

POLK CITY NATIVE RANKS FIRST IN WORLDWIDE BUSINESS STRATEGY GAME

Michael Williams, a Polk City native, was one of two recent Grace College business graduates to rank first place worldwide in the online Business Strategy Game (BSG). In the BSG, more than 3,000 teams from 200 schools are faced with a series of business decisions as they compete in a global market.

Williams, who studied business management and earned his MBA at Grace, is one of the first Grace students to achieve first-place status in the BSG competition globally. He found the game to be a fun challenge.

"The game helped me understand how many different things go into running a company and how much a single decision can affect other areas of the company," says Williams.

Williams will begin working at Lloyd-Otto Agencies, an insurance

agency in Schaumburg, Illinois, this summer.

The BSG is part of the senior seminar class mandatory for all business majors at Grace. The class requires students to participate in the game as individuals, prompting them to make nearly 40 business decisions on their own in competition with the other students in their class as well as students playing around the world.

"Giving each of the students their own company forces the students to look at the bigger picture of their companies instead of focusing on their areas of specialization," said Dr. Rick Koontz, professor of information systems and instructor of the senior seminar course. "The goal of this exercise is to have students look at business both strategically and holistically."

'OH, YEAH!'

The two words in this headline conjure an image of a glass pitcher with a smiley face for generations of kids who grew mixing packets of powder, sugar and water together for a tasty drink to "wipe out thirst." Some of you still have the containers you made this stuff in with the stains on the plastic to prove it.

Yes, I am referencing Kool-Aid and the ever-popular Kool-Aid Man. Kool-Aid still exists as a brand of flavored drink mix and is now owned by Kraft Heinz, but it certainly doesn't have the allure it had decades prior.

Edwin Perkins of Hastings, Nebraska, invented the powder form of Kool-Aid in 1927 when trying to improve on a liquid concentrate called Fruit Smack. Like most all great inventors, his experiments started in his mother's kitchen. Perkins was attempting to create a powder version of Fruit Smack that would be easier — and less expensive — to ship. Once he devised a solution, he moved production to Chicago. This success sparked the interest of large companies, and Kool-Aid was sold to General Foods. If you have



ever been to Hastings (about 100 miles west of Lincoln), you know how important Kool-Aid is to the community, as the residents have a festival called Kool-Aid Days on the second weekend in August. And, of course, Kool-Aid is Nebraska's official soft drink. Why not?

The original six flavors of Kool-Aid were cherry, grape, lemon-lime, orange, raspberry and strawberry. I preferred grape or strawberry, but they were all fantastic. Singles flavors were later introduced including black cherry, tropical punch, lemonade, pink lemonade, cherry, watermelon, orange and summer punch. Again, how could you go wrong?

General Foods introduced The Kool-Aid Man and the ingenious

marketing shortly after acquiring the brand in the 1950s. You may remember the Kool-Aid Man crashing through walls and fences and then making a batch of Kool-Aid for kids while shouting, "Oh, yeah!" I had a ring-neck Kool-Aid T-shirt with this image and slogan on it as a kid. I wore it out.

Kool-Aid is now available in liquid drops, but it just isn't the same. There was something about being a kid and standing on a chair at the kitchen counter, measuring the Kool-Aid powder and mixing it up with a wooden spoon that just can't be replicated with any type of drops. Yes, this is a job for Kool-Aid. "Hey, Kool-Aid!"

JESTER PARK NATURE CENTER ACTIVITIES

Polk County Conservation invites the public to enjoy its parks and programs. For links to more information on any of these opportunities, visit www.jesterparknaturecenter.com. The Jester Park Nature Center is a focal point within our community where recreation, education, tourism and conservation efforts all intersect into a gathering place for people of all ages to engage in the natural world. We want all to enjoy the outdoors and learn about Iowa's natural heritage.

OUTDOOR RECREATION & WELLNESS CENTER

Located adjacent to the nature center, is the Outdoor Recreation & Wellness Center. Within the building there is indoor archery and air rifle range, as well as a bouldering room. You can also rent summer and winter equipment such as canoes, kayaks, paddle boards, cross-country skis, and snowshoes.

BISON & ELK HERDS

The bison and elk herds that live in this wildlife animal enclosure have been popular attractions at Jester Park for almost four decades. In 2012, renovations were made to the area and the Elk and Bison Educational Plaza was opened to the public. Improvements include an accessible observation deck, educational displays, spotting scopes, high quality art components and an inviting viewing and picnic area. An electric fence surrounds the animal exhibit. Please use caution and stay away from exhibit fencing.

BOATING

Jester Park offers two boat ramps leading into Saylorville Lake. One is located off Jester Park Drive near the main campground, with the other located at the Lincoln Access beside the Mile-Long Bridge. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers warns boaters to use caution upstream from the Mile-Long Bridge. A "No Motorized Vessel Zone" is located north of the Mile Long Bridge from April 1 to Aug. 31. During periods of flood storage, restriction may be lifted.

CAMPING AND CABINS

Jester Park offers more than 148 campsites along the lakeshore and across the wooded hills overlooking Saylorville Lake. There are 80 electric sites, 62 nonelectric sites, four walk-in primitive sites, and two youth areas. Two campground shower houses are open mid-April through the end of October (weather permitting).

EQUESTRIAN ACTIVITIES

The Jester Park Equestrian Center offers riding lessons, shows and clinics, team building, trail riding, wagon and sleigh rides, camps, and therapeutic and at-risk programming.

GOLFING

The Jester Park Golf Course is an 18-hole championship course. Excellent playing conditions and challenging holes have helped make Jester Park a popular course for state tournaments. Jester Park also offers a 9-hole par 3 course especially popular with beginning golfers, as well as a modern Golf Learning and Practice Facility with driving range and practice greens.

JESTER PARK LODGE

The Jester Park Lodge is a full service banquet and conference center nestled along the northwest shore of Saylorville Lake at Jester Park with all of the amenities you expect. Minutes away from Des Moines and yet a world apart. More information here.

MINIATURE GOLF

Located next to the Jester Park Driving Range, the new Jester Park Miniature Golf Course is an 18-hole, nature-themed miniature course packed full of fun obstacles with the added bonus of a beautiful park view.


