Pre-festival activities kick off on Thursday, Aug. 7, with the ADM Alumni Golf Tournament, a two-day event to be held at River Valley Golf Course. Proceeds help support the ADM Alumni Association. It is the largest fundraiser of the year for the association and often fills up quickly, so hopeful registrants should gather teams of four and register through the ADM Alumni Association website, www.admalumni.com/events/golftournament, as soon as possible.

On Friday, Aug. 8, the Sweet Corn Festival kicks off with shucking of the corn at 4:30 p.m. in the parking lot at 10th and Prairie.

"We've heard several people describe the festival as a 'choose your own adventure,' where families can pick and choose which events they'd like to participate in," Erin Milroy, Adel Partners Chamber of Commerce president, shares. "This will be my first year helping facilitate the festival, alongside our wonderful committee chairs, volunteers and supporters. I especially want to thank my colleague, Casey Wheeler, who was so instrumental to all the hands that helped to pull this event together."

Event planners anticipate nearly seven tons of corn will be eaten the following day by festival attendees, and everyone is invited to join in the fun. A new addition to the festival this year is Kernel Kid, an honor bestowed on a local child who has made a positive impact on the community. The recipient of the Kernel Kid award will be introduced around 4:30 p.m. Friday. Yard games will be available for the enjoyment of all festival visitors at the Raccoon Valley Bank Stage and Pavilion. Round off Friday evening with the corn dive at Adel Family Aquatic Center at 6 p.m.

Early risers can join in the Sweet Corn 5K Run/Walk at 7:30 a.m. Saturday morning. Beat the heat and join the excitement of the parade at 9:30 a.m. The parade route will run from 18th Street and Main Street to 11th Street, onto Prairie Street, then on to finish at 14th Street. Parade line-up will begin at 8:30 a.m. along Brickyard Road, and all entries must be submitted by 8:45 a.m. Those interested can come that morning as no registration or entry form is required.

This year, Josh Shull, the 2024 Citizen of the Year, is the Grand

Marshal of the parade, along with Uptown Vintage Market, the 2024 Business of the Year. After the parade, festivalgoers are invited to grab some of Adel's famous Deardorff sweet corn. The nearly 15,000 ears of corn is a gift free of charge from the Adel Partners Chamber, and it is said to run out quickly, so those interested are encouraged to show up early for the golden goodness.

Enjoy local talents of all kinds throughout

the day on Saturday. The Southern Comfort Band will perform from 11:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Raccoon Valley Bank Stage and Pavilion, and Let's Dance, Adel Tumbling & Dance and Noted Studios will perform at noon, 1 p.m. and 2:30 p.m. at the Dallas County Courthouse lawn. Looza Palooza, a local student band, will share its musical talents at the Raccoon Valley Bank Stage and Pavilion from 4-5:30 p.m. JJ &

The Boys will round out the music for the night at the Raccoon Valley Bank Stage and Pavilion from 7:30-11:30 p.m. In addition, Raccoon Valley Radio, KKRF 107.9, will be broadcasting live from the festival. They invite everyone to stop by to say hello at the intersection of Ninth and Main streets.

Families and individuals can join in the fun and display their skills in a bags tournament, hosted by St. John's Catholic Church, from

11:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the ADM District Administration Center. Tournament entry is \$30 per team, and registration begins at 10:30 a.m. Proceeds from the tournament support the St. John's Youth Organization. A Kids' Zone, sponsored by The Garlick Team, will welcome kids to jump, tumble and play on a variety of inflatables between noon and 4 p.m. in the parking lot of Raccoon Valley Bank. Round out the night by joining the street party on the corner of 10th Street between Court Street and Main Street on Saturday from 6:30 p.m. to midnight.

Redline Warriors is happy to present the Sweet Corn Car Show Saturday morning. Cruise-in time is from 10 a.m. to noon with showtime between noon and 4 p.m. Cars will be lined up along Court Street, and all makes and models are invited to come show off. Attendance is free. Those who enjoy and appreciate big rigs may consider attending the Sweet Corn Classic at the Dallas County Fairgrounds north parking lot on Saturday from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. All truck classes are welcome.

The Adel Public Library will host a book

sale in conjunction with the Sweet Corn Festival. Early bird pricing begins Wednesday, Aug. 6 from 5-8 p.m. with a \$5 admission fee. The sale will continue Thursday through Saturday with free admission and a variety of books for all ages. Books can be purchased for a freewill donation, and all proceeds support library programs and services.

Craft and merchandise vendors will line the streets along Ninth and Main streets offering their best and creative wares for purchase. From savory corn dishes to sweet treats, ethnic cuisine to fruity teas and beverages, a variety of food vendors can be found along both sides of Main Street between Ninth and 11th streets, and informational vendors will be located along the west side of Ninth Street.

Festival attendees who want a lasting way to remember their time at the Sweet Corn Festival will be able to stop in at the Adel Partners Chamber of Commerce booth and purchase a T-shirt for \$20. The chamber is also launching "Bridge us Back" — a campaign to raise funds needed to restore access to the lighted bridge. A portion of the proceeds from the Sweet Corn Festival will go to the Lighted Bridge fund. The community is invited to bring a "Shuck Yeah" attitude and generous spirit.

"This year, we are planning to unveil a commemorative plaque for Kenny Chapman — a lifelong icon and pillar of the Adel community," Milroy says. "We are so appreciative of his contributions to personally engineer the corn cooker and helping to establish the Adel Sweet Corn Festival as a cherished and highly attended tradition and festival. We're in the final design phase for this and will be excited to share more during the festival."

"We have many of the familiar events still happening throughout the festival," Milroy shares. "We encourage visitors to stop in to support Adel and our community's ability to deliver this festival free of charge. Finally, we'll be asking visitors to cast their kernel on some future ideas that are in the works for the community events.

"What I'm most looking forward to is seeing the joy in our participants — and witnessing the community spirit alive in every smile as we come together to celebrate our 46th annual Sweet Corn Festival."

ROCK the Block revitalizes homes

Habitat for Humanity provides repairs.

Adel homeowners in the Kinnick-Feller Riverside Park area interested in having home repairs done for free can apply to the Dallas County Habitat for Humanity's Rock the Block program, a three-day, volunteer-led home preservation event set for Aug. 27-29.

The event partners with homeowners to complete critical home repairs, accessibility modifications and aging-in-place updates. It is an opportunity to revitalize both homes and neighborhoods while helping residents maintain their properties.

Through Rock the Block, volunteers will work on exterior-focused projects - such as constructing or replacing ramps, painting, repairing gutters, and cleaning up yards — at no cost to the homeowner. Participants may also qualify for additional assistance with interior repairs to be completed after the event.

"Here at Dallas County Habitat for Humanity, we understand the hard work that goes into homeownership and into maintaining a home," Lindsey Rawson Van Wyk, community partnership coordinator for the Dallas County Habitat for Humanity, says. "We know the stability and benefits of homeownership, and we are committed to offering the Adel community a hand-up, not a hand-out, to support homeownership."

Rock the Block is currently accepting and reviewing applications from Adel homeowners. Interested residents can contact Rawson Van Wyk at Irawsonvanwyk@gdmhabitat.org.

In addition to the home preservation work, Rock the Block is partnering with the city of Adel Parks and Recreation to complete a community space project, replacing the underpinning and mulch in Evans Park and installing a new play structure.

Various levels of sponsorship are available for Rock the Block. Interested businesses can reach out to Rawson Van Wyk for more information.

"This is an event for Adel, by Adel, and we would like to feature as many Adel businesses and partners as possible," she says.

Volunteer opportunities are also available. "Volunteering with Rock the Block is a great way to make a visible impact directly

on a homeowner and in your community," Rawson Van Wyk says. "There is nothing like the feeling of accomplishment from swinging a hammer or sloshing a paint brush around and, at the end of the day, being able to see your

hard work.

"For the weeks and months to come, as you drive by the neighborhood, you will be able to see the benefit of your labor in action," she adds.

That's when Rowe has more quality time with her two young boys, filling their days with pool trips, library programs, zoo outings, movie nights and more.

Rowe's oldest son attends the same school where she teaches, which she has enjoyed.

"I've been able to peek in on him, get to know his friends, and embarrass him in the hallways," she shares. "Soon, my youngest will be at Meadow View."

And, with that, Rowe's family tradition in ADM continues. ■

NO DAYS off

"No days off."

Have you ever heard this phrase? Generally, "no days off" is meant to inspire or encourage someone to keep working hard and to stay committed to a particular



goal, oftentimes a physical or athletic accomplishment. To commit to something every day of your life is truly an investment and speaks volumes about one's priorities. In 2021, Barna research group reported that only 16% of American adults read the Bible most days of the week. It follows that the percentage who read it every day is less. It should be noted that not all Americans are Christians, thus I would hope the percentage of American Christians who read the Bible most days of the week would be higher.

I find myself wondering why Christians don't take a "no days off" mentality to spending time in God's word. I think it's indicative of one's life priorities. We will naturally commit the most time and effort to those things which we believe will bring the most reward. If Christians aren't reading their Bible, it's either because they don't understand or fully believe in the power of God's word or it's because their relationship with God isn't high enough on the priority list.

Like many things in life, reading the Bible comes naturally and easily sometimes, and, at other times, it's harder. For this reason, we call scripture reading a spiritual discipline, and, not unlike weightlifting or running or practicing an instrument, it can be hard sometimes. Taking "no days off" requires discipline and resolve, and it's so worth it. Commitment to reading God's word will grow our faith and will encourage us in our walk with Jesus. As we keep our eyes on the Lord and trust him to be faithful, he will not disappoint us.

This is something we'll be talking about at high school and middle school youth group this year — the power of God's word. We will be challenging students to spend time every day in the Bible and to pray for God to minister to them and to teach them. I'm excited to hear the stories of God's faithfulness in their lives. Hebrews 4:12 reminds us that God's word is living and active. This truth serves as a promise that, as we commit to the study of God's word, it will change us, and it will give us life. What a tremendous promise. Will you join our youth this fall and take "no days off" from studying God's word? ■

SWEET CORN Festival's early years

Darold Snow, president of the Adel Chamber of Commerce, proposed that Adel establish an annual event comparable in prominence to Winterset's Covered Bridge Festival and Pella's Tulip Festival. Inspired by this vision, the inaugural Sweet Corn Festival was scheduled for Saturday, Aug. 9, 1980, from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., to be held on the courthouse square. Snow announced that home-grown sweet corn would be boiled and sold for 5 cents per ear at the festival, featuring music from the Wild Bunch, a tug of war, various games, art and craft displays, and booths by local businesses. Ten acres of corn, grown on land provided by Bob Fuller and tended by Ted Van Fossen and Jay Dwight Brown, were harvested for the event. Snow explained the goal was to thank locals with an affordable day of fun. About 2,000 people attended the first festival. The sweet corn was given out for free.

The following year, 1981, the second festival was held. There was an appearance by the Life Flight helicopter, and "Maximillian's Journeys," a film journey up the Mississippi River, was shown. Kenny Chapman easily won the cow chip toss.

1982 saw the addition of water fights. A group of farmers defeated both the Lions and Rotary clubs to take the local honors. Teams from as far away as Mt. Ayr and Council Bluffs competed in the fire department competition.

The fourth annual festival entertained the largest crowd ever. One-and-a-half tons of corn were served.

For 1984, the Scottish Heritage Bagpipe Band entertained another record crowd. Linda Chapman, chair of the event, announced that the number of booths had doubled from the previous year.

The 1985 event featured the first Sweet Corn Festival parade, with more than 85 entrants. A crowd of more than 2,000 consumed 2.5 tons of sweet corn that year. Also new was a nighttime fireworks display.

New for 1986 was mud volleyball. Three tons of free buttery sweet corn were consumed at that year's event. The parade lined up at the elementary school and travelled down Main Street.


In 1987, the festival continued to expand, featuring more art and craft booths, activities, an antique car display, and a tug-of-war contest. Notably, a beer garden and street dance were introduced after regular events (to preserve the family-friendly atmosphere). A new corn cooker was built by Ken Chapman and used stainless steel components. Attendance was expected to reach 8,000, with 3.75 tons of corn served.

The ninth annual festival (1988) added a pie baking competition and auction as well as a cook-off contest. The state was suffering from drought, but the four tons of corn for this year's event arrived from northern Iowa without an issue.

This popular event continues to grow and has become one of the premier festivals in Iowa. The 46th Sweet Corn Festival will be held Saturday, Aug. 9. Seven tons of sweet corn (now supplied locally by Deardorff Farms) is expected to be served.





PHARMACY — new and improved

An updated Iowa Pharmacy Practice Act, passed by the legislature in 2024, is now in effect. It greatly modernizes the regulation of pharmacy in the state. Instead of rigid rules that list exactly what pharmacists can and can't do, it now uses a "standard of care" model, meaning pharmacists are trusted to use their professional judgment, just like doctors and



Here's what that means in everyday terms:

Pharmacists are now officially considered practitioners, which allows them to prescribe medications and make therapeutic substitutions (like switching to a similar drug that's more affordable or covered by insurance).

They no longer need special permission for every new service or technology, as long as it's safe and within their training.

Tele-pharmacy rules were relaxed, making it easier for rural areas to access pharmacy services.

The law removes outdated "bright line" rules that were overly specific and restrictive, giving pharmacists more flexibility to provide direct care to

The goal is to make pharmacy care more responsive, efficient and patient-centered — without compromising safety. Pharmacists are developing new clinical services they can now perform right in your pharmacy. It's a big win for patient access to care, especially in underserved communities.

Q: What is benign paroxysmal positional vertigo?

A: BPPV is a problem in the inner ear that gives the sensation of the room spinning when a person changes their head or body position. Often, BPPV is accompanied by nausea and/or vomiting. One of the most common complaints is dizziness with rolling over, sitting up, bending forward or looking up. However, BPPV symptoms can occur with any motion of the head or a change in body position. The dizziness "spells" usually last for a minute



or less, but they can also be persistent. BPPV stems from a problem of floating "debris" in one or more of the three canals in the inner ear. A physical therapist is able to diagnose which canal is problematic and then treat the dizziness with a series of repositioning movements to rid the inner ear of the floating debris. If repositioning is successful, dizziness can be fully resolved. The longer the vertigo is present without treatment, the more treatments may be needed to improve the symptoms, and, once a person has had one episode of BPPV, they are 30% more likely to have a reoccurrence.

NAME, Image and Likeness: The House Settlement

The NCAA and the Power 5 conferences agreed to a settlement that was finalized in June. The House Settlement provides universities to a) provide monetary payments to current Division I athletes: b) participate in revenue sharing; and c) adhere to mandatory roster limits.



Schools are now allowed to pay student athletes for being a student-athlete. Schools can pay up to 22% of the average annual revenue of all participating institutions, which is estimated at \$20.5 million for 2025 (which will increase in successive years). Each school has discretion on which athletes to pay and how much those athletes will receive.

The House Settlement mandates certain roster limits for each sport but provides that schools no longer have scholarship limits moving forward. For example, Iowa Hawkeye football had a roster of about 130 players last year but could only give 85 scholarships. For the 2026-27 school year, football teams are limited to having

a roster of 105 players. However, schools may now provide, but are not mandated to provide, every student-athlete on the football team with a

The House Settlement also requires the establishment of the College Sports Commission (CSC), which will be responsible for enforcing revenue sharing and third-party NIL deals. The CSC will manage NIL Go, which will be responsible for evaluating third-party NIL deals. NIL Go will evaluate NIL agreements over \$600 to ensure the deals are based on fair market value (FMV) standard. This is meant to curtail a collective from paying a student-athlete compensation that is clearly above fair market value consideration. An example of such a thirdparty deal might be a car dealership paying a student-athlete \$25,000 to show up and sign autographs for two hours. An exception to that example might be if that student-athlete was the next Caitlin Clark. In that case, \$25,000 in compensation could be deemed a FMV for such an appearance.

The House Settlement has been seen as a net positive for student-athletes as it opens the door for more compensation. However, the mandated

roster limits have already forced teams like Iowa Hawkeye football to cut approximately 30 players from its roster. Many commentators wished that the roster limits at a minimum would have been phased in over time to allow walk-on athletes to remain on the team throughout their collegiate career. This settlement also puts more financial pressure on the schools themselves as most schools are planning to pay out the maximum revenue sharing of \$20.5 million. If schools decide not to max out the revenue sharing to student-athletes, those schools will be operating at a competitive disadvantage.

There have already been lawsuits filed in response to these new rules stemming from the House Settlement, and more legal actions should be expected. Lawsuits will raise questions such as limiting student-athletes' compensation, adverse effects from athletes being cut due to roster limits, and Title IX gender issues. President Trump has also reportedly considered issuing an Executive Order which would limit payments to athletes. In short, this ain't over yet... stay tuned. ■

Lately, I've been hooked on chicken salad — making a fresh batch every week for quick, satisfying lunches and the occasional no-fuss dinner. An inspiration to the community

The Adel Sweet Corn Festival boasts a longstanding tradition of offering free sweet corn during its annual festival.

This year, the Adel Partners Chamber of Commerce added a new feature: the Kernel Kid. The Kernel Kid is an honorary title given to an ADM student who has made a positive impact in the Adel community.

Kid is 7-year-old Sage Young of Adel. Sage is currently one of five brand ambassadors for St. Baldrick's Foundation. St. Baldrick's Foundation is the largest charity funder of childhood cancer research grants.

Sage, along with his parents, Betsey and Forrest Young, explain how they became involved. Sage was diagnosed at age 4 with acute lymphoblastic leukemia B cell cancer. He began cancer treatments shortly after he was diagnosed, which continued for three and a half years.

During that time, clinical trials helped to produce new drugs and treatments and were available to other children with the same cancers, cutting a year off of the children's cancer treatment.

Betsey says, "The clinical trials were staggering. It's pretty cool to see what cancer research can do and why it's so important."

Sage "rang the bell" on May 7, 2025, signifying his cancer treatment was complete. Throughout his cancer journey, the Youngs also established a non-profit, Building Brave Teams. It supports local kids in their cancer journey by providing care packages and support for both parents and their child. Betsey includes two of the children's books she wrote about families facing a cancer diagnosis.

The Youngs have been fundraising and attending head-shaving events, where attendees pledge to give money to St. Baldrick's.

They've also traveled to Washington D.C. twice to meet with lawmakers to ensure that funding for pediatric research continues and doctors remain in rural areas.

Betsey says she wants to give back and help other families who may be suffering due to their child's cancer diagnosis.

"I want to advocate and make sure research is available for the next kid," she reflects. "I knew there was a bigger meaning to Sage's diagnosis. We want to spread awareness."

During the Sweet Corn Festival shucking on Friday evening, Sage will be on hand to shuck the first ear of corn. Then, he will ride in the parade route right behind the mayor, signifying he's the Kernel Kid.

"It's super exciting for Sage to have this honor, and it motivates kids to get that recognition," she says.


