



FROM THE CITY MANAGER

Norwalk continues to see a stable growth pattern reflective of the Des Moines Metro Area with 7.6% taxable growth. Similar to the past two years, Norwalk will have the opportunity to lower the tax levy (please note that a lower levy does not mean a lower tax bill — there are many factors that influence property taxes). Norwalk also has plans for several large projects to advance in FY23. Here is a summary of our major projects:

- Norwalk Central & Athletic Complex (\$9.5M)
- Hwy 28 & Beardsley Intersection Improvements (\$4.2M)
- Hwy 28 & North Avenue Intersection Improvements (\$3.2M)
- Water & Sewer Infrastructure Projects (\$4M)
- Over \$1.5 million of other street improvement projects
- Economic Development infrastructure (\$22M-Norwalk Central & Hotel)



Goals, Vision, Path to Success

Norwalk continues to strive for the success of our community by carrying out the vision and goals of the Mayor and City Council and input from citizens. Below is an update of our progress.

Status Update of Vision 2028:

- 1. Tight Knit Friendly Neighborhoods. Norwalk has participated in community efforts to engage the public, such as Front Porch Norwalk, July 4th celebration and Music Fest. The City has also created "Taxpayer Talks" YouTube videos that seek to briefly summarize a topic of interest to citizens.
- **2. Safest City in Iowa.** Norwalk continues to place at the top of "safe city" ratings across Iowa and the United States.
- **3. Trails.** Completed one connection to the Great Western Trail, 95% of second link and will begin the third phase Spring 2022. Funds are budgeted in FY23 for school trail gap connections, and the City anticipates similar improvements in the next several years.



- **4. Norwalk Central.** Norwalk Central is a public-private partnership that will include a sports complex with both indoor and outdoor athletic amenities. The surrounding area will include commercial, retail and residential developments and is estimated to increase taxable value \$40M by 2030.
- **5. Mixed Use Developments.** We are at the beginning stages of a project called Norwalk New Urbanism. The goal of this program is to welcome mixed density development with some integration of workforce housing. The intention is that this housing will spur surrounding commercial development.
- **6. 30% Property Tax Revenue from Commercial.** Since 2021, the City has increased commercial tax revenue by 2%. The City is leveraging that commercial value to help introduce additional commercial projects. Current projects include the North River Sewer Interceptor (certified site 2.0), a hotel project near Hwy 5 and sports facilities in Norwalk Central.
- 7. Increase Quality Jobs. Norwalk recently welcomed Michael Foods and Windsor Windows to the Norwalk community. These two employers have introduced more than 400 jobs in our city. Several new commercial developments are being negotiated and will include retail, hotel, restaurants and athletic facilities.

I look forward to another successful year for the City of Norwalk.



Q: What is included in my monthly utility bill?

A: All or some of the services included in your bill are water, sewer, storm water and trash and recycling. Water meter reading begins each month on the first business day, and bills are mailed around the 15th of each month. Payment is due on the fourth.

Disconnection notices are sent on the 11th of each month. If no request for a financial arrangement has been received and no payment has been received, water is shut off on the 25th of each month.

Q: Can I pay my utility bill online?

A: Yes. Customers can sign up for Xpress Bill Pay at www.xpressbillpay. com/#/?org=norwalk10505 to make payments online or set up automatic payments. Customers can also download the new Xpress Bill Pay app to their phone.

Payments can also be made by cash, check, credit card or money order. Payments may be dropped off or mailed to **City Hall.**

Q: When is garbage picked up?

A: Garbage is picked up **Tuesday** at homes west of Highway 28/Sunset Drive and **Wednesday** east of Highway 28/Sunset Drive.

Large items and extra trash are collected on garbage day from the curb with the appropriate stickers. (No call ahead needed.) Schedule appliance pick-up with the hauler and apply appropriate stickers.

To start/stop service, call Norwalk City Hall, **515-981-0228**. For information about carts, call Metro Waste Authority at **515-244-0021**. Residents can also take garbage to Metro Park East landfill.

Q: Is recycling picked up curbside?

A: Yes, it is. Metro Waste Authority manages Curb It!, the curbside recycling program, but contracts two important functions. Waste Management collects the recyclables from the curb, and Mid America

Recycling sorts and resells them.

For information about collection, call **515-244-7336**. Collection Day is **Tuesday** for those west of Highway 28/Sunset Drive and **Wednesday** east of Highway 28/Sunset Drive.

Q: Is yard waste picked up?

A: Metro Waste Authority
manages Compost It!, the curbside yard
waste collection program and contracts
with Waste Management to collect the
yard waste during spring, summer and fall.
A limited winter collection is held. Yard
waste is collected **Tuesday** west of Highway
28/Sunset Drive and **Wednesday** east of
Highway 28/Sunset Drive. For information
about collection, call 515-244-0021. To
start service, call Metro Waste Authority,
515-244-0021. Residents can also take
yard waste to Metro Park East to be made
into compost.



CITY FAQS

Q: What requirements are there to use the Dog Park?

A. Dogs must be licensed, and you must have a dog park pass to use the Dog Park. Visit City Hall or the City's website for applications. All applications require proof of vaccination and spayed/neutered records. The licensing renewal period begins Dec. 1 and runs through July 1. Licenses expire Jan. 1.

Q: How do I report a lost or found dog?


A: Residents should contact City Hall at 515-981-0228 ext. 2221 during business hours and Westcom at 515-222-3321 during off business hours.

Q: Can we have chickens in town?

A: Yes, but limitations are in place. Only residents in R-1 zoning districts can have chickens. They can have no more than four chickens, can not have roosters and can not slaughter chickens. Regulations are also set for the allowed enclosures. Permits for the chickens and for building the enclosure are required. See **City Hall** or the City's **website** for more information.

Q: Is open burning allowed?

A: Open burning of garbage is **not allowed.** Recreational fires are allowed in some circumstances. See City Hall or the City's website for more information.



Q: What are the rules about street parking in case of snow?

A: When the City issues a snow emergency, parking is not allowed on public streets, alleys or City-owned off-street parking areas. Remember, too, that property owners must clear sidewalks of snow and ice within 24 hours of it accumulating or the City may do so and assess the costs.

Q: What does the City consider a nuisance?

A: According to Norwalk City Code, a vehicle must be parked on a hard surface and cannot be parked in a person's yard. The maximum allowed grass height is 8 inches. Excessive garbage, debris and other waste is



not allowed. Dead or diseased trees must be removed.

If you want to report a nuisance, complete the online nuisance report on the City's website. If you have questions or comments about the nuisance code, email tstravers@norwalk.iowa.gov or call 515-981-9530. If you have an immediate health or life safety concern, please contact City Hall directly by calling 515-981-0228 or by dialing 911.





ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The Economic Development Department handles a variety of business initiatives and development aspects for the City of Norwalk, such as: new company recruitment, business expansion assistance, project management and development agreements, incentives programs, property locating/site selection and infrastructure assistance, statistics and demographics, grant writing and financial programming, research and marketing, communications/public relations, community enhancement programs, foreign relations, business start-ups and special events.

In the last several years, the Economic Development Department has been involved in generating more than \$150,000,000 of new commercial investment into Norwalk including Michael Foods, Windsor Windows, Norwalk Chiropractic, 1908

Draught House, Hughes Century Crossing, Sunset Crest Retail, the soon to open Alice Place Senior, future hotel and fine dining at North Shore, Norwalk Central and the Sports Campus, and much more. Economic Development also established Norwalk's first international designation with the Sister-City partnership in Vushtrri, Kosovo, administers the Commercial Improvement Grant Program, the High Quality Jobs Grant, and the First-in Commercial Development Incentive Program.

THE PERFECT LOCATION


The City of Norwalk shares borders with neighboring cities of Des Moines and West Des Moines, while serving as the closest suburban community to the Des Moines International Airport and Valley Junction. Norwalk features beautiful new residential neighborhoods, world-class schools, and some of the best golf courses in Iowa.

Ranked "Safest City in Iowa" two years in a row, Norwalk's median household income is the third highest in central Iowa, and it has one of the lowest unemployment rates in the nation as well as being one of the fastestgrowing cities in Iowa.

In addition to the Des Moines Metro's key industries, Norwalk is primed for retail development. There are multiple commercial and retail developments underway in the city and shovel-ready sites are still available for new projects. With the Highway 28 corridor running through the middle of Norwalk from West Des Moines (63rd Street) and the main metro connector Fleur Drive extending along Norwalk's eastern borders, the remaining commercial sites are incredibly valuable.

Some of the metro companies that recently chose to expand their businesses in Norwalk are: Luana Savings Bank, Mahalo's Coffee & Donuts, Windsor Windows, Mercy Clinics, UnityPoint, Jimmy John's, Michael Foods, Arby's, Jones Family Dental, Johnson Orthodontics, RC Dermatology, Athletico, Northern Lights Pizza and 1908 Draught House.





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BUSINESS & COMMUNITY-BASED PROGRAMS

Business/Commercial

The City of Norwalk offers commercial building grants for façade and value-added facility improvements. Buildings must be within Norwalk city limits and be at least 10 years of age. Grants available are for \$1,500 to \$50,000 for qualifying projects. Matching funds required.


Demolition expenses for dilapidated structures can now be included in the application for this grant (project must include future commercial development on razed site). Funds can also be used to convert residential properties that are located in commercial areas into commercial facilities.

In addition to the Commercial Improvement Grant Program, the Economic Development Department at the City also offers a High Quality Jobs Grant to employers that meet certain criteria when adding new full-time positions, and the First-in Incentive



program for new commercial projects that get built first in a larger undeveloped area and require new infrastructure.

The City of Norwalk also provides a Five-Year Graduated Tax Abatement program for new commercial structures built in Norwalk. Contact the Economic Development office or City website for details about the abovementioned grant and incentives programs.





Veterans

The Home Base Iowa program helps veterans move to Iowa and find



full-time employment. The program has many benefits for veterans who are recently separated from the military or returning from deployments. Norwalk and Warren County are Home Base Iowa Communities, which adds to the statewide benefits package for veterans who move to, or work in, Norwalk. Many of Norwalk's businesses are committed to hiring veterans and regularly post available positions.

The Norwalk Economic Development Department also offers a \$5,000 grant to any veteran or veteran spouse who opens or physically expands a business in Norwalk. Foreign Relations

Norwalk is one of the few Iowa cities to hold an official international designation. Norwalk is Sister-City with



Vushtrri, Kosovo, and has a close working partnership with the Kosovo Consulate in downtown Des Moines. The Norwalk Foreign Relations Committee was created to engage local residents with the international initiatives of the City. Norwalk and Vushtrri are currently working on projects that will provide opportunities for business and trade, education and youth exchanges, government and public safety programming.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

The Norwalk Community Development Department handles the development and building process for the City. The process starts with the long-term planning of land uses, infrastructure and other City amenities. Land is then developed through the zoning, subdivision, and site development of property. Finally, a building permit can be submitted for the construction of various structures.

Building permits through the City can be sought for many different structures, from new commercial buildings and new houses to remodeling projects, sheds and pools. Staff in the department also conduct inspections of various permitted projects to ensure safety of structures and compliance with City codes.

The various uses of property are handled through the City's Zoning Ordinance, which is administered by the Community Development Department. Questions on allowed uses and locations of structures can be directed to the Department. The Department also assists with the requested changes to zoning for property owners.

Lastly, the Community Development Department handles all nuisance complaints for the City. Complaints can be called in, emailed, or submitted online via the City website. The Department staff investigates all nuisance complaints and issues any corrective actions needed.

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Ballfields, the aquatic center and shelters can be reserved.

Shelter reservation fees are \$15 for four hours, \$25 for more than four hours but no longer than eight hours. The shelter at Wildwood Park has a kitchen available with rental fees including the kitchen being \$40 up to four hours and \$80 up to eight hours.

NO alcohol is allowed in any of Norwalk's parks. Reservations can be made online.

Billy O. Phillips Park 2500 Lexington Drive

Features: restrooms, playground, open air shelter (available for reservation), picnic tables.

Brownie Park

805 Cherry Parkway

Features: a butterfly garden, white picket fence and an arbor that greets visitors entering the park from Cherry Parkway. A wooden porch-style swing hangs from a matching arbor just past the butterfly garden. Play a game of checkers on the picnic tables or hopscotch as you walk down

the trail past the fairy garden and through the Magnolia Arboretum. There are no restrooms at the park, but enjoy a walk over to the library for facilities and parking.

City Park

907 North Ave.

Features: restrooms, playground, basketball courts, picnic tables, shuffleboard courts, old railroad car, open shelter house with picnic tables.

Dog Park

907 North Ave.

Features: two fenced areas, one for small dogs and one for larger dogs, and water fountains. Pass required (purchase at City Hall, 705 North Ave.).

Elizabeth Holland Park

1401 Colonial Parkway

Features: two fishing ponds stocked by the DNR, 0.86-mile trail with lighting, art sculptures. Future additions will include an enclosed shelter with restrooms and additional parking.

Norwalk McAninch Sports Complex 200 Wright Road

Features: two youth baseball fields, two youth softball fields, two adult softball fields, 23 soccer fields and multi-use green space including concession and restroom areas. Field space is available to rent for tournaments, league play, scrimmages and practices, etc.

McDonald's Woods 1401 Holly Drive

Features: a forest-like setting with trees and picnic tables. To access the parking lot, use Holly Drive south of the park.

Norwalk Outdoor Ice Rink 907 North Ave.

The Ice Rink is open for skating during the winter, when weather permits. A color system will be used to inform the public of skating conditions. A traffic signal (stop light) has been installed at the Ice Rink. A green light indicates the rink is open and conditions are suitable for skating. A red light indicates the rink is closed. The Ice Rink is closed when posted due to weather, ice conditions or maintenance if there is damage to the rink or if the ice has melted.

Warrior Park

Features: restrooms, pre-school playground, NFL Play 60 Challenge Course (one of three in the Midwest), open air shelter, trail connection to Orchard Hills Elementary, pond stocked by the DNR, limited parking.

Windflower Park 1915 North Ave.

Features: the Norwalk Aquatic Center, playground equipment, walking path, 12-hole disc golf course, double-wide basketball court, skateboard park, open shelter house with an enclosed kitchen and restrooms.


