
FROM THE PUBLISHER


So, Coach Christie made it simple for me. He said I needed to quit trying to sidestep the defensive players and instead just run them over. That's what my teammates Todd and Tommy did, and that's why Coach Christie opted for plays with them running the ball and me blocking for them.

Coach Christie's advice made sense on the gridiron, but it applies to a lot more than football. We too often try to avoid our challenges in life by sidestepping, spinning and juking. And then those challenges catch up to us and tackle us to the ground. We get up, shake them off and get ready for the next play. Then we do the same things again and wonder why the same results keep happening. It's maddening.

KENNY E. CHAPMAN

Kenny Chapman, 87, of Adel, died May 17, 2025. A visitation was held on May 22 at Caldwell Parrish, Adel. The funeral service will take place on Friday, May 23, at the old Adel High School at 10:30 a.m. Burial will follow immediately after at Oakdale Cemetery in Adel.

Kenny was born on April 15, 1938, in Adel. He graduated from Adel High School, where he excelled in basketball and track. He had a passion for cars and racing. He not only participated in go-kart races but also had a knack for outrunning the police, often sharing tales of his escapades with his good friend, Jack.



Before settling down, he ventured to Montana to work on an oil rig, gaining experiences that he would recount with the flair of a true storyteller. Kenny eventually returned to Adel, where he met his first wife, Claudia, and welcomed four children: Terry, Tammy, Teresa and Todd. During this time, he formed lasting friendships with characters like Merle Haselhuhn, Jim Rhoten, Loyd Grove and Jack Chapman. He founded Ken's TV and Appliance, now Adel & Winterset TV & Appliance - Heating and Cooling, which has served the community for the last 65 years.

At the age of 42, Kenny married Linda Lou Lockhart, and together they welcomed his fifth child, Kenny (KC) Chapman.

Kenny was truly a once-in-a-lifetime personality. His kindness, quick wit, ingenuity and care for others, combined with his business acumen and gentle fatherly nature, made him an icon in the community and a hero to all five of his children.

Kenny served as the grand marshal for the Sweet Corn Festival multiple times and is nearly famous for inventing the sweet corn cooker, responsible for cooking thousands — if not millions — of ears of corn over the years. He was also the vice chairman of the Quasquicentennial, a long-time member of the Lions Club, president of the Jaycees, and a long-time member of Adel's Chamber of Commerce. If that weren't enough, he served as a volunteer firefighter.

Kenny is survived by his wife of 45 years, Linda; children: Terry (Teresa), Tammy (Brett), Teresa, Todd (Chris), and KC (Emilee); 13 grandchildren, Michael, Mattie, Michelle, Brandon, William, Justin, Josh, Brittany, Kendra, Megan, Jordan, Jackson and Jayden; great-grandchildren, Lucas, Norah, Lillie, Beckett, Callan, Pearl, Cash, Jet, Liam, Landon, Brinlee, Grayson, Brecken, Greenly, Bella, Owen and Brooks.

A SAVVY WEEKNIGHT FAMILY MEAL

While fast-food burgers may do the trick once in a while, they can get old quick if your family is eating them every other night. This quick and easy Baked Spaghetti can bring everybody back to the table and it won't break the bank either.

BAKED SPAGHETTI

Recipe courtesy of "Cookin' Savvy" Servings: 4-6

Ingredients:

- 1 pound ground beef
- 1 pound spaghetti noodles
- 1 jar (16 ounces) alfredo sauce
- 1 jar (24 ounces) marinara sauce
- 2 tablespoons garlic powder
- 2 tablespoons onion powder
- · salt, to taste
- · pepper, to taste
- 2 cups shredded cheese
- French bread or breadsticks, for serving

Directions:

- · Heat oven to 350 F.
- Brown and drain ground beef. Cook noodles according to package instructions. Drain noodles; add alfredo sauce and mix well.



- Add marinara sauce, garlic powder and onion powder to ground beef. Season with salt and pepper, to taste.
- Place noodles in 9-by-13inch baking dish. Spoon beef
- mixture on top but do not mix in. Cover with shredded cheese then cover with foil and bake 30-40 minutes.
- Serve with French bread or breadsticks.
