

## POLK CITY IS NAMED AN IOWA GREAT PLACE

The Iowa Economic Development Authority and Iowa Great Places Citizen Advisory Board designated Polk City as an Iowa Great Place. The prestigious designation recognizes communities dedicated to improving their quality of life and enhancing placemaking.

An advisory group of 30 volunteers, the City of Polk City, and GoPolkCity collaborated on submitting a Vision Plan and application to the Iowa Great Places Board in March of 2023. Through public survey and feedback, the Polk City Vision Plan, "Explore Polk City," was created and submitted with the application. The plan outlines Polk City amenities, recent accomplishments and future projects which range from small to large scale. "Explore Polk City"

## **DIDN'T OWN MUCH; DIDN'T OWE MUCH**


Read the above headline again. Those six words explain the lifestyle of many families from just a few generations ago.

My mother was born in 1935, in the midst of the Great Depression. Most of us can't imagine the doom and demise of that time. Those who lived it learned to get by on little of nothing.

My grandparents lived humble lives. They didn't drive expensive cars or wear fancy clothes. In fact, to my knowledge, they never owned a home. I don't know how much the Great Depression impacted them, because they certainly never talked about it. They just made do, and they didn't buy things unless they absolutely needed them. They certainly were not alone.

Today, many who are also clearly struggling financially still seem to find ways to buy flat-screen TVs, purchase smart phone plans, have their nails done, and get their seventh tattoo. Some who do borrow money play the victim card in hopes that it

My mother never had a credit card. She thought they were a tool of the devil, as she saw too many people get buried financially by choosing not to live within their financial means. When I was in college, I received an application in the mail for a credit card from a gas station. It seemed like a good idea to me, so I applied and received it. I paid it off each month, but I never wanted Mom to know about it. Of course, she did. And, of course, she did not approve. The only debt my mother ever had was her home mortgage. She didn't buy things unless she could pay cash for them. There was no other option, in her mind.

A few decades later, while at an

out-of-town family wedding, Mom realized that a credit card had become a necessity for purchases like hotel rooms. So, she talked with me about it, and I encouraged her to apply for one. To my dismay, she was denied because she did not have any credit history. This elderly woman with no debt, who had never written a bad check in her life, was denied a credit card. I had to co-sign the application for my mother to be approved, which I did. I understand that the credit card companies don't profit as much from those who pay their debts each month, but this still says something about the society we now live in.

As such, a better mantra for today may be: Don't own much; do owe a lot.

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# DOWNTOWN ASSESSMENT REPORT COMPLETED

The Downtown Assessment Report summarizes the observations and recommendations resulting from an Iowa Downtown Resource Center Assessment conducted in Polk City. The team's familiarization process with Polk City began with a review of materials supplied prior to the visit, a pre-visit survey consisting of 229 completed online surveys, a driving tour of the city and a walking tour of the downtown square. The intensive three-day visit also included interviews with approximately 35 community leaders, individuals and groups representing the public and private sectors. Based upon these activities and the assessment team's extensive working knowledge in downtown economic development, this report summarizes their findings and recommendations for Downtown Polk City.

The assessment team's recommendations have been grouped into five themes with suggested time frames for specific projects.

- Improve Walkability to Connect the Downtown
- Comprehensive Wayfinding and Environmental Graphics (Signs)
- Community Character, Appearance and Public Art
- · Comprehensive Event and Activity Calendar
- Enhance Business Mix Using Data and Incentives

In its report, the assessment team noted:

"It is important to take one step at a time and understand that the longer-term recommendations are not of much consequence until the shorter-term recommendations are addressed.

"The assessment team hopes Polk City will assess each recommendation and develop a plan to implement what is right for the downtown. As the process gains momentum, community leadership will need to determine additional strategies and develop approaches that are more sophisticated.

"Our hope was/is to work with leaders to identify the strengths, challenges and opportunities in a constructive way to help the community improve the vitality of the downtown over time. We appreciate the openness and honesty of residents, and we appreciate that community leaders allowed the Assessment Team to be honest in its findings."

## RAGBRAI STOP IN POLK CITY

As RAGBRAI is celebrating its 50th year, communities and bicyclists eagerly awaited the announcement of pass-through towns and overnight stop locations.

When RAGBRAI revealed Polk City as a pass-through town, community leaders were elated. RAGBRAI officially stops at Polk City on July 26 as bikes pedal their 50-mile trek from Ames to Des Moines.

Organizers came up with the theme "A Dam Good Time" to reflect the town's heritage and amenities. RAGBRAI has passed through Polk City about eight times but hasn't made a stop there for nearly 20 years.

Most bikers are set to arrive midmorning, just before lunchtime.

The bicyclists will arrive in the northwest side of town and leave north off of Third Street. Most of the activities and vendors will be set up downtown off Broadway and at the Square.

There will be food, beverage and vendors. Various sponsors are offering up activities. The band Gut Feeling will be playing on the stage from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Activities include giant yard games, beer garden, food trucks and other free entertainment.

The fire department and police are in charge of public safety. The library is coordinating volunteers. Go Polk City is selling shirts and other items.

#### **JESTER PARK NATURE CENTER ACTIVITIES**

The Jester Park Nature Center is a focal point within our community where recreation, education, tourism and conservation efforts all intersect into a gathering place for people of all ages to engage in the natural world. We want all to enjoy the outdoors and learn about Iowa's natural heritage.

#### **BOATING**

Jester Park offers two boat ramps leading into Saylorville Lake. One is located off Jester Park Drive near the main campground, with the other located at the Lincoln Access beside the Mile-Long Bridge. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers warns boaters to use caution upstream from the Mile-Long Bridge. A "No Motorized Vessel Zone" is located north of the Mile Long Bridge from April 1 to Aug. 31. During periods of flood storage, restriction may be lifted.

#### **CAMPING AND CABINS**

Jester Park offers more than 148 campsites along the lakeshore and across the wooded hills overlooking Saylorville Lake. There are 80 electric sites, 62 non-electric sites, four walk-in primitive sites, and two youth areas. Two campground shower houses are open mid-April through the end of October (weather permitting).

#### **EQUESTRIAN ACTIVITIES**

The Jester Park Equestrian Center offers riding lessons, shows and clinics, team building, trail riding, wagon and sleigh rides, camps, and therapeutic and at-risk programming.

#### **GOLFING**

The Jester Park Golf Course is an 18-hole championship course. Excellent playing conditions and

challenging holes have helped make Jester Park a popular course for state tournaments. Jester Park also offers a 9-hole par 3 course especially popular with beginning golfers, as well as a modern Golf Learning and Practice Facility with driving range and practice greens.

#### **JESTER PARK LODGE**

The Jester Park Lodge is a full service banquet and conference center nestled along the northwest shore of Saylorville Lake at Jester Park with all of the amenities you expect. Minutes away from Des Moines and yet a world apart. More information here.

#### **MINIATURE GOLF**

Located next to the Jester Park Driving Range, the new Jester Park Miniature Golf Course is an 18-hole, nature-themed miniature course packed full of fun obstacles with the added bonus of a beautiful park view.

#### **NATURE PROGRAMS**

Polk County Conservation naturalists offer many year-round nature programs at Jester Park. View their complete calendar to learn about upcoming programs at Jester and other parks in Polk County.

#### **PICNICKING**

There are five picnic shelters within the park. Several offer views of the lake and others are located in private, wooded settings.

#### **PLAYGROUND & PLAYSCAPE**

The children's playground in the main picnic area 1-1/2 miles from the park entrance includes separate play areas for pre-schoolers and for older children. Nearby restrooms are open mid-April through mid-October.

#### **HIKING TRAILS**



Bake 25 minutes. Cool 5 minutes then remove to wire rack to cool completely.
