

WinterFest at the Triangle

Santa Claus, hot cocoa and the tree lighting — it's the season for holiday merrymaking at Waukee's annual WinterFest celebration.

WinterFest will be Friday, Dec. 5 from 6-8 p.m. at the Triangle in downtown Waukee. The family-friendly event is organized and hosted by Waukee Parks and Recreation in partnership with downtown businesses around the Triangle.

Attendees are encouraged to arrive before 6 p.m., at which time Waukee Mayor Courtney Clarke will light the WinterFest tree and surrounding lights. After the tree lighting, Santa Claus plans on arriving on a fire truck driven by the Waukee Fire Department. Apparently Santa's reindeers are conserving their energy for Christmas Eve, so the firetruck is his current mode of transportation.

The festivities continue among brightly colored lights and holiday decorations. An ice-sculpting demonstration and various games will be offered. A popular snowball drop takes place at 6:30 p.m. at Charter Bank. Kids drop "snowballs" — which are actually ping pong balls — for children to pick up. Then, kids take the balls to Charter Bank in exchange for

Santa will be on hand to listen to children's wish lists at the Community Center. Kids can also decorate cookies and make crafts at different indoor and outdoor stations. All ages can enjoy free s'mores, hot chocolate, soup and cider from various businesses.

Local businesses, restaurants, bars and food trucks will also offer dinner, drink specials and various items for purchase.

Heather Behrens, director of marketing and communications for the city of Waukee,

invites all ages to the festival. She recommends folks dress in weather-appropriate layers, as the activities are a mix of indoor and outdoor events.

Attendees are encouraged to bring nonperishable food items and new, unwrapped toys or monetary donations to help neighbors in need and drop them off at the Community Center. WayPoint Resources (formerly Waukee Area Christian Services) will then distribute the donations.

Life-size Candyland game

For nearly 70 years, the Candyland game has been played by generations of families. Candyland is an ideal first game for young children who are unable to read by identifying colors to advance game play.

Imagine playing that same game, only bigger — much bigger.

Now you can.

The Waukee Library is hosting a life-size Candyland game that anyone can play. The library sets up a life-size Candyland game board, where visitors walk through the game as if they are the pieces. Just like in the game, players draw cards and work their way around the path toward the candy castle finish line. Players wander through the different candythemed landscapes, which include lollipop woods, gumdrop mountain, licorice forest and

Eliza Ahrens, Waukee children's librarian, says this is the fifth year the library has hosted the life-size Candyland game. Last year's attendance had 1,847 visitors during the three days. The library chose the activity, as people of all ages are looking for things to do during the winter break period.

"We love Candyland because it's a game that's familiar and accessible for folks of all ages and abilities," Ahrens says.

She says the game has grown throughout the years. Babies up to senior-aged folks attend the event.

"We have had so many families and groups return year after year. I love that it's becoming a winter tradition for our community," she says.

Candyland is open for all ages, to either play the game or walk through the decorations.

This year's Candyland will be open during regular library hours on Dec. 26, 29, 30 and 31.

To accommodate larger groups who may want to secure a time to go through together, registration is required on the morning of Dec. 26. Otherwise, the room is open during regular library hours on a first-come, first-served basis. Several groups will be able to play through at the same time. It takes about 15 minutes to play through the game.

Afternoon and evening game times tend to be less busy. Ahrens says there is no edible candy involved, so there are no worries about allergens. The layout and decorations change and grow every year, and Ahrens says it is worth coming back each year.

With numerous colorful photo opportunities, it's one of the library's highlights of the year.

"We have such a great time and love seeing so many people come through," Ahrens adds. "We're hoping this will be the sweetest year

SCHNEIDER stresses 'better together'

Says it is his mission to give back

Mike Schneider is a man on a mission.

In 2011, Mike Schneider founded - and still leads -100+ Men on a Mission, a group of local men committed



to supporting the Des Moines community and surrounding areas.

When he first learned about this collective philanthropy approach, Schneider discovered that it originated in his hometown of Jackson,

"Unbeknownst to me, I knew the lady who started this and went to school with her brother," he recalls. "One thing led to another, and I was introduced to their cousin who lives in Des Moines. The rest is history."

100+ Men on a Mission meets quarterly with the goal of hearing from three area nonprofits and then selecting one to receive a collective gift of around \$15,000. The group accomplishes this as members pledge to make their quarterly donations. For the past two years, they have also benefited from a matching gift sponsor, JC Toland Painting.

Each February (the next one on Monday, Feb. 9), the group joins 100+ Women Who Care to host a joint meeting. That combined gift — double their usual — is a tremendous blessing to an unsuspecting nonprofit.

In addition to quarterly meetings, Schneider leads the group's

September golf outing, another opportunity to support a local charity. This past September marked the group's fifth annual outing, which grossed around \$40,000, netted about \$30,000, and directed those funds to St. Vincent de Paul of Des Moines.

100+ Men on a Mission also uses the power of group giving to support Socks of Love each November. In addition to their pledged donations, members bring socks that are redistributed to local organizations in need.

"Throughout all of this, I truly believe that we are 'better together,' " Schneider says.

Outside of the organization he leads, Schneider stays active in the community through the West Des Moines Leadership Academy, where he helps plan alumni events such as the upcoming Day of Kindness in early 2026. He is also a longtime volunteer within the Lutheran Church of Hope network and, for the past 25 years, has joined a handful of likeminded men to minister to youth in their own unique way.

"And by that, I mean, we created a spoof band called 'n Pink' in homage to NSYNC and are happy to embarrass ourselves to reach the kids with the Good News," Schneider says.

In addition, Schneider coaches an adult team at the Kiwanis Miracle League and has been involved with the organization since its inception as a coach, volunteer and board member. His son, Cory, who has special needs, enjoys baseball, and the two have shared this experience year after year.

And when he's "bored," Schneider can often be found dressed as the Grinch at local events. Next up is a December community celebration in Granger.

"Volunteering at these and other opportunities has always been an important part of the past three-plus decades and likely got its start when I met my now-wife volunteering with the Optimist organization," he shares. "Our shared desire to work with others has rooted itself in our families, and our two boys model that same passion."

For Schneider, volunteering is an endless source of fulfillment.

"You can't help but feel so much better about yourself, your life situation or the world around you coming off of a volunteer-high," he says. "And some of my absolute best and lifelong friends have resulted from my volunteer involvement. These people will literally drop anything to respond to a need of my own or my family, and, for that, I will be forever grateful." ■

WAUKEE Northwest band fundraiser

Donate to band for chance to win a car

Many high school bands use fundraisers as a way to help curb expenses. What if supporting that band offers you a chance to win a new car?

Now you can do both — support Waukee Northwest High School band while getting a chance to win a new car.

Northwest High School Band students are currently selling raffle tickets for a 2026 Chevrolet Trailblazer. Shottenkirk Chevrolet of Waukee is donating the vehicle, and raffle tickets cost \$25 each. It's not a traditional paper raffle; it's a virtual raffle, where tickets are sold online.

Selling online is easier because students don't need to exchange money. People are directed to purchase through a website QR code. Those buying tickets can designate a Waukee Northwest Band member by entering their name on the site to obtain credit. If you don't have a band member's name, credits will be split among band members.

Andrea Webb of Waukee is on the Waukee Northwest Band Parent fundraising committee. She joined as she currently has two kids in band: a senior and an eighth grade student. Last year, the band's car raffle fundraiser raised more than \$20,000 for band students.

Webb says fundraisers assist with costs. Marching band students have expenses, such as travel, uniforms and other trips, which are not covered by the school. Parents appreciate the programs as it means they pay less out of pocket for their students.

Shottenkirk's general manager, Travis Block, says supporting school and community events is important, as it aligns with their slogan: "Serving the community, employees and customers."

"It's an obligation as a business, not only to work in the community, but to better it," he explains.

Currently the marching band and color guard consists of 117 students. Webb says her son treasures his time as a band member.

"He's really enjoyed and benefitted by being in the band. It's been a great opportunity, and it's character building for band members," she

Last year, the band traveled to Ireland and marched in the St. Patrick's Day parade. They generally offer travel trips on alternating

In addition to the raffle, band students from both Waukee high schools volunteer their time at the Can Shack, a place where the public can donate their cans for redemption. The Can Shack is located at the Fareway parking lot at 200 S.E. Laurel in Waukee. Proceeds from the cans benefit both the Waukee and Northwest high school bands.

The car raffle winner will be announced at the band's winter concert on Dec. 15 at the Waukee Northwest auditorium. Folks don't need to be present to win. The public is invited to attend the concert.

Kayla Johnson earned her teaching degree in elementary education from Sterling College while she was a stay-at-home mom raising her five children. However, this may mean that your assets will pass to a secondary beneficiary or to your estate. If the beneficiary is cancelled, you should update beneficiary designations. This will prevent the asset holder from mistakenly sending benefits to your ex-spouse. For annuities, if the payments have irrevocably commenced, they will continue to be distributed to the former spouse.

If your spouse is listed as your agent under a financial power of attorney, the agency terminates as soon as the divorce action is filed. For a health care directive, the spouse's authority is revoked upon the entry of the divorce decree. Your spouse will still be your health care proxy during the divorce proceedings.


Even though the law automatically puts some protections in place, you still need to

update your estate planning. You should make changes in your powers of attorney as soon as possible, so that you don't give financial authority or medical decision-making rights to your soon-to-be former partner.

If you want assets to pass directly to a beneficiary, and not into your estate, you should designate a new beneficiary. Joint tenancy property should be addressed. So should guardianship of minor children. Even if your ex-spouse would be the custodial parent if you die, you may want to put someone else in charge of the money you leave to your children.

Consult with an experienced attorney to discuss how your divorce changes your estate plan. Drafting new documents to reflect your wishes will give you peace of mind as you start a new chapter in your life. ■

THE COSTS of distracted driving

Distracted driving is one of the leading causes of accidents on Iowa roads and a major factor behind rising auto insurance claims. Whether it is a quick text, a navigation adjustment, or a phone call, even a moment of inattention can lead to costly - and sometimes tragic — consequences. Recognizing this risk, Iowa has enacted a new "hands-free" driving law designed to keep drivers focused on the



Effective July 1, 2025, it's now illegal for Iowa drivers to hold or manually operate a cell phone or other electronic device while driving. Calls, texts and navigation can still be used, but only if the device is in a mounted position and operated through voice command or Bluetooth. Warnings will be issued initially, but, beginning Jan. 1, 2026, violators will face fines starting around \$100. More serious penalties apply if distracted driving results in injury or death.

From an insurance standpoint, this law couldn't come at a better time. Auto insurers have seen a sharp increase in claims related to distracted driving over the past decade. Even a minor fender bender caused by glancing at a phone can drive up claim frequency and, in turn, statewide insurance rates. When drivers pay attention, everyone benefits — fewer accidents mean fewer claims and more stable premiums.

Beyond avoiding fines and higher rates, safe driving protects your financial well-being in other ways. Accidents tied to phone use can lead to at-fault designations on your record, surcharges or even nonrenewal from your insurance carrier. It is worth remembering that your policy doesn't just protect your car — it protects your liability if someone else is injured. One moment of distraction can put both your safety and your assets at risk.

According to national studies, drivers using cell phones are four times more likely to be involved in a crash serious enough to cause injury. The average cost of a distracted driving claim now exceeds \$20,000, and major injury accidents can quickly climb past \$100,000 once medical and legal costs are included. These figures underline how vital it is to stay alert and undistracted behind the wheel.

Here are a few practical tips:

- Mount your phone at eye level and use hands-free or voice-activated features.
 - Set your route and playlist before driving.
 - Use your phone's "Do Not Disturb While Driving" mode.
- Encourage family members especially teens to lead by

CONNECTING with your body





DON'T forget draw-down requirements

This time of year can bring plenty of change, whether it is the leaves on the trees, the seasonal sports schedules, or the considerations for who brings the turkey and eggnog. With all the hustle and bustle of the upcoming holiday season, you may not be focusing on the required draw down of some of your life savings.



Individual Retirement Arrangements (IRAs) were created in 1974, and Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs) were required from the very beginning. RMDs are the minimum amounts that U.S. tax law requires one to withdraw annually from traditional IRAs and employer-sponsored retirement plans. The purpose of RMD rules is to ensure that people do not accumulate retirement accounts, defer taxation, and leave these funds as an inheritance. RMDs force the holder to withdraw at least some of the funds as taxable distributions while they are still alive.

The rules apply to all employer-sponsored retirement plans, including profit-sharing plans, 401K, 403(b), and 457(b) plans. The RMD rules also apply to traditional IRAs and IRA-based plans such as SEPs, SARSEPs and SIMPLE IRAs.

The age to start taking RMDs has changed over time. The current age to begin taking RMDs is 73 as of 2023, according to the SECURE 2.0 Act, which was an increase from the previous age of 72. For those of us born after 1960, we need to consider RMDs at age 75. Individuals are generally required to start taking withdrawals from their retirement accounts by April 1 of the year following the year they reach the required age.

There are penalties for failing to take RMDs or not taking a large enough distribution. The penalty is an excise tax of 25% of the amount not distributed as required, or 10% if the RMD is corrected within two years.

To some people, this requirement will not be as great of an issue if you are already drawing retirement needs regularly from your pre-tax savings; to others, it may cause an increase in taxable income that was not expected or

This time of year, look at this future obligation. Maybe your required distribution is two to three years from now and you have room in your current tax bracket to explore other options. Many individuals consider ROTH IRA conversions to reduce the requirements at age 73. Others consider changing their annual tithing and donation expectations to have them come straight from the RMD qualified investments and go to the charities and churches of choice. Some may initiate a gifting effort to send this money in the direction of a loved one.

When it comes to retirement, you have worked hard the last 30-40 years. You have raised your family, given everything you can to save for your golden years, and now it is time for you to be able to live more like every day is a Saturday.

This time of year, let us be thankful. Let us take pause to thank those who have served to provide for the rights that we hold so dear. Let us embrace the spirit of family and friends. Don't forget to reach out to your financial advisor to get some of these end of year "requirements" in order so there are no surprises and you can walk into the New Year with a fresh start. Happy Thanksgiving. ■

Parmesan Garlic Focaccia Bread

Ingredients:

- 1½ cups warm water (about 110°F)
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 21/4 teaspoons instant yeast (1 packet)
- 4 cups flour
- 1½ teaspoons salt
- 1/3 cup extra virgin olive oil, plus more for greasing
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 2/3 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 teaspoon dried Italian herbs or chopped rosemary
- · Flaky sea salt

Directions

- Combine warm water, sugar and yeast. Let sit for 5 minutes until foamy. Add flour and salt. Mix until dough forms. (It will be sticky.) With a mixer, kneed for 5-7 minutes or by hand for 8-10 minutes until smooth. Brush dough with olive oil and cover.
- Let rise 1-1.5 hours in a warm spot until dough has doubled.
- Heat 2 tablespoons olive oil with minced garlic until fragrant (about 1 minute) in a

pan. Keep for later.

Place dough in greased 9-inch by 13-inch pan. Gently press to corners. Let rest 10 minutes, then stretch. Cover and rise 30-45 minutes.



- Preheat oven to 425 F. With your fingers, dimple the dough all over. Brush with garlic oil. Then sprinkle parmesan cheese, herbs and sea salt on top of dough.
- Bake 20-25 minutes until golden brown. Cool 10 minutes in pan, then transfer to
- Slice and serve warm. Store bread for two days at room temperature or freeze up to three months.
- For the best results, follow these additional steps: Make sure your water is warm (110 F), not hot. For the best texture, let the dough rise completely. Use plenty of oil in your pan, as this will give your bread a crisp crust.
