Forest Park
Forest Park Museum and Arboretum
This park is the location of the
administrative office of the Dallas County administrative office of the Dallas County Conservation Board. Forest Park Museum and Arboretum was originally developed in the 1940's by Eugene Hastie, a farmer, local historian and author. The arboretum was planted in straight lines to allow farming planted in straight lines to allow farming between the rows of growing trees. His love of history prompted many local residents to donate artifacts to this private collection. Mr. Hastie's museum, portraying the history of Dallas County, opened to the public in 1953.



Sportsman Park A forty acre tract of oak and hickory timber that offers electric and non-electric camping, year around cabins, enclosed shelter houses for reservation, an accessible playground, restroom facilities and shower building.



Dawson Depot Dawson Depot-Restored 1880s Depot is open from 8 am to 10 pm daily from May 1 to October 31. The building is adjacent to the Raccoon River Valley Trail and serves as a visitor center and restroom facility.



Fazel Wildlife Area

Voas Nature Area
This approximately 700 acre park is
west of Minburn and about 1/2 mile
east of the North Raccoon River. The original
265 acres were donated to the Dallas County



The property at 1129 Main St. was built in 1857 and served as the first two-story brick schoolhouse in Adel. The museum houses a collection of artifacts and documents representing a significant record of Adel history. The collection includes the desk and chair of George Clarke, an Adel native who served as governor of Iowa from 1913-1917. Clarke was the grandfather of 1939 Heisman Trophy winner Nile Kinnick, who played for the University of Iowa. The Museum also has Kinnick information on display.

The Brenton Arboretum

An arboretum is a place where trees and shrubs are grown for research, demonstration and educational purposes. The building features the original stage, box office and orchestra pit with accommodations for seating large groups for performances or for sit-down dining and dances. A display of historical pictures is now in place for all to enjoy. A historical marker on the Community House grounds was dedicated in August 2018. The Roundhouse, with a fully equipped kitchen, is available for reunions, receptions, meetings or other events small or large.

Bonnie and Clyde Shoot-out

National Plowing Match

The Dexter Museum welcomes visitors to Dexter, located along I-80 in southwestern Dallas County. Exhibits document President Harry S. Truman's visit to the National Plowing Match held at Dexter in 1948 and the former Dexfield Amusement Park that was the site of Dallas County's Barrow gang shoot-out in 1933. Three historical markers located north of town on Dexfield Road represent a significant record of these events. The museum has an abundance of historic information, plowing match scoreboards, pictures, artifacts and scrapbooks on

Dexter Centennial Park

Dexter's city park is located on the north side of White Pole Road just east of the fire station. Kids will enjoy the climbing tower, slides and merry-go-round while adults can utilize the paved walking trail around the perimeter with 10 low-impact wellness exercise stations. Kids and adults can take advantage of the interactive 10-hole disc golf course. A shelter house with picnic tables and restrooms await summer visitors. Be sure to check out the rustic bridge built in 1916 to span a creek near the cemetery. The bridge was moved to the city park where it has resided for many years.

Iowa Veterans Cemetery

The Iowa Veterans Cemetery (IVC) is the only state-owned and operated veterans cemetery in the State of Iowa. The construction was federally funded. It opened in 2008 and has more than 100 acres of property and the capacity for more than 81,000 veterans and family members. The cemetery serves Iowa's veteran population, as well as veterans from other states. There is no

state residency requirement to be interred in the cemetery. It is available to families and visitors from 7:30 a.m. to sunset daily, dependent on weather conditions. The beautiful new building was built for American Legion Post #403 with a focus on providing a free venue for families of veterans before or after committal services at the Iowa Veterans Cemetery. This facility is also available for use by the general public.

Iowa Jewish Heritage Society Caspe Heritage Gallery


Washington Township School

Take a trip back in time and visit the history room on the first floor and the museum on the second.

Perry Welcome Depot

The former railroad depot was renovated by the Perry Area Chamber of Commerce as a Welcome Center and displays railroad memorabilia from its history of the M&SL rail lines that passed through Perry. It provides area residents and visitors with information about Perry and area attractions. The Welcome Depot is adjacent to the Raccoon River Valley Trail located on the corner of First and Willis Avenue. Willis Avenue features four sculptures that pay tribute to the Railroad, Agriculture, Industry and the Arts.

The Redfield Historical Museum

Opened in 2014, the Redfield Historical Museum displays items from long ago up to not so long ago. It has a large collection of school composite photos from the 1920s to the 1990s and many other photos.

Soumas Court

Soumas Court is cradled between the Hotel Pattee and the Town/Craft Center. The court is named after George Soumas, son of Greek immigrants, WWII hero, a leading citizen and former mayor. A life-sized bronze sculpture of Soumas was created by Iowa artist Chris Bennett and serves as a focal point for this serene central parkway. Visitors entering Soumas Court pass through the gateways of New York's grand metal sculptures created by Albert Paley, the Reconfiguration Arches. The arches are an interpretation of Perry's history made of farm equipment, mining tools,

railroad items and metal pieces that recall the stories of men and women whose labors built Perry and kept it thriving.

Wiese Park and Disc Golf Course

Wiese Park is adjacent to the McCreary Community Building. It features a shelter house, gazebo, playground equipment, sand volleyball court, soccer fields and a lighted 2-mile recreation trail. You can also play a round of disc golf on a 9-hole course. The course is open seven days a week at no charge. Maps, scorecards and golf discs are available inside the McCreary Community Center.

Granger Homesteads

In 1935, the Granger Homesteads became one of the first government housing projects in U.S. history. The project was intended for those who lived in company-owned coal mining camp slums in the area so that families could move away from the decrepit mining camps and nearer to wholesome churches and schools. This building project of 50 homes on 224 acres was

completed in conjunction with the Roosevelt Administration, the National Recovery Act, Eleanor Roosevelt and local priest Monsignor Ligutti. Many of the original homestead homes still exist. There is a National Historic Marker at the end of Estates Way located off Highway 141.

Jester Park

Since 1958, Jester Park, with 1,834 acres, has been one of central Iowa's favorite outdoor playgrounds. No other location in central Iowa offers such a variety in outdoor recreation opportunities such as camping, hiking, snowmobiling, horseback riding, picnicking and golfing. More than 250 campsites are available along the lakeshore and among wooded hills. There are five picnic shelters within the park, a boat ramp, eight miles of hiking trails, five miles of snowmobile trails and playgrounds and natural playscapes. At the end of a three-milelong park drive, you'll be rewarded with a vision of the wildlife that was abundant in Iowa more





than 200 years ago. The bison and elk herds that live in the wildlife enclosures are always a popular attraction.

High Trestle Trail

The High Trestle Trail is built on a former railroad bed, previously owned by Union Pacific Railroad. The 25-mile-long trail connects the communities of Ankeny, Sheldahl, Slater, Madrid and Woodward. Its 13-story, half-mile-long bridge over the Des Moines River is one of the largest recreation trail bridges in the world. The original 1912 railroad trestle bridge was rebuilt in 1973 with the concrete piers that still stand. Art elements at the new bridge remind visitors of the area's coal-mining history while enjoying biking, hiking or running.

Woodward Hardware, Antiques and Toy Museum

The storefront was created as a general grocery store in the early 1900s and turned into a hardware store in the late 1940s. Today it

continues to serve as a hardware store for the locals. As you walk in, you'll see the history of the antique hand tools, machines, benches and parts from the early 19th century. There is also a hidden treasure in the attic of antique toys, games and rides that will take you back to your childhood and the fun you had playing as a child. Call for appointments.

Veterans Reception Center

This beautiful new building was built with a focus on providing a free venue for families of veterans after internment services at the Iowa Veterans Cemetery. This facility is also available for use by the general public.

Minburn Minneapolis and St. Louis Railroad Depot


Minburn's brick Minneapolis and St. Louis Railroad Depot, rebuilt in 1914 after the original frame building burned down, has been relocated about a half a block but is still alongside the Raccoon River Valley Trail at the crossing with Highway 169. Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the old cargo area has restroom facilities and the waiting room and office area houses a café. Stop and have a bite to eat or drink and sit outside on the patio or stay inside to enjoy the revolving displays of Minburn area history. There is also a working phone booth if you would like to show the younger generation how we kept in touch while traveling without cell phones. A Freedom Rock is located nearby.

Raccoon River Valley Trail

The Raccoon River Valley Trail is a multi-use recreational trail built on a former railroad right-of-way and is 89 miles of paved trail passing through Dallas, Greene and Guthrie counties. The trail passes through 14 communities: Jefferson, Cooper, Herndon, Yale, Panora, Linden, Redfield, Adel, Waukee, Dallas Center, Minburn, Perry, Dawson and Jamaica. A trail user permit is required for trail users 18 years of age and older.

• Big Bend Wildlife Area

Big Bend is a 640-acre wildlife management area adjacent to the Middle Raccoon River and is open to hunting, fishing, bird watching, nature appreciation, canoeing and hiking on undeveloped trails through reestablished prairie and an oak-hickory forest. The area teems with native game including rare, protected plant and animal species.

Dawson Depot

The old Milwaukee Railroad Depot in Dawson, which was built in 1889, is one of the few surviving Milwaukee Depots, possessing almost all of its original integrity. A historic restoration project on the old rail line directly connects to the Raccoon River Valley Trail and Highway 141. The Dawson Depot serves as a welcoming oasis for weary bicyclists, walkers and joggers and serves as one of the last reminders of a proud past. The old waiting room was converted into a restroom and resting area, while interpretive displays fill the former baggage room.

• Forest Park Museum

The Forest Park Museum exhibits natural, cultural and historical artifacts of central Iowa, with displays that include early transportation, farming, railroading, blacksmithing, local artists, genealogical references and library resources. On the museum grounds, visitors can explore the Alton School House, the 1860s Grabenhorst log cabin, and a 17-acre arboretum and restored prairie. The grounds connect to the Raccoon River Valley Trail, making it a great place for trail users to take a rest stop detour. Open weekdays year-round (weekends April-October). Free admission.

Glissman Conservation Area

Glissman Conservation Area is approximately 5 miles southwest of Adel along the Raccoon River Greenbelt. The property features 60 acres of oak and hickory woodlands, 2.5 acres of grasslands, and a 7.5-acre pond with plenty of fish. Enjoy the outdoors as you experience a diversity of wildlife and plant species in peaceful seclusion. The Glissman Lodge sleeps up to eight people and features a fully-equipped kitchen, two full bathrooms, and a deck with a beautiful view. Fun for the whole family or a reunion with friends. Available to rent May 1-Oct 31, plus April and November when conditions permit.

• Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) Post and Military Museum

Built in the 1880s, The Grand Army of the Republic Post is the only such building remaining on its original location. The G.A.R. was created to assist widows and children of men who died during the Civil War. Veterans met here to discuss community events and honor their lost comrades. Today this completely restored structure houses a military museum on the ground floor and the refurbished Post Meeting Room on the second floor. Open by appointment.

• Hanging Rock

A half-mile south of Redfield, Hanging Rock is comprised of 469 acres and features a landmark, massive outcrop of sandstone. The north half of Hanging Rock features a wildlife refuge and the park, with a picnic shelter, astronomical rock clock and a spur to the Raccoon River Valley Trail. The south half is open for hunting on wetland, prairie and savannah areas.

Kuehn Conservation Area

Located approximately 5 miles north of Earlham, Kuehn Conservation Area showcases 770 acres of native and reestablished prairies, riparian and upland forests, a nature center, bird blind, unique geological formations, archaeological sites and interpretive trails. Primitive camping and public hunting, including bow hunting, are available. Kuehn is the site for many outdoor and environmental education programs. Modern restrooms are available.

Redfield Depot

Just as today's four-lane highways provide Dallas County residents with easy access to Des Moines, the railroads of the early part of the 19th century served the same purpose. The Redfield depot stands as a reminder of Dallas County's remarkable railroad history. The Raccoon River Valley Trail was built on the abandoned Chicago Northwestern Railroad line. Now a resting spot for trail users, the depot still provides travelers entry and exit to the town of Redfield. Facilities include restrooms, an indoor rest area and a railroad display. The Redfield Development Commission operates a concession stand on weekends from June 1 – Oct. 30.

Sportsman Park

Adjacent to the North Raccoon River, the 40-acre Sportsman Park is ideal for nature trail hikes, picnicking and camping. The campground allows for primitive tent camping or RV camping and features an on-site camp host, modern shower house and restrooms, handicap-accessible playground and picnic shelters. Located minutes from the Raccoon River Valley Trail.



Middle / South Raccoon River Water Trail (map above)

The Middle/South Raccoon River Water Trail starts as two water trails that join midway below Redfield. Paddlers can start their float as far upstream in Guthrie County as Lenon Mill Park in Panora on the Middle Raccoon River — just over 17 miles to confluence. This route includes a lowhead dam at Redfield that must be portaged around.

Nation's Bridge Park near Stuart is on the South Raccoon River — just over 15 miles to confluence.

After the two rivers join, the trail continues approximately 19 additional miles to the confluence with the North Raccoon River near Van Meter

There are five public access areas along this water trail in Dallas County, two of which are managed by the Dallas County Conservation Board.

The Redfield Dam Access is located on the Middle Raccoon River, just upstream from where the two rivers join. The access is below the low-head dam and has a large parking area and concrete boat ramp.

The South Raccoon River Access is located

south of Redfield, just off of F-60 before the confluence. This access area is small and users must carry their watercraft down a gravel pad.

The Pleasant Valley Wildlife Area is managed by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. It is located south of F-60 at the end of Indian Trail. It includes a paved boat ramp and maintained parking area.

The Earlham Bridge Access is on the southwest side of the the P58 Bridge.

The Two Rivers Access is located in Van Meter at the end of this water trail.

North Raccoon River Water Trail (map on www. dallascountyiowa.gov/conservation)

The North Raccoon River Water Trail enables recreational paddlers to enjoy the North Raccoon River from Vogel Access in northern Sac County to the junction with the Des Moines River in Polk County, a distance of about 180 river miles.

Dallas County Conservation manages four of the nine public access areas along the North Raccoon River in Dallas County. All public accesses have a concrete boat ramp with the name of the access and the distance to the next access, including signs that point out any nearby amenities. To aide in navigation, each bridge over the North Raccoon River has visible signage on the upstream side of the bridge naming the road the paddler is passing under with the distance to

the next access.

- The furthest upstream access in Dallas County is the Dawson Boat Ramp. The Dawson Boat Ramp is located 1 mile north of Dawson along the east side of County Road P46.
- About 6 miles downstream is the Perry Boat Ramp located on the north side of the Highway 141 bridge at the west edge of Perry.
- The next stop is Spring Valley Access 4.5 miles down the river located at the east side of County Road P58.
- Another 5.6 miles takes you to Snyder Access which is on the south side of County Road F31 west of Minburn.
- Highway 44 Access is found 4.8 miles downstream.
- The next access is the Kinnick-Feller Park Access which is 6.4 miles on downstream.
- Downstream .7 mile is Adel Island Park. Both Kinnick-Feller Park Access and Adel Island Park are found at the north edge of Adel. This route includes a lowhead dam that must be portaged around.
- Traveling 7.5 miles downstream from Adel Island Park brings you to Puckerbrush Access. This access is located on the west side of County Road R16 about two miles north of Van Meter.
- Booneville Access is the last access in Dallas County and is another 8.1 miles downstream.

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
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Communities

With traditional population centers in the north and central portions of the county and a booming suburban area on the east, Dallas County has unique and diverse traffic patterns. Located only minutes from the Des Moines metro, but still having cornfields in many backyards, Dallas County truly provides an unmatched combination of rural and urban living.

- Adel: With a small-town vibe and proximity to Des Moines' metro, Adel is a vibrant, charming and thriving place to live, work and play. There's ample recreational opportunities at great city parks, the Dallas County Fairgrounds and the Raccoon River and the Raccoon River Valley Trail. Adel offers a great mix of culture and history, is the birthplace of Nile Kinnick, is the Dallas County seat and features a long-standing brickyard, brick structures and brick streets. Visit during the summer for monthly concerts and the Annual Sweet Corn Festival. Come and see for yourself why Adel is not just a place to visit, it's a place to thrive.
- Dallas Center: "Quietly Progressive" is the Dallas Center City motto. It was founded more than 125 years ago and has grown to more than 1,900 people. It is located about 20 miles northwest of Des Moines. The residents love and respect the past and are gently moving forward with plans to keep the city sound and fun while incorporating new ideas. The spiritual community is a comfort and collaboration of several churches and denominations that work together to make themselves better characters and provide support to those in need. Residents love the small town panache with all the seasonal activities that makes it feel like part of the Heartland.
- Dawson: A quiet community with 133 residents and located along Iowa

- Highway 141, Dawson offers a boat ramp at the North Raccoon River, a well-maintained city park, a fun play park and an updated community center. The restored depot welcomes those using the Raccoon River Valley Trail to town. Dawson is only about 1 mile from Sportsman Park, a 40-acre park of oak and hickory timber overlooking the North Raccoon River where you might enjoy fishing, hiking along the nature trails, picnicking or camping.
- **De Soto:** Home to more than 1,000 residents, De Soto is located immediately south of U.S. Interstate 80 on U.S. Highway 169, just 15 miles from West Des Moines at exit 110. Established in 1868, De Soto residents take great pride in their small-town values.
- Dexter: Dexter, the "Original One Horse Town," is one of the oldest towns in Dallas County. Having been platted in 1868, it celebrated its sesquicentennial in 2018. There is an amazing amount of history to explore as you begin the drive along the White Pole Road at I-80 exit 100. Travel west into town and stop at the Dexter Museum and Historic Roundhouse. A historical marker at the Roundhouse will give you a brief history of the 100-year-old building. A quick trip north of town will bring you to three more historical markers. The first marker indicates the site of the 1948



National Plowing Match with President Harry S. Truman in attendance. The second and third give information on the 1933 Bonnie and Clyde shoot-out and Dexfield Park, one of Iowa's largest amusement parks from 1916 to the early 1930s. With its updated main street, Dexter provides a nice escape from the busyness, noise and bright lights of the metro area, which is a quick 25 minutes away.

- Granger: Established in 1885, Granger's history is rooted in agriculture, railroads, coal mines, circuses and the Granger Homesteads. Because of its location close to excellent recreational activities such as three golf courses, Jester Park and Saylorville Lake, there are ample opportunities for relaxing-to-vigorous activities for individuals of all ages. Located next to Highways 141 and 17, Granger has become one of the fastest growing cities in the state of Iowa and the metro area. It maintains the charm of a small town and is only minutes from Des Moines.
- **Grimes:** Straddling the borders of Dallas and Polk counties, Grimes is a fast-growing community. As such, Grimes has many new destinations that make the community a great place to visit. Some of these destinations include: Beaver Creek Golf Club, Tournament Club of Iowa, Hyperion Golf Course, Climb Iowa, Cutty's Des Moines Camping Club, Sky Zone, Pole Position Raceway, Ignit Sports & Fitness, Old School Pinball & Arcade, and AmericInn. Stay for a weekend or a week and take advantage of all the fun and exciting things the community has to offer.
- Linden: Located along the Raccoon River Valley, Linden has a well-maintained city park, community building, baseball field and shelter house. Water enthusiasts have two nearby access points to the Middle Raccoon River.
- Minburn: True to its motto, Minburn is the

"Small Town with a Big Heart." Town residents and their rural neighbors maintain a strong sense of history and community. Volunteer efforts enable the traditional celebrations and events once found in small towns everywhere to continue to be enjoyed by generation after generation here. Celebrate the holidays and enjoy the outdoor concerts and roller skating. The town's historic brick Railroad Depot was relocated and renovated into a trailhead for the Raccoon River Valley Trail and includes a cafe, which houses local museum items. Visit the Dallas County Freedom Rock nearby. Just west of Minburn is the Voas Nature Area, an excellent place to experience what the Minburn area landscape used to look like.

- Perry: Designated as one of Iowa's "Great Places," Perry boasts a combination of arts, history, culture, commerce and recreation, unmatched to any other of its size! Perry's walkable downtown is home to more than 30 buildings on the National Register of Historic Places, multiple arts and cultural festivals, as well as several murals and public art pieces, including four sculptures along the Willis Avenue boulevard that pay tribute to Perry's historical ties to the railroad, agriculture, industry and the arts. Discover the many treasures of the Downtown Perry Historical & Cultural District, including a boutique hotel, unique shops, destination dining, photo opportunities, and access to miles of paved trails. Whether just for a day, or as an extended stay: Perry will welcome and wow you!
- Redfield: Redfield, established in 1860, sits on the Middle Raccoon River, site of one of the few low-head dams remaining in Iowa. The fishing is popular and usually successful. Named for Lt. Col. James Redfield, an early settler who served in the 39th Iowa Infantry during the Civil War, the community boasts a rare Grand Army of

the Republic Post with a military museum, the Raccoon River Valley Bike Trail and Depot, a fine library and City Park and Hanging Rock Park on the Raccoon River. The Redfield Historical Museum is now open Saturdays and by appointment. Come see Redfield, and you'll find hiking, biking, canoeing, fishing, bird watching, excellent rural scenery and friendly people.

- Van Meter: Conveniently located just minutes from West Des Moines, Van Meter provides small-town living with access to "big city" amenities. A picturesque community situated near the Raccoon River, Van Meter prides itself on its quality of life and services provided by local foundations, volunteers and boards. It is neighbor to the Iowa Veterans Cemetery.
- Waukee: The City of Waukee is recognized as one of the fastest growing cities in Iowa and is located in Dallas County one of the fastest growing counties in the U.S. The population now exceeds 20,000 residents. Waukee offers a family-friendly environment featuring quality parks, schools and trails. The City is also dedicated to economic development and expanding business opportunities. - Woodward: Woodward was established in 1883 as a railroad community. Today, that railroad line bed has become the High Trestle Trail, a recreational trail from Woodward to Ankeny, which crosses the Des Moines River Valley on the spectacular High Trestle Bridge located just east of Woodward. People come to enjoy the view and artwork of the bridge. The old depot has been restored as the western gateway to the High Trestle Trail and Woodward Trailhead. Woodward also offers a unique combination of shopping and dining, as well as rural businesses offering handmade items, gifts, farm-fresh products and more.







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
