SPECIAL needs and estate planning

We often assist families of children with special needs with estate planning. One challenge is ensuring that the child has long-term protection. While the child is a minor, the parents have the ability to act in the child's best interest. But when the child turns 18, he or she is a legal adult. The parents can no longer get medical information, arrange for therapy or oversee finances. Luckily, there is a solution.



In 2019, the Iowa Legislature enacted major changes to the Guardian and Conservatorship statute. The new law went into effect on Jan. 1, 2020, and applies to all new cases, as well as to existing guardianships and conservatorships.

A new provision permits the filing of a standby guardianship or conservatorship for a minor who is at least 17 ½ years old, which will take effect when the minor turns 18. The standby proceeding for a minor approaching the age of majority starts in probate court rather than juvenile court.

Previously, the law required the minor to turn 18 before any proceeding could commence. There was often a delay between the 18th birthday and the hearing establishing a guardianship or conservatorship. That can be detrimental to an individual who needs assistance. The new law is very helpful because it allows for action before the individual turns 18.

A guardianship is often necessary and beneficial because a child with special needs will continue to need guidance even after becoming a legal adult. The guardianship will allow the guardian to continue to act as a parent — helping with housing decisions, making medical appointments and setting up services.

The law also allows for the establishment of a conservatorship, which gives someone else (the conservator) control over the protected person's finances. A conservator can also apply for Social Security disability or Medicaid benefits for the child with special needs.

The conservatorship can stay in place if the individual will need long-term assistance in handling finances. Or, the conservatorship can terminate once a Social Security representative payee is set up.

Make sure that you have all of the information you need before your child turns 18. Work with an attorney who specializes in disability law and who is on the cutting edge of the new guardianship and conservatorship law. ■

ELECTIONS: your investing future

Another presidential election is upon us and "Oh no! My investments are all over the place!" Investment decisions during a presidential election year can be complex and influenced by a variety of factors. Investors often find themselves navigating uncertainty as they try to predict how election outcomes will affect their life savings. Let's explore the key considerations investors should keep in mind during such pivotal times.



• Economic indicators. One area to assess is the current state of the economy. Indicators such as GDP growth, unemployment, inflation and consumer confidence can provide insight into the economic environment leading up to an election. A strong economy may lead to a sense of security among investors, whereas economic downturns may cause anxiety. For instance, if the unemployment rate is rising or inflation is soaring, we, as investors, might be more conservative, opting for safer assets like bonds or gold.

• Political landscape. The political landscape can shape investment decisions. Political parties often disagree on taxation, regulation and public spending, which can impact various sectors differently. For example, if a party known for pro-business policies is leading in the polls, investors may gravitate toward equities in sectors such as technology or energy, anticipating favorable policies that could drive growth. Conversely, if a party advocating for stricter regulations is gaining traction, industries like oil and gas or pharmaceuticals may see stock prices decline due to fears of increased compliance costs.

• Historical patterns. Historically, the stock market has shown differing responses during election years. Some studies indicate that markets tend to perform better in the year following an election, especially if the incumbent party retains power. Investors may feel a sense of continuity and stability, leading to increased confidence. However, uncertainty can be overwhelming in the months leading up to the election, prompting cautious actions.

• Volatility and market sentiment. Election years often bring increased volatility to the markets. Debates, campaign rallies and polling updates can trigger rapid price movements as investors react to new information. Market sentiment can shift dramatically based on the perceived likelihood of different candidates winning. For example, significant shifts in polling data can lead to rapid buying or selling, reflecting market change. Investors must be prepared for this volatility, using strategies like diversification and hedging to mitigate risk.

• Sector rotation. Sector rotation also affects investor patterns. Investors may shift their allocations based on anticipated policy changes. For example, if a candidate known for prioritizing green energy wins, investors may allocate more funds to clean energy stocks. On the other hand, if a candidate focused on traditional energy sources gains momentum, investments may shift back toward fossil fuel companies. Understanding these dynamics may help you make informed decisions.

What do we do with this four-year repeat of the changing of the guard? Remaining diversified in your investments, not taking more risk than necessary, and educating to the trends and continual change may help keep the blood pressure lower during this volatile time. Now may be a good time to check in with your financial advisor to make sure your plan is in place. Most importantly, don't forget to vote.

RECIPE EGG ravioli with sage and almonds

Recipe courtesy of the American Heart Association Servings: 4

- 8 cups water
- 1/2 cup fat-free ricotta cheese
- 1 tablespoon grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 1/2 teaspoons fresh, chopped thyme
- 1/2 teaspoon grated orange zest
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 8 gyoza wrappers, shumai wrappers or wonton wrappers
- 4 large egg yolks, unbroken
- 1 large egg white, lightly beaten
- 2 teaspoons olive oil
- 1/4 cup sliced almonds, chopped
- 1 tablespoon chopped, fresh sage
- 1 tablespoon finely chopped red bell pepper (optional)

DIRECTIONS

- Fill large pot with water. Bring water to gentle boil over medium-high heat.
- In medium bowl, stir ricotta cheese, Parmesan cheese, thyme, orange zest and pepper.

- Place four wrappers flour sides down on cutting board. Spoon 1 1/2 tablespoons cheese mixture onto center of each wrapper. Using back of spoon, press down on cheese mixture to create well about 1 1/2 inches across (width of large egg yolk), leaving at least 1/2 inch space around edges of wrapper. Without breaking it, carefully place one egg yolk in center of each well.
- Using pastry brush, brush edges of wrappers with egg white. Place one top wrapper with flour side up on each bottom wrapper. Using thumbs and forefingers, firmly press edges together to tightly seal each ravioli. Set aside.
- Using slotted spoon or spatula, carefully drop each ravioli into boiling water. Cook 2 1/2-3 minutes, or until wrappers are al dente (cooked not too soft but not overdone). Using slotted spoon, gently remove raviolis from pot, draining well. Transfer to plates. Drizzle with oil. Sprinkle with almonds, sage and bell pepper, if desired.
- Tips: Gyoza wrappers (or shumai wrappers) are preferred because they're thinner than wonton wraps. Look for gyoza wrappers in the dairy aisle, deli department or freezer



section.

Use these guidelines to determine how you want eggs cooked: At 2 1/2 minutes, eggs are yellow and slightly thickened but not set around edges, similar to sunny-side up. At 3 minutes, eggs are deeper orange and slightly set around edges, similar to over-easy.




POACHED eggs with pesto bulgur

Recipe courtesy of the American Heart Association Servings: 4

- · 2/3 cup uncooked instant or fine-grain bulgur
- 1 1/3 cups, plus 2 tablespoons, fat-free, low-sodium vegetable broth, divided
- 1 cup tightly packed fresh basil
- 2 tablespoons chopped walnuts, dry roasted
- 1 small garlic clove, minced
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 dash cayenne
- 1/2 cup finely chopped yellow or red bell pepper
- 1/4 cup thinly sliced green onions
- 4 cups water
- 1 tablespoon white vinegar
- 4 large eggs
- 1 medium lemon, cut into 4 wedges

DIRECTIONS

- In medium saucepan, prepare bulgur according to package directions, omitting salt and substituting 1 1/3 cups broth for water. Fluff with fork.
- In food processor or blender, process basil, walnuts, garlic, salt, cayenne and remaining broth until smooth. Stir basil mixture, bell pepper and green onions into bulgur.



- In large skillet, bring water and vinegar to boil over high heat. Reduce heat and simmer. Break one egg into cup then carefully slip egg into simmering water. Repeat with remaining eggs, placing in water so they don't touch. Simmer 3-5 minutes, or until whites are completely set and yolks are beginning to set but aren't hard. Using slotted spoon, drain eggs well and place on bulgur mixture. Serve with lemon wedges.
- Note: White vinegar helps firm egg whites quickly, preventing them from spreading too much. ■

SOUTHWESTERN quinoa and egg breakfast bowls

Recipe courtesy of the American Heart Association Servings: 4

- 1/4 cup uncooked quinoa, rinsed and drained
- 2 medium tomatoes (about 2 cups), chopped
- 1 cup no-salt-added frozen corn, thawed
- 1/2 medium avocado, pitted and diced
- 1/4 cup chopped green onions
- 1/2 cup chopped fresh cilantro (optional)
- nonstick cooking spray
- 4 large eggs
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- red hot pepper sauce, to taste (optional)

DIRECTIONS

- Cook quinoa according to package directions. Remove from heat.
- Spoon quinoa into four bowls. Top each with even amounts of tomatoes, corn, avocado, green onions and cilantro, if desired.
- Lightly spray large skillet with nonstick cooking spray and set over medium-high heat. Crack eggs into skillet. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cook, uncovered, 3-4 minutes, or until egg whites are set but yolks are still runny. Using spatula, carefully transfer one egg, sunny side up, into each bowl. Sprinkle with hot sauce, to taste, if desired.



FREE clinic meets needs in Clive and beyond

Dr. O'Shea and other health care professionals donate time.

With the cost of medical care and insurance rising, many Americans struggle with tough decisions in trying to stretch finances to cover medical expenses as well as routine expenses. In Clive, and




in many other places, medical professionals are stepping up to help solve that dilemma.

Clive Community Services Free Clinic opened its doors in the summer of 2017 and is a member of the Free Clinics of Iowa Network. The clinic offers basic healthcare through volunteer physicians, nurses and other health professionals at no cost to patients. One of those physicians is Dr. Noreen O'Shea, who joined in the fall of 2017 and has served as the medical director since 2021.

Pat Sammler of Clive personally learned about the volunteerism of Dr. O'Shea and the free clinic.

"Two years ago, my husband died," she says. "I had so much dialysis equipment and solution I didn't know what to do with. If I sent it back to the company, they would just destroy it, because they considered it prescription. I called and talked to Noreen, and she was involved with a group that sent medical supplies to Honduras. I had 39 or 40 cases of

the stuff. She came over and said she'd take it all. It made me feel wonderful. I look at her, and I'm just amazed at what she and her husband do."

The free clinic depends on donations from physicians and patients, but often has more than can be used.

"We end up being on the receiving end of such things as bandages, oxygen tubing and so forth," Dr. O'Shea says.

"However, we can't use all of that. So, my husband and I partnered with a group out of Le Mars called Mission Honduras Le Mars. That group takes medical equipment, as well as physicians and nurses, and we donate our medical supplies or our time, or both."

O'Shea explains that some medications can be given to patients at the free clinic through a program called SafeMed Rx. She shares a favorite success story at the free clinic. A patient needed surgery to address an injury, but his blood pressure was too high. With the help of the free clinic, he was able to receive free medication and to be seen regularly for several months to get his blood pressure under control. He was then able to have the needed surgery.

O'Shea explains the philosophy behind the free clinic.

"We provide free medical care to patients, and we don't discriminate on their reasons for coming," she says. "They may be uninsured, underinsured, undocumented, it doesn't really matter why people come to the free clinic."

In addition to basic care, the clinic hosts occasional events/clinics such as a sports physical event, flu shot clinics, a mobile dental clinic and vision screenings. These events are announced beforehand on the city's website and social media.

O'Shea points out that she's only one of a team of professionals volunteering to make the free clinic a reality.

"We probably have seven or eight physicians and PA's (nurse practitioners) that come in on a regular basis to see patients," O'Shea says. "We also have nurses and EMTs that help us, and the people in the front office."

The Clive Free Clinic operates at 2190 N.W. 82nd St., Suite C, in Clive and is open every Monday night (except for holidays). Registration runs from 5-6 p.m. and patients are seen from 5:30-7:30 p.m. Patients are seen on a first-come, first-served basis; no appointments are accepted.

O'Shea said she and the other providers enjoy offering this service to patients.

"It's our gift to the community, and we receive back, because we enjoy meeting care needs that would otherwise go unmet," O'Shea says.

ALLERGIES or asthma flaring up?

SPOTTING Facebook scams

Social media platforms have become a prime spot for scammers and imposters to use artificial intelligence (AI) technology for their benefit. Whether it be investment scams, ticket sale scams or giveaway



scams, Facebook specifically has been impacted the most* by scammers, imposters and hackers. In this article, we illustrate how an investment scam works, highlight two other prevalent scams to keep in mind and give you steps to take if you think you've been impacted by a scam.

An investment scam is when an individual receives a message from an old friend via Facebook about a "too good to be true" opportunity. For example, you may be offered the opportunity to buy cheap cryptocurrency and receive outstanding returns.

Here's how it works:

Old friend or classmate reaches out.

They tell you about this money-making opportunity.

You agree to send them your money. Scammer disappears with your money.

What to do:

If you receive a message like this example, do not respond or click on any links they send. Do report the account and raise awareness with your friends and family. Remember, when an opportunity sounds too good to be true, it usually is.

Two other scams to keep in mind

1. Giveaway scams — Scammers will incentivize individuals with free prizes or winnings. Before giving it to the individual, they may make them pay "taxes" or "shipping" and/or provide personal data to "claim" the prize. The individual will give their money and/ or information and the scammer will disappear with it.

2. Ticket sales scams — Similar to giveaway scams, ticket scammers will post a

screenshot or QR code offering up a discounted ticket to an event. Excited fans will buy them and be left with no tickets and no way to get their money back.

If you've been impacted by a Facebook scam, here are a few immediate steps to take:

• Report the profile or page* on Facebook. • Contact the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) to file a complaint online at https:// reportfraud.ftc.gov/ or by phone at 877-FTC-HELP (877-382-4357).

• Notify the financial institutions where you have accounts. This includes your bank, credit card companies, investment companies, insurance companies and brokerage firms.

• File a police report.

 Change your Facebook and internet banking passwords.
