Jen says they looked at other breeds but both like labradors the best, so they chose their black lab, Cricket, from a breeder in Osceola.

Josh has trained dogs for some time, so when they adopted Cricket, he really dove deep into training because he wanted her to be a public dog. When they discovered the therapy dog reading program at the Winterset Library, Josh changed up Cricket's training to work toward a therapy dog certification.

"We plan on doing that later this year or next year," he says.

Cricket is mostly off-leash trained, and Josh says she is the smartest dog he has ever had, understanding concepts like "sooner" and "later."

Cricket has training sessions one to two times a day every day. All her food is hand fed. She has joined Josh and Jen on outings and trips such as exploring at Maquoketa Caves, swimming at the city pool on doggie days, attending several music shows, and going to Iowa Wild games.

"Cricket goes to the coffee shop a couple of times per week with us," Jen shares. "She gets a pup cup there, and a lot of people know her. She's famous at the coffee shop."

She has gone on vacation with her humans to Kansas City and visited dog-friendly establishments. Joshua says she loves to go on pack walks in Des Moines with him.

"Recently, I stopped at Jester Park to go on a walk with Cricket. Someone stopped us and asked if my dog was Cricket," he says. "I didn't even know the person."

They live near Winterset City Park, and Cricket spends a lot of time there getting exercise.

Cricket gets to go to Bomgaars regularly to pick out new toys.

"She loves the color yellow," Jen says. However, toys aren't the only thing she spends time with. The Dieters have a Fluent

Pet Pad (a pet-communication tool) for her to communicate with them. So far, they are working on six words with her on the pad out of the 70 different unique words to choose

"She learns things so fast," Jen states.

Cricket enjoys sleeping on her own couch upstairs, and she carries her buffalo stuffed animal to bed with her. She also gets spa days that include filing her nails, brushing her teeth, and receiving Epsom salt paw soaks. Joshua even learned to sew to patch up Cricket's favorite toys, though the ones she likes to destroy he leaves alone.

"Cricket keeps us active," Josh says. "I really enjoy doing smart puppy things with her, a combination of play and training."

"I love having her as a real companion and can take her just about anywhere," Jen says.

Rules the house

No matter how big or small, dogs can be a large part of their owners' lives. Boston, a miniature pinscher, has been a part of Anne Sneller's life since he was 6 months old. He is now 17 years old, a healthy 12 pounds, and an active part of

Anne says Boston came along before her husband and her son, and he knows it.

"He prefers me and will pass on most other people," she says. "He will ignore my family and walk past them to come to me. He rules the house."

Boston has a birthday party every year. It's one of Anne's favorite ways to pamper

"He likes to be warm and today is wearing a sweater made for him by my mom," she says.

He also has a bed on every floor of their home and blankets that he likes to burrow into. During the Christmas holidays, Boston is included as a member of the family with his own Christmas stocking and gifts.

Above all, Anne loves Boston, and she loves exploring with him.

"He keeps both of us active, and I believe that's why he's stayed so healthy for so long."

MEET Kacia Cain

Bringing real-world science to the classroom

At Winterset High School, science teacher Kacia Cain is preparing students for the next stage of life.

Cain teaches college anatomy and physiology, as well as college biogenetics, where students can earn college credit while diving into advanced scientific topics. As part of these courses, students get to work directly with medical professionals through partnerships with places like Madison County Hospital, Des Moines University, Iowa State University and Grand View University.

"We try to get them to see what life will be like at the next level and beyond," Cain says.

At the end of April, students in the college anatomy and physiology course will present research on global crises at the prestigious World Food Prize Youth Institute. The opportunity highlights one of Cain's key goals: connecting classroom learning with the real world.

She is also committed to authentic

experiences across every class she teaches, even those that don't offer college credit. In her crime scene investigation course, students collect and analyze evidence in mock crime scenes. At the end of the term, they create their own detailed crime scenes, which are evaluated by local law enforcement and presented in front of a panel of experts.

Another course focused on the human body offers foundational knowledge and unique experiences. During the digestive system unit, students visit DMACC's culinary arts program. EMS professionals also visit to teach students how to measure blood pressure and pulse.

"I'm trying to get as much real-world and authentic learning as I can for all the different levels of classes," Cain says.

In her Opportunities in Biology class, students begin to explore science beyond the classroom walls. Some students work with the Madison County Historical Society cataloging specimens, while others partner with Des Moines University on neurobiology projects. This fall, a few students will observe every department at the local hospital on a weekly basis, building relationships and gaining exposure to a variety of medical careers.

"It allows them to see that what we're doing in the classroom has relevance," Cain explains.

Cain credits her administration for supporting these meaningful experiences. With their help, the district was able to purchase an anatomage table for use in anatomy classes. This cutting-edge piece of technology is a fully digitized 3D table that displays detailed human anatomy, allowing students to explore the body layer by layer. They even use it in presentations to diagnose what went wrong and where in the body an issue occurred.

"Our students will have a real advantage when they go to college because, when they go into those labs, they'll already feel comfortable using the equipment and knowing what it can do," Cain says.





DON'T overlook your cabin air filter

When it comes to vehicle maintenance, the cabin air filter doesn't get much attention — but it should. Tucked behind the glove box or under the hood, this small filter plays a big role in keeping the air inside your car clean and breathable.

The cabin air filter traps dust, pollen, mold spores and other airborne debris before it enters your



in areas with a lot of pollution or construction, a clean filter can make a noticeable difference in air quality. It's basically your car's first line of defense against breathing in the stuff you would

Over time, though, the filter gets clogged. When that happens, airflow through your vents is reduced, which can put extra strain on your heating and air conditioning systems. You might notice weaker airflow, a musty smell, or windows that fog up more easily. These are signs it's time for a replacement.

Most manufacturers recommend changing the cabin air filter every 15,000 to 30,000 miles, but it can vary depending on where and how you drive. If you're often on dirt roads or in heavy traffic, you might need to change it more often.

It's an easy, inexpensive service that is often overlooked but has a real impact on your comfort and your car's HVAC health. A fresh filter doesn't just help your car breathe easier — it helps you breathe easier, too. ■

PLAY it safe: Wear a mouthguard

Athletes who don't wear a mouthguard when playing team sports, like soccer, football and basketball, are twice as likely to suffer a mouth or face injury than those who wear one. But injuries do not only occur in team sports. Many individual sports and activities carry the risk of injury to the face or mouth. That is why mouthguards should be worn by athletes whether they are playing contact sports, team sports or individual sports.



A mouthguard should cover all your teeth, including the back ones. It should separate the cheeks, tongue and lips from the teeth. A well-fitted mouthguard should stay in place during use, and you should be able to breathe and speak with the mouthguard in place.

There are three types of mouthguards:

1. Stock mouthguards can be bought in many drug stores and athletic supply stores. They are inexpensive but may not fit as well as more expensive mouthguards. Stock mouthguards may require that the athlete's mouth be closed to hold the mouthguard in place. This can interfere with speaking and breathing.

- 2. Boil-and-bite mouthguards are also available in many stores. To achieve a better fit than stock mouthguards, boiland-bite mouthguards are fitted by softening them in boiling water, placing them over the upper teeth and biting down until the mouthguard cools (always follow directions on the package). You should look over the mouthguard after you have fitted it to ensure that it has not become too thin, especially where the teeth come together.
- 3. Custom-made mouthguards are made for you specifically by your dentist. They are more expensive than the other types, but since they are individually crafted for you, they offer a better fit. Custom-made mouthguards also are more durable than storebought ones and generally last longer.

Regardless of the mouthguard you choose, you should wear one during all athletic activities, including playtime, practices and games.

GAP and new car replacement coverage

Protecting your new ride

Buying a brand-new car is exciting, but it also comes with financial risks - especially in the event of an accident. Two popular insurance endorsements — GAP coverage and new car replacement coverage - can help protect your investment when standard auto insurance falls short.



What is GAP coverage?

GAP stands for Guaranteed Asset Protection. This coverage helps if your car is totaled or stolen, and the insurance payout doesn't fully cover what you still owe on your auto loan or lease.

Here's how it works: Suppose you buy a car for \$30,000 and still owe \$28,000 on your loan when the car is totaled. Your insurance might only pay the car's actual cash value — say, \$24,000 — due to depreciation. Without GAP insurance, you'd still owe the lender \$4,000 out of pocket. GAP coverage bridges that gap by covering the difference.

This coverage is especially valuable for new car buyers who:

- Made a small down payment
- Chose a long-term loan (60 months or more)
- Bought a vehicle that depreciates quickly

What is new car replacement coverage?

New car replacement coverage is another optional endorsement, and it offers broader protection than a standard policy. Instead of paying your vehicle's depreciated value, it helps pay to replace your car with a brand-new model of the same make and model typically if the car is totaled within the first one or two years of ownership.

This can save you thousands, as cars lose a significant portion of their value within the first year. Some insurers even offer enhanced versions of this coverage, such as "better car replacement," which replaces your totaled car with a newer model or one with fewer miles.

Should you add these coverages?

Both endorsements are relatively affordable and can offer peace of mind. GAP coverage is often available through your insurance company or directly from the dealership, but it's usually cheaper through your insurer. New car replacement is usually available if your car is under a certain age and mileage limit.

If you're financing or leasing a new vehicle, or just want full protection for your recent purchase, these two coverages are well worth considering.

"Our biggest fundraiser is our flag service. We set out American flags five times a year, on major holidays, and it's on a subscription basis," Vossekuil says. "That's been a real success for us. I think it's around 1,100 flags that we put out. People really appreciate that."

When asked for a particularly memorable way the club helped someone, Vossekuil tells of an individual need the club was happy to respond to.

"We had a young lady that was a high school sophomore, and she was very interested in journalism. She's a very bright, articulate young lady," Vossekuil says. "There was a big journalism conference in Washington, D.C., and we donated money for her expenses to go and attend that conference. We covered her travel and lodging costs."

Currently, the local club has 44 members and welcomes anyone to come to a weekly meeting and free breakfast to learn more. The group meets every Friday at 6:45 a.m. at Montross Pharmacy in Winterset for breakfast. Vossekuil points out, there is no requirement for members to attend each week; it's simply a tradition that many members enjoy.

Vossekuil has been a member of the Winterset Optimists for six years and stepped into his current one-year term as club president in September 2024. He adds that his wife recently joined the club, too. Vossekuil also mentions that the local club is part of the national and international Optimist Club organization.

As the name suggests, the Optimist Club believes in maintaining a positive outlook, and Vossekuil shared the Optimist Creed, which includes: "Promise yourself to look at the sunny side of everything and make your optimism come true. Promise yourself to be just as enthusiastic about the success of others as you are about your own."




THE WHY and how of deadheading

Keep your flowers blooming longer and your garden a bit tidier with deadheading. Removing faded flowers can promote repeat bloom on some plants, encourage fuller, more compact growth, and tidy up the garden.

Use a bypass hand pruner, garden snips or other dead-heading tool to remove faded flowers. Bypass tools have two sharp blades like scissors, resulting in a clean cut that closes quickly, leaving your plant looking its best. Corona Tool's Ergocut dead header has a finger loop that provides better control and an ergonomic design for less stress on your hands and wrist.

The type of flower will influence how and where to make the cut. In general, remove the stem

of healthy leaves or nearby flower buds.

Remove the flower stem of salvias, speedwells (Veronicas), and snapdragons as the blooms begin to fade. Cut below the spike of flowers just above the first set of leaves or the side shoots where the new flower buds are forming.

Encourage additional blossoms and improve Shasta daisy's appearance by removing faded flowers. Prune back just above a set of healthy leaves.

Cut the flowers of plants like Armeria and coral bells back to the base of the flower stems that arise from the foliage. This improves the appearance and encourages more blooms on some of this type of flowering perennial.

Plants like daylilies and balloon flowers require a bit different care. Remove the individual blooms as they fade if you don't like looking at the faded flowers. Once all the individual flowers have bloomed out, you can cut the flower stem back at the base.

Removing fading flowers of fuchsia and lantana will prevent the plants from going to seed and encourage more blooms. Remove any berries that do form to keep these plants flowering throughout the growing season.

Deadheading peonies is strictly for aesthetics and won't extend the bloom time. Remove the faded flowers or seedpods as they form. Cut just above a healthy set of leaves to keep the stems more upright and create a tidier appearance in your garden.

Prevent some flowers, like columbine, Amsonia and Alliums from reseeding and spreading throughout the garden by removing the faded flowers. Even though it won't promote additional blooms, it will help eliminate unwanted seedlings in next year's garden.

Remove flowers as they appear on coleus, grown for its colorful foliage, to promote more compact growth. Late blooming, flowerless varieties and self-branching coleus hybrids reduce or eliminate time spent on this task.


Reduce time spent deadheading by including some self-cleaning, also called free-flowering plants, like impatiens, fibrous begonias, Calibrachoa and moss rose. Lobelia, many of the newer petunias and verbenas are also self-cleaning but may benefit from a bit of grooming. Prune back heatstressed lobelia and verbena that get leggy and petunia stems that need to be kept in bounds.

Allow seedheads to develop on coneflowers, rudbeckias and other plants that provide winter interest and food for the birds. And consider skipping the deadheading of late blooming perennials. This allows them to prepare for winter and form seedpods for additional winter interest.

And while you are out in the garden deadheading, pick a few flowers at their peak to enjoy in a summer bouquet indoors.

ASIAN ground turkey bowl is healthy and flavorful

When our girls were younger, and we were running from one activity to the next seemingly every night, we treated ourselves, often to Chinese take-out. Shane and the girls loved the sweet sauce on orange chicken. My choice was cashew chicken, and we all devoured the fried rice.

We like Asian food, but it has not been something I cook at home. This recipe caught my eye the other day, so I thought I would test it out. My family loved it!

I appreciate this Asian ground turkey bowl recipe for its perfect balance of flavors and textures. The savory turkey, cooked with garlic, ginger, hoisin sauce and soy sauce, brings a rich base that pairs well with the freshness of crunchy vegetables. It is a healthy yet satisfying dish with lean ground turkey providing a great source of protein.

I also appreciate how customizable it is. You may choose to add a little spice with sriracha or keep it mild. Adjust the flavors to your taste. The rice gives it a comforting feel, while the vibrant toppings — like cucumbers and lettuce — add just the right amount of crunch. It is one of those meals that feels indulgent but is actually good for you with only 366 calories and 32 grams of protein per serving.

Asian ground turkey bowl

Ingredients

- 2 pounds lean ground turkey
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 red pepper, diced
- 1 green pepper, diced
- 4 green onions, chopped
- 1.5 cups carrots, shredded
- .5 cup water chestnuts, chopped
- 4 teaspoons minced ginger
- 4 teaspoons minced garlic
- 4 tablespoons low sodium soy sauce
- .75 cup hoisin sauce
- · 2 tablespoons rice vinegar
- 2 tablespoons sesame oil
- 4 cups rice (any variety I use Jasmine)
- · 1-2 cups lettuce, finely chopped
- 1-2 cups cucumbers, diced

Directions

- Make sauce by combing hoisin sauce, soy sauce, rice vinegar and sesame oil. Save for later.
- Heat olive oil over medium high heat. Add turkey once hot and brown for 3-5 minutes. Push the



turkey to the sides of the pan. Add red and green bell peppers, green onions, water chestnuts, garlic and ginger. Stir together and cook for 4-7 minutes. Cook until turkey is cooked. The vegetables should be tender-crisp.

Add sauce and cook 2-3 minutes.
 Sauce will thicken and coat the
turkey and vegetables nicely. Serve
turkey and vegetables on top of a
bed of rice. Top with lettuce and
cucumbers. You can add additional
carrots and green onions if desired.
