
THE DISHWASHER DILEMMA AND PAPER PLATES

We had a number of family members in town recently for a little get-together. One day before they arrived, our dishwasher ran its last cycle — and I don't mean for that load. No, this was the end of the road for our dishwasher, one that was less than 4 years old. Surely, it could be repaired, we thought. And, surely, the repairman told us it could — but at a cost that made more sense to buy a new one. Such is the throw-away society we now live in.

Even without a working dishwasher, we somehow survived. We simply reacquainted ourselves with the dishcloths, the hand towels and an array of scrubbers we found under the sink. Wash. Rinse. Dry. Put away. Those were the tasks my siblings and I did in front of the kitchen sink after every meal in our childhood home. Those memories reintroduced themselves this past weekend — and they brought a few more with them.

To minimize the number of dishes we would have to wash, we broke out the "paper plates." Yes, the flimsy disposable tableware that seemed to be in every home a few decades ago but now is often relegated to picnics and parties.

The inventor of the paper plate was a New Hampshire man named Martin Keyes. He was trying



Today, paper plates and related products come in a variety of materials — paper, paperboard, corrugated fiberboard and Styrofoam (gasp!). Some are coated — mostly with plastic — to improve the fight to withstand liquids or grease from soaking through. And, some are better at this than others.

My mom was the frugal type. Spending extra money on those fancy coated paper plates was wasteful, in her mind. So, she



bought the 500-packs of the uncoated, 9-inch plates that most everything soaked through to the point where the plates would collapse. As such, we would use several plates, often not by choice because they stuck together. Fortunately, today, my wife opts for the upgraded versions, which came in handy this past weekend with our dishwasher dilemma.

In recent years, environmental concerns made many people switch from paper products back to traditional dishes. Overall, that is probably a good thing, even though paper plates are made with molded pulp, which is created with recycled newsprint. As such, those of you who have concerns about newspapers forcing their opinions down your throat may be right. Because, if you are using paper plates, they still kind of are.

HISTORY

THE ADEL SPEEDWAY

An estimated 3,000 people were on hand Sunday afternoon, Sept. 10, 1950, to watch the first thrilling stock car races at the newly formed Adel Speedway. The 3/8-mile track, which was on the Allen farm on the west side of town about where Adel Acres is located now, was started by John Astley and managed by Max Chapman, both of Adel.

According to reports, "Organized mayhem reigned as crashes thrilled the pleasure seekers. When the dust had blown away, most exclaimed they'd never seen anything like it."

There were thrills galore as drivers crashed, rolled and skidded on the turns and the straightaways. No one was hurt, although one or two drivers were shaken up. The program got underway at 1 p.m. with time trials for the 25 cars that were on hand for the day's racing. Each roared around the track for a qualifying time and starting positions of the various heats.

Jim Gates of Des Moines gave fans their first scare when he rolled his car over on the east turn. He was knocked out but not seriously injured. Fisher's ambulance and Doctor Alan Cochrane stood by on the infield the entire afternoon, plus Adel's old fire truck, manned by the fire department crew. Mitchell Motor Company's wrecker also stood by and was one of the busiest of all. From the first 10-lap heat race until the final 20-lap feature, it was a constant round of smash. crash, rolled daredevil tactics that sent shivers up the spines of the people in the crowd. Drivers and cars came from all over the state. Most were from Des Moines. Two Adel men. Dale Ingram and Zon Brower, drove cars sponsored by Adel Truck and Implement and Ballantine's One Stop, respectively. Don Bell, well known Des Moines radio announcer, was at the mic giving the crash-by-crash description of the day's program.

Drivers ranged in age from 21 to

30. Their old beat-up cars had motors tuned to maximum performance efficiency. Most were driven in second gear during the entire race. The rules stated that "no car can have any parts except those from commonly carried stock. They are not souped up with any extra gadgets. No windows, windshields or glass was allowed, not even a rear-view mirror." Drivers were strapped in and wore football helmets and unbreakable goggles. They were required to sign waivers of injury and death before they were allowed to race.

Races continued into November of 1950, and there were races almost every Sunday through the summer months of 1951. The last race was apparently held on June 29, 1952.

There were a few Adel men among the daredevils. Darrel Daugherty, Dean Bever, Zon Brower, Merle Merical, Dale Ingram and Ned Freestone are all listed. There were probably others.

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RECIPE

A PERFECT LEMON AND RASPBERRY PAIRING

(*Family Features*) Enjoy the richness of summer with this Ooey Gooey Lemon Cake, which pairs a soft lemony cake with a sweet-tart raspberry drizzle that's perfect for sharing with your nearest and dearest.

OOEY GOOEY LEMON CAKE

Cake:

- 1 stick butter, melted
- 1 box lemon cake mix
- 2 eggs

Topping:

- 1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened
- 2 eggs
- 3 1/2 cups powdered sugar

Raspberry Drizzle:

- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/4 cup orange juice
- 1 cup fresh raspberries

Directions:

- Heat oven to 350 F.
- To make cake: In bowl, mix





butter, cake mix and eggs until blended well but thick. Spread into buttered 9-by-13-inch pan.

 To make topping: In another bowl, using mixer, mix softened cream cheese, eggs and powdered sugar until blended well. Pour over cake mixture but do not mix. Bake 30-35 minutes until edges of cake are golden brown but center is not. Wait until completely cooled to cut, 1-2 hours.

- To make drizzle: In saucepan over medium heat, add cornstarch and sugar. Mix in water and orange juice. Stir in raspberries and bring to boil. Remove from heat when it starts to thicken.
- Drizzle raspberry drizzle over each piece.
