More than 50 miles of paved and natural surface trails accommodate a wide range of use including biking, hiking and equestrian activities. Saylorville Lake is also listed as a global bio-preserve and significant bird area for waterfowl that use the lake during their spring and fall migrations.

Three Saylorville Lake recreation areas to be closed in 2023 for upgrades

Saylorville Lake campgrounds and day use areas provide a variety of outdoor recreational opportunities for visitors throughout the summer. Over the past several years, some of the areas have received such heavy use that upgrades and repairs to water and sewer line systems have become a necessity. As a result, Prairie Flower and Cherry Glen campgrounds and the Cherry Glen picnic area at Saylorville Lake will be closed throughout the 2023 recreation season.

To help compensate for the temporary closures, Acorn Valley and Bob Shetler campgrounds will be open for an extended period during the recreation season from April 15 to Oct. 16, 2023. All other recreation areas at Saylorville Lake will be open during their regularly scheduled dates. Reservations can be made by visiting www.recreation.gov or calling 1-877-444-6777.

During the closures, the Prairie Flower and Cherry Glen fee booths will be closed. America the Beautiful (ATB) annual,



senior, access, military annual or lifetime passes, or USACE annual passes will still be available for purchase at the Saylorville Lake Visitor Center, open March 1 to Oct. 15 with varying hours, or the administration office, Monday to Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. (closed on federal holidays).

USACE Annual Day Pass



If you're planning on spending some days out on the lake boating or down at the beach this summer, then a USACE Annual Day Pass is right for you. Annual beach/boat ramp passes can be purchased for \$40 from a pay machine at the entrances to Cherry Glen or Lakeview Boat Ramps, Sandpiper Recreation Area, or Oak Grove Beach. Day Use Pass receipts MUST be exchanged for a pass hang tag within 14 days of purchase from the Visitor Center, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily, or the Saylorville Lake Administration Office, 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday to Friday.

If your receipt for the annual pass expires before getting the hang tag, you may be issued a citation for "failure to properly display applicable receipt, permit or pass" per Title 36 Rules & Regulations CFR 327.23 (C).

Ash Tree Removal



Campgrounds and recreation areas at Saylorville Lake may look a little different this recreation season due to the removal of ash trees killed by the invasive Emerald Ash Borer beetle, also known as EAB. Emerald Ash Borer is an exotic beetle that was discovered near Detroit in the

summer of 2002. The larvae of this species feeds on the inner bark of ash trees, which disrupts the trees' ability to transport water and nutrients, causing the tree to die over time. As of June 2022, EAB is now found in 36 states and areas of Canada. It was discovered in Iowa in 2010 and has killed thousands of trees across the state. It is important to look for signs and symptoms in ash trees, such as crown die back, exit holes in the tree, and woodpecker "flecking," meaning the areas that woodpeckers pick away at the outer bark of the tree.

Park rangers at Saylorville Lake have been working to remove trees killed by EAB in public use areas to prevent them from becoming hazards to people and property. Public safety is a top priority for the rangers and staff at Saylorville Lake, and while the removal of trees may seem like a bad thing, it is vital to our mission and key to keeping visitors safe in our recreation areas. In less accessible areas, some trees have been left to serve as habitat for birds, mammals, and insects, and, over the next few years, a diverse mix of tree saplings will be planted throughout the parks to replace removed trees.



Prescribed burns

Fire is a vital part of habitat restoration efforts at Saylorville Lake. Prescribed fire, also known as prescribed burns, is a natural and effective tool used to restore prairies and woodland areas around the lake. Historically, Iowa's prairies and woodlands have experienced periodic fires, set naturally or by Native Americans. Fire prevents invasive species as well as unwanted brush and trees from taking over. It also encourages new growth and improves habitat for many species of birds, butterflies, insects and mammals.

Rangers at Saylorville have been conducting prescribed burns each fall in various locations. The conditions must be just right when burning, when winds are at a good speed and in a good direction, and low relative humidity. This past fall, rangers and maintenance staff had the perfect weather to conduct a prescribed burn on Red Feather Prairie. It has been several years since Red Feather has been burned, and woody plants, cedars and other invasive species were encroaching. This prescribed burn was essential in restoring the health of Red Feather Prairie by providing nutrients and keeping invasive species and woody plants at bay.







Life jacket loaner stations

At Saylorville Lake, we take water safety seriously, and that's why life jacket loaner stations are now available at all U.S. Army Corps of Engineers designated boat ramps and beaches at the lake. Accidents can happen to anyone, at any time, and it is our goal to make water safety simple for those recreating at the lake.

Over the winter, an Eagle Scout offered to build seven new life jacket loaner stations to help improve water safety at Saylorville Lake. The new loaner stations are much nicer than the previous plastic stations. They have wooden frames, large hooks to hold the life jackets, and a large, easy-to-read, bilingual sign explaining how to properly fit a life jacket and the guidelines for using loaner station life jackets.


Life jackets housed on these stations are available on a firstcome, first-served basis, and parents/guardians are responsible for making sure children are in the correct sized jacket. Remember, it only takes an average of 60 seconds for an adult to drown and 20 seconds for a child. If a life jacket doesn't fit, it can't work properly to save a life. As with all life jackets, loaner or not, it is important to inspect them before each use to be sure they are in proper working condition. Rips or tears can significantly reduce the effectiveness of the jacket. Borrowed



jackets should always be returned to the loaner station when done being used so others can stay safe.

Saylorville Lake's life jacket loaner stations can be found at Lakeview High Water Boat Ramp, Lakeview Main Boat Ramp, Sandpiper Boat Ramp, Oak Grove Beach, Cherry Glen High Water Boat Ramp, and Cherry Glen Main Boat Ramp.

Working for us

Have you ever looked around Saylorville Lake's recreation areas and wondered what it takes to be part of the team keeping these areas enjoyable for all? It takes a dedicated team of staff, volunteers and contractors who are committed to providing quality outdoor recreation experiences while preserving and protecting our natural resources for the future. Full-time volunteers are required to "work" an average of about 21 hours per week, performing custodial, fee attendant, mowing, campground and Visitor Center hosting, as well as other position duties as assigned. In exchange for this service, volunteers receive a full hookup campsite in a corresponding campground or nearby volunteer village. Other perks include special gatherings with staff and fellow volunteers, the possibility to be chosen as a return volunteer in future years, the ability to gain life-long friends at the parks and the gratification in knowing you've become a good steward of the land.

Due to budget restraints, volunteers play a critical role in helping the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and other federal agencies operate facilities like Saylorville Lake. If you or anyone you know is interested in joining our team, please consider volunteering for one of our more than 30 positions. These roles can be filled by couples or an individual, as long as the duties can be completed. Many positions require a volunteer to "work" a few hours, five days per week while others are needed seven hours, three days per week. Volunteers without full-time jobs are preferred. Olofson Shooting Range



The Olofson Shooting Range was completely renovated in 2017 by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. The range is operated by the Iowa DNR and staffed by range safety officers. It is designed as a public facility that allows an opportunity to shoot all types of firearms. We feature a new registration/classroom building, 33 shooting lanes on a 30/50/100-yard range, shotgun sports including trap and skeet, along with a 3D and static archery range. This satisfies almost any shooting need in a safe, welcoming environment.

Hours and cost: The range is open year round from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on weekends and 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. on weekdays (closed Monday and Tuesday). The basic charge is \$10 per hour for the range usage or \$6 per round of 25 for the shotgun sports. We do not rent firearms or sell ammunition, so you must bring your own, although we do have targets available.

Olofson Shooting Range is closed: Jan. 1 (New Year's Day), Easter Sunday, July 4, Thanksgiving Day, Dec. 24 and Dec. 25.

Location and contact: We are located at 11652 N.W. Nissen Drive, in Polk City, Iowa. This is conveniently located between Saylorville and Big Creek Lake, just four miles north of Polk City. We can be reached at 515-795-4000.

Classes: We offer classes throughout the year, such as beginning shooting, hunter education, concealed carry, and a variety of outdoor skills topics. These classes are listed on the DNR website at https://register-ed.com/programs/iowa and registration is usually required.



Facilities and activities

Big Creek Lake was created as part of the Saylorville project to protect Polk City from floods. A diversion dam, which forms the 866-acre Big Creek Lake, was primarily developed as a flood control project but also offers a wide variety of recreation. Big Creek State Park and the adjoining public hunting areas provide recreation for visitors of all ages and interests. The focal point of the 3,550-acre complex is the lake.

Picnicking/shelters

Shelters and picnic areas, a beach, playground and several boat ramps provide a variety of outdoor recreation opportunities. Open picnic shelters, located in pleasant settings around the lake, can be reserved through the park reservation system. Shelters at the beach are handicap accessible.

Camping

Camping is not permitted at Big Creek State Park. However, there are several large federal and county camping areas about four miles away on Saylorville Lake.

Trails

A 26-mile paved multi-use trail allows bicyclists and pedestrians to travel from the beach south through the Saylorville Lake area all the way to Des Moines. A connection to the High Trestle Trail can be made by traveling east on 142nd Avenue for two miles. Eleven miles of snowmobile trails provide winter recreational opportunities. Big Creek is also popular with cross-country skiers.

Lake activities (swimming, boating, fishing)

Big Creek Lake's clear water provides great family swimming fun. Refreshments are available at the beach during the swimming season. A large wooden play structure is located at the beach. Disc golf and volleyball areas provide additional entertainment.

Big Creek Lake provides excellent fishing year-round. The lake's clear waters are stocked with crappie, bluegill, largemouth bass, walleye, channel catfish and muskie. The lake is popular for a variety of boating activities. Any size motor may be operated

at "no wake" (5 mph or less) speeds on the lake. Five modern boat ramps, three on the west side and two on the east, provide excellent access to the lake. A gravel ramp is located on the upper end of the lake. A fishing pier is accessible to the mobility impaired. Big Creek has a concessionaire that offers pontoon boats, kayaks, paddle boards, bicycles and more. To contact the concessionaire, call 515-984-6083 or visit their website at bigcreekmarina.com.

Hunting


The state park is a wildlife refuge where hunting is not permitted. However, hunting is allowed on the lake itself and in designated public hunting areas around the lake. Upland areas open for hunting are marked with public hunting signs. Favorite game includes pheasants, rabbit, deer and squirrel. Waterfowl hunting is popular on the lake. 





- Educational Ambassadors: Luna, a Great Horned Owl, and Millennium Blue, a Peregrine Falcon, now call Jester Park home. Both raptors were rescued after injury and can no longer live in the wild. They're still settling in, but you can visit them at the raptor enclosure near the nature center.
