

ADEL LIONS CLUB CAN AND BOTTLE SITE RELOCATED

As Adel residents have probably noticed, Dallas County is preparing to demolish the two buildings located on the lot on the east side of the square. This will make way for a larger parking lot for Dallas County employees. This is part of the county's investment in that area to build a new administration building at the site of the old Adel Chrysler auto business and sheriff's office and jail.

Many residents have grown accustomed to dropping off their redeemable cans and bottles at the small building located in the corner of the current parking lot. All proceeds raised from this Lions Club project are used for community projects.

The building has now been relocated to 302 S. Sixth St. This is across the bike trail south of



Patrick's restaurant, or just north of Arnold's Motor Supply. Many will recognize the building as where firewood has been advertised for sale for many years.

The Lions Club encourages residents to continue dropping off their redeemable bottles and cans at the new location. It's easy to get to, and the process remains the same.


BIRTHDAY SPANKINGS

At our home, a small wooden breadboard with a short handle would come out at each of our birthdays, and the party guests would laugh as the birthday kid was placed over a knee and spanked. The laughs were the greatest the time when the board broke on Steve's

bottom. That board was likely 50 years old and glued together a few times, but it makes for a good story to this day. My birthday wish was to skip the birthday spankings. For the most part, the wish was granted.

For those of you not familiar with birthday spankings, the birthday boy or girl would typically receive a hand slap on the rear for each year of the child's life. Beyond that number, a child would receive another spank "to grow on." What in the world was that?

My words are not meant to condone or condemn spanking, as you all clearly have your own strong opinions on the subject. Instead, I want to simply to point out how quickly times and traditions have changed. As for the disappearance of birthday spankings, we can certainly be grateful. At least I am.

HISTORY OF ADEL'S FIRST SCHOOLS

The first schoolhouse in Dallas County was a log cabin built by W.W. Miller. This was east of town where the historical marker is located. It was a log cabin, about 16 feet square, and built at the expense of Mr. Miller. Natural lighting was supplied by cutting a section of log out on each end. Attendance was free to all who desired to send their children. It was taught during the winter of 1847-1848 by S.K. Scovell who received a salary of \$8 per month for the threemonth term.

The first schoolhouse in Adel was a one-story frame house on Main Street just west of downtown. After several years, this building was replaced by a two-story brick structure. The first teachers were James Reed and a Miss Anderson. This brick building still stands today and is the home of the Adel Historical Museum.

An important factor in Adel's educational history was the creation of the Gregg Fund. Thomas D. Gregg

deeded 160 acres to Dallas County to establish a school. This helped fund the third school building, which was built on the same site. The three-story building was 45 feet by 90 feet and cost \$28,000 to build, plus \$4,000 for furnishings. The first classes in this building were held in 1870. At the time, it was the finest school building in the county. Just to the west of the building was a brick outhouse divided in the middle with separate entrances for boys and girls. A galvanized wash tub sat under a tree for drinking water and tin cups were hung from the tree with chains. This was probably responsible for the spread of many childhood diseases. Thanks to the urging of Dr. Scott, modern restrooms were installed in 1899, and clean drinking water was piped into the building.

Adel quickly outgrew this building and, in the spring of 1914, work began on a new building on the same lot. This three-story building was built of brick with concrete floors at a cost of \$48,946, had indoor

plumbing with two restrooms and drinking fountains, was heated with coal and had electric lights. It also had a gymnasium, considered one of the finest when built. This gym later became known as the "cracker box."

Adel's continued growth soon made more room necessary. In 1922, local contractor George Hoffman and Sons were employed to build a new primary building. This one-story building had a full basement and was built at a cost of \$19.495. The first three grades were then moved from the high school building and the first kindergarten was started. There are a few of us still around who remember starting school in what was known then as "the little building."

In 1952, a new gymnasium was built that joined the high school and primary building. Costs had gone up as this building set them back \$172,000. Four years later, an office complex was added between the two buildings at a cost of \$2,500. What a bargain.
