

SAVORING THE SWEET CORN FESTIVAL AUG. 8-9

Another trip around the sun has brought the community back to the Sweet Corn Festival, a favorite time of year for Dallas County residents. The 46th annual Sweet Corn Festival will take place Aug. 8-9.

Pre-festival activities kicked off on Thursday, Aug. 7, with the ADM Alumni Golf Tournament, a twoday event to be held at River Valley Golf Course. Proceeds help support the ADM Alumni Association. On Friday, Aug. 8, the Sweet Corn Festival kicks off with shucking of the corn at 4:30 p.m. in the parking lot at 10th and Prairie.

Event planners anticipate nearly seven tons of corn will be eaten Saturday by festival attendees, and everyone is invited to join in the fun. A new addition to the festival this year is Kernel Kid, an honor bestowed on a local child



who has made a positive impact on the community. The recipient of the Kernel Kid award will be introduced around 4:30 p.m. Friday. Yard games will be available for the enjoyment of all festival visitors at the Raccoon Valley Bank stage and pavilion. Round off Friday evening with the corn dive at Adel Family Aquatic Center at 6 p.m.

Early risers can join in the Sweet Corn 5K Run/ Walk at 7:30 a.m. Saturday morning. Beat the heat and join the excitement of the parade at

9:30 a.m. The parade route will run from 18th Street and Main Street to 11th Street, travel from 11th Street to Prairie Street, then on to finish at 14th Street. Parade line-up will begin at 8:30 a.m. along Brickyard Road, and all entries must be

'I SEE NOTHING!'

I spent way too much time on the living room floor in front of our Magnavox console TV set when I was a child, much like how kids today spend too much time on their phones. For me, it was an after-school ritual where I connected with "The Floppy Show," "Speed Racer" and "The Electric Company." Sometimes, my older brother would join. Other times, I would watch with friends. But, typically, I simply viewed the shows by myself for a couple of hours in peace and quiet before supper was served. This didn't happen every day, mind you. I did have lawns to mow, football games to play and homework to do, but I was clearly fascinated with TV.

During that time, I was also introduced to a number of TV shows that were no longer airing in prime time but could be seen in syndication on weekday afternoons. I learned from Bobby what happens when you put too much soap in the washing machine on "The Brady Bunch." I discovered how dangerous quicksand could be on "Gilligan's Island." And I came to know what a "cement pond" and the "fancy eating table" were from "The

Beverly Hillbillies."

But the one show I truly looked forward to was "Hogan's Heroes." Yes, this sitcom that was set in a prisoner-of-war

(POW) camp in Nazi Germany during World War II doesn't hardly seem like something that would catch the attention of a kid in the 1970s, but it sure did

The show, which originally ran for six seasons, was about a group of Allied prisoners who use the POW camp as an operations base for sabotage and espionage activities directed against Nazi Germany. But, it was more than that. Somehow, the show's creators took one of the world's most serious of subjects and made it funny. The cast of heroes showed a dedication to their cause while we laughed at the incompetence of the German leaders. Hogan. LeBeau. Newkirk, Kinch, Carter, The show was clearly never made to entertain kids, but it did, at least this one.

One by one, the actors who portrayed the stars of the show met their own demise, including the aforementioned as well as the ones who played Klink, Schultz, Burkhalter and Hochstetter. (An interesting side note — these four actors who portrayed the German officers were all Jewish.)

The only remaining cast member who was still alive passed away recently. His name was Kenneth Washington, and he played U.S. Sergeant Richard Baker in season six, assuming the duties of Sergeant Kinchloe (Kinch) after Ivan Dixon left the series. Washington was 89.

I can't help but wonder if any TV shows in the recent era would have the same impact on kids today as "Hogan's Heroes" did on me and, likely, many of you. I can't name one, certainly not from broadcast TV. How about you? Have a TV show that continues to connect with you, from past or present? Send me a note and let me know.

LEMON CHICKEN SPAGHETTI

Recipe courtesy of "Cookin' Savvy" Servings: 4-6

Ingredients:

- 1 pound spaghetti noodles
- 2 chicken breasts
- 1/2 cup flour
- 2 tablespoons lemon pepper
- 1/2 cup avocado oil
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 1/2 cup heavy cream
- 1/2 cup Parmesan cheese
- 1 tablespoon onion powder
- · salt, to taste
- pepper, to taste
- 1 teaspoon lemon pepper (optional)

Directions:

 Cook noodles according to package instructions.
 Cut chicken into bite-sized pieces.



- In bowl, mix flour and lemon pepper. Mix chicken in flour until evenly coated.
- In skillet over medium heat, add oil and butter. Add chicken and fry until golden brown. Remove from skillet and set aside.
- Empty skillet but don't wipe clean. Add chicken broth and,
- using spoon, stir bits from chicken over medium heat. Add heavy cream, Parmesan cheese and onion powder. Season with salt and pepper, to taste. Add lemon powder, if desired. Stir until well combined then add chicken.
- Serve over cooked noodles or mix noodles into skillet.

After the parade, festivalgoers are invited to grab some of Adel's famous Deardorff sweet corn. The nearly 15,000 ears of corn is a gift free of charge from the Adel Partners Chamber, and it is said to run out quickly, so those interested are encouraged to show up early for the golden goodness.

Enjoy local talents of all kinds throughout the day on Saturday. The Southern Comfort Band will perform from 11:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Raccoon Valley Bank Stage and Pavilion, and Let's Dance, Adel Tumbling & Dance and Noted Studios will perform at noon, 1 p.m. and 2:30 p.m. at the Dallas County Courthouse lawn. Looza Palooza, a local student band. will share its musical talents at the Raccoon Valley Bank Stage from 4-5:30 p.m. JJ & The Boys will round out the music for the night at the Raccoon Valley Bank Stage from 7:30-11:30 p.m. In addition, Raccoon Valley Radio, KKRF 107.9, will be broadcasting live from the festival. Families and individuals can join in the fun and display their skills in a bags tournament, hosted by St.

John's Catholic Church, from 11:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the ADM District Administration Center. Tournament entry is \$30 per team, and registration begins at 10:30 a.m. Proceeds from the tournament support the St. John's Youth Organization. A Kids' Zone, sponsored by The Garlick Team, will welcome kids to jump, tumble and play on a variety of inflatables between noon and 4 p.m. in the parking lot of Raccoon Valley Bank. Round out the night by joining the street party on the corner of 10th Street between Court Street and Main Street on Saturday from 6:30 p.m. to midnight.

Redline Warriors presents the Sweet Corn Car Show Saturday morning. Cruise-in time is from 10 a.m. to noon with showtime between noon and 4 p.m. Cars will be lined up along Court Street, and all makes and models are invited to come show off. Attendance is free. Those who enjoy and appreciate big rigs may consider attending the Sweet Corn Classic at the Dallas County Fairgrounds north parking lot on Saturday from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. All truck classes are welcome.

The Adel Public Library will host a book sale in conjunction with the Sweet Corn Festival. Books can be purchased for a freewill donation, and all proceeds support library programs and services.

Craft and merchandise vendors will line the streets along Ninth and Main streets offering their best and creative wares for purchase. From savory corn dishes to sweet treats, ethnic cuisine to fruity teas and beverages, a variety of food vendors can be found along both sides of Main Street between Ninth and 11th streets, and informational vendors will be located along the west side of Ninth Street.

Festival attendees who want a lasting way to remember their time at the Sweet Corn Festival will be able to stop in at the Adel Partners Chamber of Commerce booth and purchase a T-shirt for \$20. The chamber is also launching "Bridge us Back" — a campaign to raise funds needed to restore access to the lighted bridge. A portion of the proceeds from the Sweet Corn Festival will go to the Lighted Bridge fund. The community is invited to bring a "Shuck Yeah" attitude and generous spirit. The chamber is also asking visitors to cast their kernel on some future ideas that are in the works for the community events.
