

JOHNSTON'S PATCH IS DRAKES' BEAUTIFUL BULLDOG

Thousands of people gathered at the Knapp Center on Drake University's campus to celebrate the crowning of Patch as the winner of the 44th Annual Beautiful Bulldog Contest. The 2-year-old winning bulldog delighted the judges when she strutted down the runway in her custom jean jacket featuring a Drake University patch sewn into the fabric. A rescue dog that found her foreverhome when she was 7-months old, Patch was one of nine rescued dogs competing for the top spot.

Patch lives in Johnston with her owners, Jennifer Hinton and Joel Kornder. In addition to owning an English bulldog, Hinton has a special connection to Drake where she serves as assistant director of Transfer Admission.

"I heard about the contest when I moved to Des Moines this past



summer, and I knew I had to enter Patch," said Hinton. "She is the epitome of the bulldog breed, and we're so proud of her all the time, but especially today. We're grateful for all the support we've received and this opportunity to show everyone how special Patch is."

The crowd went wild when Patch jumped... well, really, walked...

through a literal hoop to earn her crown as The Most Beautiful Bulldog — a trick Hinton said they worked on for months prior to the competition. Patch also had dozens of loyal fans in the audience sporting "Vote for Patch" shirts that Hinton had made for her friends and family.

FROM THE PUBLISHER

In our capital city a few weeks ago, Des Moines Mayor Frank Cownie signed off on a "No Mow May" proclamation, asking Des Moines residents to refrain from cutting their grass to help pollinators thrive by preserving native wildflowers and grasses.

To be clear, a proclamation is not a law but merely a suggestion. In other words, this "suggestion" will be encouraged but not enforced. It apparently is a suggestion for private property owners only, though, as there will be no change to the city's mowing and maintenance schedule in May.

The proclamation sounds nice, and although I am not a fan of bee stings, I do understand the value of bees and the need for better pollination to preserve certain flowers. Even so, if bees give you anxiety, you should know that a recent study found homes that didn't mow for a month had five times more bees compared to yards that were mowed. And, aside from the bees, there are few other things you should consider, too, as noted by Iowa State University Extension and Outreach.

Grass will grow at least 12 inches during the month




of May. Most mowers are not equipped to cut grass that tall. Experts say you should only remove one-third of the total leaf blade in a single mowing to avoid damage to your grass. That math doesn't work.

Assuming you will mow in June, you should be prepared for some serious grass clipping clean-up. If left on the grass, those clippings will smother and kill most everything underneath and will leave bare spots in your lawn.

All of us living outside of Des Moines should check the weed ordinance for our city or homeowners' association, or we risk getting fined.

I have to admit, like many of you, I appreciate a well-maintained lawn. I also admit, like many of you, I typically break my New



As such, I am opting for an alternative to No Mow May, which may more appropriately be called, Mow Less May. Some studies show that mowing every two weeks, and raising your mower blade as high as possible, can still significantly increase the bee population. I can manage my lawn in a way that supports pollinators with more flowers and avoid irritating my neighbors while keeping my obsessive-compulsive behaviors somewhat under control.

And, with any luck, I might make it seven days.

MAKE FAMILY MEALS SPECIAL WITH A FRESH, HOMEMADE DISH

(*Family Features*) Nothing makes family time special quite like a homemade meal, especially one made with locally sourced ingredients that are as fresh and flavorful as they are thoughtfully prepared.

Whether your gatherings with loved ones take place in the family kitchen, on the patio or at a picnic area, this Asparagus, Bacon and Egg Salad makes for a perfect brunch or appetizer that leans on local ingredients like Michigan asparagus, which takes just about three days to get from the field to your table. Grown by more than 100 family farmers, it can be found in your local store at 1-4 days old, compared to 10-20 days old for imported asparagus.

Local means fresh, which makes for an especially delicious meal, but it also means sustainability. Because the Michigan asparagus season relies on the weather and uses rainwater instead of irrigation, it makes for a sustainable product that's environmentally friendly.

As a nutrient-dense, low-calorie vegetable with no fat, no cholesterol and little sodium, it's also easy to prepare – just don't overcook it. Look for thicker spears at the store, as they tend to have greater texture and more flavor and tenderness because the fiber is less concentrated.

ASPARAGUS, BACON AND EGG SALAD

Ingredients:

- 6 bacon slices
- 1 pound fresh Michigan asparagus, ends trimmed
- 1/3 cup olive oil
- · 2 tablespoons champagne vinegar
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
- · 4 hard-boiled eggs, peeled and quartered
- 2/3 cup halved cherry tomatoes
- 1/4 cup sliced green onion

Directions:

In skillet, cook bacon until crisp. Remove from pan. Set aside.

Cut asparagus into four pieces. Add asparagus to same skillet used to cook bacon. Cook until fork tender, about 4 minutes, depending on thickness of asparagus.

While asparagus cooks, prepare dressing. Whisk oil,



vinegar, honey, mustard, salt and pepper. Set aside. Chop bacon.


Remove asparagus from pan and place on platter. Top with chopped bacon, eggs, tomatoes and green onion. Pour dressing over top.
