiritual lives reflect what we draw our nourishment from. Just as the celery's color changes based on what it absorbs, our actions and attitudes reflect our spiritual source. This concept is beautifully expressed in 1 John 4:7, which reminds us, "Beloved, let us love one another, for love is from God, and whoever loves has been born of God and knows God." When our spiritual roots are firmly planted in God, love naturally flows from us. It's not about forcing ourselves to be loving; it's about allowing God's love to transform us from within. Just as the celery visibly changes when it draws from the colored water, our lives reflect God's love when we draw from

So, next time you see a stalk of celery, remember the lesson it teaches about spiritual growth. Let's choose to draw our spiritual nourishment from God's endless well of love. As we do, we'll find that love naturally flows through us, transforming our actions and attitudes. After all, when we're rooted in God's love, it's not just our actions that change — it's our entire outlook on life.







#### LASERS help prevent skin cancer

Skin cancer is the most common type of cancer in the United States but also one of the most preventable. Routine use of SPF of 50 or higher, avoidance of sun during peak hours, and wearing protective clothing all help block the sun's harmful rays to reduce risk. However, damage caused by the sun is cumulative over the life span, and, unfortunately, skin cancers still happen. Many advances in laser technology now offer an additional solution in the prevention



of skin cancer. Ablative lasers work by removing part of the epidermis and are effective in reduction of both pre-cancerous and non-melanoma cancerous lesions (such as basal cell and squamous cell carcinoma), but also can have significant downtime and discomfort. New data suggests skin cancer prevention benefits with non-ablative fractional laser treatments include fewer side effects and reduced downtime for a patient-friendly experience. One study done at Massachusetts General Hospital showed that patients treated with non-ablative fractional laser had half the risk of developing facial keratinocyte carcinoma. They also found that the time to development of a keratinocyte carcinoma was significantly longer in the treated group versus the non-treated group. Researchers concluded that treating sun damage with non-ablative fractional laser, such as Erbium or CO2, gave healthy skin cells a selective advantage. However, if you have a suspected skin cancer, the gold standard treatment remains excision or Moh's surgery, and you should have any suspicious lesions evaluated by a board-certified dermatologist. ■

#### **HEALTHY** Halloween habits

4 tips for healthier snacking this spooky season

- Skip sticky and sour candies. Gummy and sour candies typically contain more sugar and acid. The stickier the candy, the more likely it is to get stuck in the teeth. The sugar and acid are harmful to the enamel, or outside protective layer, of the tooth. These characteristics combined create the perfect environment for cavities to form.
- · Avoid eating candy right before bed. When candy is consumed right before bed, the sugars and acids coat the gums, teeth and tongue. The acid then attacks these areas and can cause tooth decay, tooth and gum sensitivity, and erosion of the enamel of the tooth.
- Avoid snacking on candy frequently throughout the day. The longer the sugar is in contact with your teeth, the higher the risk for cavities. If you are going to enjoy candy, we recommend you have your fix all at once then rinse with water or brush your teeth afterward to remove any residual sugar from the teeth.
- Chew sugar-free gum. Chewing sugar-free gum following consumption of candy will help produce saliva. Saliva helps remove leftover food as well as neutralize the cavity-causing acids that remain after the candy is gone. ■
