DOING THE DISHES

Doing the dishes was a nightly task in my childhood home and one that my siblings and I argued over each evening. Who would clear the table? Who would wash the dishes? Rinse them? Dry them? Put them away?

I was the youngest of four children, so I likely was cut some slack. Still, I was eager to be like "the big kids" and help out. My siblings were eager to have me help — until I dropped a plate or two and Mom would not-so-nicely blame it on them.

Mom would often say that she didn't need one of those newfangled dishwashers. She had four of them, and we were better than any Maytag. We were faster. The dishes were cleaner. And we used less water and electricity.

Mom was the inspector. If any food residue was still on the dishes, they went back through the cycle — and none of us wanted to be blamed for that. So we scrubbed, and we rinsed, and we dried, and we put away.

Doing dishes with Dad was easier. We would wash the dishes and then set them on the counter

on a drying rack. "We will let Jesus dry those," he would say each time with a laugh.

We learned not to search aggressively for utensils in the soapy water, as we could discover a sharp knife. We all learned that one the hard way.

Looking back, I am glad that we did the dishes by hand. We learned to actually talk to each other, not only sorting out tasks but actually having discussions. We learned how to work together quickly, efficiently and in an orderly manner. We would listen to music sometimes, but we would usually just talk. There was a lot of joking around, laughing and storytelling. It was mostly silly stuff, as I recall, but it was important then.



Jolene and I had a similar process with our kids at home, filling the dishwasher after each meal. The dreaded task was clearing the dishwasher, especially when learning it was full of clean dishes when you were ready to load the dirty ones in. When all three of our kids were home, the dishwasher seemed to run daily. It was a different process for a different era, but it just wasn't the same as leaning over the sink, shoulder to shoulder, trading out wet towels. I am reminded of this process during the holidays when we hand-wash the "fancy" dishes - and I actually look forward to it.



PECAN-CRUSTED PORK TENDERLOIN

Total time: 35 minutes Servings: 6

1 pork tenderloin (about 1 1/2 pounds) salt, to taste pepper, to taste ½ cup brown sugar, divided 2 tablespoons soy sauce, divided 2 teaspoons minced garlic ½ cup pecan pieces ¼ cup pineapple juice 2 tablespoons Dijon mustard

Directions

Preheat oven to 400 F and lightly grease large baking dish. Season pork tenderloin with salt and pepper, to taste; set aside.

In small bowl, stir 1/4 cup brown sugar, 1 tablespoon soy sauce and minced garlic. Spread mixture over pork. Press pecan pieces into brown sugar mixture on pork. Bake, uncovered, 20 minutes.

In medium saucepan over medium-high heat, combine remaining brown sugar, remaining soy sauce, pineapple juice and Dijon mustard. Bring mixture to boil; reduce to simmer 3-5 minutes then remove from heat. Slice pork, spoon sauce over top and serve.

SPEED LIMIT TO BE LOWERED IN SPOTS OF U.S. 169 CORRIDOR IN ADEL

Beginning Wednesday, Dec. 1, motorists will see new speed limit signs along the U.S. 169 corridor in Adel. The City of Adel and the Iowa DOT are working collaboratively to ensure U.S. 169 remains safe while the area continues to grow.

Crews will be placing digital message signs along U.S. 169 to alert motorists of the upcoming changes prior to Dec. 1. The current 55 mph signs at the south side of Adel between 302nd Place and Timberview Drive will be replaced with 50 mph signs. The current 45 mph signs along U.S. 169 between Timberview Drive and Greenwood drive will be replaced with 40 mph signs.

The Iowa DOT reminds motorists to drive with caution. obey the posted speed limit and other signs in the work area, and be aware that traffic fines for moving violations are at least double in work zones. As in all work zones, drivers should stay alert, allow ample space between vehicles, and wear seat belts.

BE AWARE OF CITY'S WEATHER-RELATED POLICIES

Snow plow priorities

The City of Adel's snow-control policy lists the priority for plowing.

FIRST PRIORITY: The downtown areas and Greene Street, which must be kept open to provide a transportation system for police, fire, and rescue squad units.

SECOND PRIORITY: All

designated snow routes.

THIRD PRIORITY: Secondary roads and cul-de-sacs.

FOURTH PRIORITY: Alleys and City parking lots.

Snow emergency parking ban

During snow events, when plowing will be necessary, the City will implement an emergency parking ban.

All vehicles must be removed from City streets when the parking ban is in effect. Vehicles parked in the street may be fined \$25, towed, or both. The ban starts at the beginning of a snowfall and does not end until 24 hours after snowfall has ceased. You may park on the street after this 24-hour period has ended. You may call City Hall to find out if the parking ban is in effect.

Citizen responsibilities

Snow can be beautiful, but it can also create hazards. When residents fail to clear their sidewalks, the results can be treacherous. Sidewalks need to be cleared to protect pedestrians from possible injury. Residents are required by ordinance to clear sidewalks (including those crossing alleys, crosswalks and driveways) within 24 hours of the end of a storm. Pile the snow on your yard, not in the street. If your sidewalk is icy, you may need to apply a heavy coat of sand or de-icer. A helpful hint for residents: Clear your sidewalk after the snowplows have finished plowing to the curb.

Mailboxes and fire hydrants

During heavy snowfalls, City plows may not be able to place the snow onto the right-of-way. During these times, resident will be responsible for clearing the snow around their mailbox to assure delivery of mail. The face of the mailbox must be properly installed behind the curb line and it must be able to withstand snow cleaning efforts by the City. The City will not be responsible for damage to mailboxes that don't meet requirements. Residents are asked to clear snow from around any fire hydrant in their yard so public safety crews can more easily find them in the case of an emergency.
