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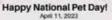




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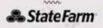




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THAT ought to be enough

Residents share their experiences as pilots

Our eyes often gaze upward in amazement. A clear, night sky filled with stars. Clouds painted in vibrant pinks and oranges by a rising sun. Ominous storms with lightning flashing across the heavens. Formations of geese traversing the continent, high above the land. And, heavy, metal airplanes with their human cargo miraculously crossing the skies as if light as hollow-boned birds.

While many of us are happily grounded, some pursue the dream of soaring above us, enjoying the view of expansive territories below, clouds from above, and the vastness of the blue sky surrounding them. This month, we ask local pilots to share the stories behind their passion for flight.

A family of pilots

Robin Diel, who lives in Winterset and grew up in a family of pilots, was inspired to start flying when her husband, Mike, became a pilot.

Robin grew up in Alaska taking trips with a dad who was a bush pilot (one who flew and landed in areas without landing strips). She says she loved it, as well as the fishing, hunting and more Alaska offered. Robin traveled around North America with her family, but they spent summers at Merrill Field Airport where her father had his business as a pilot.

"I loved watching the planes land and take off," she says.

Robin's first solo flight was in November of 2009, and she flew until she and Mike sold the plane in 2016. She recalls memorable flights including a cross-country flight from Tri-City in Sebring, Ohio, to Finger Lakes in New York, then to Niagara Falls and back.

"I have beautiful photos from circling above the falls," she says.

Robin flew in Ohio until she and Mike moved to Colorado in 2011, where they flew from Front Range Airport near Denver and took mountain flying lessons.

"My favorite route was over Trout Creek Pass, which opened to a majestic view of the Collegiate Peaks in the Rocky Mountains."

Robin and Mike also flew to Santa Fe, New Mexico, over Wyoming to Yellowstone National Park, and finally to Idaho, where they sold their plane.

Robin and Mike belonged to a club for pilots at Tri-City Airport. They had flight instructors who encouraged them to take "back seat lessons" while the other was flying.

"This gave us more experience, but when I was practicing stalling the plane, Mike felt sick in the backseat," she says.

Robin's favorite type of landing were the short field one.

"This is what we did in Alaska. It used to scare Mike."

While learning to fly, she learned precision.

"The flight check list is absolute and should never be cut short. I have carried that into other life experiences," Robin says.

Eventually, flying was no longer feasible for Robin and Mike, and, ultimately, Robin became less sure about piloting. When her pilot brother made her feel like the plane might crash, her confidence was shaken.

"I still loved right seat piloting with Mike, though."

Robin had several close calls flying as a

child and adult.

One was when Robin and Mike were returning from a sight-seeing venture and nearly collided with a jet upon landing at a small airport that did not have air traffic controllers.

Another close call occurred when her father was flying across an inlet and the engine lost a cylinder, the mount broke, and the plane shuddered.

"We were midway and barely made it to the airport for major repairs."

Another time, Robin accompanied her father on a caribou hunt in bitterly cold weather when one of the guns for the hunt slid on the plane, lodged in the rudder, and caused the huge wind gusts to throw the airplane back and forth. As a result, her dad lost his sense of direction, and they had to land in a lake.

Robin and Mike have enjoyed "hangar flying" with other pilots over the years, where they met up near their hangars to share these and many other aviation stories.

Quick trips

Robin's husband, Mike Diehl, became interested in flying so trips to visit his daughter could be fast and easy when the couple lived in Ohio and his daughter was home in Iowa.

Mike and Robin were members of an Ohio flying club for five years. When training, Mike and Robin discovered they loved "hangar flying" — exchanging stories and enjoying camaraderie with pilot club members in the hangar.

Mike has had many different experiences via aircraft. He's flown around Niagara Falls 3,000 feet above sea level and to locations to visit or have a meal with family and friends.

Mike's longest flight was through a storm on the way from Ohio to Colorado when he and Robin relocated in 2011. The weather was so bad they had to fly commercially on the trip home and return later to retrieve their plane.

Even though Mike had some less-thanmemorable long, delayed flights and sleepless nights during weather snafus, he fondly remembers flying.

"Once you were in the plane and doing pre-check items, the cares of the world started to fall off. Especially when you were in the air above it all," he says.

It was a transition going from driving to flying. There were times when Mike, especially as he began to learn to fly, thought to himself, "We are going to run into another plane up here — because you must stay alert about other cars while driving. But there are so few other planes up in the air."

Mike invested funds and time in flight training but says it was worth it.

"There are very few private pilots, so you start to feel like you have accomplished something."

At times, Mike still became nervous about the weather.

"The winds and clouds always play a part in the flight. So my wife, Robin, and I would go places, and the first thing we looked for was the

weather."

Once, when Mike was flying at an airport without tower support to tell him about the wind, he didn't set the propeller at the correct angle for conditions and almost drifted off the edge of the runway.

"This was a scary moment for sure," he says. "I did not make that mistake again."

One even scarier time, a jet almost hit Mike and Robin head-on on the runway upon landing. Mike announced his landing as he was supposed to, and the jet's pilot failed to.

"We can only thank God that he gave us the skill and time to get out of the way."

Once they landed, Mike and Robin spent time in Yellowstone National Park. When they prepared to leave, the smoke from a smoldering forest fire made it difficult to fly by sight, so they had to rely on their instrument readings to guide them.

Eventually, when repairs cost too much, and after these scary encounters, Mike and Robin sold their plane and stopped flying.

"We had enough of the unexpected expenses and the weather-related issues that kept us from flying a lot of the time."

A record-breaking mom

Randy Williams of Winterset had a recordbreaking mother, Ruby Bostic, who piloted a groundbreaking flight of more than 5,600 miles (mostly over water) that was entered into the Guinness Book of World Records in 1985.

Randy shares family stories about his mom and excerpts about her from the book entitled, "Distinguished African Americans in Aviation and Space Science," by Betty Kaplan Gubert, Miriam Sawyer and Caroline M. Fannin.

Ruby was born to a family of farmers who harvested all types of crops, including strawberries, corn, beans and tobacco. In addition, she helped harvest, feed and water the livestock of horses, cows, pigs and chickens. In high school, Ruby studied French and home economics and played basketball.

Ruby graduated with a bachelor's degree from St. Augustine College in Raleigh, North Carolina, in 1955. She was a member of the Alpha Kappa Alpha sorority. Ruby was one of the few students to own a typewriter while she studied at college, so she typed up the other students' papers. She became an entrepreneur in that respect, so much so her teachers saw

how successful she was and, at times, borrowed money from her.

Ruby married Joney Williams the same year she graduated, in 1955. The couple relocated to Long Island, New York, and had two children, Joney Randolph and Philip Jonathan. Ruby stayed home with her children and often heard planes flying nearby. She had hopes of someday

"I wanted to go everywhere," she said.

Ruby's dream came true when her husband's colleague took her up in his plane, and it thrilled her. As she watched him fly, she thought, "If he can do this, then I can, too." And that she did.

In 1975, Ruby earned her master's degree in social work from Adelphi University, located in Garden City, New York. Shortly after that, she earned her private pilot's license.

After 100 hours of flight training, she received her private pilot's license in 1978. She flew in the New York area, the Caribbean and over the African plains. In addition, Ruby delivered produce seasonally in and out of Puerto Rico.

Ruby and her friend, Melva Jackman,

became the first African American women to fly from New York to Trinidad in a single-engine plane in February of 1985.

"Everywhere we stopped, people could not believe two women were flying an airplane by themselves."

The plane was a Piper Cherokee Arrow with only enough fuel for five hours. This monumental feat gained worldwide attention, although that was not their intent.

After earning her private pilot's license, Ruby used her background in social work to work tirelessly within African American organizations to introduce youth to the opportunities available in the aviation industry. Ruby went on to become a captain in the Civil Air Patrol.

Ruby pursued a social career for more than 30 years, from 1961 to 1992. Ruby received an award for her outstanding service for her roles in service work in 1999.

Her husband, Joney Williams, died in a car accident in 1969, leaving Ruby a single mother. She married Carl Bostic and was widowed again in 1996.

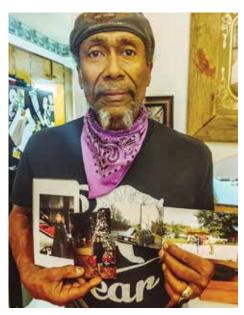
She was a powerful woman who achieved many things worth remembering, her son,

DISHING out the facts on good fats

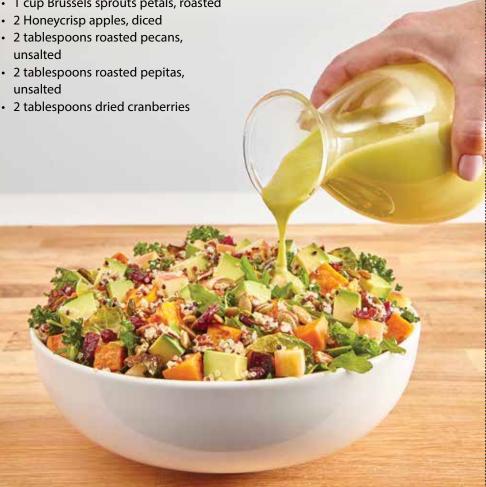
- 1/2 Avocado From Mexico, diced

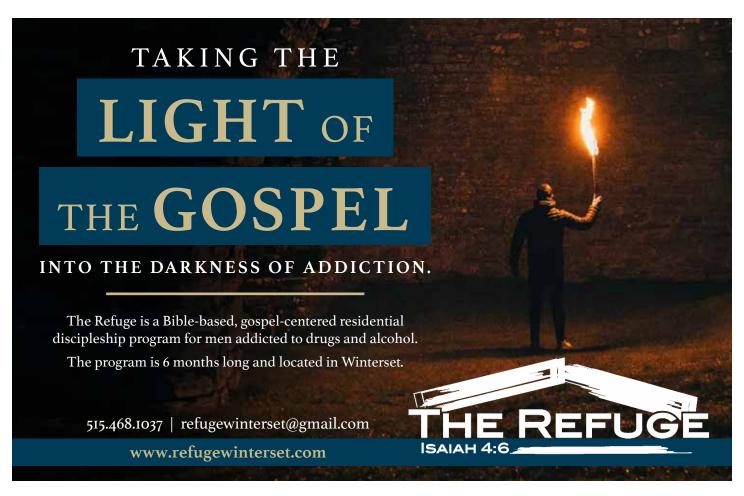

Is the issue of addiction in the Bible? That answer depends on how it's defined. I love my friend and author Mark Shaw's definition of addiction. Here is how he defines it: "Addiction is a sin issue that flows out of the heart. It is primarily a worship disorder, it's idolatry." Based on that definition, we see the problem of addiction all over the pages of the Bible. In Genesis 3:1, Satan (God's fallen angel) tempts Eve to doubt God's authority and goodness. Listen to what he says, "Did God really say, you must not eat from any tree in the garden?" Notice how sin (addiction) starts with a subtle and deceptive appeal to something attractive and seemingly good. I can't remember who said this for sure, but it stuck with me: "Sin will take you farther than you want to go, keep you longer than you want to stay, and cost you more than you want to pay." Sin is simply rebellion against God, and it will lead us astray in the

It would be a hopeless situation if it wasn't for the mercy and grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. 2 Corinthians 5:21 "For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God." Jesus paid for our sins (addiction issues). He died in our place so that we might live. Not only that, He rose again, conquering sin, death and hell forever. Here are six simple steps to ensure that your vehicle is prepared for road trips and weekend getaways.

- 1. Thoroughly clean the car, inside and out. There's nothing like a good spring cleaning. A thorough wash and wax is the most important thing to do with your car once the winter ends.
- 2. Check your tire pressure. Tire pressure is especially important in the spring. If you added air during the winter, it can lead to overinflation as
- spring temperatures rise, which can cause premature tire wear.
- 3. Inspect your wiper blades. As spring starts and temperatures warm up, check your wiper blades for any signs of cracking or wear. You'll need those wipers for spring rains.
- 4. Check under the hood. Specifically, have belts and hoses checked to ensure they aren't brittle or heavily worn. Check your coolant to make sure it's not too old — an important factor for avoiding overheating as temperatures gradually climb.
- 5. Check alignment and suspension. Winter is known for being harsh on roads, which can be harsh on your vehicle. If you find yourself frequently traversing roads with huge potholes or rocks that have emerged from the asphalt, it could ruin your car's alignment or damage suspension
- 6. Check the filters. Spring is also known for pollen and allergies. You can keep them out or minimize their presence in the cabin by replacing the filter in your climate control system. ■

A study by the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA), showed that 76% of cat owners and 85% of dog owners consider their furry companions members of the family.



But what happens

"I decided to market each individual service on its own and let the community tell me what it needed," she explains. "Pet care services got immediate, positive feedback, so I created a name, business cards, flyers, a Facebook page and went to work."

Cindy knows that her job requires responsibility, accountability and, of course, a lot of love for every pet she cares for. Her day typically starts at 7 a.m. and ends around 9 p.m.

Visits are at 30-minute intervals, and all services are customized by the pet owner. From the time Cindy enters a client's home until she leaves, 100% focus is on the pet, and they are never out of sight. She ensures food/water bowls are clean and ready, litter boxes scooped, and all areas — including the yard — are spotless.

"Pets let me know what they need, whether it's snuggles, playtime with a favorite toy or fetch," she says. "Clients get a report, along with a photo and/or video sent to them within 15 minutes of my visit."

It's not just dogs and cats. Cindy has cared for an English lop rabbit, a ferret, peacock and a talking blue and gold macaw bird. There's also a tale of three donkeys.

"They pushed open a piece of their fence and were missing," Cindy says, laughing. "After calling the owner (who remained calm), my son and I found the three donkeys together in the far corner of the acreage. After gathering them up, I went and purchased supplies to repair the fence."

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GETTING the right amount of fluoride

Fluoride is a safe and good way to help protect your teeth from cavities. There are several sources of fluoride: fluoridated water, toothpaste and mouth rinse and fluoride treatments from your dentist.



• Fluoridated water. Some water sources have fluoride in them naturally. To help prevent cavities, the level of fluoride in drinking water should be 0.7 parts fluoride per million parts water. To get this level, some towns must adjust how much fluoride is in the water.

Bottled water and well water might not have the right level of fluoride. If you mostly drink water from these sources, your dentist may suggest you use a toothpaste or mouth rinse that has more fluoride than the ones you can buy in the store. To help prevent cavities in children who drink water with low levels of fluoride, your dentist may recommend tablets, lozenges or drops.

It is especially important that children get the right amount of fluoride. Too much can affect developing teeth, which can become discolored, may have white lines or, in more severe cases, brownish pits.

• Toothpaste and mouth rinse with fluoride. One of the easiest ways to help strengthen your enamel is by caring for your teeth at home.

The American Dental Association recommends that everyone brush their teeth for two minutes twice per day using a toothpaste that contains fluoride. Because young children may not be able to spit toothpaste out, they should use a smaller amount than older children and adults. Children 3 years and younger should use a smear of toothpaste the size of a grain of rice. Children older than 3 years and adults should use a drop of toothpaste the size of a pea.

If you need extra help preventing cavities, you might try using a mouth rinse that contains fluoride. Mouth rinse is intended to be spit out after rinsing. So children younger than 6 years should not use it.

• Fluoride from your dentist. Treatments in the dental office may also help prevent cavities. Fluoride varnish can be painted on the teeth and is often applied to children's teeth twice per year. Older adults can develop cavities on the roots of their teeth because their gums may recede. They may also need a fluoride varnish.

Your dentist might provide a fluoride treatment using a gel or foam in a tray that sits in your mouth for one to four minutes.

Sometimes you need more protection than the toothpastes or mouth rinses you buy in the store offer. In these cases, your dentist might prescribe a toothpaste or mouth rinse that has more fluoride in it. ■

POSTURE and longevity

To live a long, active, energetic life, few things matter more than your posture. Posture is one of the most studied aspects of health. We all know, when we are sick, we get symptoms like upset stomach, headaches, fevers, chills, cough. But how do we measure health? Health is not just the absence of disease, but how well our body adapts and performs the demands of life. How can that be measured? One very observable objective measure of health is posture.

MANAGING the unmanageable

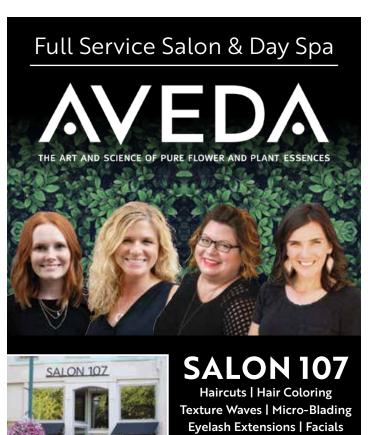

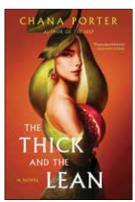

Parallel to Beatrice's story, Reiko is a brilliant student caught in a classist net with only a few bad choices left — until she, too, finds the same book and takes control of her life in dramatic fashion.

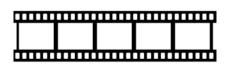
