

KEENAN'S 'GIFT' GUIDES HIS CHAINSAW

REMOVAL OF ASH TREES TURNS INTO PUBLIC ART PROJECT.

Many residents of Adel have recently been touring Kinnick-Feller and Island parks to view the intricate chainsaw sculptures Gary Keenan has created from the trunks of ash trees that needed to be removed.

The first to appear was an eagle with a fish in its talons, an appropriate addition to the park near the Raccoon River, where eagles have been sighted. Then, an ADM Tiger was sculpted near the ball fields, a fox in Island Park, cardinals

by the entrance to Oakdale Cemetery and more.

"In all, there will be seven tree trunk sculptures completed by Gary," says Nick Schenck, director of Adel Parks and Recreation. "We talked as a staff to determine the list of

sculptures and their locations."

Curtis Waddingham, Adel parks superintendent, had the idea to contact Keenan. Since the bid for tree removal was lower than expected,


'WELCOME BACK'

Which TV theme songs are the most memorable for you? Of course, the answers will likely be tied to the decade you grew up in — but not necessarily. Think about the TV theme songs that make you smile when you hear them. The ones that make you turn up the volume knob. The songs you know every word to. The instrumentals you hum along with. The serious ones. The silly ones. The sitcoms. The cartoons. The kid shows. Nothing is off limits. Here are a few of my favorites to get the conversation rolling.

"Welcome Back" was the theme song of the 1970s sitcom "Welcome Back, Kotter." It was written and recorded by John Sebastian, the former lead singer of Lovin' Spoonful. The song reached No. 1 on the Billboard Hot 100 chart in May of 1976.

Epstein. Barbarino. Washington. Horshack. They all made me smile, and this song still does. "Yeah, we tease him a lot 'cause we got him



"Not getting hassled, not getting hustled." "Good Times" aired for six seasons from 1974 to 1979. The Norman Lear production was television's first African American two-parent family sitcom. It was a spin-off of "Maude," which was a spin-off of "All in the Family." The gospel-styled theme song has lyrics that might be a challenge to

understand, but I still sing along with whatever I think the words are. "Keeping your head above water, making a wave when you can."

And my last one to whet your musical appetite is the theme from "The Rockford Files." The song is as iconic as the Pontiac Firebirds James Garner drove on the show. This 1975 instrumental by Mike Post features a blues harmonica solo, dobro guitar, an electric guitar solo heard in the bridges and a Minimoog synthesizer heard in the refrains. It spent four months on the charts and became a Top 10 hit in August of 1975 and even won a 1975 Grammy Award for Best Instrumental Arrangement.

These tunes may get the ball rolling, but I clearly missed other great TV theme songs. Send me a note and let me know which ones are memorable to you.

HARLAN DELANO CHAPMAN

Harlan Delano Chapman Sr., 89, of Adel, died June 26, 2023, at the Community Living Center -Veterans Hospital Campus in Des Moines. Funeral services were Thursday, July 6, at Iles-Brandt. Burial followed at Panther Creek Cemetery west of Adel.



Born during the Great Depression on Nov. 20, 1933, to Herbert and Rosa Chapman, he grew up in a large family: two brothers, three half brothers and two half sisters. Harlan grew up helping his family on the farm and farming became his passion as well. He served his country in the 97th Signal Battalion from 1954-1956. Harlan was a farmer, a mechanic, a people person, and a lover of nature. He had the ability to make something out of nothing and the gift of storytelling. He touched many lives through his hard work on the farm and playing his harmonica at local cafes. He was an active listener and reflective dispenser of advice. His kids remember him as a strong individual. Harlan suffered many losses during his lifetime. The loss of his farm in the 1980s and the death of his first wife, his siblings and his daughter. He took these losses in stride and persevered. He treasured time spent with family, friends and his dogs.

Harlan is survived by his second wife, Annamaria; daughters, Debbie Webb (Tom), Deloris Gibbons (Ron), Donna Halbach (Todd), Dana Chapman-Barber (Tom) and Heidi Chapman-Fisher (Jim); sons, Daniel Chapman and Harlan Chapman, Jr. and their families, including 16 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren; and a brother, Kenneth Chapman (Linda).

He was preceded in death by his parents, sisters, brothers, first wife, Marian, and daughter, Denise.

RECIPE

ELEVATE SUMMER ENTERTAINING WITH AN ENJOYABLE CRUNCH

(*Family Features*) As families and friends gather on patios and decks to enjoy the warmth of summer and meals fresh off the grill, many are searching for that perfect ingredient that can complement salads, appetizers, main courses, desserts and more.

This year, you can turn to pecans to elevate meals and give your guests something to rave about. Known for their rich, buttery consistency and naturally sweet taste, pecans have a longstanding tradition as a nut topping. They're sprinkled atop this Spiced Pecan Grilled Peach Salad with Goat Cheese for a refreshing seasonal salad with a nutty crunch.

SPICED PECAN GRILLED PEACH SALAD WITH GOAT CHEESE

Prep time: 5 minutes Cook time: 50 minutes

Servings: 4

Spiced Pecans:

- 1 large egg white
- 3 tablespoons dark brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt
- 2 cups pecan halves

Salad:

- 1/4 cup, plus 2 teaspoons, extra-virgin olive oil or pecan oil, divided
- 1/4 cup white wine vinegar
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/8 teaspoon kosher salt pepper, to taste
- · 2 large peaches, halved and pits removed
- 6 cups mixed baby greens (such as arugula, spring mix and spinach)
- · 4 ounces soft goat cheese

To make spiced pecans:

Preheat oven to 275 F. Line rimmed baking sheet with parchment paper and set aside.



In medium bowl, whisk egg white, brown sugar, cinnamon, cayenne pepper and salt until well combined. Fold in pecans and mix until evenly coated in mixture. Spread in single layer on prepared baking sheet.

Bake 45-50 minutes, stirring occasionally until pecans are fragrant and golden brown. Allow to cool completely.

To make salad:

Heat grill to medium-high heat.

In small bowl, whisk 1/4 cup olive oil, white wine vinegar, Dijon mustard, garlic powder, salt and pepper, to taste. Set aside.

Brush cut sides of peach halves with remaining olive oil and grill until grill lines appear and peaches become tender, 3-5 minutes. Remove peaches and cut into slices.

Divide greens among four plates. Top with grilled peach slices and goat cheese. Divide 1 cup spiced pecans evenly among salads and reserve remaining cup for snacking. Drizzle each salad with vinaigrette...

money was available to hire Keenan for the carvings.

"I had heard about Gary and seen his work around the area and hoped we could turn the tree removal into a positive impact," says Waddingham.

They started talking in January about the possibilities as they walked around the parks and pointed out the trees to be removed. In March, the trees were removed and Keenan has been carving as his schedule permits.

"I started playing around with carving when I was a young man," says Keenan. "I was intrigued with the idea of carving something out of wood. I do seem to have a certain connection to trees."

For the last 23 years, Keenan has made tree carving his full-time







business, traveling all over the United States. He has been invited to attend numerous exclusive, juried competitions in England and Scotland. And, you might recognize him as one of the chainsaw carvers at the Iowa State Fair.
