



COMMON QUESTIONS

How do I report a utility service outage?

- Electric and water: During business hours, call 515-961-9444, select option 2. After 5 p.m., call the Indianola Police Department at 515-961-9400.
- Communications: During business hours, call 515-961-9444, select option 2. After 5 p.m., call 515-961-9444 and follow the voice prompts to leave a message for the on-call technician. If it is before 10 p.m., you can also email support@imufiber.com. If there is a technician currently online, a technical support chat button will be available at www. indianola.com/fiber.

Does Indianola Municipal Utilities provide any programs to promote energy efficiency?

Yes. Rebates are offered on many energy-efficient upgrades. Contact IMU at 515-961-9444 for program requirements prior to installation. Some examples of projects include:

- Central Air Conditioners: To qualify, customers must work with their contractor to choose a central air conditioner that is adequate for the size of their home and has a Seasonal Energy Efficiency Rating (SEER) of 14 or higher.
- Lighting: LED lights and fixtures are eligible for rebates.
- Appliances: Rebates are available when some Energy Star appliances are purchased, such as washers, dryers, refrigerators and freezers.
- Add-On or Air-to-Air Heat Pump: Residential customers receive a rebate for adding a heat pump to the existing heating and cooling system.
- Geothermal Heat Pumps: Residential and commercial customers receive a rebate for installing a geothermal heat pump as the primary heating and cooling system.

Energy Audits: IMU customers can also request an energy audit that will be provided at no cost. Commercial customers should call 515-962-5308 to request an audit, and residential customers should call 800-545-0762 to request an audit.

Does Indianola Municipal Utilities provide any assistance for paying utility bills?

Project Share is a voluntary program, created to assist needy households in paying their winter energy bills. You can help by adding a regular Project Share (PS) contribution to your monthly utility payment or by making a direct donation to Project Share. These funds will then be distributed to neighbors in need of help paying for winter energy costs. Those qualifying for help will be carefully identified by an area social service agency. A local committee will oversee Project Share to guarantee all contributions will be handled equitably and efficiently. To enroll in the Project Share program, stop in at the customer service center, 210 W. Second Ave., or call customer service at 515-961-9444.

Where can yard waste be dropped off?

The City has a brush facility available to Indianola City residents only (ID required) at 1800 W. Iowa Ave. The facility is open April through Nov. 20 for 2022. Thursdays from noon to 7 p.m., Saturdays 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., and Sundays noon to 4 p.m. It is closed on holidays.

Fees for leaves and grass are \$2 per bag/ bundle, \$20 for a pickup load, \$25 for a trailer load, \$30 for a small truck load and \$50 for a large truck load. Cost for trees/shrubs are \$5 per bag/bundle, \$20 for a pickup load, \$25 for a trailer load, \$30 for a small truck load and \$75 for a large truck load. Items may be loose or in paper bags only.

Wood mulch is available at the Indianola Brush Facility during normal hours of operation free of charge. Individuals wanting mulch will need to provide their own containers, and assistance is not provided except on the second Saturday of the month from 9 a.m. to noon. A fee of \$10 is charged for staff helping load a trailer or pickup to help offset costs.

Are dogs allowed in city parks and at the Pickard Softball Complex?

Dogs are allowed in Indianola city parks as long as they are leashed at all times and owners clean up any messes. This includes the softball complex at Pickard Park. Indianola's off-leash dog park is available for residents and non-residents. An annual membership costs \$25 per dog.

How can I get city alerts such as when the snow ordinance is in effect?

Any alerts in effect for the City of Indianola can be found online in the Alert Center at www.indianolaiowa.gov/alertcenter.aspx. Alert Center allows you to view all alerts and emergencies in your area. To be instantly notified of alerts and emergencies, subscribe to Notify Me® or RSS. The links are included on the Alert Center page.

Is alcohol allowed in city parks?

The City allows limited use of alcohol in parks. Special permits are issued from the Parks and Recreation department, subject to a damage deposit. Call 515-961-9420 for more specific information.



COMMON OUESTIONS

How do I get my utilities hooked up?

Residents living within the city limits (and limited areas outside the city limits) have the following services through Indianola Municipal Utilities and City of Indianola: Electric, Recycling, Waste Water, Water, Storm Water.

Billings for these services are issued on the first day of the month and are due no later than the 20th of the month in which they are issued. (Balances not paid by the 20th are subject to a late charge of 1.5%.)


Application for municipal utility services must be filed at the IMU Customer Service Center located at 210 W. Second Ave. The application must be signed by all adults or emancipated minors residing at the address to be served. A connection charge shall be

required at the time of application. The connection charge is \$15.90 for each utility service requested during regular business hours, which are Monday - Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. A valid photo ID is required.

How do I get or renew a drivers license?

The Warren County Treasurer's Office, 301 North Buxton St., Suite 102, issues and renews drivers licenses. It is open by appointment only. To schedule an appointment, visit https://wb-warrencountyia. qmatic.cloud/qmaticwebbooking/#.

Where do I get a license plate?

The County Treasurer, 301 N. Buxton St., Suite 102, processes motor vehicle transactions and collects appropriate fees. Services include: title transfers and collection of Road Use Tax, collection of registration fees (license plate/validation fees) and refunds as required, collection of annual license fees due for all types of vehicles, issuance of specialty plates, notation and cancellation of security interests (liens) and issuance of Storage of Vehicles and Junking certificates. The office is open by appointment only. To schedule an appointment, visit https://wb-warrencountyia. qmatic.cloud/qmaticwebbooking/#. For information, call 515-961-1111.



LIBRARY



Services

- Adventure Pass: Check out a free pass to the Blank Park Zoo, the Greater Des Moines Botanical Garden, and the Science Center of Iowa. Each pass includes admission for two adults and two children. Passes are available on a first-come, first-served basis, and may be reserved up to 90 days in advance by cardholders 18 and older. Check with the library for more details.
- **Book Boxes:** Books (to borrow) and goodies (to keep): The Library periodically offers personalized book picks from the librarians plus surprise goodies in each box. Check with the library to sign up.
- Interlibrary loan: If the library doesn't have a book you want, they can request it from another library.
 - Printing, scanning and faxing: These services are offered during regular business hours.
- **Homebound delivery program:** The library provides free book selection and delivery to homebound patrons.
- **Reserve a meeting room:** Reserve for civic, cultural or educational meetings for community groups.
- Seed Library: The Seed Library is located in a card catalog cabinet near the newspapers. The drawers are sorted into "Fruit & Veg," "Herbs" and "Florals" and filled with donated seeds. Any member of the community can borrow seeds from the Seed Library without a card or membership required. Taking seeds from the seed library only promises that, if you can, you will donate some of the seeds you save. The Seed Library is sponsored by the Warren County Master Gardeners.

Support the library

The Friends of the Indianola Public Library Foundation supports the goals of the library. In doing so, they are the sole supporter of the summer reading program, have and continue to provide support for remodeling projects, and fund events such as Breakfast with Dr. Seuss. BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

Downtown Square Commission

The Downtown Square Commission consists of property owners, business owners and residents in the Downtown Square area. This Commission is responsible for recommending sidewalk and street use permits, street closure permits and reviewing façade grant applications. Commission members are appointed by the City Council. Meetings are at 10 a.m. the third Tuesday of the month in the City Hall Council Chambers.


Indianola Public Arts Commission

The mission of the Indianola Public Arts Commission is to encourage the cooperation and coordination of art projects that will enhance the cultural level of the arts in the community. The commission works with Simpson College, the Indianola Community School District, and other groups to encourage individuals and groups to foster a broad arts program for the community. Meetings are the fourth Thursday of the month at 6 p.m. in the City Hall Council Chambers.

Hometown Pride Committee

The mission of the Hometown Pride Committee is to bring neighbors together to build a sense of community, create and improve public amenities, and celebrate what makes Indianola great. Indianola Hometown Pride is part of the state wide Hometown Pride program and one of seven Hometown Pride programs in Warren County. The group meets monthly.





Mayor's Youth Council

Established in January of 2011, the Indianola Mayor's Youth Council provides Indianola's youth with an active role in learning about and addressing issues in the community. Indianola High School students are chosen to serve on the council and have the unique opportunity to learn how government works, represent the youth in the community, and become actively involved with community projects and activities. Participation on the council offers valuable leadership experience and will involve close interaction with the Mayor, City Council and members of the community in working toward the betterment of Indianola.


Parks & Recreation Commission

The Parks & Recreation Commission advises City Council on the needed facilities to provide open spaces, such as parks and playgrounds, and community facilities for other forms of recreation. It oversees city programs and encourages other programs for the leisure time of City residents of all ages. Meetings are at 6 p.m. the second Wednesday of the month at the Activity Center.

Veteran's Memorial Building Commission

The Veteran's Memorial **Building Commission** consists of honorably discharged soldiers, sailors, marines, airmen or Coast Guard members who manage and control the Veteran's Memorial Aquatic Center and establish rules and regulations for management. The group meets quarterly at 5:30 p.m. at the Activity Center. Other boards can be found on the City website.





EMERGENCY SERVICES



911

911 is to be used only in emergency situations. An emergency is any situation that requires immediate assistance from law enforcement, fire department or emergency medical services.

Calling 911 activates an entire network of highly-trained emergency medical workers. Their time and expertise are valuable and should not be wasted on non-emergencies. Generally speaking, people are aware that they should call 911 in an emergency, but they are less aware of the circumstances in which they should not call 911. Non-emergency calls to 911 impede the efficiency of responders and call-takers by interfering with legitimate 911 calls.

When to call 911: medical emergencies; heart attack or stroke; someone faints or collapses; someone is badly injured; domestic violence; fires; burglary, theft or crime in progress; vehicle accident with life threatening injuries; suspicious activities; chemical/fuel spill and other emergencies.

When not to call 911: to get information, power outages, to report a broken water main or fire hydrant, loud party or barking dog, transportation to a doctor appointment, to pay tickets, for prescription refills or pickups, for treatment for minor cuts/abrasions, as a prank, for non-life threatening chronic medical conditions or to receive priority care at the emergency room.

Emergency notifications

The Warren County Public Notification System is set up to alert the public about emergencies in the area. In the event of an emergency or severe weather, an alert can be sent to the phone numbers and/or email addresses of those who have signed up. This is a free service provided by Warren County Emergency Management and Alert Iowa. For more information and to register, visit http://entry.inspironlogistics.com/warren_ia/wens.cfm.

Police Department

The mission of the Indianola Police Department is to work in partnership with the community to protect life and property and enhance the quality of life in the city through excellence in policing.

Indianola Police have created a safe exchange zone at the Police Department. Two parking spots on the south side of the Police Department have been designated for safe exchange zone parking. Individuals can meet to safely exchange goods related to online selling sites. The zone can also be used by parents for safe child custody exchanges. The safe exchange zone is monitored by a surveillance camera 24 hours a day.

To make a code enforcement request, call the Community Development Department at City Hall at 515-961-9430 or the Indianola Police Department at 515-961-9400.



Note that the Indianola Police Department does not generally unlock vehicles unless it is an emergency situation such as a child locked inside a vehicle. This is due to the increasing complexity of car security systems and side-impact airbags; attempts to open may cause damage to a vehicle or injury to an officer. Contact a locksmith to open vehicles.

If you are gone on vacation, the police recommend you advise them if your residence will be unoccupied. Call or go to the Indianola Police Department to fill out a vacation check form. Bring to the police station or email it to pallsup@cityofindianola.com.

Fire Department

As emergency responders to fires, medical emergencies and disasters, natural or manmade, the Indianola Fire Department protects the lives and property of residents and visitors. The Department promotes public safety through its fire prevention, investigation and education programs.

The department's fire district encompasses 125 square miles located centrally in Warren County, including the City of Indianola. Its members are comprised of career/full-time, part-time and paid-on-call employees. The department's members provide emergency services 24-hours/7-days a week to all citizens and visitors in the fire district. The department also responds to mutual aid requests from other jurisdictions.

The emergency medical service is authorized by the State of Iowa Public Health Department to provide paramedic-level care.

Smoke detectors: The City of Indianola Fire Department purchases and/or receives donations of a limited number of smoke alarms for distribution to City of Indianola residents who may otherwise not be able to afford them. If you can afford a smoke alarm but have a question or concern regarding installation of your own smoke alarm, contact the office of the deputy chief at 515-961-9405.



RECYCLING

Recycling plays an important role in keeping the community environmentally safe and controlling waste at the South Central Iowa Landfill. A total of 64% of Indianola residents participate in the citywide recycling program, which costs \$4.75 per month per household. The fee is charged to each residence whether the service is utilized or not. Residents are provided with a cart to hold their recyclable items.

The following items are acceptable for recycling: cardboard (must be broken down and cut to fit into cart); empty aerosol cans, glass jars and bottles of all colors; mixed paper (junk mail, envelopes, sticky notes, coloring books, phone books, cereal boxes, tissue boxes, magazines, etc.); necked plastic bottles (do not go by the numbers on the bottom of the containers); newspapers (also including inserts); plastic margarine and yogurt containers; shredded paper (must be contained

in a paper product such as a cereal box or paper sack); tin and aluminum cans.

The following items are banned from



your recycling cart: containers with motor oil or other hazardous materials, foil and disposable baking tins, food-contaminated items, garbage or yard debris, plastic bags, plastic cups, plastic food containers, polystyrene foam and wire hangers.

All recyclables may be placed in your cart to be picked up every other week depending on your place of residence. All items must be at the curb by 7 a.m.

INDIANOLA SQUARE

Indianola Downtown Square Reconstruction project

In August of 2018, Warren County voters approved a nearly \$30 million bond referendum to construct a new justice center for Warren County in the heart of Indianola's Downtown Square. Knowing that changes were coming, in September of 2018, the City of Indianola partnered with the Indianola Chamber of Commerce and Warren County Economic Development Council to have the Iowa Economic Development Authority conduct a Downtown Assessment on Indianola's Downtown Square. A key recommendation of the assessment was to develop a streetscape concept plan.


The results of the Downtown Assessment Visit recommended the City of Indianola focus on six key areas, one of which was to look at the Downtown Square's infrastructure and identify improvements that could



be made to the streetscape during the construction of Warren County's Justice Center. To assist with this recommendation, the City consulted with Bolton and Menk to redesign the streetscape of Indianola's Downtown Square.

After steering committee meetings and further study and input, the final concept includes: bump-outs, widened sidewalks, a combination of parking types, and hardscape enhancements.

Phase 1 began in June 2021. There are a total of nine phases to the project with completion expected in 2023. ■

CITY PARKS



Barker Park

401 S. First St.

One of the most popular neighborhood parks, the land for Barker Park was purchased by the Park Board in 1952 from C.F. and Francis Flesher, C. Ray and Eva Flesher, Frank C. and Blanche Flesher. The park was renovated in 2001. The park was named after a pioneer Indianola family, the Barkers.

The park features ball fields, basketball court, picnic areas and grill, playground and restrooms. The shelter offers three picnic tables with seating for 18.

Buxton Park

705 N. Buxton St.

Both stunning and serene, Buxton Park is nestled in the center of Indianola adjacent to Simpson College. Its formal gardens, butterfly garden, ornamental fountain, wind sculptures, public art and gazebo offer a spectacular setting for intimate gatherings, photo sessions or a simple stroll in the park.

A children's garden added in 2019 invites little ones to spend time getting closer to nature with a play tunnel, interactive Natureland game, musical instruments, planter boxes filled with touch and feel plants

and vegetables, and other nature-related activities.

Also home to an arboretum, the park offers a self-guided interpretive tree tour pamphlet at the display case near the gazebo. A three-tiered water fountain is ADA accessible and also offers a drink for dogs on leash.

The first park in the city's system was donated to the City in 1906 by Mr. and Mrs. William Buxton.

Dayton Park

800 E. Franklin Ave.

Donated by Osborne Williams in 1959 after construction of a new housing development on the east side of the city, Dayton is a small pocket park that adjoins the Summerset Trail and is used by area residents to play ball games or picnic. It features a playground and restrooms as well.

DeNelsky Park

509 E. Fourth Ave.

Opened in 2008, this park area includes 22.9 acres donated by the DeNelsky family as a memorial to Minnie DeNelsky.

The area has approximately 9-10 acres

of woodlands with the remaining in native grasses, flowers and open space. This unique natural area within the city limits provides environmental and wildlife appreciation and educational opportunities, in addition to serving as a neighborhood park. A minimum of 70% of the land will be maintained and managed as existing wooded and natural open space area.

Dog Park

1710 S. K St.

The park provides space where dogs can exercise and socialize with other dogs. It features agility equipment, benches, bag dispensers and waste receptacles, picnic tables, restrooms, water and shelter in a fenced-in area.

Access is available to members only. Annual membership fees are \$25/dog and expire one year after purchase date. Memberships may be purchased through Indianola Parks and Recreation. To become a member, download, print, sign and initial the Indianola Dog Park Membership Agreement form. The form needs to be signed by everyone who will take your dog(s) to the dog park.

Return the completed form, along with current vaccination records (Parvo/Distemper and Rabies) and \$25/dog membership fee to 2204 W. Second Ave. (Highway 92).

Magnetic annual permit access cards and lanyards will be issued to dog owners. The permit must be displayed while at the park.

Downey Park

1710 S. K St.

Adjacent to the Dog Park, this area features benches, picnic tables, restrooms and shelter. South River once flowed through Downey Memorial Park. Purchased by the City in 1933 as part of the waterworks areas, the site was named Richard Downey Memorial Park in honor of caretaker Walter Downey's son, who died in World War II.



Easton Park

1211 E. Euclid Ave.

Received by the City in 1974, after development of the surrounding homes, Easton is a neighborhood park with play equipment, landscape plantings and a stream running through the center.

McCord Park

900 S. P.St.

Donated to the Parks and Recreation Commission by Max McCord in 1976, the park has areas with play equipment and several hiking trails around the natural wooded perimeter of the site. Picnic area, basketball court, sand volleyball, restrooms and shelter are also found at the park.

Memorial Park

602 N. G St.

The land for this park was purchased in 1956 from Victor and Lois Gillespie for the purpose of building a pool. The park contains play equipment, open areas, a large aquatic center, an outdoor amphitheater and skate park as well as other park amenities such as restrooms, shelter, benches and more.

Moats Park

900 N. First St.

Visitors to Indianola are greeted by this cheerful wayside park on Highway 65/69. Its amenities make the park a popular destination for school outings, reunions and parties. The shelter offers 12 picnic tables with seating for

96. Visitors can enjoy the baseball/softball diamond, basketball court, picnic area, playground, restrooms and shelter.

The City purchased the north end of the site in 1911 with acquisition of the south portion in 1939. The park shelter was constructed in 1954, and summer band concerts were held there for years.

Pickard Park

2205 E. Second Ave.

The largest park in the city, Pickard Park offers a venue for many outdoor recreational activities. The shelter boasts a scenic view of the Iowa countryside. Formerly a farm, the park lies on the eastern edge of Indianola and is the eastern terminus of the McVay/Summerset Trail.

The park hosts cross country meets, youth and adult softball tournaments and disc golf tournaments including an annual National Tour featuring top professional and amateur disc golfers. A horseshoe court is also

available.

Acquired from the Clarence Pickard family in 1976, the rolling hillsides include some of the first terraces and water diversion projects completed by the Soil Conservation Service in Warren County.

Sesquicentennial Park

110 N. First St.

This little gem is located on the southeast corner of City Hall at Salem and Jefferson. Multiple flowerbeds showcase an everchanging display of annual and perennial flowers.

The pink-flowered Carefree Beauty rose is featured here as well as in plantings around Indianola. Ornamental Prairiefire crabapple trees are planted around the perimeter of the park. Antique-style lighting and a four-sided clock tower add a nostalgic touch to this park. The focal point of the park is a sculpture called the Tree of Life.



South Park

401 W. Fourth Ave.

Purchased from the estate of Horace E. Patten in 1964-65, this neighborhood park has been leveled and reseeded from its original land of a deep water way. Neighborhood children enjoy its play area and basketball court. Restrooms are available.

Ice Rink

Indianola Activity Center, 2204 W. Second Ave.

This public ice rink, which measures 80 x 40 feet, was donated in partnership with the Iowa Wild and Wells Fargo in the fall of 2018. Daily rink hours will be from dawn to noon for hockey and from noon to dusk for open skating as the weather



allows. Throughout the winter, the rink may be periodically closed for maintenance if the ice has melted or there is damage to the surface. Red and green signs will be posted at the gate to indicate whether or not the rink is open.

The Annett Nature Center, which opened in 1997, sits in the 160-acre ANC Park. The ANC rests on a hillside above a 6-acre pond and a 10-acre wetland and is adjacent to Lake Ahquabi State Park. The nature center has three levels containing interpretive exhibits, classrooms, WCCB administrative offices and a community room. The ANC serves as the hub for conservation education programs and as the focal point for many school field trips and summer nature day camps.

CITY TRAILS

Indianola's trail system boasts more than 5 miles of hard surface trails as well as 3.5 miles of hiking trails at Pickard and DeNelsky parks.

The McVay Trail, the Summerset Trail and the Jerry Kelley Trail can all be accessed from the Trailhead located at 503 N. Fifth St. It features off-street parking, a shelter with picnic tables, benches, pop machine, modern restrooms and a drinking fountain available seasonally.

Popular routes

- Take the McVay Trail 1.6 miles east to Pickard Park.
- Head north from the trailhead to the Summerset Trail (11.1 miles north to Carlisle).
- Take the Hillcrest Trail extension to access the Summercrest Hills neighborhood that includes the YMCA, medical offices and retirement communities (0.5 mile).



• Or head west on the Jerry Kelley Trail. Follow the sidewalk trail past Buxton Park to Memorial Park (1 mile). Continue west to Wilder Elementary (1.5 miles).

This phase has about half the trail off street, and half of it uses shared bike lanes on West Iowa Avenue and North Kenwood.

Tips for Trails Program

Customers may choose to "round up" their bill to the nearest dollar, with the additional rounding amounts being credited to the trails program, or add a flat dollar amount to their bill for trails. If you support trails and would like to see them enhanced, you can contribute to this effort.




