WDM FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

June 10 – Residential fire: Fire crews were dispatched for a structure fire at approximately 1:32 on June 10. While in route, firefighters upgraded the alarm to a working fire. They arrived to find a two-story residential home with heavy black smoke and fire on the back side of the attached garage and the side of the home. Everyone was out of the home. Fire attack was initiated, and the fire was under control quickly. Firefighters spent extra time with overhaul due to the flammability of the blown insulation. Initial damage estimates are at \$100,000, and no injuries were reported. The fire was caused by improper disposal of embers from a charcoal grill.

June 19 – Commercial fire: At approximately 10:45 a.m., West Des Moines firefighters were dispatched to 608 S. 19th St. for a reported structure fire. The first arriving engine found smoke and flames showing from the building. Firefighters had to force their way into the building through a door and immediately encountered high heat and thick smoke with near zero visibility.

A total of three alarms were called for this incident that brought crews in from Windsor Heights, Urbandale and Clive fire departments. Outside temperatures were in the mid 90s, so, as crews rotated, they were checked by members of West Des Moines EMS for signs of heat exhaustion.

No injuries were reported, and the cause of the fire is under investigation. Initial damage estimates are \$200,000. ■

SWEET SUMMER TREATS THAT BEAT THE HEAT

WATERMELON GELATO

Servings: 8

- 2 cups pureed watermelon
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 cup fat-free half-and-half
- 3 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/2 cup whipping cream

Directions

In blender, blend watermelon, sugar, cornstarch, half-and-half, lemon juice and whipping cream until smooth.

Using ice cream maker, process gelato according to manufacturer's instructions.

KIDS TRIATHLONS AT RACCOON RIVER PARK TO IMPACT TRAFFIC

The City of West Des Moines will be hosting two kids triathlons in Raccoon River Park: The RipRoar Kids Triathlon on Saturday, July 9, and the Flatland Kids Triathlon on Sunday, July 10.

On Saturday, July 9, Grand Avenue along Raccoon River Park will remain open, but the park will be heavily impacted by triathlon activities.

The Flatland triathlon on Sunday will involve closures of Grand Avenue from approximately 6 a.m. to noon from River Ridge Drive to South 35th Street.

For the duration of both triathlons, Grand Avenue access to Raccoon River Park will be closed until 1 p.m. Access into Raccoon River Park will be via S. 11th Street. Parking may be limited while the triathlons are taking place in the park, which is expected to be until approximately 1 p.m. each day.

The boat ramp, beach and boathouse in Raccoon River Park will be closed each day during the triathlons from approximately 6 a.m. to 1 p.m.
