

## The perfect date — or so they thought

Paige, a numbers person, was drawn to the year 2020. The couple planned to have their ceremony in Florida, so she thought April would be an ideal time — not too hot, not too cold. They set their wedding date for April 16, 2020, appreciating the symmetry of 4/16/20 (4 + 16 = 20).

"So, everything was making sense for 2020, not knowing what that year was going to be," Paige reflects.

For their reception, they chose Emerald Hills in Promise City, a new venue south of Des Moines. They were the sixth couple to book it, which meant they were able to secure some discounts.

#### Finding the right vendors

With her husband's experience in videography, he was particular about finding the perfect wedding videographer. After searching extensively and finding no one local that met their expectations, they discovered Brandon Rice Films from Tennessee.

"That was kind of random, too, but he was

really, really good," Paige says.

The original plan was for Rice to fly to Florida for the ceremony while a friend of Ryan's would film the reception in Iowa and send the footage to Rice for editing.

Videographer, check.

Paige then picked out the colors — purples and blues — and found her wedding dress at Pure Bridal in Ames, a shop she liked because they carried multiple sizes in each dress and had everything organized by price.

Things were coming together nicely.

#### Then, March 2020 happened

Three to four weeks before their wedding, Paige and Ryan had to cancel everything due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"That was extremely devastating," Paige says. "It was probably the most depressed I've ever been. I went through all the stages of grief."

Having dreamed of her wedding since she was a young girl, she struggled to process the loss of the day she had planned so carefully. Fortunately, most of their Florida vendors were understanding of having to cancel, as the state had closed to outside visitors.

With wedding planning at a standstill and her hairstyling work paused due to the pandemic, she needed a distraction.

"In my depressed stupor, I'm actually very handy, so I decided to build a porch on our house," Paige says.

She was grateful to have found something to take her mind off things as she and Ryan thought about what to do next.

#### A change of plans

The couple knew they didn't want to wait indefinitely, so they reworked their wedding plans. They decided to forgo Florida but kept their Emerald Hills reception, postponing it to September 2020, assuming the pandemic would be over by then.

"That was a funny joke," Paige says.

Luckily, with its spacious layout, Emerald Hills allowed for proper distancing, and their guest list wasn't too large.

On their original April date, Paige and Ryan still were legally married, holding a small ceremony in southeast Iowa on a family friend's farm with a pond — close enough to an ocean

for them.

"But instead of white sand, we had white snow," Paige says, recalling how winter held its grip on them that day.

Despite her dislike for winter, the soft snow made for some beautiful photos taken by family members. They didn't wear their full wedding outfits, but the moment was special nonetheless. A childhood friend officiated the intimate ceremony with only immediate family in attendance.

#### **A September celebration**

When September arrived, they were finally able to celebrate with family and friends. Their original photographer, Jenni, was still available — though extremely pregnant at the time — and their videographer, Brandon, made the drive from Nashville.

Paige designed her own bouquet and arch flowers, while she handmade the bridesmaids' bouquets. Originally, she had planned to do this for the Florida wedding, knowing that artificial flowers would travel better.

For catering, they went with an unexpected but practical choice: Olive Garden.

"Everyone does chicken or BBQ or plated meals. We wanted little things here and there to be different," Paige says.

They found Olive Garden to be affordable and flexible with their guest count changes due to the pandemic.

For dessert, they chose Glorious Cakes, opting for a traditional sheet cake with three different flavors. Their DJ, Sound Doctor, kept the party going all night.

Paige, who owns Lux Salon Studio, did her bridesmaids' hair, while her coworker, also a bridesmaid, handled makeup and styled her hair.

"If I could have done my own hair, I probably would have," Paige says. "But I figured I shouldn't put that stressor on myself."

Through all the unexpected twists and disappointments, her husband was her rock, Paige says.

"Having each other was a huge thing," Paige says. "We'd been together for nine years at that point. It's not like we weren't getting married." For her, the hardest part was not being able to control and plan everything.

"I'm a Type A planner, so it killed me not to have my dream," she says. "But what stood out was really our love for each other, as cheesy as that sounds."

On that September day in 2020, while it

wasn't what they could have ever expected, they celebrated with 130 guests. Despite all the challenges, people still talk about how much fun their reception was.

A wedding that wasn't quite what they originally envisioned turned into a day — and a journey — they'll never forget.  $\blacksquare$



#### Barbecue chili

Recipe courtesy of "Cookin' Savvy" Servings: 8-10

- 1 pork loin (2-3 pounds)
- 1 can (10 ounces) diced tomatoes and green chilies
- 2 cups barbecue sauce, divided
- 1 cup water
- 1 can (29 ounces) tomato sauce
- 2 cans (27 ounces each) chili beans
- 1 package chili seasoning
- 1 tablespoon barbecue seasoning
- 1 tablespoon onion powder
- 1 tablespoon garlic powder
- salt, to taste
- pepper, to taste sour cream, for serving
- sourclearn, for serving
   shredded cheddar cheese, for serving
- corn chips, for serving

#### Directions

- Place pork loin in slow cooker. Cover with diced tomatoes and green chilies, 1 cup barbecue sauce and water; cook on low 4-6 hours.
- Cut up cooked meat and place in Dutch oven along with juices from slow cooker. Add remaining barbecue sauce, tomato sauce, chili beans, chili seasoning, barbecue seasoning, onion powder and garlic powder. Season with salt and pepper, to taste.
   Cook over medium heat 20
- minutes, stirring occasionally.
  Serve with sour cream, shredded
- cheese and corn chips.
- Tip: Add can of beans if serving bigger crowd.

## **PALLIATIVE** care: An option for someone you love?

Q. My husband's doctor suggested we look into palliative care. This is not a term that's familiar to me. My husband lives with a chronic health condition. Thankfully, the illness is not immediately life-threatening, but my husband's quality of life isn't what we'd like it to be. What can palliative care do for him?



**A.** I'm sorry to hear about your spouse's health condition, but it's great that you're exploring

palliative care — a specialized form of care focused on providing relief from the symptoms, pain and stress of a serious illness, rather than trying to cure the illness itself. It's aimed at improving the quality of life for both the person living with illness and their family.

Here's what you should know about palliative care.

• It's available to anyone with a serious or chronic health condition, regardless of their prognosis. The goal is to alleviate suffering and improve comfort by managing physical symptoms, but it also addresses emotional, social and spiritual needs.

• Palliative care typically includes a variety of specialists, such as physicians, nurses, social workers, chaplains and therapists. They will all work together to create a care plan that's tailored to your spouse's needs.

• It's focused on managing pain, fatigue, nausea, breathing

**difficulties, and any other symptoms of illness.** If your spouse is dealing with discomfort related to their chronic condition, palliative care can significantly help decrease that.

• It also supports loved ones. Assistance offered with palliative care can include counseling, caregiver support and education, and help navigating health care systems and decisions.

• Palliative care doesn't replace other treatments for your spouse's condition. It can be given alongside curative treatments, helping to manage the side effects or helping cope with difficult symptoms during treatments like chemotherapy or dialysis.

• It's offered in various settings. If receiving care at home is preferable to you and your husband, make sure you find a provider that offers home-based palliative care. Life insurance is one of the means by which you can protect your loved ones. As you apply for life insurance, aspects of your application could raise or lower your rates, including: 1) Age. Your date of birth is the top factor affecting the cost. 2) Gender. Women tend to live longer than men, so women generally pay less for life insurance. 3) Health history. policy. Having a history of medical conditions, especially serious illnesses such as heart disease or cancer, will increase your premiums. 4) Family health history. Even if you have no current medical conditions, a family history of illness, especially hereditary diseases, could increase the cost of your coverage. 5) Smoking. The health risks associated with smoking, including potentially fatal diseases like cancer, mean increased premiums. 6) Occupation. Your premiums could be higher if your occupation exposes you to toxic chemicals or requires you to perform dangerous tasks. 7) The policy. Policies issued for larger benefit amounts over longer terms generally cost more than policies with smaller benefit amounts over shorter periods.

## WHAT IS probate?

Probate is the court-supervised administration of an estate. If you have a will, upon your death your executor will present it to the court. It is a common misconception that merely possessing



the will vests someone with the authority to act. In order for a will to be effective, it must be admitted to probate. If you die without a will, the Court still has control over the assets of your estate.

Probate is necessary where there are assets which cannot be transferred. For example, real estate titled in the decedent's name cannot be sold without passing through probate. Investments with no beneficiary designation generally require probate to transfer them to heirs.

Banks and financial institutions may

require "Letters of Appointment" or "Letters Testamentary." This is an official document, issued by the clerk of court, empowering the executor to act on behalf of the estate.

Court supervision of probate ensures that your executor or the court-appointed administrator handles your estate legally and according to your wishes. To ensure that the will or the rules of inheritance are followed, the personal representative must report the assets, debts and disbursements of the estate to the court. The personal representative also files tax returns on behalf of the decedent and the estate.

Iowa law requires that notice of probate be published. The notice must be published for two consecutive weeks. Then, the estate must remain open for four months before it can be closed. During this time, the personal representative will sell real estate, liquidate assets, pay creditors, and make disbursements to beneficiaries. Other factors may require a longer probate period, but generally, the probate of an estate lasts around six months.

Attorney's fees and court costs cannot be paid until the estate closes. In Iowa, attorney's fees are statutorily-controlled and are capped. The personal representative is also entitled to fees. By comparison, other methods of asset disposal (like a revocable trust) have no fee caps.

Probating an estate is fairly straightforward. Court-supervised administration of an estate is neither lengthy nor overly expensive and has the benefit of ensuring that all the assets of the estate have been disposed of properly and legally. If you have questions, make sure that you contact an attorney who specializes in probate and estate administration.



As many teenagers rely on social media sites and apps to communicate and find information, local news continues to be relevant. People want to know what is happening in their own backyards.

One way students can obtain information is through The Orbit, an online student-run newspaper for North Polk High School. The Orbit evolved into an online publication during the pandemic.



The Orbit comes out weekly with a variety of content, such as a student poll or "people in the halls" columns.

The Orbit's editor is senior Zoe Marquez.

It covers sports, arts, theater, reviews and more — just like any newspaper. Longer features are published once a month.

The Orbit's editor is senior Zoe Marquez. She shares editorial duties with Addison Hop and Morgan Eyanson-Renken. Students who take Intro to Journalism classes become interested and join the newspaper or yearbook staff and contribute content, videos or photos. The high school advisor is journalism teacher Jessica Trier.

Marquez says the publication launched online after the COVID pandemic. She says many students read stories, with up to 1,000 views.

"People read it in the Des Moines metro, and we get a wider range of readers," she explains.

To determine what stories to cover, she looks right to the school to see what's relevant.

"We figure out the big story for the week," says Marquez. "We factor in what's relative and what people actually want to read about."

They'll interview teachers, students, business owners, coaches and more. Yet, most stories include a student-focused theme.

"We like to include at least one student's perspective in each story," she explains.

Each section allows readers to post comments.

"All feedback is appreciated. It means people are reading our stories. We are always looking for feedback and ideas."

Marquez has attended NP Schools since the beginning. She has enjoyed writing and plans on attending college for journalism. She's interviewed dozens of people, yet one story stands out from 2022.

She wrote a story on an East High School student's shooting and contacted the student vice president to get her take on the tragedy.

"I wasn't aware the teen who passed away was a close friend. It was very eye opening," she reflects. "You don't know what's going into a story and what might come out of it."

Her advisor edits to ensure sensitivity regarding content.

"With the story (East High School) students were informed. It was a positive outlook as to what was going on in the school."

The best part of writing is distributing information, Marquez says.

"That's my passion. I love spreading awareness and getting people in the loop," she says. "It's super important to be informed of things outside the school. It's my goal as a storyteller to let people know the facts."

### A FEAR-FREE revolution

#### Making vet visits better for pets and their people

When I first began at the clinic in 2009, my cat, Lionel, was a veterinarian's nightmare. At home, he was sociable and friendly. But when his carrier crossed the clinic's threshold, his entire body stiffened. He growled, hissed and lashed out, making even getting him out of his carrier nearly impossible. The stress was overwhelming — for both of us. Each visit ended in sedation and exhaustion, reinforcing his fear and making me dread every appointment (and I was the vet).



A few years later, we learned about a revolutionary approach called "fear free" veterinary care, designed to reduce stress and anxiety in pets. At first, I was skeptical. Could soft music, different wall colors or pheromones really make a difference? Would slowing down to work at a pet's pace throw off our schedule? It sounded like wishful thinking. But then, we tried it.

We started with small changes — using non-slip mats, offering treats, and adjusting our handling techniques. Gone were the days of scruffing cats or pinning dogs to the floor. Over time, we saw a shift. Our patients became more willing to trust us, and their visits became smoother. But the real turning point for me was Lionel. With a feline-only exam room, calming pheromones, and antianxiety medication, Lionel transformed. For the first time in 12 years, he didn't need sedation. I was able to take him out of his carrier without a struggle AND do a full exam. That moment changed everything. Lionel had never been difficult — he had been terrified. And now, he didn't have to be. I cried with relief.

And Lionel wasn't alone. Imagine being leashed or caged, taken to a building full of unfamiliar smells, surrounded by other scared animals, and handled by giant beings who don't speak your language — all while being poked and prodded. That's what vet visits feel like for many pets. But they don't have to. "Fear free" is not just a philosophy — it's a way of life that means better care.

Stress and anxiety don't just make vet visits difficult — they impact overall health. When pets feel safe, exams are more effective, treatments are easier, and long-term outcomes improve.

If vet visits have been stressful for your furry family member, consider giving "fear free" care a try. It might just turn what was once a dreaded trip into a positive, even enjoyable, experience for you and your pet. ■




