

DAVID MCADON CONTRIBUTES TO APTA MAGAZINE ARTICLE

David McAdon, physical therapy assistant, is an alternative modalities specialist and whole health gym coordinator at the Central Iowa VA Healthcare Center in Des Moines. He was asked to contribute to an article in the December 2024 American Physical Therapy Association Magazine, detailing his experiences with using virtual reality in treating everything from Parkinson's disease to anxiety and depression.

Entitled "Real Progress: Virtual Reality in Physical Therapy" by Chris Hayhurst, the article notes how VR technologies are gaining ground in research, education and clinical practice.

McAdon has been using VR with patients since 2020 in the Des Moines VA facility's outpatient rehab clinic. The technology consists of a headset that communicates with a large-screen tablet to record

data on balance or range-of-motion or other activities. Because VR is engaging, there is better patient buyin, and it helps to overcome some of the resistance to treatment activities.

"Depending on what the goal is and the condition we're trying to treat, there are a multitude of activities within the system that allow you to work on anything you want," McAdon says.

McAdon is a 1992 graduate of ADM Schools and a graduate of Iowa State University and Mercy College of Health Sciences.

IT'S A BIRD. IT'S A PLANE. IT'S... A DRONE?

I wrote a column a couple years ago about a drone I own that sparked many comments from readers. With all the sightings of these much larger devices hovering in the air around New Jersey recently, it seemed worth revisiting.

My wife bought that simple drone for me as a Christmas present in 2022. I still have it, though I rarely use it, mostly because I still have not become properly licensed. I argued in the past that it seemed like a complicated process, although several readers offered me tips back in 2023 to make it easier. I saved their messages for future use. Well, it's the future, and I have still haven't used them. I ask myself, why? I have certainly learned to navigate through various certifications and training and government requirements many times. Why am I stalling on this one, especially when the drone footage could be quite helpful in my business?

The more I thought about it, the more I realized the truth can be found in multiple explanations.

First, I have learned that operating a drone is tricky — maybe not for those of you who have been playing

complex video games for a few decades, but the skills I gained from mastering Pac-Man as a kid don't seem to help much.

Second, the margin of error is also low, and the replacement cost is high. That's not a good combination for me.

Third, as many of you loyal readers know, I am a privacy freak, and the whole idea of drones taking photos and video on demand is concerning to me. It should be to you, too. Clearly, our government is using drones in ways that would make us all uncomfortable if we knew the entire truth. And, clearly, other governments are doing the same.

Admittedly, I don't fully understand a property owner's rights on how to deal with drones, but I do know I would not hesitate to shoot one down if I felt it was intruding on me, and I would be more than willing to go to court to justify my actions. I wish our government officials would feel the same way about unidentified drones flying over our cities. I find the silence more concerning than the

And despite the annoying hoops I still haven't jumped through, I believe the licensing is a good idea, as we need to know who is on the controls of these invasive devices. We can only hope it is a group of tech-savvy kids with too much time on their hands.
