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## WDM HISTORICAL Society year in review





More than 4,300 adults and youth visited the Jordan House and Bennett School or participated in an educational program, summer camp or lecture — a new record.

- The Iowa Files, a free public lecture series presented in partnership with the West Des Moines Library, launched its sixth year of free programming that celebrates the people, places and events that make Iowa interesting.
- The Jordan Scholars Leadership Institute celebrates its ninth class, giving high school juniors unique access to community leaders who excel in the areas in which James Jordan also excelled. Scholars are provided a stipend so finances are never a barrier to participation.
- The Polk County Master Gardeners selected the Jordan House as their newest volunteer opportunity, generously giving their time and talent (and plants) to beautify the museum with historically accurate plantings and a new moon garden. Ted Lare Design & Build donated significant hardscapes and plants to the beautifying effort.
- Volunteers helped with cleanup at the Jordan House and Bennett School, and a new well pump and cover were installed as an Eagle Scout project.
- Schoolhouse Storytime at the Bennett School gave young families the chance to hear fun stories, dance, sing and make a craft all summer
  - Neumann Monson Architects donated

hundreds of hours helping design a site plan for the Historic Campus of Legacy Woods.

- The Jordan House Museum hosted free tours in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and, thanks to Polk County, distributed books about Dr. King to visitors.
- We explored a classic Victorian craft in a workshop led by artists from Olson-Larsen Galleries
- The third Historic Cemetery Tour told the stories of early Valley Junction residents and showed what the City of West Des Moines has planned for the Huston Cemetery.

#### What's new for 2025

• The Historical Society is working with the City of West Des Moines and donors to develop an exciting Historic Campus for the Legacy Woods project. The campus will bring together the history of the original Jordan farm, the fight for freedom represented by the Underground Railroad, Indigenous peoples, the railroads, and the contributions of the early workers to today's community. This area will inspire, educate and connect our community with the beauty of Iowa's natural landscapes. History is showcased in Legacy Woods through the rich natural scape as well as through the Historic Jordan House Museum.

The planned first addition to the historic campus will be a 19th century log cabin,

professionally restored and available to visitors to the Jordan House and Legacy Woods. If you'd like to support this project and help Raise the Walls, visit www.wdmhs.org/ historic-log-cabin.

- Thanks to funding from the Iowa Arts Council, a 3-D scan of all three floors of the Jordan House Museum has been created and will be made available online in early 2025. This virtual tour doesn't require an app and will make the Underground Railroad exhibit and the second floor of the Jordan House virtually accessible.
- New workshops will include classic crafts, such as Victorian Hair Art and other forgotten hobbies.
- A new exhibit focusing on Victorian Leisure and the Impact of the Industrial Revolution will open February 2025.





## THE FINAL Disposition Act

Iowans now have a simple way to direct their funeral arrangements and disposition of their remains after death. The Iowa Legislature passed Iowa Code \$144C, entitled the Final Disposition Act. It



allows an individual to name a designee who shall have the exclusive right to make decisions regarding the final disposition of the decedent's remains and the ceremonies performed. This law went into effect in 2008.

The designation must be in writing and contained either in a health care power of attorney or in an instrument attached to the health care power of attorney. The way the law is currently written, it appears that a person must have a health care power of attorney in order to appoint a designee under the Final Disposition Act.


A durable health care power of attorney is a document through which you name another person to make health care decisions for you if you are unable to make them. The person, known as your "attorney-in-fact," is required to make decisions according to directions you provide. If your wishes are not known, your agent will make decisions in your best interest based on the discussions you have had with your agent. The document is "durable" because it remains effective even if you become incapacitated or incompetent.

Placing a final disposition designation within a durable health care power of attorney gives you maximum control over your final arrangements. The designation can contain one or more alternate designees and may include contact information for the designee and alternates. However, the declaration shall not include directives for final disposition and shall not include arrangements for ceremonies. Therefore, if you appoint a designee, it is critical that you speak with that person about your final arrangements.

A designee or third party (such as a funeral director) who relies in good faith on the declaration is insulated from civil and criminal liability. If there is a question about the type of ceremony or the disposition of remains, the funeral director will defer first to the person you appointed. Your agent must act quickly, however. The designee has either 24 hours after notification or 48 hours after death, whichever is earlier, to exercise the authority.

A final disposition act designation allows you to nominate someone you trust, will ensure that your wishes are carried out, and can prevent disagreement among your loved ones during a difficult time. ■

#### King finds purpose in giving back.

In April 2020, Kevin King retired after 32 years as a critical care registered nurse and adult liver transplant coordinator at UCLA Medical Center in Los Angeles. Seeking a fresh start, he relocated to West Des Moines, a



city he'd visited a few times prior and quickly grown to love.

While his career was behind him, King knew he wasn't ready to stop helping others. Today, he devotes his time and energy to making a difference in his new community as a volunteer with the West Des Moines Department of Health and Social Services' food pantry.

"I decided it was time to repurpose myself," King says. "I was very fortunate to have great parents and grandparents that always instilled the importance of giving back to the community and taking care of one another. Therefore, helping others was a perfect fit for me personally."

Since March 2023, King has volunteered weekly at the food pantry, assisting families and individuals with accessing food and personal supplies. Whether it's restocking shelves, processing donations, or distributing school supplies and winter clothing, King's dedication is driven by a desire to give back to a community that has welcomed him.

"I felt that the food pantry would be a good fit for me," he says. "As a teenager, I worked in a grocery store during my high school years, and I enjoy interacting with people. I also felt that, with the growing numbers of families facing food insecurities, it would be a great place for me to volunteer my time."

For King, volunteering is about more than simply lending a hand — it's about building connections. He's especially fond of engaging with clients, whether it's catching up with regular visitors or meeting new ones. One moment that stands out involves an 8-year-old boy who came to the pantry with his father. Fluent in both English and Spanish, the boy became King's translator for the visit.

"In talking to him, I found out that he loved math," King explains. "So, I immediately gave him the hand-held counter, and he assisted in tallying up all the items. We worked side by side counting and bagging the items. He absolutely loved it."

Likewise, King enjoyed seeing the boy so engaged and helping.

"He was truly an amazing little boy," King says. "His father must be so proud."

Another unforgettable experience came when a client collapsed due to a medical emergency. King and two fellow volunteers immediately came to the person's aid. Drawing on his nursing background, King focused on stabilizing the client while his colleagues coordinated with EMS and reassured others at the pantry.

"I was very grateful that I was able to use my skills as a nurse," King says. "However, I was even more grateful that my two colleagues helped take control of the situation without missing a beat."

For King, the rewards of volunteering are immense. He's embraced the opportunity to connect with people from diverse backgrounds, brushing up on his language skills and even using tools like Google Translate to better



Not all continuing care at home programs are created equal! If a specific one appeals to you, make sure it meets both your current and future needs and provides you with peace of mind.



## 'Cleavage: Men, Women, and the Space Between Us'


Jennifer Finney Boylan has written several phenomenal books including her profoundly influential memoir, "She's Not There," which has won numerous awards, and deservedly so. I picked up this book with a lot of expectations and anticipation. I was pleased to find this series of interconnected essays to be everything I had hoped for. This is another classic in the making.

The differences between the genders are interesting to read from the transgender perspective. Boylan came out in 2000, long before the current swirl of fear and anger was the norm, and, as such, she provides a unique lens on how society has changed over the past few decades in response. Gender infuses so much of our lives in ways small and overwhelming. It's fascinating to read about how much, and how little, it matters to one's sense of place, time and love.

Honest and raw — at times brutally so — this book wasn't always easy to read, but it is even more

important for that. I like books that open my eyes to things I might not otherwise see or understand. If you're up for learning the social, mental and historical impacts of gender, this is a great place to start.

#### Rotary repairs, gives away bikes

A West Des Moines Rotary Club program is giving new life to donated bikes through a community service project.

Carol Narak, with the WDM Rotary Club, says the service project was started by Rotary member Harold Hulleman.

The program received a grant to buy a pickup truck to collect and deliver bikes. The grant also included bike stands and tools to work on the bikes.

A warehouse space donated by Rotarian Bob Start stores the bikes and equipment. Volunteers work on bikes donated by the public.

A recent plea for donated bikes netted 27 bikes.

"I've had bikes show up at my house, and I didn't know they were coming," Narak says.

Often, volunteers will pick up bikes as needed.

"People cleaning out garages or those whose kids have outgrown bikes will donate to us," she

A committee gets together to do the repairs. Some bikes require minimal work, such as new handlebar grips, seats or tires. Others need more extensive brake or gear work. If bikes are unrepairable, they donate them to the Street/ Bicycle Collective in Des Mones.

"We have a variety of people with special skills who help repair bikes, while others don't. Those who can't, help out with other duties," she says.

Narak keeps a spreadsheet of the differentsized bikes. Every few months, when a set number of bikes are ready to donate, Narak contacts West Des Moines Schools Superintendent Matt Adams. He, in turn,

contacts the principals to see which students might need bikes. Bike World often donates its van to help haul bikes to schools or giveaway sites.

Last fall, the Rotarians gave away 86 bikes to the Children and Family Urban Movement program.

"We didn't have enough bikes," she explains. "We'll be back with more bikes."

Narak has been involved with the WDM Rotary Club for a long time. She and her husband, Tom, worked in education their entire careers. Helping kids is important to them.

"When I was a kid, everyone had a bike," she reflects. "Today, not everyone has a bike. When they get one, they're so happy to finally have a bike."

Narak says the Rotary Club is always looking for service projects and new members. Past projects have provided winter coats, veteran assistance, tree planting and other service
