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From the city manager

Dear citizens and businesses of Norwalk,

Norwalk is thriving. We're experiencing growth in both our business sector and housing options, our schools are excellent, our parks and recreation offerings are expanding, and we're maintaining a safe community. It's truly a great time to be in Norwalk.

I'd like to address two significant matters with you: state legislation impacts to city services and annexation to secure Norwalk's future.

STATE LEGISLATION

There is a current effort by our state legislature to reduce property taxes. While lower taxes can certainly be beneficial, it's important to consider that they can also have potential drawbacks.

The city of Norwalk consistently strives to be as efficient as possible while providing the



essential services that our citizens and businesses rely on. However, if property taxes are forcibly lowered, it could unfortunately lead to a decline in the quality or availability of these services. Your voice plays a crucial role in this matter. Silence on this issue may be interpreted by both the city and the state legislature as an indication that you are willing to accept reduced services in exchange for lower taxes. If this is not your preference, I strongly encourage you to reach out to your state legislature representatives and express your support for local governments. They can demonstrate their support for cities like ours by allowing us to manage our own budgets and revenue streams.

ANNEXATION

The city of Norwalk is taking proactive steps to secure our future prosperity by annexing property. The city was recently approved to annex more than 2,900 acres south and west of our current city boundaries. This strategic annexation will protect a vital growth corridor with direct access to Interstate 35. This decision reflects our commitment to long-term planning and sustainable development. By securing this growth corridor, we are ensuring that Norwalk is well-positioned for future expansion and economic opportunities. We understand that

annexation can raise questions, and we encourage you to reach out to my office if you have any concerns or would like more information. We are committed to transparency and open communication with our citizens.

Thank you for your continued support as we work to build a bright future for Norwalk. ■

Q: What is included in my monthly utility bill?

A: All or some of the services included in your bill are water, sewer, storm water, trash and recycling. Water meter readings are taken each month on the first business day, and bills are mailed around the 15th of each month. If no request for a financial arrangement has been received and no payment has been received, water is shut off on the 25th of each month.

Q: Can I pay my utility bill online?

A: Yes. Customers can make online payments or sign up for automatic payments at https://norwalkia.ourcommunityconnect.com.



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Q: When is garbage picked up?

A: Garbage is picked up on Tuesday at homes west of Highway 28/Sunset Drive and on Wednesdays for homes east of Highway 28/Sunset Drive. Large items and extra trash are collected on garbage day from the curb with the appropriate stickers. Schedule appliance pick up with the hauler and apply appropriate stickers. To start/stop service, call Norwalk City Hall, 515-981-0228. For information about carts or missed pickup, call Metro Waste Authority at 515-244-0021. Residents can also take garbage to Metro Park East Landfill. Spring cleanup is May 12 and May 14, 2025.

Q: Is recycling picked up curbside?

A: Yes. Metro Waste Authority manages Curb It!, the curbside recycling program. For information about collection, visit https://www.norwalk.iowa.gov/departments/utility_department/trash___recycling.php



Q: Is yard waste picked up?

A: Metro Waste Authority manages Compost It!, the curbside yard waste collection program. For pick up, customers must have the proper carts, Compost It! Bags or Compost It! Stickers. For information, visit https://www.norwalk.iowa.gov/departments/utility_department/trash___recycling.php.







City F-AQs

Q: Is there a dog park?

A: Norwalk's Dog Park is located inside of City Park. The Dog Park has two fenced areas, one for small dogs and one for larger dogs. There are water fountains available for hydrating your dogs as well. Passes for the Dog Park are required and can be purchased at City Hall, 705 North Ave., Norwalk. For cost information related to licensing of your dogs or passes to the Dog Park, call **515-981-0228.**

Q: Is open burning allowed?

A: Open burning of garbage is not allowed. Recreational fires are allowed in certain circumstances. When allowed, they first must be used for cooking, heating, recreation or ceremonies and must be contained in a fire ring or commercial device meant for containing a recreational fire. Q: What are the rules about street parking in case of snow?

A: When the city issues a snow emergency, parking is not allowed on public streets, alleys or city-owned off-street parking areas. Property owners must clear sidewalks of snow and ice within 24 hours of it accumulating or the city may do so and assess the costs.

Q: What does the city consider a nuisance?

A: According to Norwalk City Code, a vehicle must be parked on a hard surface and cannot be parked in a person's yard. The maximum allowed grass height is 8 inches. Excessive garbage, debris and other waste is not allowed. Dead or diseased trees must be removed. If you want to report a nuisance, complete the online nuisance report at https://www.norwalk. iowa.gov/citizen_request_ center/nuisances.php. If



you have guestions or comments about the nuisance code, call 515-981-9530. If you have an immediate health or life safety concern, contact City Hall directly by calling 515-981-0228 or by dialing 911.







Economic Development

The Economic Development Department handles a variety of business initiatives and development aspects for the city of Norwalk, such as new company recruitment, business expansion assistance, project management, development agreements, incentive programs, property locating/site selection, infrastructure assistance, statistics and demographics, grant writing and financial programming, research, communications/public relations and marketing, community enhancement programs and foreign relations.

Since the Department was established in 2017, the city's commercial tax base has increased by 140%, adding \$63 million to the tax base, and the industrial tax base has grown by 969%, adding an extra \$46 million in taxable value. In this same timeframe, more than 100 new businesses have opened, resulting in more than 1,500 fulltime jobs in the community.

Norwalk also has the first certified site in Iowa to reach capacity, with Windsor Windows and Michael Foods adding more than 300,000 square feet of new light-industrial space. Michael Foods is currently expanding their facility and operations, which will double their existing footprint, employment base, and production.

Recently, Norwalk established the Southwest Development Corridor (norwalkiaswdevelopment.com) south of Delaware Street which will include newly annexed 2,900 developable acres to the city's limits and connect Highway 28 westward to I-35. The city is investing in infrastructure within the corridor to help promote and prepare for high-value commercial/industrial growth over the next several decades. The Southwest Development Corridor is a prime location for IT/tech, data centers and larger light-industrial developments.

Economic Development established Norwalk's first official international designation with the Sister-City partnership in Vushtrri, Kosovo, and manages the state-to-nation program. The department also administers the Commercial Improvement Grant program, High-Quality Jobs Grant, veterans programs, Tax Increment Finance program, and the First-in Commercial Development Incentive program.

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The perfect location

The City of Norwalk shares borders with neighboring cities of Des Moines and West Des Moines while serving as the closest suburban community to the Des Moines International Airport and Valley Junction. Norwalk features beautiful new residential neighborhoods, Lake Colchester, world-class schools, and some of the best golf courses in Iowa.

Ranked one of the "Safest Cities in Iowa" several years in a row, Norwalk's median household income is the third highest in central Iowa. It has one of the lowest unemployment rates in the nation and is one of the fastest-growing cities in Iowa.

In addition to the Des Moines Metro's key industries, Norwalk is primed for retail, recreation and tourism-based development. Multiple commercial and retail developments are underway in the city, such as Norwalk Central, the Gregg Young Sports Campus and the NorWalk of Fame. With the Highway 28 corridor running through the middle of Norwalk from West Des Moines (63rd Street)

and the central metro connector Fleur Drive extending along Norwalk's eastern border, the remaining commercial sites are incredibly valuable.

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Business and community-based programs

BUSINESS/COMMERCIAL

The city of Norwalk offers commercial building grants for façade and value-added facility improvements. Buildings must be within Norwalk city limits and be at least 10 years of age. Grants available are from \$1,500 to \$50,000 for qualifying projects — matching funds required.

Demolition expenses for dilapidated structures can now be included in the application for this grant. (The project must consist of future commercial development on a razed site.) Funds can also be used to convert residential properties in commercial areas into commercial facilities.


In addition to the Commercial Improvement Grant program, the Economic Development Department also offers a High-Quality Jobs Grant to employers who meet certain criteria when adding new fulltime positions and the First-in Incentive program



for new commercial projects that get built first in a larger undeveloped area and require new infrastructure.

The city of Norwalk also provides a Five-Year Graduated Tax Abatement program for new commercial structures built in Norwalk. Contact the Economic Development office or city website for details about these grant and incentive programs.





Veterans

The Home Base Iowa program helps veterans move to Iowa



and find fulltime employment. The program benefits veterans recently separated from the military or returning from deployments. Norwalk and Warren County are Home Base Iowa Communities, which adds to the statewide benefits package for veterans who move to or work in Norwalk. Many of Norwalk's businesses are committed to hiring veterans and regularly post available positions.

The Norwalk Economic Development Department also offers a \$5,000 grant to any veteran or veteran spouse who opens or physically expands a business in Norwalk. For more information about this program, contact the Economic Development office.

Foreign relations

Norwalk is one of the few Iowa cities with an official international designation. NORWALK Norwalk is a Sister-City with Vushtrri, Kosovo, and has a close working partnership with the Kosovo Consulate in downtown Des Moines. The Norwalk Foreign Relations Committee was created to engage residents with the city's international initiatives. Norwalk and Vushtrri are currently working on projects providing opportunities for business and trade, development, and governmental and public safety programming. In 2023, the president of Kosovo and the ambassador to the United States attended a delegation event at Norwalk City Hall

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Community development

The Norwalk Community Development Department handles the development and building process for the city. The process starts with the long-term planning of land uses, infrastructure and other city amenities. Land is then developed through the zoning, subdivision and site development of property. Finally, a building permit can be submitted for the construction of various structures.

Building permits through the city can be sought for many different structures, from new commercial buildings and new houses to remodeling projects, sheds and pools. Staff in the department also conduct inspections of various permitted projects to ensure safety of structures and compliance with city codes.

The various uses of property are handled through the city's Zoning Ordinance, which is administered by the Community Development Department. Questions on allowed uses and locations of structures can be directed to the department. The department also assists with the requested changes to zoning for property owners.

Lastly, the Community Development Department handles all property nuisance complaints for the city. Complaints can be called in, emailed, or submitted online via the city website. The department staff investigates all property nuisance complaints and issues any corrective actions needed.

The Community Development Department can help residents work through any new projects. For information on development and building within the city, call 515-981-9530. ■

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
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RESERVATIONS

BILLY O. PHILLIPS PARK,

2500 Lexington Drive

Amenities include: playground with rubber surface, wheelchair swing, restrooms, open air shelter (available for reservation), backstop/practice ball diamond and picnic tables.

BROWNIE PARK, 805 Cherry Parkway Amenities include: butterfly garden, Iowa's first Magnolia Arboretum, a fairy garden, checkers and hopscotch on the trail that leads through the park and to the Norwalk Easter Public Library where parking is available. There are no restrooms at the park but enjoy a walk over to the library for facilities and parking.

CITY PARK, 907 North Ave.

Amenities include: playground equipment, basketball courts, picnic tables, shuffleboard courts, restroom facilities, old railroad car and open shelter house with picnic tables.



DISC GOLF COURSE, 1915 North Ave.

Par 3 disc golf course is located within Windflower Park. It is an 18-hole course with 18 tee-offs, 9 holes and 1 practice hole.

DOG PARK, 907 North Ave.

Norwalk's Dog Park is located inside of City Park. The Dog Park has two fenced areas, one for small dogs and one for larger dogs. There are water fountains available for hydrating your dogs as well. Passes for the Dog Park are required and can be purchased at City Hall, 705 North Ave. For cost information related to licensing of your dogs or passes to the Dog Park, call 515-981-0228.

ELIZABETH HOLLAND PARK,

1401 Colonial Parkway

Amenities include: two ponds stocked by the DNR with bluegill, largemouth bass and channel catfish; 0.86-mile trail with lighting and art sculptures.



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McDONALD'S WOODS PARK,

1401 Holly Drive

This park is nestled behind townhomes on High Road. It is a quiet, forest-like setting with trees. To access the parking lot, use Holly Drive south of the park.

SERENITY WOODS

The city of Norwalk has purchased 177 acres of new parkland south of town. It is located at the northwest corner of Elkhorn and Highway 28. A portion of the North River runs through the middle of the park, splitting it into two sections.

Serenity Woods is not yet open to the public. Norwalk Parks and Recreation is working on accessibility to the site along with a parking area. After access is established, the Parks Department will announce when the public can use the new park area for hiking and other outdoor activities.

While the city is excited to offer this great



amenity for citizens and visitors, it should be noted that accessing the site prior to opening would be considered trespassing.

Serenity Woods is adjacent to the North River Greenbelt: Swamp White Oak Tract, managed by the Warren County Conservation Board.

TRAILS

The city maintains several miles of linear multi-use recreational trails. The trails are both on and off the street. The most recent addition is the Great Western Trail Connection.

WARRIOR PARK,

511 Orchard Hills Drive

Amenities include: pre-school playground; NFL Play Challenge Course (one of three in the Midwest); restroom facilities; open

air shelter (available for reservation); trail connection to Orchard Hill Elementary; pond stocked by the DNR with bluegill, largemouth bass and channel catfish; small parking lot (the city encourages you to walk or ride your bike to the park).

WINDFLOWER PARK, 1915 North Ave.

This park includes the Norwalk Aquatic Center, playground equipment, a walking path, 12-hole disc golf course, a double wide basketball court, skateboard park, an open shelter house with an enclosed kitchen (refrigerator, microwave, stove, kitchen sink) and restrooms. Check availability and reserve a shelter online at https://norwalkparks.


