For the past year, The Dallas County Fair Board has been preparing for the upcoming county fair July 8-12, and it is excited to share the highlights and new events that will be available for the community's enjoyment. Fair Board Secretary Sherry James shares that, this year, there will be no gate admission fee or fee for parking, and the carnival will be absolutely free as well, thanks to sponsors. Families can come and enjoy all the carnival rides without the burden of admission or ride tickets.

One of the main highlights of this year's Dallas County Fair will be the Mutton Bustin' and Rodeo in the




south arena on Thursday night. Free entertainment will abound all around the entertainment plaza in the middle of the fairgrounds. Returning crowd favorites will include magic shows by Shaun Jay Magic, firefighter shows, the Bill Riley Talent Show Tuesday afternoon, Xtreme Strong Man, and City Council Barnyard Olympics. There will also be the 4-H/FFA BBQ on Tuesday evening at the county fair.

Livestock and pet shows will take place throughout the week, and, new this year will be some commercial vendors displaying indoors. The Fair Queen is crowned Friday at 3:30 p.m., right after the Little Miss Judging on Center Stage at 3 p.m.

There will be live music after each evening event at the south arena, except for Friday night during a concert. Grandstand entertainment will feature DJ Dallas and DJ BMoore on Thursday night from

REMEMBERING 'JAWS' AND THAT OMINOUS TWO-NOTE OSTINATO

Have you ever seen the movie, "Jaws"? If so, have you watched it again lately?

I watched it many years ago. It certainly wasn't at the theater, as I would have been 6 years old when it was released in 1975. But, somewhere along the line, I did see it. More than likely, it was a few years later in the made-for-TV version. I may have also rented a VHS tape or saw it on HBO at a friend's house. I'm not sure. Regardless, even with an ocean nowhere near by, that film caused me to cautiously enter any body of water for years to come.

If you don't know by now, "Jaws" was released 50 years ago, and some fans of the movie have been celebrating the anniversary with watch parties and nostalgic events related to the summer blockbuster film of its day. Interest in the original 1974 book by Peter Benchley has also experienced a surge. Keep in mind, "Jaws" was the highestgrossing film of all time until the release of "Star Wars" two years later.

Although I may not have seen the film at its release, I do remember the

classic movie poster with the giant shark nosing its way up in the ocean toward a naked woman swimming. Even at 6 years old, that



caught my attention. I remember that poster image on T-shirts seemingly everywhere at the time, too. Roger Kastel created the iconic poster, as well as the one for "The Empire Strikes Back." Take the movie title off of the "Jaws" poster and most everyone could still name the film. Try that with any other movie poster, especially today.

Of course, the movie title was ingenious, too. What other single word could summarize the fear of sharks better and make millions of people think twice before dipping their toes in the ocean — or any water? Yes, director Steven Spielberg was, and at age 78 still is, a moviemaking master.

But maybe the most identifiable aspect of the "Jaws" movie is the music score of only two notes by the illustrious John Williams. The score apparently was not well received by Spielberg, who initially thought it was a joke. Williams then explained to him, "The sophisticated approach you would like me to take isn't the approach you took with the film I just experienced." Spielberg eventually agreed, and Williams earned an Academy Award for Best Original Score. Even for people today who never saw the movie, that ominous two-note ostinato clearly signifies approaching danger.

"Jaws" had a budget of \$9 million and box office sales alone of \$477.9 million. It was clearly a phenomenal success. Unfortunately, it had three awful sequels, including "Jaws 3-D" that I did see in a theater in 1983. I won't be seeking out that film, but I am going to catch the original again and may even read the book. And, for at least a few years, I will likely be avoiding the ocean.

HISTORY

THE BONNET FACTORY

Did you know that Adel's city hall was once a glove and bonnet factory? The building that now houses our city government started life way back in 1907. It was built by Joe Roland and Carl Shroeder as a factory for the production of cotton flannel gloves, corn husking gloves (a glove with metal plates and hooks on the palm and palm side of the fingers used in husking corn) and sun bonnets. Their company, Adel Manufacturing Co., began by making stack covers. In 1906, they advertised they could make stack covers cheaper than could be bought anywhere else. They offered 15 sizes starting with a 10 by 18 at \$6.50 up to a 16 by 24 at \$19.50. How they got from stack covers to gloves and bonnets is anybody's guess.

In August of 1906, even before they had built their new building, it was announced that they had made a shipment of more than 400 dozen pairs of gloves and mittens to a Des Moines clothing firm. filed on March 12, 1909, listing W. B. Kinnick, F. B. Kinnick, C. H. Shroeder, M. C. Shroeder and Charles Moon as members of the board of directors. The amount of capital stock was authorized at \$50,000.

An advertisement of the time stated that "At Adel Manufacturing Co., we can give good work to all who want to work at good wages. Those who have already learned how to run a power machine can earn from \$6-\$9 per week. On Sept. 15, we will have an instructor here to give lessons, the way the work can be done quickest and the best. To those learning and who expect to stay with us, we will guarantee \$3 per week."

The firm was also known as the Roland Bonnet Factory. Bonnets were an important part of a woman's wardrobe in the 19th and early 20th centuries. Bonnets protected women's complexions from sun exposure, maintained modesty, and signified social status. But, by the early 1900s, bonnets were quickly losing favor to other forms of women's headgear.

In 1914, the building was sold, and the glove and bonnet business was relocated to Des Moines. The building was then used for storage until 1927 when C. M. Poffenberger, a retired farmer, purchased it and converted it into an apartment complex. He sold it to his son in 1936. Gordon Russel was the next owner, and it became affectionally known as "The Flats."

The building was used for apartments until 1991 when it was purchased by an ambitious entrepreneur named Kevin Rice. Rice also purchased the old railroad depot building across the tracks. He transformed the depot building into a restaurant and converted the old bonnet factory into a brewery... the Old Depot Brewing Company.

Rice was perhaps a bit too ambitious as the business failed, and he was forced to close in 1996.

The City of Adel completed the purchase of the building in 2001 and remodeled it into a fine city hall.

CHEESY, COMFORTING CHICKEN

(*Culinary.net*) A quick and easy way to get comfort food on your dinner table is this recipe for cheesy baked mushroom chicken. Add some green beans and mashed cauliflower for a well-rounded meal for your family.

CHEESY BAKED MUSHROOM CHICKEN

Ingredients:

- Nonstick cooking spray
- 4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts
- 1/2 cup flour
- 4 tablespoons butter
- 8 ounces mushrooms, sliced
- 1/2 cup chicken broth
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 cups shredded mozzarella
 cheese
- 1/2 cup Parmesan cheese, grated
- 1/4 cup green onions, sliced

Directions:

- Heat oven to 375 F. Prepare baking dish with nonstick cooking spray.
- Cut each chicken breast in half. Place flour in resealable bag.



Place chicken in resealable bag with flour; toss to coat.

- In large skillet, melt butter.
 Add chicken to skillet; brown all sides. Transfer chicken from skillet to 11-by-7-inch baking dish.
- In skillet, sauté sliced mushrooms in remaining

butter until softened. Add chicken broth, salt and pepper. Bring to boil, then cook 5 minutes. Spoon over chicken.

Bake 15 minutes. Sprinkle with cheeses and green onions. Bake 5 minutes, or until cheese is melted.


