

# ADEL ROTARY RECOGNIZES WORLD POLIO DAY

Rotary international established World Polio Day on Oct. 24 to commemorate the birth of Jonas Salk, who led the first team to develop a vaccine against poliomyelitis. Use of the inactivated poliomyelitis vaccine and subsequent widespread use of the oral vaccine developed by Albert Sabin led to the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) in 1988, reducing worldwide polio by 99%.

Led by the World Health Organization, the GPEI is the largest international public health initiative in history. Its partners include RI, the CDC, UNICEF and the Gates Foundation. Rotary International is responsible for fundraising, advocacy and volunteer recruitment. The strategy for eradicating polio is to immunize every at-risk child until there is no one left for the disease to transmit to, and the disease eventually dies out.

Adel Rotary is supporting the efforts of the GPEI by creating a fun event, a Football Pool to pick the winners of 10 college football games each week of the season. Rotarians contribute to the Rotary Foundation's Polio Plus Campaign to participate in hopes of coming out on top to take possession of the traveling mini-football and proudly inscribing their name.

- Heat oven to 350 F.
- Brown ground beef with taco seasoning.
- Cut tortillas in half then in half again, making four pieces.
   Place two pieces in each hole of muffin tin. Place browned ground beef in each hole then top with shredded cheese. Bake 15 minutes, or



until tortillas reach desired crispiness.

 Using knife, shred lettuce and cilantro. Top each cup with sour cream, salsa, lettuce and cilantro, as desired. Add guacamole and olives, if desired.
