A PINEAPPLE PIZZA PREFERENCE

Want to know how to identify a clear division in a group of people? It only takes one question, and it has nothing to do with gun ownership. Or immigration. Or transgenders in sports. It is about something many people tend to be much more passionate about — pizza. That's right, pizza. Or, more specifically, pizza toppings.

Don't believe me? Try to order pizza for a group and ask what toppings they prefer. Get ready for a debate.

I prefer loads of meat on my pizza. Sausage. Pepperoni. Canadian bacon. All of it.

My wife wants a fungus on hers. She says you can't even taste the mushrooms, which leads me to two questions: How does she know what I can taste? And, if she is correct, why pay to put a topping on a pizza that you can't taste?

According to research shared in a Huffington Post story, 52% of Americans say pepperoni is one of their three favorite pizza toppings, 34% include sausage, and 31% list mushrooms. Bacon and plain/mozzarella cheese each were named top-three picks by 20% of respondents.

But what about the least favorite toppings? According to the same research, 49% selected anchovies as one of their three least favorite pizza toppings. Also at the bottom were eggplant (disliked by 30%), pineapple (24%) and artichokes (24%).

Speaking of pineapple, which I truly enjoy when combined with Canadian bacon, it is clearly one of the most divisive choices. Where you live and how old you are tend to be the factors. According to the data, people living in the western states are more likely to choose pineapple as a favorite pizza topping, and people 18 to 34 years old also tend

to be more into it. Meanwhile, only 9% of Americans 55 or older chose pineapple as a favorite topping, and 28% count it among their least favorites. Those of you who don't like pineapple on pizza should take a little advice from Time For Timer and "put a little on your plate."

One may wonder why pizza toppings create such divisive debates. Keep in mind that 73% of Americans say they eat pizza at least monthly, and 21% opt for it at least weekly. As such, pizza is something we frequently associate ourselves with, and that often tends to become personal.

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HISTORY

CAFES AND THE WAR YEARS

World War II caused a shortage of help for Adel's cafés. Good jobs for women were available at the Ankeny Ordinance Plant and other war-related industries. The pay was vastly better than that of a waitress, and Conards ran a bus there for transportation. The shortage was apparent when a convention of physicians was held in Adel and afterward decided to dine at Mack's Café. A group of teachers, who eat there regularly, saw the predicament and enrolled themselves as waitresses. Help was also short in the kitchen, so home economics teacher Phyllis Hague drafted herself for the job of dishing up food. Customers appreciated it, and the women had some fun (and maybe received a few tips).

Mack's Café was in trouble again. After an early Sunday morning raid by the sheriff and county attorney, owner J.E. McCleary was arrested and charged with the sale of beer on Sunday and permitting the use of intoxicating liquor. About 40 people were in the "Silver Moon" part of the café at the time. Mack's closed until late April when it was announced that Frank Miller had purchased the business and would re-open soon. The restaurant would continue to be known as Mack's, but, henceforth, no beer would be served.

In December, eight truckloads of WACs from the Des Moines Training Center stopped for breakfast at the Wolter Café while on a training trip. No mention was made as to how eight truckloads handled, but the next week there was an advertisement for waitresses by the Wolter Café.

1944 saw the beginning of a new business that would become almost an Adel institution. Harley Harper, who had been operating a billiard and pool hall before going to Alaska, announced that he and Mrs. Harper would open a new café. Their building, on the west side of the square, would be completely remodeled and redecorated with a modern kitchen as well as booths, tables and a lunch counter.

Howell's Café, after serving a large Sunday dinner with all proceeds going to the Red Cross, became Mom's Café.

In March 1945, a few people got a look at German prisoners of war when a car containing two guards and six prisoners made a stop at the Triangle Inn Café. The prisoners were allowed to walk around a bit while two machine guns "kept them passive."

In September of 1945, Mack's Cafe was refused a dancing permit by the town council. Twenty citizens attended the meeting with a petition signed by 307 citizens. Sheriff Evan Burger added his opinion that beer and dancing could not be controlled. Reverends H.M. Sippel, A.M. Long and Paul Miller, along with John Fiddler, Dr. Whitmer, Fred Gearhart and many others, agreed. Frank Miller promised he was prepared to operate a clean and first-class place and would in no way operate his business as others in the past have. The council took no action on Miller's request for a beer license in conjunction with his dance hall.

POTATO SALAD

Recipe courtesy of "Cookin' Savvy" Servings: 4-6

Ingredients:

- · 3 pounds potatoes
- 4 boiled eggs, coarsely chopped
- 2 dill pickles
- 1 tablespoon garlic powder
- 1 tablespoon onion powder
- 1 package (2 1/2 ounces) real bacon pieces
- 2 cups mayonnaise
- 2 tablespoons mustard
- salt, to taste

- pepper, to taste
- smoked paprika, for garnish

Directions:

- Coarsely chop potatoes. In Dutch oven, boil until fork tender. Drain then add coarsely chopped eggs and pickles.
- Add garlic powder, onion powder, bacon pieces, mayonnaise and mustard.
 Season with salt and pepper, to taste. Mix well.
- Transfer to large bowl and refrigerate 1-2 hours. Garnish with smoked paprika.
