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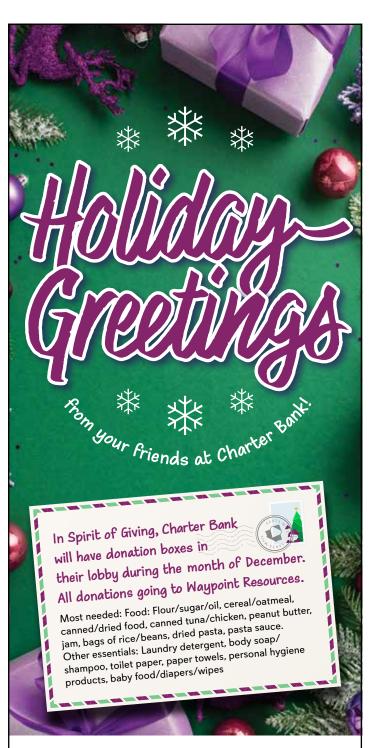

#### The joy of giving

Jenny Glasgow's family moved to Adel from Washington state. When they moved, her cousin John, lovingly called JJ, moved with them. JJ brought with him a talent for sewing, which he had been developing for several years. He has enjoyed crafting and gifting Christmas gifts no matter where he was located. Two years ago, around the first part of December, JJ gave Glasgow's family homemade Christmas stockings.

"He made Santa hats and Christmas stockings for each of us — a total of six sets," Glasgow recalls. "Each person's stocking and hat matched with the same print of fabric. Mine was a blue, snowy Christmas scene. My daughter's hat and stocking were a red cheetah print because she loves cheetahs. Another of the sets included a Seattle Seahawks sports theme for his dad."

Some of the stockings were Christmas themed, and some were not. JJ tailored and custom-made each set to the likes and interests of its recipient. The stockings are all hand sewn and are approximately 12 inches in length from tip to top. Both the stockings and the hats were fur-lined.

"JJ definitely has a sewing talent," Glasgow relates. "Most people don't usually think of gentlemen with that talent."

The hats and stockings were so well received that JJ made more stockings for them

Glasgow says they use the Christmas stockings each year, and they like to hang them on their mantle in the living room.

"It has a homey feel to it even though we have an electric fireplace," she says. "We love to put them out the day after Thanksgiving and leave them up until the New Year. We love to fill them up to the brim as much as the stocking hangers can hold. Because they are larger, sometimes they can get heavy. One year, we had to put them on the floor below because they were too heavy."

JJ has already started making some Christmas stockings as Christmas gifts for other individuals this year. Glasgow says their family regularly enjoys making and giving handmade gifts.

"I love that JJ made and thought these Christmas stockings out for us. It makes them special," she shares. "Knowing that a person took time to put something together specifically for you is always very special. They took the time to make something versus

just buying something from a store. Because of the time investment, it means more that he made something beautiful for us."

JJ has given the stockings to his family before Christmas so they can use them that

"He has a big, goofy grin on his face when he gives them, loving the appreciation he sees on our faces, especially if we didn't know they were coming," Glasgow shares.

#### **Preserving memories**

Two years ago in December, Suzanne Talley's mom passed away. While spending time with her dad soon afterward, he mentioned that he wasn't sure what to do with all her mom's glasses. As a lifelong crafter is prone to do, Talley had been browsing online for ideas on how to use her mom's belongings to create cherished gifts for her family.

"There were enough pairs to make a Christmas snowman with the glasses for each of my three siblings, myself and my dad," she recalls. "Also, my mom was a canner, so I took one of her flannel shirts and a canning ring and made an ornament."

Talley did not take long to accomplish her task, completing the gifts in one day. She made each snowman's face different so each would be unique. She gifted them on Christmas day. Talley's gift crafting went beyond ornaments. She also gathered some

of her mom's old clothes and made memory bears for her nieces and nephews.

Last year, Talley once again made and gave ornament gifts.

"Last year was a year of ornaments. One of my friends had lost their dog of more than 12 years," she says. "I made ornaments with his picture on it for her. Another friend read 133 books that year. I used an app called Goodreads to put together the list of book titles she had read. Through the app, I downloaded the book images it generates, put them in a file that has all the squares for a sheet of sticker paper, printed them, and put each of them on a small piece of foam. Then I placed those squares into a clear 6-inch ball

and decorated it with the year and a ribbon on the outside. That project took a little longer because of how many books she'd read."

The book title ornament was also a Pinterest find, which is also where she discovered the Goodreads app and how to use it. After posting a picture of her crafted gift on her business page, a local book club called the Literary Ladies Book Club loved the idea and gathered to make their "Year of Books" ornaments — and they plan to do it again in January. Afterward, Talley joined their book

Talley says she has always enjoyed making gifts for others.

"To me, it is more special to give what I've put my heart and soul into," she explains. "I'd much rather make something than buy something from a store. A lot of times, if I see something I like, I try to figure out how to make it myself. First, I want to see if I can do it, and second, because it will have more meaning if it is handmade. My dad's parents would make all the grandkids Christmas ornaments each year. My grandpa would cut the wood, and my grandma would paint them. The apple didn't fall far from the tree."

#### Growing the gift of giving

Ten years ago, Amber Rowley and her family moved to their first farm. There, she had a garden, chickens and eggs. She began using the abundance of the harvest that year to make gift baskets for others.

"I'm a big fan of homemade gifts because people have done that for me," she explains. "Our neighbor would bring over a plate of a delicious variety of cookies, a picture of their family, and a gallon of fresh-pressed cider."

Now, Rowley puts together baskets full of jams, jellies, pickles, relish, eggs, dry soup mixes, drink mixes and dehydrated fruits and vegetables. Jars are craftily decorated with fabrics edged with pinking shears and string or twine.

This year, the Rowley apple tree had a bumper crop, and she has dehydrated a lot of apples.

"I plan to include the apples in the baskets because they are tasty and versatile," she says.

She also has a sourdough starter that is part of a 130-year-old chain of sourdough. She has dehydrated some of that sourdough starter and includes it in her gift baskets. When she has eggs, she will put them in the baskets, too.

Rowley spends about six months infusing

extracts of vanilla, lemon and mint to include in the baskets as well. For future gift baskets, Rowley is learning the art of cheesemaking, and she hopes to grow grapes this coming spring so she can make and include wine in her baskets. One of her favorite items to include is Christmas jam. It is made of cranberries, cherries and strawberries.

"Christmas jam is a beautiful ruby color, and it is such a versatile jam," she shares. "It can be used in oatmeal, on toast and biscuits, or to make dessert bars. It is delicious."

Gift basket recipients usually include Rowley's family and friends.

"I also give to neighbors, co-workers and people I am close to," she says. "Sometimes I hear about someone in need of pantry staples, and I'll put together a basket for him or her.

Giving the fruit of my labor away makes me feel good."

Rowley is a fan of simpler times. She spends the summer canning and putting things away until winter. Because she is a private chef who enjoys giving and nourishing others' bodies and soul, she expresses her love language in the gift baskets she puts together. Everything she does is a result of growing it with her own hands in her garden or from the farm animals she raises. Her grandma taught her the skills of foraging, growing and preserving, and her love for giving to others is the catalyst for blending the two together. One basket takes just 15 to 20 minutes to put together, but it is a result of a whole year's worth of time and labor of love, and for her that makes it mean more.

## **SUPPORTING** students every step

ADM school counselors are committed to all.

Many families have a general sense of what a school counselor does, but the full scope of the role is often far broader and more nuanced — than people realize.

Counselors in the ADM Community School District hope to shed some light on what they do to help all students in the district.

Much of any misunderstanding of the role stems from the confidential nature of the work. Counselors are often the keepers of sensitive information, which can make their role feel a bit mysterious from the outside.

Another common misconception involves the difference between schoolbased counseling and licensed mental

health therapy. ADM's counselors focus on short-term, skill-based support, usually six to eight weeks, to help students navigate social, emotional or academic challenges. When longer-term or specialized care is needed, they connect families with the right outside providers and walk alongside them as they find that support.

Throughout the school year, ADM counselors meet students where they are developmentally and emotionally. Their work spans every grade level, but the emphasis naturally shifts as students grow. In the elementary buildings, lessons center around recognizing emotions, understanding how the brain works and learning healthy ways to manage big feelings. Students also practice kindness, friendship skills and healthy relationship building.

At the middle school, the focus turns to maintaining friendships, choosing supportive peer groups and resolving conflicts. High schoolers receive ongoing support in those same areas, but counselors also help them prepare for life after graduation, whether that means college, a trade or something different.

Every ADM student receives intentional support along the way. Younger learners benefit from monthly counseling lessons, while middle school students participate in sessions during Tiger Time. The district

also partners with Family Connections, a school-based therapy program that places mental health providers in ADM buildings throughout the

In today's world, the challenges students face are increasingly complex. Easy access to technology and social media can make it harder for kids to develop strong interpersonal skills or emotional awareness. ADM counselors see firsthand how this constant connection can affect students and work intentionally to overcome the hurdles.

Even with the challenges, the work is deeply rewarding. Counselors in ADM schools witness growth in moments both big and small. They are honored to walk with families through some of life's hardest seasons, offering stability during grief, financial strain, deployments, separation or mental health struggles.

Above all, the ADM counseling team is committed to helping every student develop the skills they need to succeed, both now and beyond their time in school. ■

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## FRIEND'S apples create a perfect fall treat

When Cheryl Castile shared a bag of freshly picked apples with me, I knew exactly what to do - turn them into something warm, comforting and perfect for sharing. I love to bake, and these apple cinnamon muffins are the result: soft, fragrant and filled with cozy autumn flavor in every bite. There is something special about baking with



fruit that comes straight from someone's tree.

As they bake, the kitchen fills with the irresistible scent of cinnamon and caramelizing apples, promising a treat that is both nostalgic and homemade. These muffins strike the right balance — tender on the inside with just a hint of golden crispness on top. They are wonderful for breakfast, a midmorning snack or an afternoon pick-me-up with coffee or tea.

Simple to make and even better to share, these muffins are a sweet way to say thank you or to celebrate the small gestures of kindness that brighten an ordinary day. So, if you have a handful of apples and a little time, this recipe transforms them into something truly special - a batch of warm, cinnamon-kissed gratitude.

#### Apple cinnamon muffins

#### **Inaredients:**

- 1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1/2 cup brown sugar, packed
- 1 large apple, Granny Smith works
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup butter
- 2 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 pinch salt
- 1/2 cup milk (can use soy, almond or other varieties)

#### **Directions**

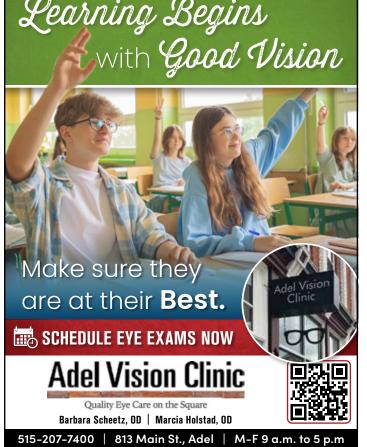
- · Combine cinnamon and brown sugar and set aside. Peel apple, dice into small pieces and set aside.
- Mix flour, baking powder and salt and set aside. Cream together sugar and butter using a mixer.
- Add eggs and vanilla and mix well. Stir in flour mixture. Slowly stir in



milk until combined.

- Grease a 12-muffin pan. Divide dough, diced apples and cinnamon/brown sugar mixture in half. Place one half of the dough among the 12 muffin cups. Follow with one half of the apples and then the cinnamon/brown sugar mixture. Repeat.
- Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 minutes. These can be frozen up to three months or enjoy warm.

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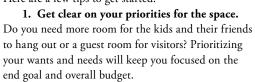

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## THE BASICS of lowa deeds

In Iowa, real estate is transferred by legal documents known as deeds. Each type of deed offers different levels of protection to the buyer and different levels of responsibility from the seller. Understanding the different types of deeds is important for anyone dealing with real estate.

The most common deed is a General Warranty Deed. This deed provides the strongest protection for a buyer as the seller guarantees

that the title is clear of any defects, whether they occurred during or before the seller's period of ownership. The seller is typically legally responsible for resolving any title issues that may arise. General Warranty Deeds are the norm when a buyer purchases a residential real estate property from a seller.

Another commonly used document is a Special Warranty Deed. This deed limits a seller's guarantee to the time the seller owned the property. This means the seller promises the title to the property remained clear only during the time of the seller's ownership, but not beforehand. It offers less protection than a General Warranty Deed.



A Quitclaim Deed provides the least protection for the buyer. With this deed, a seller conveys whatever interest the seller may have in the property, if any, without making any assurances about the title's quality. Quitclaim deeds are often used between family members, transfers to revocable trusts, and to clear up title issues. A Quitclaim deed to the Brooklyn Bridge is often used as an example of the dangers and risks of a Quitclaim deed. The seller is not stating that they own any interest in the Brooklyn Bridge. Caveat emptor ("Let the buyer beware") applies here.

Iowa also has Court Officer Deeds, such as a Sheriff's Deed or Executor's Deed. These deeds are used when property is transferred through legal proceedings, such as foreclosures or estate proceedings. Iowa also has Trustee Deeds which are used when a property is held in trust and transferred by a trustee.

Buyers and sellers should understand these deed types when buying and selling real estate. A licensed Iowa attorney can advise you further regarding these matters.

#### **WHAT IS** the best way to stretch?

Stretching improves flexibility and helps to minimize the risk of injury. There are three groups of stretching exercises. The first group is called static. The muscle is stretched slowly to tolerance and held in position of maximal stretch for a defined period of time. Static routines are the more traditional type of stretches and are commonly used in most training regimens. The static stretch has been proven to improve flexibility.



The second group is called dynamic. This type of stretching has been shown to improve agility, speed and strength. The muscle is stretched by moving from resting position to maximal stretch and returned to resting position; motion continues for a defined period of time. Static stretching combined with dynamic stretching may provide the optimal balance of both improved performance and flexibility. The third and final group is called proprioceptive. Proprioceptive stretching is done when the muscle is contracted directly prior to static stretch of the same muscle. The proprioceptive stretch requires expertise to perform correctly.

Lasting improvements in flexibility are related to duration of the stretch. Static stretches should be held for a minimum of 30 seconds, preferably 90 seconds. The number of repetitions and days necessary to produce lasting improvements in flexibility are controversial. Benefits usually fade once stretching regimens are discontinued.

## **SIGNS** an aging loved one needs help

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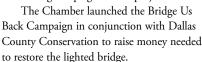

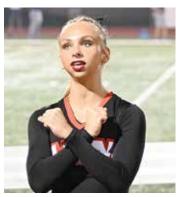

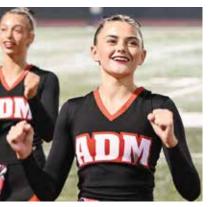

#### **SNOW AND ICE CONTROL - SNOW REMOVAL POLICY:**

Here's the "snowdown" on some helpful tips to remember in the coming months. (For more information please visit the City of Adel website at https://www.adeliowa.gov/departments/public\_works.php to view a FAQ flyer)

- Snow parking: It is unlawful to park any vehicle on any street or alley
  during a snow removal period. The ban continues from the beginning of
  snowfall until 24 hours after the snowfall ends. Residents should be aware
  of weather conditions and not park on City streets if there is a possibility
  of overnight snow.
- Sidewalks: Snow removal from sidewalks is the responsibility of the property owner. You have 24 hours after the snowfall to clear your sidewalk. Please pile the snow on your yard and not in the City street. (A helpful hint for residents: clear your sidewalks after the snowplows have finished plowing to the curb. If you fail to clear your sidewalk, the City may do so and bill you.)
- Snowmobiles: From November through March, snowmobiles may be operated on the Raccoon River Valley Trail between 7:00 a.m. and 10:30 p.m. The speed limit is 10 mph.
- Mailboxes/Fire Hydrants: Residents are responsible for clearing snow around their mailbox to assure delivery of mail and that their mailbox is properly installed behind the curb line. The Fire Department requests property owners who have a hydrant to clear snow away for easier access.
