While some of us dream about one day owning that fresh-off-the-showroom-floor vehicle with its spotless exterior, dust-free dashboard, brand-new smell and scuff-free tires, others are looking for something quite different: potential. Where we see a rusty, broken-down or past-its-prime set of wheels, they see what will be after repairs, cleaning, fresh paint and hours of labor, frustrations and gratification. They see a dream car in the making.

Garret Von Stein restored his grandfather's 1979 Custom Deluxe 20k20.

His grandfather's truck

Garret Von Stein of Bondurant is a go-getter and a handy guy, having been active in FFA and having won a lot of trophies for projects he entered. One big project he took on recently was restoring his grandfather's truck.

The truck is a 1979 Custom Deluxe 20k20. "It is one of the coolest farm trucks you'll ever see," says Garret.

Garret enlisted friends around his age to help him with it. Russell Hanson is who Garret considers the go-to person when it comes to a rat rod. (A rat rod is a custom car with a purposefully worn-down, unfinished appearance, usually lacking paint and showing rust.)

"Russell is the expert on my truck and others like it. He got my truck up and running," says Garrett.

Garret also asked his buddy Jace Huff.

"We use his home body shop he calls Huff Auto Body," he says. "We use Jace's shop to fix everything, and he is the one who helps me out the most on everything with the truck."

Recently, he and his crew of buddies (all are still in high school — Garret and Jace were sophomores this past year and Russell was a

senior) replaced parts like the carburetor, the intake and valve covers.

"We also replaced the brakes and did a spin on repairing the floors by using retired road signs," he says.

The innovative idea to use the signs to fix the rusted-out floorboards came from a show Jace was watching.

"I just use the truck as a daily driver — haul hay and other stuff around," Garret says.

Garret did not have to repaint the truck. It does have some rusting around the edges, but that adds to the charm. After all, it is a farm truck and was his grandpa's work truck. Garret continues to fix the truck as he continues using it. He remembers his grandpa also working on the truck and him admiring it when he was younger.

"I always loved the truck as a kid, and I would sit in it for hours as our house was being built."

After a year of working on it, Garret and his buddies are putting the finishing touches on it. Meanwhile, he continues to drive it during the summer and plans to drive it to school next year.

Garret's favorite thing about his truck is how custom it is.

"We put a different spin on it than most restored trucks. It has more of a farm truck vibe, and that is what I like about it," he says.

Others agree with Garret and his buddies. "It's just been a few high schoolers making do with what we have in knowledge and parts," Garrett says. "And it gets a lot of attention."

Garret has lived in Bondurant his entire life.

"And so has my dad and his dad before him. For years, my grandpa had an electric business in Bondurant, Von Stein Electric," he says.

Grit and know-how

When rebuilding cars, it takes a specific mix of passion, precision and persistence — especially when it is the cars' owners doing all the restorations themselves. Such is the case with Todd Schlenker. He had the perfect mix of grit and know-how when restoring his old truck from hood and headlights to truck bed and tailgate — and everything in between.

His hard work paid off recently when he entered his first car show, the Hawk Haven

Father's Day Car Show in Altoona, and won Best Truck. His daughter, Cailey Schlenker, was happy he completed the long project before Father's Day this year.

"My dad restored his '54 Chevy, entered it into a car show and won in Altoona this year," she says.

Todd lives on the outskirts of Maxwell by Farrar with his wife, Sue, and does not restore cars for other people; he just runs his plumbing business, Todd's Plumbing, Heating &

Cooling LLC, serving Bondurant, Altoona and surrounding areas, and works on his car when time permits. He used to live in Bondurant and raised both of his kids there.

Todd bought the car six years ago, in 2017, and did all the bodywork himself with the exception of the paint, which was done by United Classic Body and Paint by Larry Webb.

Todd performed a complete restoration.

"It was a complete 'body off restoration' from the ground up," he says.

A body-off restoration means the car body is unbolted and removed from the chassis or frame.

Todd did all the restorations and upgrades by himself with help from his friends and family, who inspired him to take on this project in the first place. His father, Bill Schlenker, and brother, Mark Schlenker, had completed car projects, and he wanted in.

"My father and older brother restored vehicles themselves, so I wanted to prove I could do one myself," he says.

Though this restoration was done as a hobby initially and not necessarily with car shows in mind, Todd was confident enough in his work to enter the car into a show and won first prize.

The truck is a 1954 Chevy 3100 Pickup First Series.

"It now has a Mustang 2 front end coil springs, four-link rear suspension, 350 Chevy Motor, with a 400 turbo transmission, and four-wheel disc brakes."

Todd also added a few modern amenities like power steering and air conditioning, making this truck a dream to drive. His favorite thing about his truck is driving it as a finished product and hearing positive feedback on his hard work.

"I hear others' compliments about my restoration. They love the color and say it looks great," he says.

Restorations a family affair

Jacob "Jake" and Jasa Clos live in Bondurant, where they have rebuilt a 1965 Mustang and a 1978 Trans Am. Jake has done most of the work, with help from his older brother, AJ Clos, who lives in Imlay City, Michigan, and runs Angry Al's, a car shop.

Jake has owned the Mustang since 2019 and the Trans Am since 2021. He used Gary Martin of Goldfield Trim for the Mustang interior and convertible top.

"All other work has been done by us and my husband's brother," says Jasa.

The Mustang has seen a lot of action since removed from the barn where it had been sitting since 1983. Same with the Trans Am.

"The Trans Am was just a shell when we got it," says Jake.

Getting both cars back in working order has been a family affair. Getting the cars restored was a dream of Jasa's, and Jake and his brother were happy to help make that dream come true.

"I have always wanted a 1965 Mustang. My husband found mine sitting in a barn in southern Michigan and gave it to me for my 40th birthday."

Jake had a similar dream, so the two car enthusiasts are a match made in heaven with their two classic cars restored.

"Jake has always wanted to restore a Trans Am," says Jasa.

The two found the Trans Am during the pandemic and made it a project to focus on as a hobby.

The Mustang is a 1965 rangoon red Mustang convertible with a white interior. The 1978 Trans Am is a blue Pontiac Trans Am with T-top.

The projects have been a work in progress over the years, and they are just putting the finishing touches on them.

"We are finishing the work on the interior

and the final wiring of the Trans Am, and we are finishing up the final work under the hood of the Mustang," says Jasa.

The couple is pleased with how their projects turned out, and when they take them out of storage, they are glad their long journey of restoring them is ending.

"We have been trailering it back and forth for engine and bodywork," says Jasa.

It's been bonding time for the couple — and for Jake and brother AJ.

"We have enjoyed spending time together, working on the cars." Jasa says.

They look forward to taking the cars on a cruise instead of putting them in the trailer to go back and forth to the garage.

People wanted to buy the cars before they were nearing the finish line of rebuilding them.

"We have had a few people stop and ask to buy the cars while we were working on them," says Jasa.

The first couple of times the couple took the Mustang out, they enjoyed the feedback they got for their hard work.

"When we take the Mustang out, we always get honks or waves and people telling us how good it looks," says Jasa.

Jasa has lovingly named her Mustang "Lucy Dale." Dale was her grandpa's name. Jasa says she has loved Lucy Dale since Jake gave it to her as a surprise on her 40th birthday.

"Jake gave me a big gift bag with a model of the car, and the title was taped to it. Took me a minute to realize what it was," she says.

From the first time the Clos family brought the Mustang to AJ's from the barn to when the body and paint were done to finally bringing the Mustang home last fall, it's been a labor of love. Jasa cannot wait to continue cruising in both of the cars and enter them into car shows.

"We re-did the classic cars so we can drive them, not leave them covered up in the garage," she says. ■





A LOOK at diversification

Ancient Chinese merchants were said to have developed a unique way to manage their risk. They would divide their shipments among several different vessels. That way, if one ship were to sink or be attacked by pirates, the rest stood



a good chance of getting through. Thus, the majority of the shipment could be saved.

Your investment portfolio may benefit from that same logic.

Diversification is an investment principle designed to manage risk. However, diversification does not guarantee against a loss. The key to diversification is to identify investments that may perform differently under various market conditions.

On one level, a diversified portfolio should be diversified between asset classes, such as stocks, bonds and cash alternatives. On another level, a diversified portfolio also should be

diversified within asset classes, such as a diverse basket of stocks.

A diversified approach

For example, let's say a stock portfolio included a computer company, a software developer and an internet service provider. Although the portfolio has spread its risk among three companies, it may not be considered well diversified, as all the firms are connected to the technology industry. A portfolio that includes a computer company, a drug manufacturer, and an oil service firm, however, may be considered more diversified.

Similarly, a bond portfolio that invests exclusively in long-term U.S. Treasuries may have limited diversification. A bond fund that invests in short-term and long-term U.S. Treasuries, plus a variety of corporate bonds, may offer more diversification.

Mutual Funds and ETFs

The concept of diversification is one reason why mutual funds and Exchange Traded

Funds (ETFs) are so popular among investors. Mutual funds accumulate a pool of money that is invested to pursue the objectives stated in the fund's prospectus. The fund may have a narrow objective, such as the auto sector, or it may have a broader objective, such as largecap stocks. ETFs also can have a narrow or broader investment objective. Keep in mind, though, the more narrow an investment objective, the more limited the diversification. Furthermore, a narrow investment objective may result in more volatility and additional risks associated with a particular industry or sector.

The concept of diversification is critical to understand when you are evaluating a portfolio.

OPTIONS for helping pay for assisted living

Assisted living communities provide personalized care in a social setting with the goal of preserving your independence as long as possible. Assisted living focuses on keeping you active and encouraging you to continue living life to its fullest.

Looking into the investment to live in assisted living can be daunting. Many people wonder how they can afford to cover the cost. It is a common misconception that Medicare will assist in paying for assisted living. It does not. However, there are




some options for those who need the benefit of assisted living and cannot afford the entirety of the monthly payment.

If you are a veteran, a spouse to a veteran, or the surviving spouse of a veteran, you may be eligible to receive funds for assisted living through the Veteran's Aid and Attendance program. Veteran's Aid and Attendance assistance is in addition to the normal veteran's pension amount. The Veterans Administration does not pay the assisted living directly; you receive the funds and then pay the assisted living to help cover the costs.

There are qualifications in order to receive funds from this program. including an honorable discharge and the receiver must be 65 or older and have monthly income below the limits set by the Veterans Administration. You also must meet medical requirements such as the need of assistance with activities of daily living. Activities of daily living include help with dressing, bathing, medication management, and more.

Another option for those who need financial assistance for assisted living



is elderly waiver. Elderly waiver is a Medicaid-based program that provides funding assistance for those who need the extra service and support that assisted living provides. Elderly waiver also has eligibility requirements. You must be an Iowa resident 65 or older, you must need assistance with ADLs, and there are also asset and income limits. It is important to note that not all assisted livings accept elderly waiver as payment.

Another option to assist with paying for assisted living is long-term care insurance. Many long-term care insurance policies will also provide coverage for assisted living care. Not all policies are the same. Check with your long-term care insurance provider to see if and what they will cover for assisted living. If you do not yet have long-term care insurance, the sooner you get it the better, as the premiums increase with age. Generally, between the ages of 50-65 is the most cost effective time to buy long-term care insurance. The younger you are, the lower the premium will be, but you will be paying that premium for a longer period of time.

Tour different assisted living communities, find out what their requirements are, and always plan ahead. As you can imagine, many of our seniors are on fixed incomes. If you may need to take advantage of the elderly waiver program, it's important to research what communities accept the waiver program and inquire about their waiting lists. This is a great time to get a plan in place and share it with your loved ones so they can be ready to support you when the time comes.



DOES my kid need glasses?

Near-sighted kids are easily caught with a standard vision test. Most children are far-sighted, which is harder to check. There are three things to watch for depending on the severity of the prescription. The mildest symptoms are headaches, tired eyes or avoiding reading for long periods of time. They may also become class clowns as a way to avoid reading. The headaches typically occur in the early afternoon.



The second symptom is complaining that the board is blurry, especially after reading. This mimics near-sightedness, but it's actually due to a muscle cramp inside the eye. The eye works so hard to focus on things up close that it can't adjust properly to see things at a distance. Most children with these first two categories of symptoms will need reading glasses, which they usually outgrow by their teens.

The most severe symptom is an eye turn towards the nose, which is caused by a high prescription. When we look at something up close, we use two systems to focus: We add power to keep it in focus, and we bring our two eyes inward to keep it as one image. If the overall glasses prescription is too powerful, both systems must be used for distance, causing one eye to turn towards the nose. This type of eye turn generally requires glasses and sometimes vision therapy before surgery is considered. ■

As school approaches in August, many children will return to carrying backpacks to and from school. Here are a few tips to help our students fit and carry their backpacks:

• Make sure the backpack is positioned over the mid-back muscles.

• Do not carry more than 10-15% of your body weight in the backpack. For a child who weighs 50 pounds, he/she should carry no more than 7.5

pounds. A child who weighs 80 pounds should carry no more than 12 pounds. A child who weighs 100 pounds should carry no more than 15 pounds.

• Make sure to wear both shoulder straps, and wide shoulder straps are preferred to distribute the weight evenly.


• Backpacks with multiple compartments are preferred for small items, allowing larger and heavier items to be placed in the center of the bag and positioned closest to the wearer.

• Take off the backpack while standing.

OPTIONS for straightening teeth

One common question discussed among patients and dental professionals is, "What are my options to make my teeth straight?" Most options to straighten teeth are about braces and clear trays. Braces are bonded onto teeth in specific spots, with wires laced through to allow assistance in moving the teeth. Monthly visits to the dental office with adjustments of brackets, wires and chains help make the process easier, quicker and more efficient. Clear trays are



completed in a series of multiple trays changed out every two to three weeks. Before the first tray, filling material is placed on teeth for the trays to snap and stay in the mouth. The trays are then removed while eating but worn the rest of the day. After the braces process is complete, wearing a retainer for top and bottom teeth is most important. In the future, teeth have a tendency to move back to their original position before braces when the retainer is not worn. Benefits of doing braces, other than a confident smile, are easier oral care of brushing and flossing and eliminating occlusion of the teeth coming together, overbite of the front teeth, and tooth pain caused from misaligned teeth. If you have any questions about what you can do to correct misaligned teeth, discuss with your dentist the options they would recommend for you. ■

KLINE shares a bountiful gift

Harvest benefits charitable groups.

A well-known Bible verse savs, "Remember that whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully" (2 Corinthians 9:6). That theme seems to relate to the garden of Scott Kline of Bondurant.

This is the second summer that Kline has grown vegetables in Bondurant to give to charitable recipients in the area, and the harvest is expected to be bountiful. He has previously given vegetables to Lutheran Church of Hope, which he attends, for those in need, but this year he is expanding.



Scott Kline keeps his garden watered to get the best harvest he can.

"I'm planning to give to some of the food pantries and homeless shelters this year," he says. "Last year I planted 65 tomato plants; this year I planted 80. And last year I picked a little over 1,000 tomatoes. We canned 131 quarts of spaghetti sauce."

Kline, who previously lived in Ames, is friends with Keith Williamson, who owns and operates Williamson Repair & Tire in Bondurant. When Williamson heard that Kline wanted to find a place to grow a garden, Williamson offered a spot behind his shop. Kline quickly accepted, and the two worked to prepare the land for gardening, scraping the grass off the ground, adding compost, and tilling to eliminate some areas with too much sand or clay near the surface.

Kline says he is grateful to Williamson for letting him use the land for free — and for even installing a water spigot on the back of the shop. He doesn't charge Kline anything for using the water.

Because Kline has a full-time job in building maintenance, he's figured out ways to "work smarter" in his garden, but it still requires a lot of time.

"Before it starts getting picked, I spend probably two hours a week, just to water," he says. "After I till everything, I lay down landscape fabric and make holes for the plants so there's no weeding."

Once harvest time rolls around, that increases to around eight hours per week, and Kline is grateful for the help of his girlfriend, Heidi. Kline squeezes in time to take care of the garden whenever it's needed, including an 8 a.m. watering trip on the Fourth of July.

This year, Kline's garden, which measures 12 feet by 46 feet, includes 52 pepper plants (Super Chili, Jalapeno, Hot Banana, Sweet Banana, Green Bell and Sweet Red Italian), 18 cucumber plants (Burpless and Space Master), 80 tomato plants (Roma, Jet Star, Early Girl and Better Boy), and many green bean plants. He says he experiments with new methods to make his plants healthy and productive.

Kline's explanation for his generous project is simple.

"God gave me the green thumb, and I like watching things grow."

Specific details can be found in Chapter 82 of the Bondurant City Code. Golf carts may travel the city streets of Bondurant between sunrise and sunset. All golf cart operators will first need to obtain a Golf Cart Permit from City Hall each calendar year. The Golf Cart Permit fee is \$35.
