HISTORY

ADEL'S FIRST SWIMMING POOL BY MIKE FLYNN

On Friday, Aug. 17, 2012, Adel's first municipal swimming pool closed its doors for the last time, replaced by an impressive new aquatic center. Its concrete walls and brick filter and bathhouse, a longtime fixture in Riverside Park. would soon be demolished. The historic old pool had its beginning during the Great Depression and had served the community for 75 years.

During that period of hard times, the citizens of Adel had a dream. They visualized a Utopian city with a vibrant commercial district. band concerts, a beautiful park and, of course, a swimming pool. The city fathers took that vision and went to work. They developed a plan whereby the city would sell bonds in the amount of \$9,000 to be repaid with an annual payment of \$675, including interest. The Works Progress Administration (WPA), a depression-era government program, would contribute approximately \$15,000 and most of the workers. The pool would be 65 feet wide and 130 feet long with facilities

for dressing rooms, showers and a complete sanitary filtration system. It would accommodate 300 people.

A special election was held on Aug. 25, 1936, for the citizens to approve or reject the plan. The proposal passed with a vote of 534 in favor and 109 opposed.

Work began on Nov. 4 and continued through the winter. Jake Wolfe was named foreman of the project, and Lafe Higgens was the engineer. Wolfe vowed to work every day they could to complete the project. Heated sand and gravel were used during freezing temperatures to prevent flaws in the concrete. In January, it was reported that the foundations for the pool and filter house were in. lines were run to the city sewer, water mains were laid and much other work completed.

In early May of 1937, Mayor W. D. Valentine announced that the much-anticipated opening date would be sometime in July. It was also announced that Carrol Nuzum, athletic director of the Adel High School, would be the first pool

manager.

Sunday July 19, 1937, was opening day. "The fences may not be up, the kiddies wading pool not completed and the benches and terraces yet to be put in place, but there will be water in the pool," Engineer Dale Swisher announced. "The pool will be turned over to the city at 9:30 that morning at which time a short talk will be given by E.C. Boudinot, Supt. of Operations for the W.P.A." Acceptance was made by Mayor Valentine.

Prices were set for the season as follows:

Rental of suits...Children 10 cents, Adults 15 cents

Single admission...Children 10 cents. Adults 25 cents

Season Tickets... Ages 5-12, \$1; 13-17, \$2; Adults 17-plus, \$3.50

probably still has fond memories of the old pool. For many teens, their first real job was as a lifeguard or teaching swimming lessons. It was a place to hang out and cool off after baling hay or walking beans during a hot and humid Iowa summer.

CUCUMBER SANDWICHES

Recipe courtesy of "Cookin' Savvy" Yield: 4 sandwiches

Ingredients:

- Garlic toast
- 4 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup mayo
- 2 teaspoons dried dill
- 2 teaspoons thyme
- 1 tablespoon onion powder
- 1 tablespoon garlic powder
- 2 cucumbers
- salt, to taste
- pepper, to taste

Directions:

- Cut crust off bread and set aside.
- In bowl, mix softened cream cheese, mayo, dill, thyme, onion powder and garlic powder.



Peel cucumbers then coarsely chop and add to cream cheese mixture. Add salt and pepper, to taste.

- Spread mixture over bread and cut into triangles.
- Tip: Recipe can be doubled, if needed.
