Here's a little history.

The U.S. Navy first issued T-shirts as undergarments for uniforms in 1913. In casual situations, sailors and marines began to remove their uniform jackets and wear only the undershirts. Not long after that, T-shirts became popular layers of clothing for workers. By the time the Great Depression rolled in, the T-shirt was the go-to garment that was worn while doing farm or ranch chores. And then along came Marlon Brando and the movie "A Streetcar Named Desire," making T-shirts fashionable as standalone

outerwear garments. Need I mention Arthur Fonzarelli?

During the rebellious 1960s, printed T-shirts started to surface as part of self-expression and protests, as well as with company advertising and as souvenirs. This continued for several decades, becoming more "in your face" each year. Remember "Frankie Says Relax"? Today, revenue from T-shirts sales is expected to top \$5.28 billion in the United States alone. Yes, with a B.

Did you know that a T-shirt is named so because the shape of the shirt is in the letter "T"? It's true. And the word "T-shirt" became part of American English by the 1920s and started appearing in the Merriam-Webster Dictionary about that time, too.

Now back to what your T-shirts say about you. Your favorite sports

teams. The events you have gone to. The employers you worked for. The schools you attended. The places you visited. Your favorite bands. TV shows. Movies. And you thought you were a private person?

T-shirts today are printed with all types of catch phrases, popular quotes and even vulgarities. And people seem to wear them proudly. Will that trend change soon and see T-shirts going back to simply being plain white undergarments?

Frances Jean Bergman was born on Jan. 18, 1929, on a farm east of Parkersburg. She graduated from Parkersburg schools in 1947. Frances married Harold Ray Bergman in Parkersburg in 1950. She worked at a variety of jobs over the years. In 1989,



she retired from her final employment at the Audubon County Clerk of Court office where she was deputy clerk. Frances was the first woman elected to the Audubon city council. She helped Harold with his job with Farm Bureau, attending meetings and hosting many events in her home.

Frances and Harold have three children, Mike (Ellen), Tim (Kenna) and Phil (Donna); four grandsons, Alex, Brandt (Michelle), Brett and Kenny. She was loving, caring and very involved with her children, their spouses and her grandchildren.

Frances and Harold hosted two foreign exchange students: Bassam Abou Murad (1971-1972) from Brazil and Ann Moitry Vacant from France (1980-1981) who continued to visit Harold and Frances regularly. She was a member of Meredith Drive Reformed Church and supporter of a mental health support group that had broad attendance. Frances also was a trained volunteer at hospice and spent many hours comforting others.

She was preceded in death by her parents; older brothers, Johnny and Harold Kalkwarf; sisters-in-law, Eunice and Dorothy Kalkwarf and Bonnie Bergman; and brothers-in-law, Robert Bergman, John Bode and John DeGroot.

Frances is survived by husband, Harold, her sons and their spouses, her grandchildren, several brother- and sisters-in-law, and many nieces and nephews.

Frances died on July 4, 2023, at Edencrest at Green Meadows in Johnston. Her funeral was July 8 at The Bridge in Johnston. Interment was at Oak Hill Cemetery in Parkersburg.



### GRILLED PORK CHOPS WITH PEACH PECAN SALSA

Cook time: 25 minutes Servings: 4

- 4 boneless pork loin chops (each 1-inch thick)
- 3/4 teaspoon, plus 1/8 teaspoon, kosher salt, divided
- · freshly ground black pepper, to taste
- · 2 medium peaches, diced
- 2/3 cup raw pecan pieces
- · 2 tablespoons red onion, diced
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh basil
- 1 teaspoon minced jalapeno pepper
- 2 teaspoons lime juice

#### Directions:

Season pork chops with 3/4 teaspoon salt and black pepper, to taste.

Heat grill or grill pan to medium-high heat.

Grill pork chops until browned, about 5 minutes. Flip and



cook 5-6 minutes until food thermometer inserted in center registers 135 F.

Transfer to plate and rest at least 5 minutes until internal temperature rises to 145-160 F.

Gently stir peaches, pecans, onion, basil, jalapeno, lime juice and remaining salt.

Add salsa on top of each pork chop with remaining salsa on side.
