Bologna sandwiches. I have not had one of these in decades, and I don't plan to either. I had enough sliced bologna as a child to last a lifetime. No offense, Oscar Mayer, but enough is enough.

Jell-O salads. I can still see those metal tins that Mom hung on the wall — right next to the giant wooden fork and spoon. I guess Jell-O salad was one way to get us kids to eat more fruit. And there was always room for Jello.

Sloppy Joes. Did you ever notice how each family had their own slightly different version of Sloppy Joes? Mom's were on the dry side, more like the Maid-Rites. Jolene likes her soupy and redder in color. I like them the way anyone cooks them for me.

**Fondue.** My sister had a fondue pot set that we tried a few times. In today's dipping-crazy world, these

things could certainly make a comeback

casserole. I loved this stuff. Tuna AND noodles. The best of both worlds. I still make a version today with macaroni and cheese. I call it the Tuna Fish Hot Dish. Nobody seems to enjoy it like I do.

Western French dressing. We seemed to always have a bottle of Western French salad dressing on the table. I didn't like lettuce as a kid, but I did like that stuff. As I recall, the bottle packaging had a steer prominently on the front. As such, I would ask Dad to pass me "the cow," which brought a laugh from my family members.

Turkey tetrazzini. This was a staple of school hot lunch, and why not? Just the other night, we had some leftover chicken, rice and corn. I mixed it together with a little cheese and a dash of milk. I told Jolene it reminded me of turkey tetrazzini. It was a bit heavy on the corn, but it was delicious.

Goulash. Now, this was a weekly staple in my childhood home. Mom was the tomato-juice-canning queen, and much of it went into this dish. Jolene's version is less soupy and much improved. Of course, I never told Mom that.

TV dinners. The 1970s were about simplifying the family meal, as many moms started working outside of the home, and the time crunch had settled in. Along came frozen fish sticks, pot pies and TV dinners. My favorite of the latter was Salisbury steak. The potatoes and gravy were good, too. The vegetables were awful. But having a TV dinner on a TV tray in front of the TV set was a special treat, regardless.

**HISTORY** 

### EARLY AUTOMOBILE DEALERS

One of the first automobiles in Adel was an Oldsmobile, purchased by Dr. Sloan in 1902. He did not purchase it in Adel, however. It would be a few years before there were any dealers in town to sell him his next car.

"Ford, the king of cars" was the claim in an early advertisement by the Burkett Auto Company. Dave Burkett, who also operated a Ford agency in Dallas Center, started in 1913 selling Henry Ford's popular Model T. In 1914, they sold 42 new Fords and a few used cars. The manager was Harry Archer, and the business was located southeast of the square. In 1919, Burkett purchased the building from J.B. White and began some additions.

Adel Auto Company, located one block west of the square and owned by J.W. Batterson, began in 1912 selling Buick and Hudson automobiles. By 1920, they had added Dodge and Cadillac. That same year, it was announced they would handle a line of Stewart trucks. In December, they proclaimed that Guy Garner was operating the big Stewart truck of the Adel Auto Company between here and Des Moines. "It is a big truck, and Guy is capable of handling it." Stewart Trucks, Cadillac, Buick and Hudson were dropped, but Batterson continued as a Dodge dealer for many years.

The Skinner Auto Company began around 1919 as agents for Maxwell cars and trucks. Mr. J.L. Skinner, owner, promised to pay attention to all details of the business and "employ only competent workmen who can tear down and rebuild in a mechanical like way." They didn't last long, however, as there is no further mention of them.

The Adel Motor Company began selling Page, Overland and Nash automobiles in 1920. In addition, they operated a repair garage in downtown Adel for all makes. The business, started by Charles McCleary and L.R. Barrett, became McCleary Motor Co. in 1922 when McCleary bought out his partner. The Nash and Overland brands were soon dropped in favor of the new Jewett line. The year 1924 saw the addition of the Willys Knight luxury sedan, and, in 1925, they added Buick.

Dallas County automobile buyers showed no sign they were concerned about the approaching hard times. There was a big increase in auto sales for the year 1925, and more buyers were paying cash. It is interesting to note that the low- and medium-priced machines predominated, with nearly half of the 585 cars registered being Fords. There were no Cadillacs and only three Packards sold that year. Here's a breakdown of the brands sold and their numbers: Ford 325, Dodge 52, Chevrolet 42, Buick 38, Overland 18, Essex 17, Star 16, Chrysler 14, Maxwell 14, Hudson 8, Studebaker 7, Hupmobile 7, Jewett 7, Gray 5, Oldsmobile 3, Packard 3, Nash 2, Rickenbacker 2, Willys-Knight 2, Jordan 1, and Fageol Bus 1.

Today, new car buyers must go to Waukee or Des Moines. Adel currently does not have any dealers for new automobiles.

#### **ROASTED TOMATO SOUP**

#### Ingredients:

- 3 pounds tomatoes
- 1/2 onion (optional)
- 1 garlic bulb (optional)
- 1 tablespoon garlic powder
- 2 teaspoons onion powder
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 tablespoon mesquite seasoning
- avocado oil
- 1 1/2 cups broth of choice
- 1 cup heavy whipping cream
- salt, to taste
- · pepper, to taste
- grilled cheese sandwiches, for serving (optional)

#### **Directions:**

- Heat oven to 375 F
- Slice tomatoes. Slice onions and garlic, if desired. Place in baking dish.
- Sprinkle garlic powder, onion powder, sugar and mesquite



seasoning over tomatoes. Drizzle avocado oil over top and mix

- Bake about 1 hour. Blend until smooth.
- Pour into pot and mix in broth and whipping cream. Bring to simmer and add salt and pepper, to taste.
- Serve with grilled cheese sandwiches, if desired.
