PARENTS' RULES

Like most teenage kids, I liked posters — and I had some classics. The Farrah Fawcett red swimsuit poster. The Evel Knievel wheelie and cape poster. And more KISS posters than I could count.

The problems were where - and how - I could hang them.

Of course, my bedroom was the only room in the house where my posters would be allowed. Mom didn't think the Fonz should be hung up in the kitchen. I understood.

Mom's rules on how posters could be applied to the wall were the real trick. Pushing thumbtacks into the sheetrock was out of the question, as that left holes in the walls. Using tape to adhere them to the walls might work, if it was the right tape that didn't take off paint or leave residue behind. And that chewing-gum-like stuff that was supposed to stick to the poster and the wall sounded great, except it left an oil-like stain on the posters.



The last option was the only option, at least from Mom's perspective. She didn't really care what happened to my posters, but the walls were not to be marked up in any way. Period.

Do you ever notice how some of your parents' rules stick with you throughout your lifetime? Mom's instructions on not using thumbtacks and tape were based on her being the one having to patch and paint the walls in our home. When my kids were wanting to hang posters in their rooms, I had the same rules — and I wasn't even the one who painted. Mom's rules also apply at our workplace today. I cringe when I see items that employees have taped or thumbtacked into walls or woodwork, as I know how much I paid to have those walls painted or woodwork repaired. I gladly supply bulletin boards to anyone who needs them, but some folks just can't resist the temptation to tape, staple or push tacks into sheetrock.

INFORMATIONAL SESSION: DALLAS COUNTY VOLUNTEER WATER QUALITY MONITORING PROGRAM

DCCB needs your help to discover more about what's going on in our watersheds. This is not a training and requires no commitment, but it's a chance to ask questions and see if this new program is right for you. According to the DNR's statewide 2022 Impaired Waters Report, only 15 out of 2,617 waterbody segments (that's 0.57%) could be declared to meet all their designated uses. Only 13% were labeled as "healthy." Part of the reason why these numbers are so dismal is because data is absent or insufficient from nearly 60% of our state's identified waterbody segments. For this reason, DCCB is starting a volunteer-based water quality monitoring program to help fill gaps in data and provide information to the public. Once a month, volunteers would collect and share chemical data from their assigned stream site(s) using simple field tests. Registration required online at DccbWaterQuality.eventbrite.com. UNFORGETTABLE FRUITY FLAVOR

LEMON CHEESECAKE WITH FRUIT Servings: 6-8

- 1 1/4 cups graham cracker crumbs
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup butter, melted
- 2 packages (8 ounces each) cream cheese, softened
- 1 can (14 ounces) sweetened condensed milk
- 3 eggs
- 1/4 cup fresh lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 orange, peeled and separated
- 8 raspberries
- 3 mint leaves, for garnish

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350 F.

In medium bowl, combine graham cracker crumbs, sugar and melted butter. Press firmly into 9-inch springform pan.

In large bowl, beat cream cheese until fluffy.





Gradually beat in sweetened condensed milk until smooth. Add eggs, fresh lemon juice and vanilla extract; mix until combined.

Pour into pan. Bake 50-55 minutes, or until center springs back when lightly pressed.

Chill in refrigerator until completely cooled. Arrange orange slices around border of cake and place raspberries in middle. Top with mint leaves.

'SUPER MARIO BROTHERS'

Huge month in the theaters for those less than 3 foot tall. "Super Mario Brothers" opened in early May and has dominated the box office every week since. As I write this, the movie has made \$434 million dollars. If only it had been good. The film wasn't made for me, so I'll give it a pass this time. Obviously, its target audience loved it. **Grade: C+**

'GUY RITCHIE'S THE COVENANT'

With "Operation Fortune" a couple of months ago, "Guy Ritchie" has turned in two of the most enjoyable movies of the year to date. This one follows an American soldier in Afghanistan who is injured and flown home to recuperate. When he finds that his former Afghan translator is in hiding and being hunted, he takes it upon himself to go back and save him. Jake Gyllenhaal brilliantly plays this soldier, and the movie is really emotional and entertaining. It is a really strong story about two men thrown together by fate. **Grade: A-**

'PAINT'

Owen Wilson plays Carl Nargle, Vermont's No. 1 public television painter. Think Bob Ross, but you will see why his estate probably squashed that idea. The highlight of the film (and there are only a few) is seeing Wilson in the Ross afro. After that, the movie slides downhill fast. Wilson plays this character as a serial philanderer and not a very bright man. I think this could have been really good, but it's not even close. **Grade: C-**
