For high school social studies teacher Jess Larison, teaching is all about the students.

"You never know what you are going to get from high school students," he says. "Sometimes they make you laugh, and sometimes they make you want to pull your hair out, but, at the end of the day, I am always left knowing that I am building positive relationships with students, and that makes my heart smile."

This year marks Larison's third year teaching history at Winterset

High School and his seventh year teaching overall. He's currently pursuing a master's degree in history teaching from Northwestern College, which takes up much of his time outside the classroom.

"I am excited about what I am learning and what it will — and already has — added to my teaching," he shares. "It may also mean some exciting new history course offerings at Winterset High School, which I am looking forward to."

Larison was drawn to teaching by his mother, who taught for more than 40 years, and his sister, who is eight years older.


"They both inspired me to go into teaching as I got to see firsthand how their hard work translated into a positive influence in the world and personal satisfaction in knowing they were making a difference," Larison says. "I knew that I wanted to have an impact in the community I lived in, and teaching opens so many opportunities to do that."

He sees that potential shine in Winterset specifically. Initially, Larison was attracted to the district because of its size and location, but he was truly sold by its dedication to developing teachers and fearlessness in trying new initiatives that benefit students.

"Seeing Winterset schools dedicate themselves to Capturing Kids Hearts, Portrait of a Graduate and Authentic Learning demonstrated to me that the district had a student-first orientation and had their minds set on the right things," he says. "I feel like being in this district and working on these initiatives has helped make me a better teacher, and I have personally seen how they help students to grow."

As the school year continues, Larison looks forward to applying some of what he's learning in his master's courses to the Portrait of a Graduate

"In my research methods course, we discussed 'public history' and how to apply it in the classroom, and I think there are some strong overlaps with the skills we teach with Portrait of a Graduate," Larison explains. "I am excited to look for new ways to engage students with history in their lives and community and find ways to get them out in the community researching and presenting what they are learning about the past and how it informs our present." ■

Tires aren't something you frequently purchase, so it's understandable if you are confused by the array of brands, sizes and tire types to choose from. However, a little knowledge and a trusted advisor can make the process a breeze. First, you must identify the proper size tire for your vehicle.



# **HAIR** and nutrition

# **SIMPLE** eating hacks to reach health goals

'Tis the season for family, friends and food. This is the time of the year when the "diet" gets kicked to the curb as we prepare for our favorite recipes and load up on sweet treats because, after all... it's that time of the year. Before you pull out your sweats for the rest of the month and brace yourself to gain 10 pounds that you swear you will lose in January, be encouraged that there are a few "hacks" you can consider as you prepare for the festivities that this season brings.



**Hack 1:** Eat your foods in the right order. Fiber first, then protein and starch/sugary food last. You don't have to completely cut carbs from your diet. But a simple hack to avoid a sugar spike is to frontload your carbs with fiber (aka veggies). Want to go above and beyond? Start your meal with a salad topped with a vinegarette dressing.

Hack #2: Pair your carbs with protein (and be sure to eat your protein first). Before you load up on the mashed potatoes, stuffing and dessert, eat your protein. And, if you're really serious, eat a vegetable or a salad before you even eat your protein. Consider eating an egg or two 20 minutes before eating your big meal. By the time you get to dessert, a couple bites will be all it takes to satisfy that sugar craving... and you won't experience the yucky side effects later. ■

# **CANDY** and cavities: Minimize the risk

For most kids, Halloween is the high point of the year for collecting candy. It also can be a scary time for teeth and gums. Sweet, sour and sticky candies can damage your child's oral health. Study results have shown that eating candy more than once per week can increase the risk of developing cavities. Snacking on candy between meals and before bedtime greatly increases the development of cavities.



It is not just eating candy that raises the risk of developing cavities. The amount of time teeth are exposed to sugar can also affect development of cavities. Sticky candies and candies your child suck on for long periods can cause problems. Because they are high in acid, sour candies can soften enamel. Just like cavities, the risk of developing tooth erosion is increased through long exposure to sour candies. Researchers found that 5-year-old children with tooth erosion were five times more likely to have erosion in their permanent teeth. The packaging on some of these candies can be misleading. A survey of candies labeled as "tooth

friendly," "sugar-free for healthy teeth," or "kind to teeth" may have less sugar, but they still may be acidic.

Gums sweetened with xylitol or sorbitol can help reduce the risk of developing cavities. Chewing sugar-free gum increases saliva. Saliva helps stop acid attacks on the teeth. Researchers have found that chewing gum sweetened with xylitol reduced plaque by 15%. In many cases, saliva also contains fluoride, which helps harden enamel.

Everyone should brush their teeth twice per day for two minutes each time with a soft-bristled toothbrush and a toothpaste that contains fluoride. Children 3 years and younger should use a smear of toothpaste the size of a grain of rice. Children older than 3 years can use a pea-sized amount.

Sugary, sour and sticky candies all are bad for your child's teeth. Watch when and how much candy they eat and make sure they brush their teeth properly and see their dentist regularly.

# **THE COSTS** of distracted driving

Distracted driving is one of the leading causes of accidents on Iowa roads and a major factor behind rising auto insurance claims. Whether it is a quick text, a navigation adjustment, or a phone call, even a moment of inattention can lead to costly - and sometimes tragic — consequences. Recognizing this risk, Iowa has enacted a new "hands-free" driving law designed to keep drivers focused on the



Effective July 1, 2025, it's now illegal for Iowa drivers to hold or manually operate a cell phone or other electronic device while driving. Calls, texts and navigation can still be used, but only if the device is in a mounted position and operated through voice command or Bluetooth. Warnings will be issued initially, but, beginning Jan. 1, 2026, violators will face fines starting around \$100. More serious penalties apply if distracted driving results in injury or

From an insurance standpoint, this law couldn't come at a better time. Auto insurers have seen a sharp increase in claims related to distracted driving over the past decade. Even a minor fender bender caused by glancing at a phone can drive up claim frequency and, in turn, statewide insurance rates. When drivers pay attention, everyone benefits — fewer accidents mean fewer claims and more stable premiums.

Beyond avoiding fines and higher rates, safe driving protects your financial well-being in other ways. Accidents tied to phone use can lead to at-fault designations on your record, surcharges or even nonrenewal from your insurance carrier. It is worth remembering that your policy doesn't just protect your car — it protects your liability if someone else is injured. One moment of distraction can put both your safety and your assets at risk.

According to national studies, drivers using cell phones are four times more likely to be involved in a crash serious enough to cause injury. The average cost of a distracted driving claim now exceeds \$20,000, and major injury accidents can quickly climb past \$100,000 once medical and legal costs are included. These figures underline how vital it is to stay alert and undistracted behind the wheel.

#### Here are a few practical tips:

- Mount your phone at eye level and use hands-free or voice-activated
  - Set your route and playlist before driving.
  - Use your phone's "Do Not Disturb While Driving" mode.



# A LOOK at diversification

Ancient Chinese merchants were said to have developed a unique way to manage their risk. They would divide their shipments among several different vessels. That way, if one ship were to sink or be attacked by pirates, the rest stood a good chance of getting through. Thus, the majority of the shipment could be saved. Your investment portfolio may benefit from that same logic.



Diversification is an investment principle designed to manage risk. However, diversification does not guarantee against a loss. The key to diversification is to identify investments that may perform differently under various market conditions.

# PARMESAN garlic focaccia bread is a slice of comfort

This month, I share another recipe from my daughter, Samantha. She loves to make all kinds of bread. Few things make a kitchen feel more welcoming than the aroma of freshly baked bread, and parmesan



garlic focaccia delivers that comfort in every bite. Golden and crisp on the outside yet soft and airy inside, this Italian favorite is elevated with the irresistible pairing of roasted garlic and nutty parmesan cheese. It is the kind of bread that feels special but is surprisingly simple to make at home. Serve as a side with soups and pastas, cut into squares for an appetizer board, or enjoy warm right out of the pan. Focaccia is versatile and crowd pleasing. The drizzle of olive oil, a sprinkling of herbs and the cheesy finish give it that bakery-style touch you will love sharing — or keeping all to yourself. Enjoy! ■

### Parmesan Garlic Focaccia Bread

#### **Ingredients:**

- 1½ cups warm water (about 110°F)
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 21/4 teaspoons instant yeast (1 packet)
- · 4 cups flour
- 1½ teaspoons salt
- 1/3 cup extra virgin olive oil, plus more for greasing
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 2/3 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 teaspoon dried Italian herbs or chopped rosemary
- · Flaky sea salt

#### **Directions**

- Combine warm water, sugar and yeast. Let sit for 5 minutes until foamy. Add flour and salt. Mix until dough forms. (It will be sticky.) With a mixer, kneed for 5-7 minutes or by hand for 8-10 minutes until smooth. Brush dough with olive oil and cover.
- Let rise 1-1.5 hours in a warm spot until dough has doubled.
- Heat 2 tablespoons olive oil with minced garlic until fragrant (about 1 minute) in a

pan. Keep for later.

Place dough in greased 9-inch by 13-inch pan. Gently press to corners. Let rest 10 minutes, then stretch. Cover and rise 30-45 minutes.



- Preheat oven to 425 F. With your fingers, dimple the dough all over. Brush with garlic oil. Then sprinkle parmesan cheese, herbs and sea salt on top of dough.
- Bake 20-25 minutes until golden brown. Cool 10 minutes in pan, then transfer to wire rack.
- Slice and serve warm. Store bread for two days at room temperature or freeze up to three months.
- · For the best results, follow these additional steps: Make sure your water is warm (110 F), not hot. For the best texture, let the dough rise completely. Use plenty of oil in your pan, as this will give your bread a crisp crust.



# **HOENIG** says, 'Welcome to Winterset'

Community greeter provides useful information and more.



Moving to a new community is challenging. Not only are there financial and logistical challenges, such as moving expenses, utility deposits and connection fees, there are also social challenges, such as trying to make new friends, meeting the neighbors, and finding out what the community's resources are.

That is where Sandy Hoenig comes in. In her role with Community Greetings, Hoenig reaches out to those who are new to the community. She and her husband, Rick, experienced being new to Winterset not many years ago.

"Rick and I lived in Ames for 25 years, then we moved to Winterset about 12 or 13 years ago," Hoenig says. "We moved here because we have a son and his family in town."

That experience showed Hoenig the value in having a friendly welcome to a new community. As a retired teacher and school counselor, Hoenig has experience in helping

Hoenig and her husband believe in being active in the community in a variety of ways.

"We volunteer at the museum and at CRISP and things like that," she says.

Regarding her role as a community greeter, Hoenig says she strives to connect with people promptly.

"I try to call on people who are new to Winterset — both buyers and renters. I tell them about Winterset and Madison County to help them feel welcome," Hoenig says. "I have a bag of information to share."

The materials Hoenig gives out include coupons and offers from local businesses, general information from the Chamber of

Commerce, and other items as available.

Hoenig mentions some of the most popular freebies.

"Free bread from the bakery and free popcorn at the movie theater," she says. "But the most important thing is information from the Chamber of Commerce."

Hoenig's role is only part-time, but she would like to be a little busier.

"It kind of fluctuates due to the time of the year. The most I've ever had in a month is about 12 or 14," Hoenig says.

One of the biggest challenges Hoenig faces is simply learning who is new to town. With that in mind, she welcomes anyone to pass along contact information about new residents to her at skhoenig@hotmail.com.

Hoenig is a strong advocate for Winterset and says there are two main reasons why people trelocate here. The first, she says, are people who have family connections in Winterset, such as the situation when she and Rick moved to town.

The second main reason for moving to Winterset, according to Hoenig, is that people like what Winterset offers, such as a quality school system and a friendly, small-town community. Winterset is near enough to the Des Moines metro area to be a "bedroom community" for some, but Hoenig knows the town is much more than just that.

Hoenig stresses that, when someone new moves to town, there's real value in sharing information on local resources.

"We want to let them know what's available for entertainment, music, theater and different things like that," she says. "If they know what's available here, they can stay here and spend their time and money in Winterset."

Hoenig also challenges the entire community to offer a warm welcome to all.

"Winterset has a reputation for being very friendly, and I want to make sure we're more inclusive," she says. "What more can we do to reach out to make sure all feel welcome?" ■
