Will and Kylie Hyde's wedding featured traditional elements, as well as some unique touches, such as throwing T-shirts to guests and having a live wedding painter.

The pair married on July 20, 2024. They had attended the same high school, gone to Iowa State and lived in the same neighborhood, but they had never met.

That changed when Kylie "swiped right" on Hinge, a dating app.

"We lived about a mile from each other," she says.

The couple went on a family Alaskan cruise vacation near Glacier Bay. Will planned the proposal during the cruise. He hired a cruise photographer for a proposal picture.

"My scheme was to have Kylie face the mountain, and I'd assume the position," Will says.

Just as he asked her, the cruise director announced that sea lions were on the same side of the boat as they were.

"Everybody rushed over to our side of

the boat," Kylie recalls. "We got an applause from the crowd."

The couple set the date: July 20, 2024. The ceremony and reception took place at Willow on Grand in Des Moines. A wedding planner for White Willow Events assisted with the planning. The couple chose the venue because it is near downtown and an easy-to-reach destination for family attending from out of town.

Kylie incorporated some wedding planner ideas yet also searched online for do-ityourself projects.

The venue accommodated both the ceremony and reception.

"We wanted to keep it as stress-free as possible," Will says.

The couple admitted that having a July wedding in the heat of Iowa summer was risky. The weekend before the wedding, temps reached near 100 degrees. However, on their wedding day, it rained in the morning, and the high was only 75 degrees.

"We rolled the dice and lucked out. It





They chose catering by Gateway Market, including focaccia bread from the South Union Bakery.

"We're a big fan of George Formaro (a Des Moines chef and




Will and Kyle Hyde see their live wedding painting for the first time. Photo by Liv Frueh Photography

restaurateur). He's a family friend who came to the wedding," Will says. "We also did our rehearsal dinner at Centro with George."

Their photographer was Liv Frueh with Liv Frueh Photography. They chose sheet cakes from Costco for the guests. They also ordered a small personal cake from the Ramic Dessert House in Johnston.

"My mom got a figurine of our dog making a paw print into the cake as a topper. They did an amazing job," Kylie says.

One disappointment is that Kylie's maid of honor couldn't attend the

"We did live videos of her throughout the wedding," Kylie says.

A surprise gift from her maid of honor was a live wedding painter, Suz Live Paints. Kylie noticed a woman taking pictures, explaining it was promotional photos for the wedding venue. In reality, it was the wedding artist taking photos. When the couple arrived at the reception, the artist was painting on her easel in the moment.

"It was a surprise. I didn't even know it (live wedding painters) was a thing," she says.

Throughout the reception, DJ Music Man played tunes. Games included musical chairs, a newlywed-style game and a photo booth with props. Kylie designed T-shirts with the wedding party and then threw them to the crowd. A giant crossword puzzle kept guests busy.

Fake mustaches on the tables provided more fun.

"We thought nobody would use them," Kylie recalls.

"It was hilarious. My 10-year-old cousin







DISABILITY or early retirement?

Clients frequently ask what happens when a disabled person meets retirement age. Simply put, when a disabled person attains full retirement age, disability benefits automatically convert to Retirement Insurance Benefits. Most disabled beneficiaries will notice no difference when they become retirement beneficiaries.

A more complicated issue is whether to apply for disability or early retirement.

Some people close to — but not at — age 62 do not apply for disability thinking that they will just wait until they can apply for early retirement. This results in a reduced monthly benefit.

However, if you are having difficulty maintaining employment because of a severe medical condition or combination of conditions expected to last at least 12 months, you may want to consider applying for both early retirement and Social Security Disability. You can apply for both at the same time, or, if you already have a disability claim filed, you can apply for early retirement while the disability claim is processed. This can provide for monthly income while you are waiting for a decision on your disability claim. Should you be found disabled, you may receive

compensation for the period of time you received the lower amount. This back-pay amount can be significant.

The amount of monthly benefits you receive depends on when you are found disabled. Regardless of when you apply, if you are found disabled, and your disability began before the age of 62, you will receive your full retirement benefits. If you are found disabled after the age of 62, your monthly payment will be reduced by the number of months of full retirement benefit but will still be more than the amount of early retirement. You cannot receive disability and full retirement.

Another factor to consider is Medicare. Individuals are eligible for Medicare at the age of 65. Rather than wait until age 65, disabled persons are eligible for Medicare after they have been entitled to SSDI for 24 months.

If you are close to, or over the age of 62, and unable to work because of a medical condition, you should consider filing for disability, early retirement, or both. Contact an attorney who specializes in Social Security disability claims to find out which options are best for you.

WHAT to know about 're-grief'

When children have someone significant in their life die, it can be difficult to know how to best support them. It's natural to want to "fix it," but this is one of those things we cannot fix.

Children will continue to grieve as their development and understanding of the world changes. When the death occurs, the child understands only as fully as their cognitive development allows. As they age, and their development changes, their

understanding changes, too. They may have new questions or wonderings and may express their grief in new ways. This is called "re-grief" and can sometimes catch their adults off guard.

While our fundamental understanding of death may not change after adulthood, our understanding and experience of grief can change over time, too. Whenever a new life milestone occurs (i.e., we get married), we understand the world in a different way (as a newly married person). This can also have an impact on our grief. Remember, there is no time limit on grief.

How to help? 1. Listen, compassionately. "It makes sense you feel that way. Do you want to tell me more about it?" 2. Answer questions honestly and repeatedly if asked — in consistent, developmentally appropriate ways. 3. Encourage creative and physical activities (that they enjoy) to get feelings out of their bodies. 4. Encourage sharing memories and, if you knew their person, share memories you have. They may learn something new about them, and what a gift that is.

PUT IT OUT FOR CURBSIDE SPRING CLEAN-UP APRIL 28-MAY 2, 2025

During the free, curbside portion of Spring Clean-Up Week, City garbage customers can place large items on the curb for disposal on their normally scheduled garbage collection day, Monday through Friday. Put bulky items, such as furniture, oversized electronics and other large items up to five feet in length, on the curb no later than 7 a.m. on your garbage pick-up day. Smaller items should be bagged or boxed.

The following items will not be accepted at the curb:

- Appliances
- Hazardous materials
- Broken-up concrete/asphalt or demolition materials
- Loose shingles and lumber
- Anything longer than five feet
- Paint
- Propane tanks
- Tires
- Yard waste (collected only on Mondays, April-November)
- Items too heavy for a two-person team to reasonably lift

Hazardous waste, appliances and tires will not be collected from curbs, but you can take them to the designated drop-off site for free disposal. **New for 2025, drop all your items in one place!** Drop-off sites have all moved to the Public Works building. Before you head out, go to Waukee.org/SpringCleanUp for a map of the drop site to see the flow of drop stations.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE

If you have items, such as acid, rechargeable batteries, oil, antifreeze, lawn fertilizer, pesticides, pool chemicals, oil-based paints or aerosols, dispose of them for FREE. Latex paint will not be accepted; however, dried latex paint can be placed in regular trash bins year-round.

The following items will not be accepted at the drop-off site:

- Ammunition/explosives
- Asbestos
- Dry cement mix
- Fire extinguishers
- Joint compound
- Latex paint
- Medications
- Propane tanks
- Radioactive materials

APPLIANCES AND TIRES

Appliances must be cleared of food, household hazardous waste and garbage prior to dropping them off. Items that are accepted for free include washers, dryers, dishwashers, refrigerators, furnaces, water heaters, stoves, etc. Up to five car tires may be dropped off free of charge. The drop-off fee for each additional car tire is \$1, and semi-truck and tractor tires are \$5 each. Rims are not accepted.

ELECTRONICS RECYCLING

Keep your electronics waste out of the landfill and protect your personal data by recycling it. Drop off laptops, TVs, keyboards, speakers, printers, routers, phones, e-readers, CRTs and TVs. All data-containing devices will have data cleared. Alternatively, electronics are accepted in the weekly garbage collections or on the curb during Spring Clean-Up Week.





WHAT are comprehensive and collision insurances?

When you hear someone use the term "comp and collision," they are referring to two separate insurance coverages available for personal auto insurance policies: comprehensive coverage (also referred to as other-than-collision coverage) and collision coverage.



What is comprehensive insurance?

Comprehensive insurance helps pay for damages to your vehicle caused by factors other than an accidental collision, such as fire, vandalism, weather (hail, flooding, wind, lightning, etc.), theft, impact with an animal, etc. (Exclusions may apply.)

Here are some examples of when comprehensive insurance may apply:

- Your vehicle is damaged in a hail storm (other damage sources may include flooding, wind and lightning).
- Someone vandalizes your vehicle by slashing your tires and breaking all the windows.
 - You hit an animal with your car on your way to work.
 - A storm causes a tree to fall on your vehicle.
 - Someone steals your vehicle.
- Your neighbor's brush fire gets out of control and sets your vehicle on fire.

What is collision insurance coverage?

Collision insurance helps cover the cost of loss or damage to your vehicle when it is involved in an accidental collision with another vehicle or object. (Exclusions may apply.)

Collision insurance coverage is exactly what it sounds like. It covers you when your vehicle collides with an object or another car. It generally provides coverage for situations where you are the one being hit or where you accidentally hit another vehicle.

Even situations where your car is parked and hit by another vehicle or by an object on the ground are typically covered by collision insurance. Here are some examples of when collision insurance coverage may apply:

- Another vehicle hitting your vehicle.
- Your vehicle accidentally hitting another vehicle.
- Accidentally backing your vehicle into a pole or other object.
- Damage from another vehicle backing into your vehicle, even if you are parked at the time.
 - Bottoming out your vehicle.
 - Accidentally rolling your vehicle over an object or rolling your vehicle.

What do I need?

A few things to consider when deciding if you want comprehensive, collision or both coverages on your personal auto insurance policy include:

- What is the age and condition of your vehicle?
- Is your vehicle under a lease or loan?
- How much will it cost to repair or replace your vehicle if it is totaled?
- Do you park your vehicle outside?
- Do you have a long commute?
- Do you have an inexperienced driver in the household who may be more likely to be involved in an accident?

HOW ABOUT a ROTH IRA?

As a financial advisor for over 20 years, there are many questions that we get from our clients about retirement, about saving, and about insurance. One of the most common questions that I receive pertains to whether a ROTH IRA is a good choice as an investment and how can it be used to improve my retirement income platform. Here are 5 reasons we share with our clients.



Access. A Roth IRA gives you the ability to access your contributions without incurring any type of penalty or income tax. You have already paid tax on those contributions, so pulling them back out, without accessing your gains, will allow you to utilize the benefit of its value immediately, regardless of your age.

Tax Free Growth. The Roth IRA is one of few investments that allows you opportunity to grow your money without having to pay tax on gains. That means you don't pay any taxes along the way and will not have to pay additional tax in the future when you seek to take a withdrawal. As long as you follow the rules, like waiting 5 years from when you established the account and being over the age of 59 1/2 before you pull money out, you will have access to 100% of the value without owing any additional money to "Uncle Sam."

Use for College. The Roth IRA gives you money that can be used for college and for retirement. We tell people all the time, you can borrow money to go to college, but you cannot borrow money to retire. So, using a Roth IRA gives you some flexibility to be able to pull money out to send "Junior" to college without the burden of a long-term financial aide obligation. Your contributions are accessible without penalty. Your growth or interest will avoid a 10% penalty but you will have to pay tax on that gain.

No Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs). As of December 2022 under the SECURE Act 2.0, RMD age was increased to age 73 and 75 for withdrawals on any IRA or 401K. The Roth IRA has no requirements to draw money out at any particular age. So, you can allow this to grow all the way through your date of death. This will open up many opportunities for your legacy planning and for your golden years income planning.

No tax consequences at your passing. With taxes and inheritance being a big concern for many, securing a tax advantaged investment to pass on to the kids and grandkids is always important. The Roth IRA transfers, by beneficiary, to the next generation without income taxes needing to be paid. Your beneficiary will be subject to a 10-year RMD schedule if it is reinvested in an inherited-Roth IRA, but it will still never be subject to a 10% penalty or income taxation.

There are many savings vehicles available to everyone, a Roth IRA may be a great fit for you. ■

The Warrior Awards are a time to pause, reflect and be specific about recognizing the students.



"We love our home because it has given our family a great place to call home and create important memories and spend time with family and friends," she says.


