






Taking a teenager skater bedroom and turning it into a nursery required some thought for the Hinders family.



The Jobe and Sydney Hinders family moved into their home in April 2021. They knew before they purchased it there would be aspects of the home they would want to improve or change all together.





"We started with the basics like painting and decorating to make it our own, but we had much bigger plans in mind for the future," Jobe says. "These bigger projects included finishing our basement, building a nursery and adding some major curb appeal to our unsightly exterior."

Jobe had just started a small construction company called We Do Redo, so it was mostly a DIY project to build his business profile. When it came to tasks he was uncertain about, he used his construction connections to gather



information and ask advice.

ASAP Concrete provided him with the tools and insight necessary to excavate the basement, add drainage tile around the perimeter, and pour the concrete back to finish the floor. Lawrence Construction relocated the water heater, ran all new water lines, and roughed in the electrical and plumbing.

"We roughed in the entire basement, but we only finalized the bedroom for the time being. It was essential to finish the bedroom, as we're expecting a new bundle of joy and needed to create more space for our family. Upon completion of the basement bedroom, we set our sights on renovating a bedroom upstairs into a nursery."

They had a blast rebuilding and designing the nursery for their little girl, he says. Though he flew by the seat of his pants with the basement project, his wife was the one with the vision for the nursery: boho chic. Once completed, it became their favorite room in the house.

The Hinders family also added landscaping around the home in a three-phase process. They constructed raised terraces around the

perimeter to help with water drainage, added a large mulch bed and rock patio to address issues they had with dead spots in the yard, and installed a small playset, hammock and two rope swings for their boys. They also built a chipping and putting green to cover the last bit of mud in the yard, added landscaping around it, and built a fence for the pups to enjoy some free time outdoors.

"It's safe to say, we are extremely happy with the way things turned out and look forward to continuing to finish the remainder of the basement," Jobe says. "We can't believe the difference this has made in actually enjoying our space."

Main floor makeover

Dave and Joann Leto moved into their home in December 2020. They bought the home knowing there were a lot of things they wanted to change and update.

"As we were looking at the home and deciding whether we were going to make an offer, we asked our contractor, Chris Mortale, to walk through the home with us to provide his professional opinion on the house and to

talk through some things we would like to do if we were the owners. Having him provide his input — especially in making sure the home was quality built — was an important part of the process for us."

In the five years since they have owned the house, they have done quite a bit to change its look and feel, touching much of it inside and out. They painted all the interior woodwork, including the doors and trim, and painted all the walls and ceilings. They removed a double-sided fireplace between the kitchen and living room to open the home and installed a new built-in gas fireplace, custom cabinets and floating shelves in the living room.

In the kitchen, they painted the cabinets, installed new quartz countertops and a tile backsplash, and added a coffee bar. They updated the half bathroom on the main level with new sink and toilet, and added storage, a new cabinet with sink, and changed the overall layout of the mudroom and laundry area.

They added new light fixtures, ceiling fans, and can lights throughout main level of the home. In the sunroom, they added two large windows and a sliding door. Outdoors, they

added a covered deck off the sunroom, a sliding door to the walk-out basement and updated the small deck off the mud room. The front porch received a new stone veneer, and they updated two garage doors.

They had worked with Mortale on their previous home, so it was an easy choice to enlist





his help in the new home. Though the Letos had a lot of ideas for their house, they found working with a professional improved on their own plans.





LEADERSHIP program graduates 2 local longterm care professionals

Fourteen professionals from long-term care organizations across Iowa have completed a year-long executive leadership program through the Iowa Health Care Association (IHCA), designed to strengthen leadership in nursing homes, assisted living programs, care continuum and home care settings. Included were Karla Bicknell and Dawn Hannum, both of whom work at Kennybrook Village in Grimes.

The 2024-2025 Executive Health Care Leadership Institute wrapped up in July with a graduation ceremony and final project presentations in West Des Moines. The program helps rising leaders in long-term care develop key skills in management, communication, workforce development and quality improvement, while fostering confidence and collaboration across care settings.

"This program supports the next generation of long-term care leaders who are committed to delivering high-quality care for older Iowans," said IHCA Vice President of Regulatory Affairs Brenda Irlbeck. "Each graduate brings new energy, insight and dedication to our field. Their impact will be felt in communities across the state."

Throughout the year, participants took part in both virtual and in-person sessions covering topics such as mission-driven leadership, building trust within teams and leading quality improvement projects. ■

Gena Pierce just completed her 14th year at Dallas Center Grimes, and this year begins her 12th year teaching transitional kindergarten at the district. The program is for children who are old enough to attend kindergarten but may need another year to grow academically or socially to be developmentally ready for traditional kindergarten. The class works on social skills, classroom routines, and academics based on Iowa Core at the kindergarten level, but at a slower pace.

Any student needing more confidence in any area could benefit from this extra year. Classes are smaller, allowing for more personalized instruction. Students are encouraged to reach the high expectations Pierce has for them with lots of support.

"Being 5 doesn't guarantee that a student is automatically ready for kindergarten. Every child develops at their own pace and aren't necessarily ready just because they hit a certain age," Pierce says, adding that she enjoys getting to know each child, what they are interested in, and what motivates them to enjoy learning.

"Seeing a student arrive with a big grin on their face and ready to learn is the best feeling in the world," she says. "I love the hugs when they feel supported and cared about as well as the times when they teach me something new. I also enjoy a high five or knuckles when they have completed a difficult task or accomplished a goal they have been working on."

Her little learners have fun while working on developing new skills. In the second half of the year, themed dress-up days are held. In April, wind-up chicken races included any teacher who walked by. The students cheered for one another as they worked on good sportsmanship.

School should be a time of growth both academically and socially, Pierce says, adding that students are learning what is appropriate for their age. With her support, they are encouraged to try to learn new ideas with a

HIGHLIGHTS of the One Big Beautiful Bill Act

The One Big Beautiful Bill Act (OBBBA) introduces major updates that impact nearly everyone. The law makes permanent updates to key provisions of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act while adding new ways



to save for education, retirement and long-term financial security. Some key takeaways are:

Tax provisions from TCJA made permanent: Without the OBBBA, the following would have expired in tax year 2025: Lower individual income tax rates extended with no expiration. Increased standard deductions.

For families and education: Child Tax Credit: Permanently extended with a maximum of \$2,200 per child beginning in 2025. Child & Dependent Care Credit: Expanded from 35% to 50% of qualifying expenses with a floor of 20%. Starter IRAs for children (under 18 and not working): \$1,000 government

contribution at birth (born in 2025); up to \$5,000 in annual contributions allowed; withdrawals restricted until age 18, then follow Traditional IRA rules. 529 Education Savings Plans: Expanded to cover up to \$20,000 from \$10,000 per year in K-12 expenses, apprenticeship programs, educational therapy and post-secondary certifications.

For retirees and older adults: Enhanced standard deduction in addition to existing standard deduction through 2029 for those 65-plus: \$6,000 for single filers and \$12,000 for joint filers.

For working adults: Temporary deductions for tax years 2025-2028 for tipped workers and those eligible for overtime pay. May deduct qualified tips received in occupations that are listed by the IRS as "customarily and regularly receiving tips." May deduct the overtime pay that exceeds their regular rate of pay. Deductions are subject to income phaseouts and caps: deduction cap: \$12,500 (single) or \$25,000 (married), phaseout: \$150,000 (single) or \$300,000 (married).

For all taxpayers: SALT (state and local tax) deduction increased from \$10,000 to \$40,000 through 2029. Estate and gift tax exclusions rise in 2026 to \$15 million per individual/\$30 million per couple.

The OBBBA creates new opportunities to reduce taxes, save more effectively for education and retirement, and distribute wealth to future generations. MEET Katy Forsythe

One of 30 middle and high school educators selected to attend C-SPAN conference

Katy Forsythe, a social studies teacher at DCG, attended C-SPAN's Summer Educators' Conference. The conference is designed to educate teachers about the network's resources and how to incorporate the materials into their teaching practices. Forsythe was one of 30 middle and high school educators from across the nation selected to attend the conference in July.

The conference provides educators with the opportunity to explore the free curricular offerings available digitally by C-SPAN

Classroom, including lesson plans, bell ringers, current events videos, Classroom Deliberations, On This Day in History events, Constitution Clips and StudentCam, C-SPAN's annual documentary competition for students in grades 6-12. Participants also heard from speakers and discovered how to search, clip and share videos from 300,000 hours in C-SPAN's Video Library as they work to create engaging learning experiences for their students.

"I heard about this conference through other members of my graduate program," Forsythe says. "Applications open mid-February and center around how applicants envision their students benefitting from the conference. While in Washington, D.C., we had the opportunity to tour C-SPAN's studios, the U.S Capitol, and visit The People's House Interactive Experience. I am especially excited to tell my students about C-SPAN's StudentCam Documentary Competition."

Forsythe started her career student teaching at DCG High School in the spring of 2019 and then taught eighth-grade American history for five years at Norwalk before returning to the district. She graduated from Drake University with a bachelor's degree in secondary education and endorsements in all social studies and talented and gifted. She begins her second year teaching western civilization and American government at DCG high school this fall.

"I love getting to work with kids who are beginning and ending their high school experiences," she says. "There is a lot of space for growth during such big transitions. I appreciate the level of support teachers here receive from other staff, administrators and the community."

In addition to teaching, Forsythe is also beginning work to support Mount Vernon's GWTI250, a nation-wide teacher professional development program, for 2026. Mount Vernon is known for its summer residential program, the George Washington Teacher Institute, so she is looking to expand access to a shortened version of the learning experience by bringing it closer to home for fellow Iowa teachers.

"Educators: Look for a GWTI250 workshop coming to Iowa next year," she says. ■

529 Flexibility

Many of us are familiar with the benefits of establishing a 529 plan for our children and/or grandchildren in hopes of having a way to fund the costs of college in the future. The new tax law has increased the flexibility of the 529 plan. This is great news, especially for folks who have funded a 529 plan for a child, later to learn the child has developed a disability and will likely not be going to college. Not to fret. There are a few more options now available.



One feature of a 529 plan is that the money in the plan does not count as an asset for the person with the disability, so it has no effect on his or her eligibility for government

In lieu of paying for college tuition, dorm fees, books, etc., here are some additional thoughts:

Maybe college is not in the cards, but a trade school is? Welding, mechanics, cosmetology, getting a CDL, and various other types of "trade" education are now qualified expenses.

K-12 allowed expenses, including textbooks, workbooks, digital learning tools and other devices, tutoring services, online education options, and "educational therapies," which appears to have an expanding definition, are expanded to \$20,000 per year (starting in 2026).

Money can move from the 529 plan to an IABLE account (which is also a type of 529 plan) without penalty or tax consequences. From there, money can be used to pay for nearly anything the person might want or need, without tax or penalty. (There is an annual limit to how much an IABLE account can receive in a calendar year, and if the account grows to over \$100,000, there will be a Medicaid

Additional things to keep in mind:


In some cases, the beneficiary must meet the legal definition of disabled.

There are specific rules associated with each different category of expense, and you should visit with a knowledgeable advisor before taking a distribution from a 529 plan.

Money left in a 529 plan at the death of the beneficiary is NOT subject to estate recovery for government benefits paid on behalf of a person with a disability and CAN be transferred to another qualified beneficiary. Win win.

Money left in an IABLE account cannot be withdrawn and distributed to anyone else. Generally, it stays in the plan to benefit others who have a disability.




