

GOLFERS RAISE \$6,000 FOR DALLAS COUNTY CONSERVATION BOARD

Nearly 80 golfers participated in the second annual Greater Dallas County Development Alliance Golf Outing to raise money for the Dallas County Conservation Board. The event was held on Wednesday, June 28, at the River Valley Golf Course and generated \$6,000 in proceeds.

This year's event was sponsored by Adel Partners Chamber of Commerce, Bolton & Menk, Impact 7G, Kwik Star, Van Meter Community Foundation, Waukee Chamber of Commerce and the York Companies.

"We decided in our second year of hosting this event that we wanted to raise money for a county-wide cause. The Alliance's golf committee chose the Dallas County Conservation Board as the beneficiary because of the work they do to enhance the quality of place and life for residents and

The U.S. Navy first issued T-shirts as undergarments for uniforms in 1913. In casual situations, sailors and marines began to remove their uniform jackets and wear only the undershirts. Not long after that, T-shirts became popular layers of clothing for workers. By the time the Great Depression rolled in, the T-shirt was the go-to garment that was worn while doing farm or ranch chores. And then along came Marlon Brando and the movie "A Streetcar Named Desire," making T-shirts fashionable as standalone

outerwear garments. Need I mention Arthur Fonzarelli? During the rebellious 1960s, printed T-shirts

started to surface



as part of self-expression and protests, as well as with company advertising and as souvenirs. This continued for several decades, becoming more "in your face" each year. Remember "Frankie Says Relax"? Today, revenue from T-shirts sales is expected to top \$5.28 billion in the United States alone. Yes, with a B.

Did you know that a T-shirt is named so because the shape of the shirt is in the letter "T"? It's true. And the word "T-shirt" became part of American English by the 1920s and started appearing in the Merriam-Webster Dictionary about that time, too.

Now back to what your T-shirts say about you. Your favorite sports

teams. The events you have gone to. The employers you worked for. The schools you attended. The places you visited. Your favorite bands. TV shows. Movies. And you thought you were a private person?

Your dresser drawer may say more about you than the data Facebook collects. But, of course, you know what's in your dresser. On Facebook's servers? Good luck.

T-shirts today are printed with all types of catch phrases, popular quotes and even vulgarities. And people seem to wear them proudly. Will that trend change soon and see T-shirts going back to simply being plain white undergarments?





GRILLED PORK CHOPS WITH PEACH PECAN SALSA

Cook time: 25 minutes Servings: 4

- 4 boneless pork loin chops (each 1-inch thick)
- 3/4 teaspoon, plus 1/8 teaspoon, kosher salt, divided
- freshly ground black pepper, to taste
- 2 medium peaches, diced
- 2/3 cup raw pecan pieces
- 2 tablespoons red onion, diced
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh basil
- 1 teaspoon minced jalapeno pepper
- 2 teaspoons lime juice

Directions:

Season pork chops with 3/4 teaspoon salt and black pepper, to taste.

Heat grill or grill pan to medium-high heat. Grill pork chops until browned, about 5 minutes. Flip and



cook 5-6 minutes until food thermometer inserted in center registers 135 F.

Transfer to plate and rest at least 5 minutes until internal temperature rises to 145-160 F.

Gently stir peaches, pecans, onion, basil, jalapeno, lime juice and remaining salt.

Add salsa on top of each pork chop with remaining salsa on side.

FILM REVIEWS By Michael C. Woody

'SPIDER-MAN: ACROSS THE SPIDER-VERSE'

In 2018 we were "Into the Spider-Verse," this year we are "Across the Spider-Verse" and in May of 2024 we will be "Beyond the Spider-Verse." So the 2023 chapter, "Across the Spider-Verse" is obviously the middle story in a trilogy. Knowing that makes it a lot easier to not completely understand everything that is going on in the film. This is Marvel Comics' multi-verse where different Spider-Men from a lot of universes collide in one. If you saw the first film, that makes sense. If you didn't, you need to catch up on these very well made films with well told stories. **Grade: B+**

'TRANSFORMERS: RISE OF THE BEASTS'

This is an entertaining and well-made movie that made almost no sense to me whatsoever. There was enough action and humor for two films, but maybe that's OK. My kids grew up with these Transformer things, so I'm not exactly the target audience, but I was mildly entertained. **Grade: B-**

'THE FLASH'

While I will admit to growing up a comic book fan, the DC Universe (Superman, Batman and the Flash) held little appeal to me. On the movie side, I have liked many of the DC-based movies but admittedly had little interest in "The Flash." I was wrong on this one. What I found was an entertaining and well-told story with an almost perfect mix of action and humor and an impressive nod to the DC Universe toward the end of the film. It was 30 minutes too long, but I'd still recommend it. **Grade: B+**
